



With the announcements in the past two months of three new plants for the immediate Friona area, the outlook for the future of Friona has been boosted tremendously.

The attitude of the people has made a complete "about-face" from the doleful situation which had existed up until a couple of months or so back.

As one fellow pretty well summed it up: "It's been better for our area than a good slow 12-inch rain."

The announcement on April 13 by Hi-Plains Feed Yard of the new facility west of town was the kickoff of the new "boom" for Friona. Construction of the new feeding operation, which is to eventually approach 50,000 capacity, is progressing nicely.

Then on April 27 came the clincher with the announcement by Missouri Beef Packers of the beef packing plant which will be the nation's largest, to be located three miles southwest of town.

Preliminary work is now underway at the packing plant site with preparation of the land taking up the time presently.

In last week's issue, we announced the latest addition to Friona's industrial lineup, the feedlot supplement manufacturing plant, which goes right along with the cattle-feeding industry which is beginning to come of age in Friona.

Because of the location of new industry, the expected growth of Friona, both in the residential and business district, is causing a lot of talk about town.

Several rumors are flying back and forth about the proposed location in Friona of various chain stores. As of the present, we have nothing definite to announce, but expect that we will have within a short time.

transfer into the school district while four will transfer out of the district next fall.

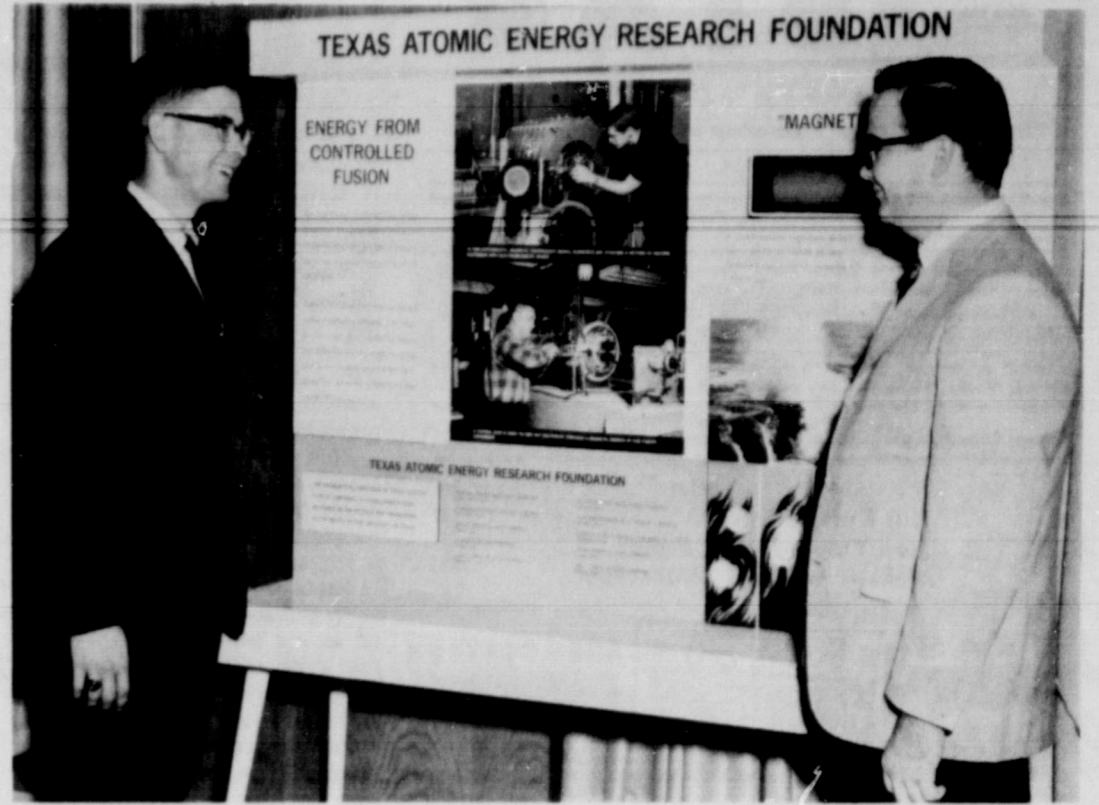
Farr also reported that the new 1967 International 60-passenger school bus has been delivered.

