The housing situation continues to be a big item of interest in Friona, with the projected opening date of April 1 for Missouri Beef Packers looming closer and closer all the time.

Local builders received a setback the other day when they learned that the possibility of getting loans through the Farmers Home Administration at a good interest rate were much slimmer than they at first had thought.

And, what with the increase in interest rates under conventional loans, builders are getting less and less interested in building apartments, according to a member of the Chamber of Commerce's housing committee.

At one time prior to Christmas, pledges had been received for around 50 apartments from various Friona individuals, but their interest seems to have dwindled since the holidays, according to Charles Allen, chairman of the committee.

There have been several out of town developers make inquiries and show interest in building apartments, but as of the present, none have come up with a concrete deal.

Now, with April 1 getting closer and closer, time is becoming about as much a factor as the money situation.

"If we don't come up with something, then a lot of the effort expended in getting Missouri Beef Packers to locate in Friona will have been in vain," Allen stated this week.

Residential building has picked up considerably in recent weeks, but this naturally consists of homes being built for sale, and will not alleviate the expected void in rental property.

However, a nose-count of residential building as of Tuesday morning by City Manager Jake Outland showed that eleven projects were underway, with construction estimated to cost \$201,300. In addition, construction is well underway on the new restaurant on West Highway 60.

But we're still needing apartments and/or apartment builders in Friona, and the sooner the better.

Raymond Fleming, who built a 10-unit apartment complex in 1967, indicates he would like to build a similar set of apartments, if arrangements can be worked out.

All 10 of Fleming's new apartments are rented, so it won't be a factor in the expected influx on or after April 1.

Last week Nelson Lewis was beating the drums in his "Pause and Reflect" column for a museum in Friona.

An indication of what can be done is seen by visiting the Deaf Smith County museum at Hereford. This museum was started by our neighboring citizens last summer, and already is very impressive.

Naturally, it isn't as big and inclusive as is the museum on the West Texas State campus at Canyon, for example, but already the Deaf Smith County Museum has done a good job of preserving artifacts of its immediate area.

Sections of the Deaf Smith County Museum are laid off as rooms as they would appear in the typical West Texas home around the turn of the century. They have been made more realistic through the use of store manikins.

