A sure sign that summer isn't too far in the future; don't look now, but the television networks are beginning to use re-runs.

Easter Sunday comes earlier this year than it does most years. This is because there is a full moon on Saturday.

# Crim Sees No End To Dry Conditions

"Very similar to last year-- maybe a little better," was the moisture prediction for 1967 by Lazbuddie's J.W. (Indian) Crim at his annual weather

watch at sunrise Wednesday morning. "The rains will be a little more general this year, although we won't get very much

at one time," said Crim, in indication that 1967 won't see us break out of the dry spell to any large extent.

The horizon was blotted by a thick cloud cover at sunrise Wednesday morning -- the first time in several years that the sun was completely obscured at the time of Crim's observation. Thus, he went by the almanac's listing for the time of sunrise to get the lowdown on the year's weather prospects. "Cloudiness at the time the forecast is made doesn't make a lot of difference. The main thing is the wind direction,"

Crim stated. At sunrise Wednesday, the wind was coming from almost due south, switching a bit to the southwest.

This, Crim indicates, doesn't hold promise for a lot of moisture during the year. The best direction has proven to be northeast, with northerly and northwesterly winds also said to be favorable.

The Farmer County weather prophet said the flames indicated that this year's weather might be a bit "on the rough side." He said he looked for some hail storms the latter (Continued on Page 5)

# Eye Clinic Set For Pre-Schoolers

An eye check for all children four to six years of age will be given free of charge at Friona Elementary School from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Saturday, April 8. Tests will be administered by members of New Horizons Junior Study Club who were given an eight hour training course by Betty Kimmey, assistant executive director, Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness February 6 and 7 in Amarillo.

This project is being co-sponsored by the New Horizons Junior Study Club and the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness in an effort to locate pre-school age children with visual problems before they enter school.

Today, experts know a condition known as amblyopia or "lazy eye" blindness one in 20 American youngsters. It is the leading cause of partial blindness in our children, however, in recent years it has been learned that amblyopia is almost 100 percent preventable.

The amblyopic child's eyes may look straight and bright and clear. They appear normal in many types of medical examinations. The child can play, watch television and even begin to learn to read in a seemingly usual way. But, by the time he gets his first real eye examination, the damage may have been irreparably done.

Time is a most important factor. Vision development ends by the age of six or seven. After that the amblyopic eye can no longer learn. And since it may take a year or two to correct the weak eye, experts say the child with amblyopia should be found at the age of four.

Dr. John Humphrey, city health officer, has reviewed the program and recommends that parents of children in the four to six year age bracket take advantage of this opportunity to have an eye check made.

# Bovina Group To Build Feedlot

Plans for a cattle feeding operation to ultimately handle 30,000 head of cattle has been announced at Bovina by a newly formed corporation.

The feedlot will be located on the south side of highway 60 on land purchased from Jack Dinn, Clovis.

Pens for approximately 10,000 will be constructed this year, with others to be added as they are needed, according to present plans.

For a comparison, Friona Feed Yards currently has around 27,500 capacity.

A grain preparation mill will be installed at the Bovina facility to handle a capacity of 30,000 head.

The site is four miles southwest of Bovina and eight miles northeast of Texico-Farwell.

Owners of the cattle feeding operation will be G.D. Anderson, who is co-owner and manager of Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevators in Farmer County; John Douglas Pittman of Hereford; Owen Seaman of Hereford, and A.R. Dillard, Jr. Wichita Falls in conjunction with Jack Dinn.

Also a stockholder in the co-operation will be Casper C. Neagle of Roswell, who will manage the feedlot in Bovina.

Construction on the facility is expected to get underway within the next 30 days, Anderson announced this week.

"We would like to have the plant in operation in six months, but the beginning time is uncertain now," Anderson commented.

The cattle feeding corporation will be called the Farmer County Cattle Co.

Installation of the feeding facilities will provide another major industry for the Farmer County area. When the feedlot is operating at capacity, 20 or more people are expected to be employed.

In addition to the payroll, the increased use of locally produced feed will make a stronger market for milo and ensilage. This too can be of economic benefit to the area in general.