Cattle Feeding Took Major Upswing In '62

(Editor's note: This is the first of a series of articles dealing with cattle feeding in the Friona area.)

Cattle feeding in the Friona area, which is about to become "major league" in proportions got its first major impetus about five years ago, with the founding of Friona Feed Yards, Inc. In 1962, a group of local farmer-cattlemen consolidated their resources for the purpose of finishing their own feeders and those of their neighbors. The result was the birth of Friona Feed Yards.

CONTENTED COW . . . A number of ingredients are utilized by the feedyard in their feeding program. Dehy pellets, silage, milo, mineral rice hulls, fat, molasses and a protein supplement treated with 70 milligrams of antibiotic are just a few of the ingredients included in each animal's daily ration.

Since the first load of cattle was unloaded in April, 1963, Friona Feed Yards has become one of the largest operations in the state, handling over 70,500 cattle per year.

Managing the local operation is a man with previous feeding experience in the Greeley, Colorado, area, -- Jack Carrothers. Carrothers came to the Friona area in 1962, to help design and build the feedlot. He resides at 604 Etta Ave. in Friona.

Capacity of the 220-acre yard is 28,000 cattle. The push-button mill can handle 350 tons of mixed rations in 14 hours. Two silage pits at the yards have

a capacity of 23 tons, and 28 tons of corn silage, this silage being obtained locally.

Corn is grown for the company under contract, and is stored in the two pits.

"It's a good economical feed and we use silage and "dehy pellets" in preference to alfalfa hay," says Carrothers. "This is mainly because of the convenient handling of silage.

Incoming steers weigh from 600 to 1,100 pounds. The average feeding period is about 130 days. Cattle at the lots run 80 per cent steers an 20 per cent heifers on the average. Friona Feed Yards, besides feeding cattle on a custom basis, also feeds as a corporation, and strives to keep at least a third of their pens filled with company owned cattle.

The yards were built large enough to achieve the advantages of mass production with maximum efficiency, giving feeders complete freedom as to choice of cattle and length of feeding time. The employees number 25 at the present time, all from the local area. The mill is handled by one man, assisted by a helper who handles the silage.

Cattle owned by the stockholders are handled like custom-fed feeders. The owners pay for feed, plus a mark-up to cover labor and operation expense.

Spring and fall months have proven the best feeding time in Friona. Because of the 4,000-foot elevation, summer gains are also good.

Nearer To Goal

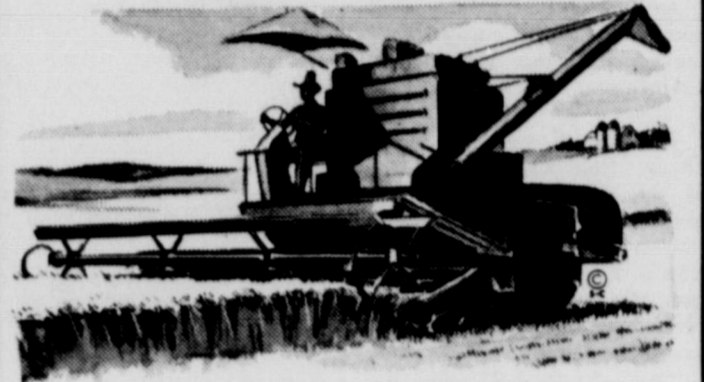
April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$4,080 in Parmer County were reported today by Frank Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee. The County's goal of \$130,000 has reached 32 per cent for the year.

Total purchases of E and H Savings Bonds in Texas for the month of April amounted to \$13,817,202. The January-

April sales for the state totaled \$56,389,486 which is an increase of 8 per cent over the same period of 1966.