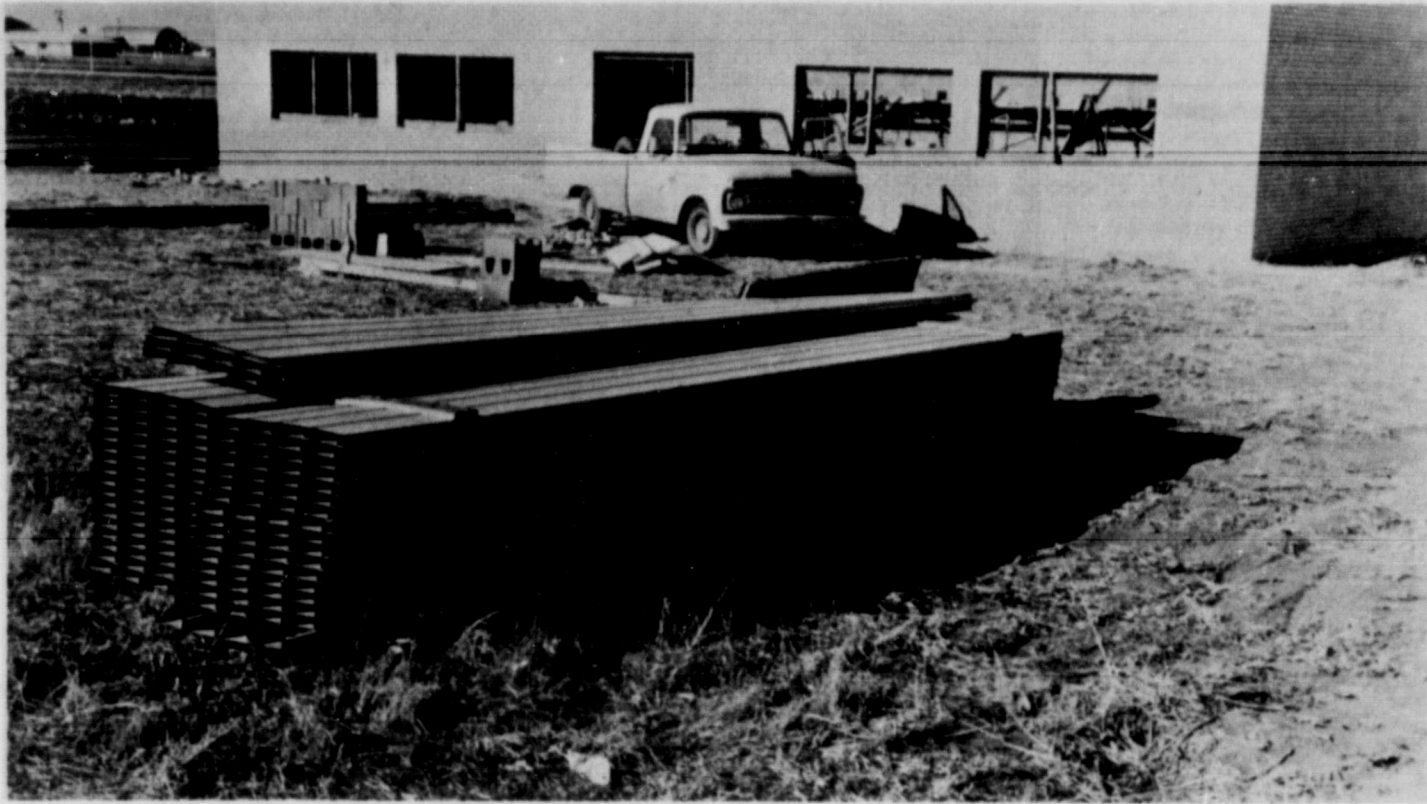
Anyway, Lewis' project has made some headway locally. He has been given permission to use a showcase at Friona Junior High School, for display purposes.

Lewis thinks that from this beginning, area residents might want to loan some of their items for display, until eventually a museum can become a reality.

We agree that a museum would be a real fine addition to Friona, both (ultimately) as a tourist attraction, but primarily to preserve the records and evidences of our early way of life.

## MANY UNREGISTERED

### Registration Date Approaching

Just two weeks remain before the deadline for registering to vote in 1968 elections, and still hundreds of Farmer County residents have not yet applied for their voting certificates.

Voters are warned that everyone must register this year, even voters over 60 years of age, who previously have not been required to register in Farmer County.

Application may be made either by mail or by personal appearance at the county tax assessor-collector's office in Farwell, or at the Ethridge-Spring Insurance Agency in Friona.

Since 1968 is an election year, it is anticipated that all-time record number of voters will register for the coming year's elections. This is because it is the first presidential election year under the free voting registration system.

A form for applying for the voting certificate is being published again this week. Forms are available at the tax assessor-collector's office, or at Ethridge-Spring Agency.

The previous voting registration high was in 1964, the last presidential election year, when a total of 2,984,766 registrants were reported by county tax assessor-collectors under the poll tax system then in force.

The total registration in 1966 was slightly under 2,970,000, including registrations under the poll tax system and free registrations during a supplemental registration period in March 1966 after a federal court decision invalidated poll tax payment as a condition for voting. Registrations for 1967, an "off year" for elections, normally could have been expected to drop from the previous year's total, but exceeded the 1966 figure by about thirteen thousand. Political observers have explained the increase by the fact that the full four months of the registration period were available for registering voters without cost, while only a 15-day period had been provided for free registrations in 1966.

## Hub Sale Requests Listings

The 12th Annual Hub Community Sale will be held next Thursday, January 25 at the Hub Community Center. Deadline for getting items listed on the sale bill is Friday at 2 p.m.