"This area is as good as any from the standpoint of feed production," Anderson said. Plans for the feedlot construction have been underway for a year or more.

# Funnels Cavort Around Friona

What started out to be a calm Sunday afternoon shower spawned several apparent tornadoes in the Friona area last Sunday, while portions of the

area received close to an inch of moisture, the most at one time in almost six months. Several residents of Friona reported seeing funnels "in the

making," and at least one which touched ground briefly in open country just north of town.

Meanwhile, all farmers near Hub may not have seen funnels, but the aftermath on some farms left little doubt that funnels must have been at work.

On the Edward Engram farm a mile east of Hub, a 20x40 storage shed was completely demolished, with parts of the tin building strewn for many yards.

A mile northeast of Engram, on the John Renner place, a big 20-foot metal cattle self-feeder was picked up and thrown through two heavy corral fences, coming to rest some 50 yards from its original location, twisted and ruined.

A pile of sheet iron was also scattered for several yards. Rainfall was as varied as the difference in locations. The measurement in Friona was only .09 inches, but the fall to the south and east was apparently heavier. Dwan Menefee, two miles south, reported a half inch.

Close to an inch was reported by Arthur Drake and V.J. Zeman, just south of Friona. It amounted to .7 inches at the D.L. Carmichael farm near Black.

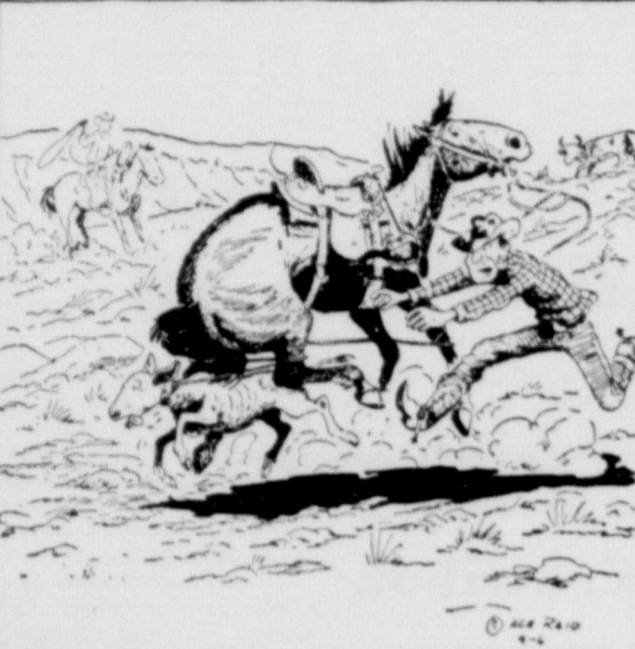

## Pause And Reflect

(Discussion of Communism's rules for membership, continued from last week.)

11. Each member party must have "Democratic Centralism" so it can accurately receive orders and information from the International Committee.

"The great rule of conduct for us in regard to foreign nations is, in extending our commercial relations to have with them as little political connection as possible. So far as we have already formed engagements, let them be fulfilled with perfect goodfaith. Here let us stop," George Washington's Farewell Address

12. Each member party agrees to co-operate with central decisions of the International Committee.

"When we review the calamities which afflict so many other nations, the present condition of the United States affords much matter of consolation and satisfaction," - George Washington

13. Each member party must give every possible support to the Soviet Republic in their war against imperialism.

"Thus supported by a firm trust in the Great Arbitrator of the Universe, aided by the collected wisdom of the Union, and imploring the divine benediction on our joint exertions in the service of our country, I readily engage with you in the arduous but pleasing task of attempting to make a nation happy," George Washington

14. Each member party must work out its propaganda program to comply with the guidelines set by the International Committee.

"A violent man enticeth his neighbor, and leadeth him into a way that is not good," Proverbs XVI: 29

15. In case of party conflict within said country all true communist member party are to submit entirely to the orders and directions of the Executive Committee of the International.