Nationally, cash sales of E and H Bonds for the first four months of 1967 amounted to \$1,770 million, 4 per cent above sales during 1966. Sales of E Bonds alone for the first four months were \$1,640 million, an increase of 6.3 per cent over 1966's \$1,543 million.

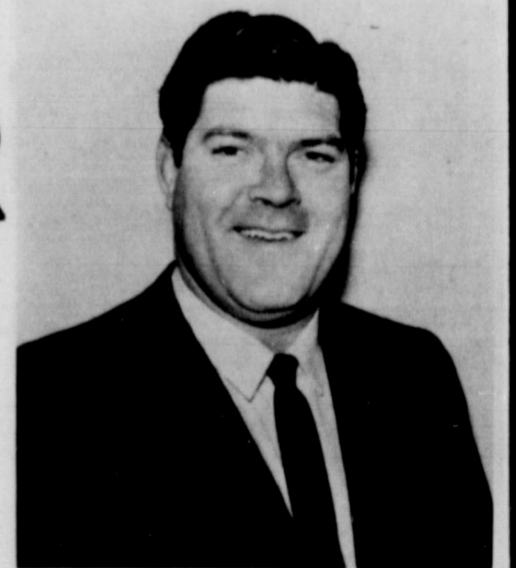

question has been raised about Friona's school situation. Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr has said that the present system could add 300 students, which would be a 25 per cent increase, without any additional building; if the students were fairly well distributed throughout the 12 grades. Friona High School can easily handle 500 students, Farr points out. The expected enrollment, based on names presently available, is that the enrollment next fall would be around 340. This means that the new high school could handle roughly a 50 per cent increase.

The only question is: How soon will this "expansion room" be taken up? This remains to be seen, of course.

Along the line of anticipated growth, members of the industrial development committee made a trip last weekend to Dennison, Iowa, to get some ideas of what Friona might

expect and plan toward. Dennison, Iowa, had a population of 3,800 in 1960, before the establishment of Iowa Beef Packers. Today, the population is estimated at 7,000. The town now has a four-year college and 170 retail businesses.

Before Iowa Beef came to Dennison, it is described as being a "less than average" town. Today, it is a thriving dynamic city. Its newspaper has gone from weekly to four issues per week.

Retail sales have jumped from \$7 million per year prior to the beef plant to \$17 million last year. These figures are not estimates, but are taken from state sales tax records.

Impossible for Friona, you say? Maybe so, but this time last year, who would have thought it possible that within a year's time we would have had three major industries announced, with construction underway on two of them?

Merchants who want to give a get-acquainted gift to newcomers should contact Mrs. Everitt immediately. She plans to start the program on Monday, June 19.



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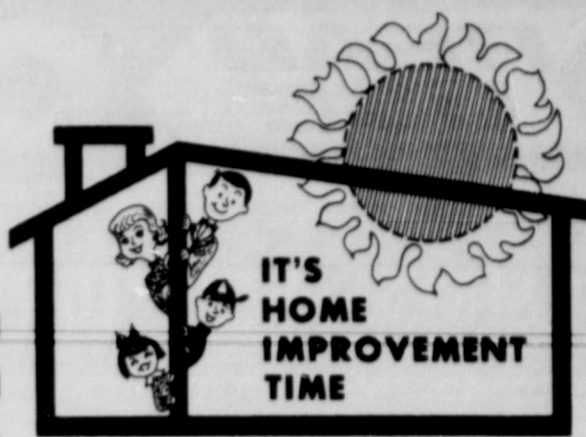

Those good ol' news leaks are on the way out, now that Texas has a law requiring public meetings to be public. Officials will now have to guard their language instead of the door.