Items to be sold may be phoned in to Fleming & Son Gin, Hub Grain or West Hub Gin. Also, listings may be given to any member of the Hub Community Association.

Area artists are once again welcome to display their paintings at the center, stated Clarence Monroe, president of the association.

Artists may price their paintings if they wish, and if sold the association will charge a five per cent commission.

Consignment will be accepted, although they are not listed on the sale bill, up until the sale begins.

A 10 per cent charge will be made on all items which sell for \$10 or less, and a five per cent commission is charged on sales of more than \$10.

While farm equipment and implements make up the bulk of the sale, officials point out that they will accept any and all items for sale.

Mrs. Long will meet area artists at the center at 9:30 Wednesday morning, January 24, to assist in the hanging of the paintings.

## Clayton Asks Re-election

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake, announced Monday his candidacy for re-election to the office of State Representative, District 72, consisting of Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Farmer Counties.

Clayton has received many honors while serving this District as State Representative. He was one of the few men in Texas History to become a Chairman of a Committee during his first term. In the past five years, Clayton has been Chairman of four committees, two of which were Water Committees. It is reported by the Speaker of the House, Ben Barnes and other key people that Clayton is probably the most knowledgeable man in the Texas House of Representatives on water and water related problems of the State.

This past year Clayton was presented an award for outstanding service to the Citizens of Texas by the State Soil and Water Conservation Districts.



Clayton said "In seeking re-election I feel we can play an important role in water development and water importation to this area of the State and I pledge my continued influence and efforts to that end. Your past support and influence have been greatly appreciated and we ask for your continued support in the coming elections."

Clayton filed on the Democratic ticket for Primary Election to be held May 4, 1968.

## Young Seeks Re-election

Jack Young of Muleshoe, District Attorney of the 154th Judicial District of Texas, consisting of Lamb, Bailey and Farmer Counties, Monday announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of District Attorney.

Young, District Attorney since 1961, served as President of the District and County Attorneys Association of Texas, a state wide organization, in 1966-67. In September 1967, he was appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, Ben Barnes, to the newly created Commission on Law Enforcement Procedures, which Commission is charged with the responsibility of drafting a manual on law enforcement procedures, the manual to be used as a guideline by all Texas Law Enforcement Officials in the investigation of crimes, interrogation of witnesses and preservation of evidence in accordance with recent State and Federal Court decisions.

Young said, "In asking to be re-elected your District Attorney, I pledge to every citizen of the 154th Judicial District my utmost efforts to prosecute the criminal offenders and help make Lamb, Bailey and Farmer Counties, Texas, a better place in which to live."

Young filed on the Democratic ticket for the Primary Election to be held May 4, 1968.

## OFFICIAL FIGURES

### Rainfall For 1967 Dips To 4-Year Low Of 11.17

Rainfall in Friona during 1967 was the lowest in four years, it was revealed by figures compiled by the City of Friona. Rainfall total was 11.17 inches.

It probably comes as no surprise to agricultural observers that only during three calendar months of 1967 was there as much as an inch of moisture recorded. This was during the June-July-August period. In fact, discounting the three "wet months", only a total of 2.78 inches was measured during the other nine months of the year. No moisture at all was measured in January.

June was the banner month for rainfall during 1967, with a total of 3.43 inches. July was a close second with 3.17 inches. August was the only other month to top an inch, with 1.79 inches.

The 1967 total is 6.03 inches less than the 17.20 inches received in 1966. It is just .35 inches better than the total for 1964, which at 10.82 inches is the lowest since records have been kept at the City of Friona (since 1962).

Other yearly figures for recent years include 17.23 inches in 1965 and 18.80 inches in 1963. A total of 12.22 inches was recorded for a part of the year in 1962.

## Bank Deposits On Increase Locally

Deposits at Friona State bank showed an increase of \$712,788.59 for the close of business on December 30, compared to the same date a year earlier.