"The said states hereby severally enter into a firm league of friendship with each other, for their common defense, the security of their Liberties, and their mutual and general welfare, binding themselves to assist each other, against all force offered to, or attacks made upon them or on account of religion, sovereignty, trade, or any other pretense whatsoever. - Articles of Confederation - Article III

16. Each member party will officially adopt the name given it by the International Committee.

"We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and other Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America," - Preamble to the Constitution.

17. Each member party will publish for circulation the Chief Documents of the International.

"A hypocrit with his mouth destroyeth his neighbor; but through knowledge shall the just be delivered," - Prov. XI:9

18. Each Central Committee of the member party must have on its membership two-thirds of comrades already members of an International party, even if the membership origin be outside of said country. This same procedure will include all local cells.

"The wicked have drawn out the sword, and have bent the bow, to cast down the poor and needy, and to slay such as be of upright conversation. Their sword shall enter into their own heart, and their bows shall be broken," - Psalms XXXVII: 14-15.

19. Any member party who rejects these principles is to be expelled from the Congress of the International Communist Party.

"And fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul; but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell," - Matthew XX:28.

## Texas Draft Call For May Listed At 885

The state's 155 draft boards will be called upon to furnish 885 men for the armed forces in May, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, stat Selective Service director, said Thursday. This compares with quotas of 675 for April 761, for March, 674 for February, and 1,110 for January.

There will be no quotas for the physical and mental pre-induction examination of men in April, Colonel Schwartz said. This continues a ban on examinations since early January because of the budgetary limitation of travel funds.

The state Selective director said no decision had been made as to whether or not examinations would be held in May.

He said Texas currently had sufficient examined and acceptable men to fill current quotas.

Induction quotas for the Army by Texas draft boards in the fall of 1966 reached as high as 2,700 monthly.

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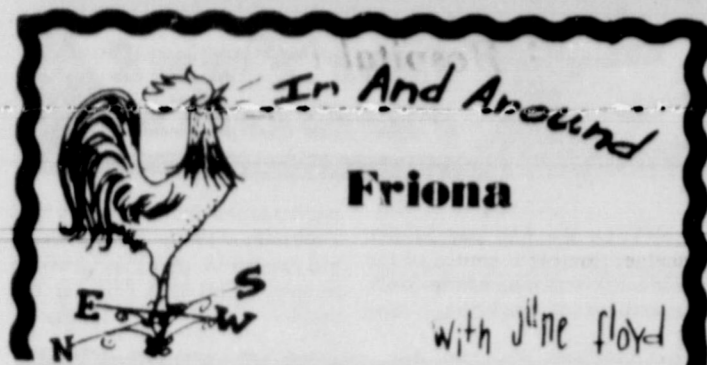

One of the most interesting visitors we've had in the star office in a long time was Mrs. Ethel Moyer. She came in to renew her subscription Tuesday morning and chatted with us for several minutes. Mrs. Moyer has been gone from Friona for many years. She is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sutton.

Her father first purchased land north of town in 1906 and built a large middle America type barn and house before moving his family here from Ohio in 1907. He later served as a local postmaster.

Mrs. Moyer remembers packs of lobo wolves and herds of wild mustangs roaming the Tierra Blanca and adjacent areas when she was a small girl. "My mother was a good marksman," she said. Then added, "Pioneer women had to learn to shoot to protect themselves and their children during the absence of their husbands."

Ethel Sutton started to school in the first school building in Friona. It was a frame structure located on the same property Friona elementary school now occupies. Later she attended school in the community in which her family resided. The school was first known as the Sutton School and later as the Maurer School.

Mrs. Lawrence Lillard, the former Edith Maurer, was Mrs. Moyer's teacher at the time she attended the rural school. She was graduated from Hereford High School in 1917. After attending a business school in Amarillo for a time she became employed at the Harvey House Newstand and was transferred from Amarillo to Oklahoma City then to Houston, where she met George Moyer, who later became her husband.

The Moyers have lived in California for a number of years. They were overnight guests in the home of Mrs. Edith Lillard and visited with other old timers before proceeding westward.

**On-The Farm In Parmer County**

The week of March 19-25 has been designated as National Poison Prevention Week. Its purpose is to call attention to the dangers created by the increasing use of such toxic substances as medicines, polishes, cleaners, solvents, pesticides, and others.