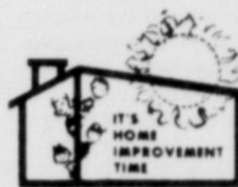

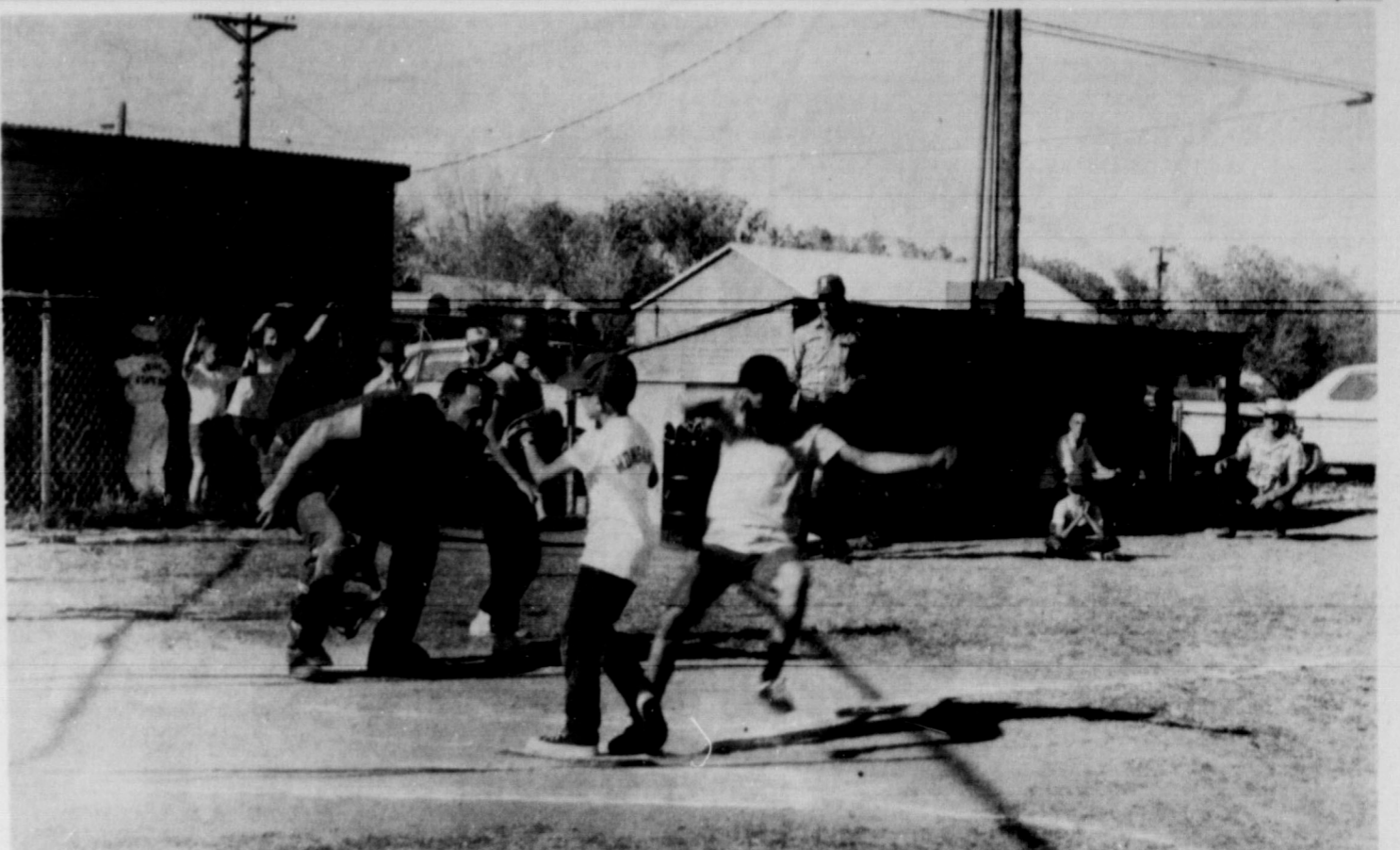
Friona Downs Dimmitt, 6-4

Phipps Has First Wheat

E.G. Phipps has harvested the first load of wheat brought to a Friona elevator for the second straight year.