The deposit total as of Dec. 30, 1967, stood at \$8,140,122.45. This was an increase of almost 10 per cent over the comparable total of \$7,427,343.86 on Dec. 30 of 1966.

Other figures also were up accordingly, according to the bank's quarterly statement. Total assets stood at \$8,848,406.38 at the end of the present quarter. This compared favorably with the total of \$8,052,817.39 for the same quarter a year earlier.

Bank loans were up considerably, from \$4,680,996.25 at the end of 1966, to \$5,309,048.18 on the current statement.

Another area which showed a good increase was the time and savings deposits category. This increased from \$1,486,672.59 at the close of 1966 to \$1,997,801.73 at the close of 1967.

### Bookmobile Sets Regular Stops

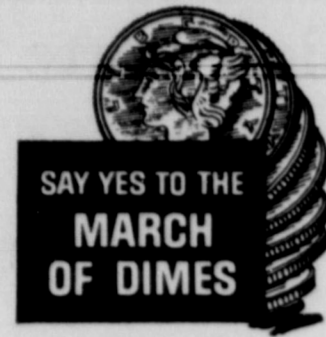
The High Plains Bookmobile will be in the Friona area the next few days, according to Lorene Sooter, bookmobile librarian.

## Routine Business In Council Meet

Mostly routine business was transacted by the Friona City Council at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Payment of \$638.81 was authorized to Raymond Fleming as a utility refund for lots 41-44, block 1, Western Addition. These are lots on which Fleming developed with his apartment buildings.

A petition for a street light at Austin Avenue and 11th St. was approved.

The council voted to purchase a distinctive reflective bumper sticker, with the wording "Friona, Beef Capital of Texas," in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce.

The group confirmed a resolution allowing a 2.6-foot encroachment upon alley right-of-way at the Denver Smith property, Lot 1, Block 6 of the Staley Addition No. 3.

Contractor R.L. Fleming ap-

peared before the group and asked if the city could extend utilities should he work out details for additional apartments behind those he has constructed on West Fifth.

In his monthly summary of activities, City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland reported that there were ten transfers in city properties as reported by the county clerk's office during the month.

Three building permits were issued: one for a restaurant, estimated at \$25,000 and two residences at \$46,660 total.

Water department records showed that 10,085,200 gallons of water were pumped, an average of only 325,000 gallons per day, down for the second straight month.

Moisture recorded during December was .32 inch, in the form of snow.

Three new water taps were made, to bring the total number of active taps as of the end of the month to 1063.

Sewage records showed 5,817,938 gallons pumped during the month. Six new sewer taps were installed to bring the total number of active taps to 1,014 as of the end of December.

Only two fire alarms were sounded during December - one a tractor at Missouri Beef Packers on December 7 and another, an automobile at White Auto Store Dec. 22. Total estimated damage was \$150.

Police department records showed 42 arrests; 18 for traffic warnings, 15 traffic violations; four driving while intoxicated; three for drunkenness and one each for zone restriction violation and vagrancy.

Five complaints were investigated; two for thefts and one each for prowlers, fraud and a lost billfold. Eight motor vehicle accidents were investigated with one resultant injury.

All trees in the city park were pruned of their long limbs during the month.

A street cut was made at Sixth

and Euclid Dec. 1 for the McGlothlin building water service. Three days were spent in plowing and clearing the streets of ice and snow after a 4.5 inch fall Dec. 15.

At the regular meeting of the library board Dec. 20, Mrs. V. J. Zeman submitted her resignation to the board with regrets.

The story hour will be conducted during the summer for about eight weeks and helpers are always needed. Speaking from experience, you'll never spend an hour in a more enjoyable way!

