With the announcements in the past two months of three new plants for the immediate Friona area, th outlook for the future of Friona has been boosted tremendously.

The attitude of the people has made a complete "about-face" from the doledrum situation which had existed up until a couple of months or so back,

As one fellow pretty well summed it up: "It's been better for our area than a good slow 12-inch rain."

The announcement on April 13 by Hi-Plains Feed Yard of the new facility west of town was the kickoff of the new "boom" for Friona, Construction of the new feeding operation, which is to eventually approach 50,000 capacity, is progressing nicely.

Then on April 27 came the clincher with the announcement by Missouri Beef Packers of the beef packing plant which will be the nation's largest, to be located three miles southwest of

Preliminary work is now underway at the packing plant site with preparation of the land taking up the time presently.

In last week's issue, we announced the latest addition to Friona's industrial lineup, the feedlot supplement manufacturing plant, which goes right alon with the cattle-feeding industry which is beginning to come of age in Friona.

Because of the location of new industry, the expected growth of Friona, both in the residential and business district, is caus-

ing a lot of talk about town. Several rumors are flying back and forth about the proposed location in Friona of various chain stores. As of the present, Mrs. Bernie Gowens and Mrs. we have nothing definite to announce, but expect that we will have within a short time.

Cattle Feeding Took Major Upswing In '62

(Editor's note: This is the first of a series of articles dealing with cattle feeding in the Friona area.)

Cattle feeding in the Friona area, which is about to become "major league" in proportions got its first major impetus about five years ago, with the founding of Friona Feed Yards, Inc.

In 1962, a group of local farmer-cattlemen consolidated their resources for the purpose of finishing their own feeders and those of their neighbors. The result was the birth of Friona Feed Yards.

Since the first load of cattle was unloaded in April, 1963, Friona Feed Yards has become one of the largest operations in the state, handling over 70,500

cattle per year. Managing the local operation is a man with previous feeding experience in the Greely, Colorado, area, -- Jack Carrothers. Carrothers came to the Friona area in 1962, to help design and build the feedlot. He resides at 604 Etta Ave. in Friona.

Capacity of the 220-acre yard is 28,000 cattle. The pushbutton mill can handle 350 tons of mixed rations in 14 hours. Two silage pits at the yards have

a capacity of 23 tons, and 28 tons of corn silage, this silage being obtained locally. Corn is grown for the com-

pany under contract, and is stored in the two pits. "It's a good economical feed

and we use silage and "dehy pellets" in preference to alfalfa hay," says Carrothers. "This is mainly because of the convenient handling of si-


Incoming steers weigh from 600 to 1,100 pounds. The average feeding period is about 130 days. Cattle at the lots run 80 per cent steers an 20 per cent heifers on the average. Friona Feed Yards, besides feeding cattle on a custom basis. also feeds as a corporation, and strives to keep at least a third of their pens filled with company owned cattle.

The yards were built large enough to achieve the advantages of mass production with maximum efficiency, giving feeders complete freedom as to choice of cattle and length of feeding time. The employees number 25 at the present time, all from the local area. The mill is handled by one man, assisted by a helper who handles the silage.

Cattle owned by the stockholders are handled like custom-fed feeders. The owners pay for feed, plus a mark-up to cover labor and operation expense,

Spring and fall months have proven the best feeding time in Friona. Because of the 4,000-foot elevation, summer gains are also good.



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AN EDITORIAL

Space For Miracles

In the United States we, more than most other peoples, have been blessed with vast and fertile lands. They have been bountiful in yielding food and fuels, clothing and shelter, minerals and mountainous harvests of all the things our people have required.

But, many Americans have accepted the bounty and beauty of the land without recognizing the burdens we impose upon it. We live in a time of mushrooming population; sprawling cities, superhighways, airports, parking lots, seashores and scenic monuments, wilderness areas and parks are encroaching upon the nation's productive land at a fan-

This year, again, there are quarrels between the productive users of our land, and those who prefer that more land be set aside for recreational, esthetic and cultural purposes. No one questions the conviction and dedication of those who wish to preserve wilderness areas, establish parks and protect the scenic grandeur of our country. But the stark reality is that the thousands of products which our forests yield for our people are of tremendous national significance, too. Growing trees and harvesting them in an endless cycle is an absolute essential if our country is to prosper

It is elemental that trees require land. It is equally obvious that this is one national resource which can be replenished, by forest regeneration. This is not true of petroleum or minerals, for example. When these resources are depleted they are gone forever. The replenishment cycle for our forests can be accomplished only if sufficient land is provided for the regrowth process.

Yet, if the Congress were to pass, in their present forms, just those bills which the Secretary of Interior has put forward this year to establish new Federal parks and trails, the impact upon our timberlands would be catastrophic, so seriously would they reduce the nation's opportunity to grow trees, harvest them, and replant.

It is the land itself which is the priceless natural resource of our nation. It can never be enlarged. Given access to the land we can grow trees forever. Denied the land, we

Nearer To Goal



Also they are resistant to sunlight and weather, not affected by moths, mildew or bacteria. Also the Polyesters do not sag or shrink. Oily stains are best removed before washing by rubbing a paste of detergent into fabric before washing.

Take precaution when wash-

washer. Articles washed next in the machine will pick up the glass particles left behind from the fiberglass fabric. The particles are so tiny they can't be removed. When the articles come in contact with the skin, the small glass fragments will work into the skin and are impossible to be located even by a doctor.



Water Needs Of Cotton **Outlined For Farmers**

Cotton that received good rains this past week should have enough moisture in the ground to last for a while.

Watering cotton too early can lead to troubles. If watered too early (before white blooms anpear) cotton tends to keep growing in a vegetative manner and doesn't start fruiting early. Early irrigation can lower soil temperatures and encourage blights, wilts and seedling dis-

Irrigating too early can also keep roots from penetrating deep in the soil. If roots haven't penetrated deep in the soil, the normally hot, dry weather of August (not like last year) will cause plants to become moisture stressed. An inadequate root system means farmers won't be able to irrigate their cotton often enough at this time to keep plants adequately supplied with water.

Highest water requirements of cotton plants occurs at peak bloom stage. At this stage, area is August 20.

Right now, 157 children in the county receives \$7,806 per month, based on the social security accounts of their deceased, retired, or disabled parents.

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