Phipps brought a load of "Early Triumph" to West Friona Grain Company last Wednesday. It had a moisture content of 12.7 per cent and a test weight of 59 pounds per bushel.

The first different elevators have shared in being the recipient of the first load of wheat during the past three years. Last year Phipps had the first load for Friona Wheat Growers and in 1965, Earl Jameson brought the first load to Continental Grain.

Grain Sorghum's Water Requirements Discussed

Sorghum has an extensive root system and will penetrate the soil profile to a depth of four to six feet when sufficient soil depth is available.

Optimum yields require approximately 24 inches of useable water during the season. This moisture need may be met from moisture stored in the soil, rainfall and supplemental irrigation. For maximum efficiency the available water should be distributed through the growing season to meet the demands of the crop at the critical stages of growth—particularly at the time of boot, bloom and early grain formation.

Grain sorghum usually uses less than one-tenth inch of water per day up to seven leaf-stage. During the boot and head stages, daily use may be reduced by one-fourth if stress occurs at anytime up to the soft-dough stage.

Grain sorghum to be irrigated only one time during the growing season produces more efficiently when the application is timed at the boot stage of growth. Grain sorghum to be irrigated twice during the growing season produces most efficiently when the first application is applied at the early boot stage and the second application applied at the bloom stage of growth.

Rodriguez, who attended Friona schools, has been in the service seven months.

He was trained in the maintenance of engineer construction and earthmoving equipment. Instruction was also given in the repair of gasoline and diesel engines, air compressors, tractors, graders, crane shovels and other engineer equipment.

State's Draft

Quota Released

The state's 155 draft boards will be called upon to furnish 974 men for the armed forces in July, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

Monthly calls in the period from January through June ranged from a high of 1,110 to a low of 674.

The Selective Service boards will forward 5,016 men for draft pre-induction examination in July, an increase from 4,000 in June.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction already have been figured and mailed to the state's local boards.

Colonel Schwartz also said state Selective Service had received a quota for four doctors of osteopathy to enter the Army or Navy in July, August, and September.

The Texas quota of 974 men for July is the state's share of a national call of 19,900.



County Buyers Spend 38¢ Of Dollar For Food, Cars

How are residents of Parmer County spending their money these days?

How much of their shopping dollar goes for food, cars, clothes, furniture and other purchases in local retail stores?

According to figures for the past year, which have just become available through a new consumer market study, most of them had more money at their command and they appeared to have no reluctance about spending it.

The findings are based upon a nationwide survey made by the Standard Rate and Data Service to determine how families in each section of the country spend their retail dollar, and for what.

In Parmer County, it is shown stores selling food and automotive equipment captured a large share of the market. Together, they attracted 38 per cent of all retail business in the local area.

Food purchase alone, in bakeries, grocery stores, supermarkets, butcher shops and the like added up to \$3,521,000, an increase over the prior year's \$3,144,000.

These purchases which amounted to 17 per cent of all

retail business locally, covered only food bought for the home consumption. Not included is money spent in lunchrooms, restaurants and other dining places.

Just how much the take-home food cost, on a per-family basis, was arrived at by dividing the total expenditure by the number of families. It came to \$1,024 per family.

The report shows that automobile dealers accounted for \$342,000, as against the previous year's \$4,102,000.

Market strength was also in evidence in most other retail lines.

Variety shops and department stores carrying general merchandise grossed \$306,000 compared with the former total of \$271,000.

Apparel shops, including those selling shoes, hats, underwear and outer garments, had receipts of \$521,000. Their previous total was \$456,000.

Sales of furniture and other home furnishings came to \$72,000, as against the prior year's \$64,000.

Consumer buying throughout the nation rose 8.3 per cent in the year, the SRDS figures show. Some of it was attributable to inflation.