Mrs. Zora Gaede, librarian, has supplied these facts and figures concerning the library's use and growth during the year just ended. There were 4,173 patrons of the library. Of these 194 were new readers. During 1967, there were 9,420 books checked out. Many new books were added by purchases and by donation. We acquired 627 new books. If you have any books which your family would like to donate, just bring them by the library. They will be very much appreciated. Hardback books are preferred over paperback books because they wear many times longer. Paperbacks are accepted however. Several local and area citizens have made recent donations to the library. C. J. Horton donated five volumes on Texas history. Mrs. Jack Gil-

lland of Hereford, Texas donated 78 books. Hugh Moseley made a donation of 12 books in memory of his mother, Mrs. Eva Moseley.

Local citizens, especially library users, are to be given an unusual opportunity. Miss Loula Grace Erdman, author of many historical books and professor of creative writing at West Texas State University in Canyon, has consented to give a book review in Friona. She is such a busy person that only on rare occasions does she consent to go out for this kind of evening. In addition, the manuscripts and galley proofs of one of Miss Erdman's books will be here on loan from the Mary Elvins Library in Amarillo. These are kept in a locked room in the Amarillo library and are only loaned out for special events.

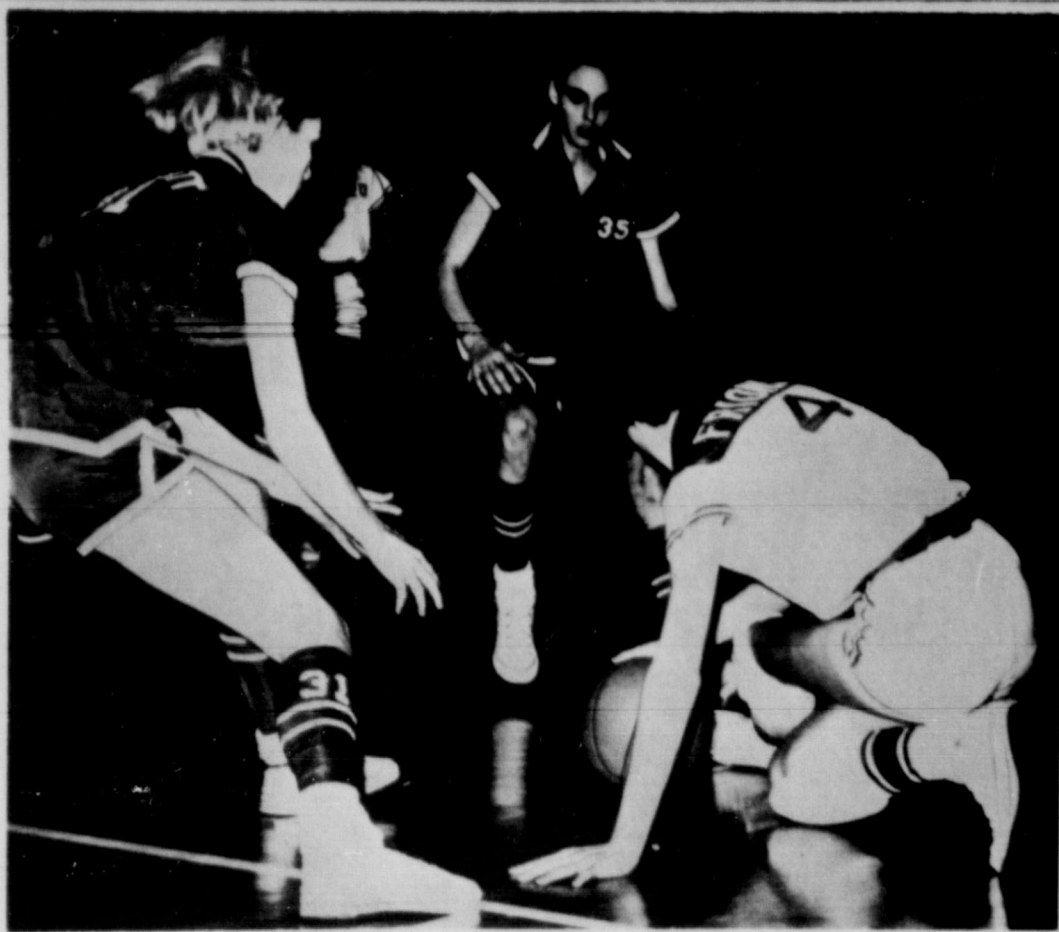

## Patrol Investigates Nine Wrecks In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of December according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons injured, and estimated property damage of \$5,650.