Some 600,000 Americans may suffer from accidental poisoning this year unless people become more careful about handling and using harmful chemicals. Over 80 per cent of the victims will probably be children under five years of age. In his official proclamation designating the week, President Lyndon B. Johnson pointed out that caution is necessary in using potentially dangerous products. This includes taking the time and trouble to store harmful chemical beyond the reach of children.

Among the most common sources of poisoning are medicines, including aspirin; household items such as kerosene, lighter fluid, furniture polish, paint, shoe polish, turpentine, pesticides; insecticides and rodenticides.

Farm chemicals, garden supplies and poisonous household items should be stored under lock and key especially if small children are present. Small children cannot read and do not recognize the danger involved.

They are attracted by the shape and color of containers, and anything that looks edible often winds up in their mouths.

**CONTROL SHADE TREE BORERS**

Many pests of ornamental trees and shrubs will soon be active. Prevention is the best method for holding plant damage to a minimum. This is particularly true in controlling shade tree borers.

The most important borer species includes the round-headed and flatheaded borers. The adults of the roundheaded borers are known as long-horned beetles because they generally have antennae as long or longer than their body. The larvae (borers) make galleries beneath the bark and also tunnel into the heartwood.

The adults of the flatheaded borers are generally beautifully colored or metallic, boat-shaped beetles. The typical injury caused by the larvae (borers) consists of rather shallow long, winding, oval galleries beneath the bark.

A few species of wood borers will attack trees and shrubs already weakened or injured by transplant shock, drought, poor soil fertility, mechanical damage or other means. Keeping the plants in a vigorous growing condition is important in preventing damage to established plants.

There is a wide variation in the life cycle or developmental stages of wood borers. Some species emerge as adults in the early spring and begin egg laying. Others emerge and deposit eggs in cracks and crevices in the bark. Upon hatching, the young borers begin their tunneling.

To prevent newly-hatched borers from becoming established in a tree, it is necessary to apply an insecticide to the trunks and lower branch prior to egg hatch. The first application should be made in early spring soon after the leaves appear. An effective spray treatment is a mixture of DOT-malathion. A copy of L-199, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants, can be obtained at the County Agent's office.

Following the insecticide application, trunks of young or transplanted trees should be wrapped with nursery wrapping paper, burlap, aluminum foil or newspaper to prevent egg laying by the adult borers. Be sure to use these insecticides in wettable powder form on young trees to avoid injury to the bark when wrapped. Keep the wrapping on all year and replace when it becomes torn.

There is no magic formula which can be applied to the soil or trunk of the tree which will kill wood borers in the trees.

If you have a child under five, the chances of him being accidentally poisoned this year are one in 38! Those are not very good odds -- particularly when your child's life is at stake. Before you say it is impossible for a child to be poisoned in your home, think about how many times you have known children to accomplish the impossible. Most accidental poisonings can be related to patterns of storage, handling, and disposal. Don't underestimate your children's ability to crawl, climb, or reach almost anywhere. Allow for the impossible when handling, storing, or disposing of medicines or household products.