At Home In Parmer County

Leaders and 4-H members are busy as can be these days getting into clothing project work. These girls learn much more about clothing other than sewing up a garment.

This includes knowing about materials, fibers, care of clothes, personal development, color, lines and designs best suited to the individual figure, and many other things that contribute to their personal appearance.

The joy and satisfaction of achievement can be a very important factor in the development of youth.

The name "Polyester", has come to mean easy care fabric to most people when buying material or clothing. Polyester is the family name but there are different brand names such as Avelon, Dacron, Encron, Fortrel, Kodol, and Vycron - these all need the same washday care.

Polyester has excellent wet and dry wrinkle resistant, shape retention, durability and easy washing care. Also they are resistant to sunlight and weather, not affected by moths, mildew or bacteria. Also the Polyesters do not sag or shrink. Oily stains are best removed before washing by rubbing a paste of detergent into fabric before washing.

Take precaution when washing fiberglass curtains in the

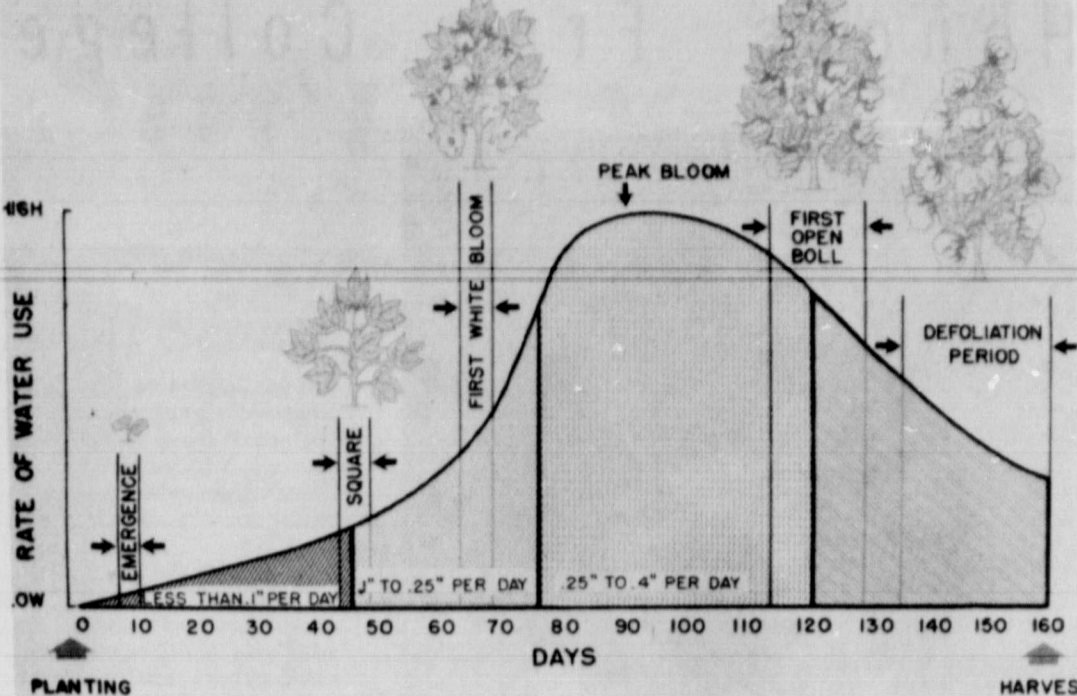
washer. Articles washed next in the machine will pick up the glass particles left behind from the fiberglass fabric. The particles are so tiny they can't be removed. When the articles come in contact with the skin, the small glass fragments will work into the skin and are impossible to be located even by a doctor.

The program marked the beginning of 4-H Clothing project work for June according to Cricket B. Taylor, County Extension Agent.