The rural traffic accident summary for Parmer County during the calendar year of 1967, shows a total of 121 crashes resulting in 4 persons killed, 71 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$82,126.

When the final fatal traffic accident reports are tabulated for 1967 it is estimated that the death count for Texas will be 3,340 or about two per cent less than the all time high of 3,406 traffic deaths in 1966.

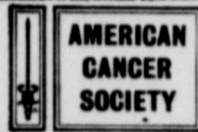

# Dixon Reports On Water, Inc. Tour

(Editor's Note: Seven Friona residents were among a party of 80 who took part in a tour to California Dec. 10-13, sponsored by Water, Inc. in the interest of developing a water program for the area. Jim Dixon, one of the local men on the tour, gave a report for the Farm Bureau board of directors. His report follows:)

The purpose of this tour is to study the California Water Project and to see if such a project would be feasible for the Southern High Plains.

The tour was composed of 80 members from the High Plains. The group included farmers, bankers, ranchers, newspapermen, and television reporters.

The trip took four days. We left on Dec. 10 and flew from Lubbock to Sacramento via El Paso and Los Angeles. That afternoon Preston Walker from Plainview and I toured the Governor's Mansion.

The next morning we went by bus to Oroville Dam which is the heart of the California Water Project. Money spent in the Oroville Dam Area will total \$474,757,000. The dam has a height of 770 feet, a volume of 80,000,000 cubic yards, a capacity of 3,484,000 acre-feet, a surface area of 15,500 acres and a shoreline of 167 miles.

The Oroville power plant will produce 2,467,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity, yearly. After our visit to Oroville Dam we rode the bus to Modesto where we met with a Mr. Banks who is a member of the firm which is doing consulting engineering work for Water, Inc.

He told us that water cost the California (Kern County) farmer from \$20 to \$45 per acre foot. It takes about 3 1/2 acre feet of water for most crops. (An acre foot is one acre covered with one foot of water). Mr. Banks said the problem with a water project is not engineering but one of politics and economics. (Who pays and what do I get out of it.)

From Modesto we went to the Delta Pumping Station. Eleven pumps lift 10,300 cubic feet of water per second from the delta to the California Aqueduct which has a length of 414.5 miles. (A cubic foot per second is equal to 450 gallons per minute).

The San Luis reservoir is located down stream from the Delta Pumping Station for the purpose of water storage and power generating. It is unique in that all the water is pumped in, none comes from natural flow. The San Luis reservoir has a capacity of 2,095,000 acre-feet, an area of 13,800 acres and a shoreline of 65 miles.

That night (Dec. 12) Bill Bryant, who is chief of the Kern County Water Agency, explained how the farmer receives his water, what he pays and how the water districts are set up. Some farmers chose not to belong to a

water district and they will not share in the water even though the canal may pass through their land.

Part of the cost of the water is to be paid for by an ad valorem tax. This tax is a "Zone of benefit" tax paid by everyone including city people because they receive benefits from the water from sales of gasoline, machinery, groceries, etc.

The next morning we rode the bus to the Tehachapi Pumping Station which will lift the water over the Tehachapi mountains and into the Los Angeles area. There will be 14 pumps lifting 4,410 cubic feet per second of water 1938 feet. The water is lifted over, rather than through the mountains because of two faults inside the mountains. These faults cause earthquakes which would ruin a tunnel.

We arrived in Los Angeles about noon Dec. 13 and then went to Long Beach where we saw a project which uses fresh water to keep the salt water from seeping in under Long Beach. Recharge wells pump in fresh water which pushes the salt water back toward the sea.