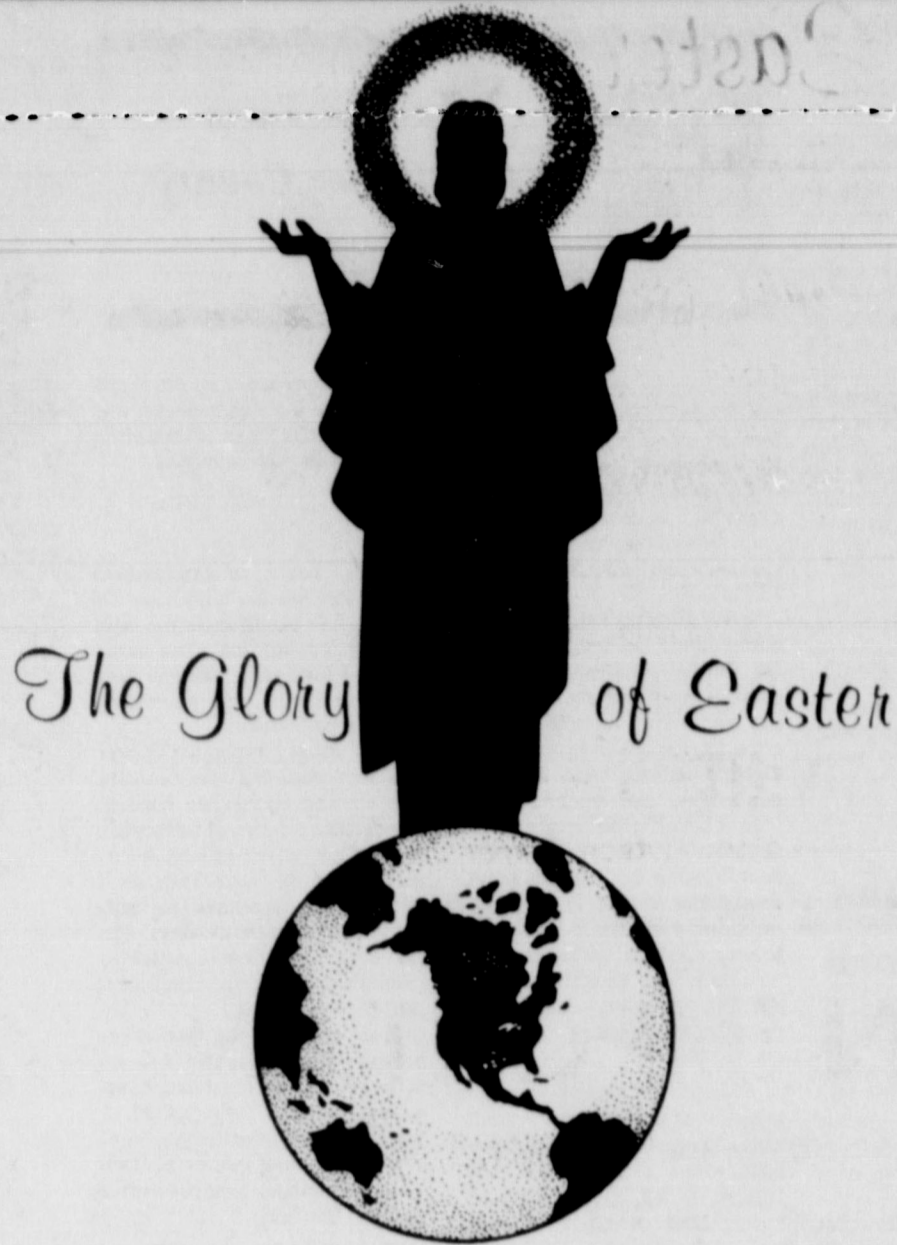
The Extension Service, as an educational agency is prepared to give assistance to any group who is interested in extending the educational opportunity of our Latin American families through improved methods in Home Economics.

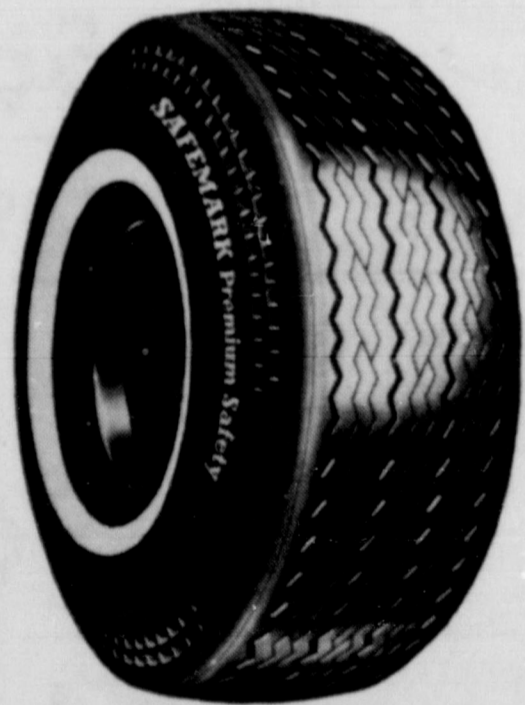

Robert Lloyd, 1948 graduate of Friona High School and son of Fred Lloyd, was honored recently in Hereford as "Outstanding Farmer of the Year," by the Hereford Lions Club.