Mrs. Russell Haberer of Lazbuddie community discussed "The Question of Charm," Mrs. Hurshel Harding of Farwell, showed slides and discussed "Color for You." "Line and Design for You" was demonstrated and discussed by County Extension Agent, Cricket B. Taylor. "New Fabrics" was subject of Mrs. Rita Sue Hucker, Assistant Extension Agent from Deaf Smith County. A 4-H member, Lyme White of Farwell, gave a talk and exhibited "Slips of Modern Fashion."



Water Needs Of Cotton Outlined For Farmers

Cotton that received good rains this past week should have enough moisture in the ground to last for a while.

Watering cotton too early can lead to troubles. If watered too early (before white blooms appear) cotton tends to keep growing in a vegetative manner and doesn't start fruiting early. Early irrigation can lower soil temperatures and encourage blights, wilts and seedling diseases.

Irrigating too early can also keep roots from penetrating deep in the soil. If roots haven't penetrated deep in the soil, the normally hot, dry weather of August (not like last year) will cause plants to become moisture stressed. An inadequate root system means farmers won't be able to irrigate their cotton often enough at this time to keep plants adequately supplied with water. Highest water requirements of cotton plants occurs at peak bloom stage. At this stage,

cotton will use one-fourth to four-tenths inch per day. This compares to less than one-tenth inch per day for cotton from emergence to squaring stages. From white bloom to peak blooming stage, plants will utilize one-tenth to one-fourth acre-inches water daily.

If only one summer irrigation is possible apply it at the peak bloom stage of growth - 25 to 35 days following appearance of the first white bloom, depending upon variety. With two summer irrigations, the most efficient schedule is an irrigation at first bloom followed by a second application 25 to 35 days later.

Cotton lint quality, as well as yield, is vitally affected by irrigation practices. Irrigation after the recommended cut-off date will increase the quantity of wasty and immature fibers and subsequently lowered micronaire values and reduced spinning performance. Recommended cut-off date for this area is August 20.

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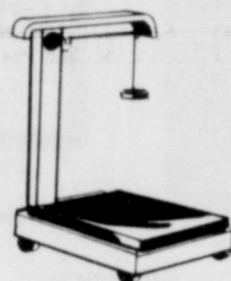

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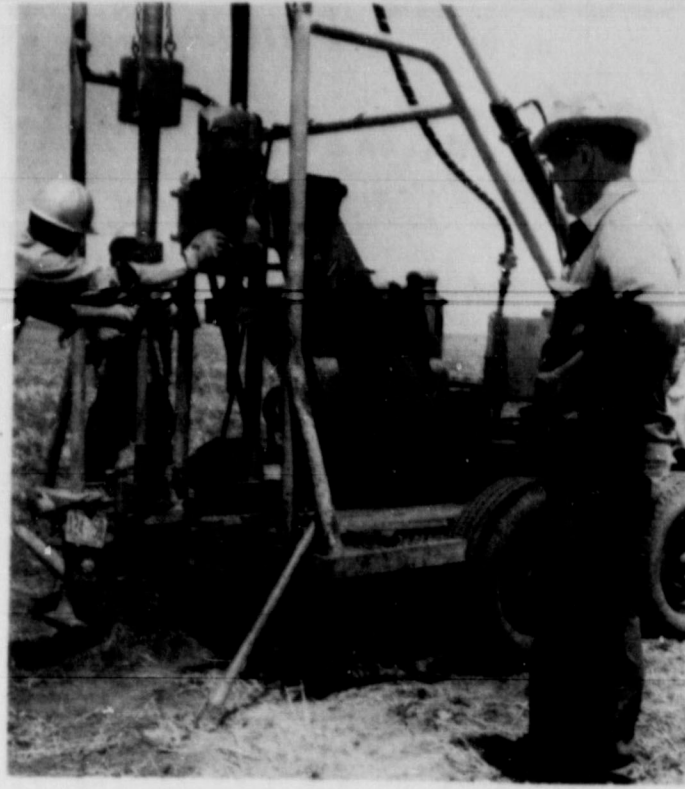