Lloyd was chosen by a committee of the Hereford Lions. He farms 800 acres of land, with his major crops being wheat, milo and soy beans. He has been a farmer in Deaf Smith County since 1950, and has farmed in his present location for the past 10 years.

## Hightower Blasts Liquor Proposition

Senator Jack Hightower, Vernon, said Thursday that Governor John Connally's proposed liquor-by-the-drink tax revenue measure "would create more problems than it would solve."

In his address to the legislature, the Governor said that the proposed tax on the liquor sales would add \$15 million to the state's revenue during the next biennium.

The Senator also questioned the advisability of the Governor's proposed repeal of the Colson - Ericsson Act under which state funds are allotted for construction of farm-to-market roads.

"I am in agreement with Governor Connally's statement that increased effectiveness in enforcement of laws relating to private clubs and the sale of liquor are essential," the senator said.

"I do not think that there will be any tangible benefits for the state under the liquor-by-the-drink proposal, even though it was proposed as a revenue measure," Senator Hightower said.

"However, I do not believe that the legalization of liquor by the drink is necessary to accomplish this. Such legislation would, in my opinion, create more problems than it would solve."

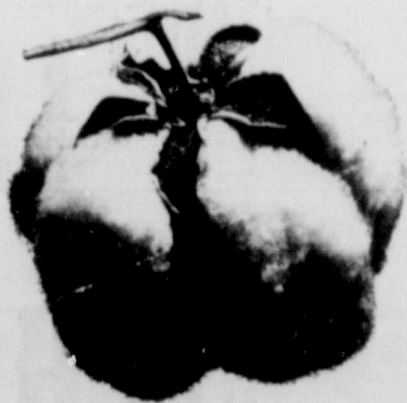

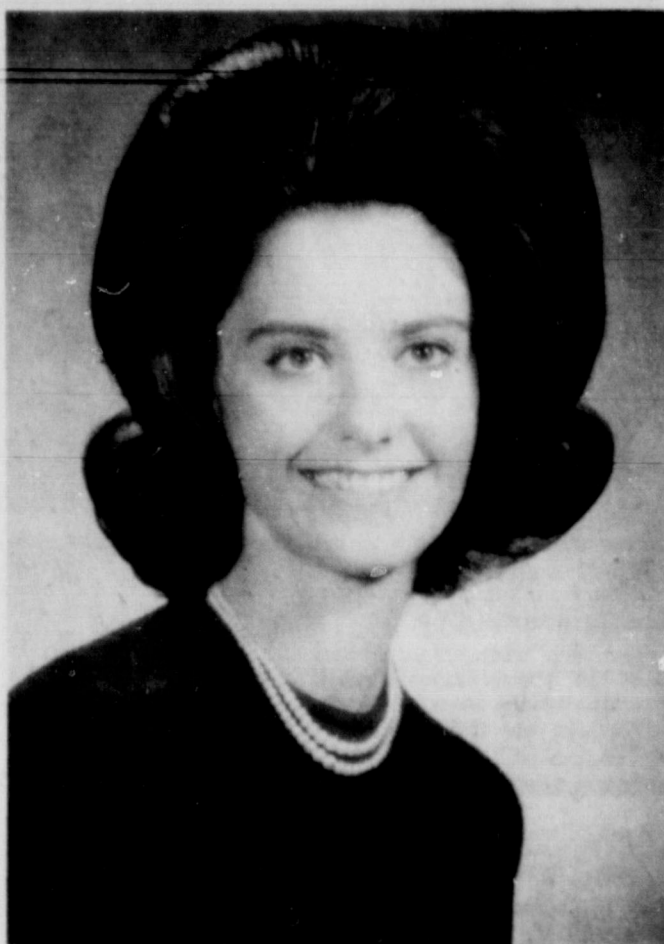