Finally, we saw a 600-acre percolating basin which uses excess rain water and some fresh water to recharge the water sands under Los Angeles. This basin was noteworthy because the land was valued at \$50,000 per acre.

The total cost of the California Water Project will be about \$2,814,108,000. About half will be paid by California and half by the United States Government.

Late on Dec. 13 we boarded a plane which took us back to Lubbock.

I would recommend that we support Water, Inc. in its work. Politically, we should support those candidates which favor the "water, inc." goals.

We must secure a better return for our products. We cannot pay for a water project with the present prices of commodities.

Finally, we should form water districts. These districts are the bases of a water project. We must present a solid front if we ever hope to bring water to the Southern High Plains.

## Imitation Foods Are Discussed By Agent

Within the last ten years a variety of synthetic foods have appeared on the market. As consumers we want to know what they are, how they compare nutritionally, how they measure up in eating quality, how much they cost compared to the real thing. Having this information, we can then make an educated choice between the new product and the natural good, says County Extension Agent of Farmer County, Cricket B. Taylor.

One of the newer synthetic foods that has made its appearance is that of dairy foods. Most imitation dairy products contain milk solids, but in place of butterfat have vegetable oil. Since vegetable oils are generally cheaper than butterfat, the imitation products are usually cheaper.

However, vegetable oil has just as many calories as butterfat, so you do not save calories with these products. If a polyunsaturated, non-hydrogenated vegetable oil is used, you would have a less saturated fat than butterfat -- an important consideration to persons needing to control blood cholesterol level.

Most labels don't state the kind of vegetable oil used. However, the common vegetable oil used in imitation dairy products -- particularly imitation milk -- is coconut oil. Coconut oil is one of the few vegetable oils (olive oil is another) that is highly saturated rather than poly-unsaturated. It is actually more saturated than butterfat. Thus, imitation dairy products using coconut oil in place of butterfat would not be more beneficial than regular dairy products from the cholesterol standpoint.

Some imitation dairy products -- advertised as "non-dairy", contains no milk solids, but usually do have sodium caseinate -- a derivative of milk protein. Keep in mind that dairy products contribute important amounts of protein, calcium and the B vitamin, riboflavin. These nutrients would

be greatly reduced or not present in the "non-dairy" products. Take a look at milk here are some facts to consider also, Mrs. Taylor said. Imitation Milk - Varies in content (read labels) but is usually a mixture of either fresh nonfat milk, or nonfat dry milk and water, plus coconut oil, lactose monodiglyceride (a form of milk sugar), corn sirup solids (sugar) and carotene (which provides vitamin A and color). Nutritionally it is nearly equivalent to whole milk. Sometimes slightly more nonfat milk solids are added to increase protein and calcium content. Its calorie count is about the same as whole milk.

You save money by using imitation milk (about 5¢ a quart) instead of whole milk, but you do not save calories or reduce saturated fat content. You would save more money by using reconstituted dry milk or fresh nonfat milk and at the same time reduce calories (by 75 per cup) and get no cholesterol-producing fat.

In some states imitation milk does not come under the health regulations established for regular milk.

Imitation sour cream, imitation ice cream and ice milk - Vegetable fat (kind not stated) substituted for butterfat. Cost lower, calorie count not lower than regular products. May be "non-dairy", thus lacking nutritious milk solids -- read label to find out.

Coffee Whitener and Whipped Toppings - (powdered, liquid and pre-whipped) -- contain corn sirup solids (sugar) vegetable oil (kind not stated), sodium caseinate, stabilizing and emulsifying agent, vegetable color. Cost lower, have longer shelf life, greater convenience. Still have calories, but in the case of whipped toppings, fewer than whipped cream because they whip to greater volume (4 times original instead of doubled). Pre-whipped (frozen or aerosol) toppings are not cheap. Read label for weight, not volume -- they are full of air.

# NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before September 1, 1968, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31, you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.
2. Call in person at the School Tax Office and get a census blank and fill it out. Remember if your child will be six years old next September 1, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next September 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

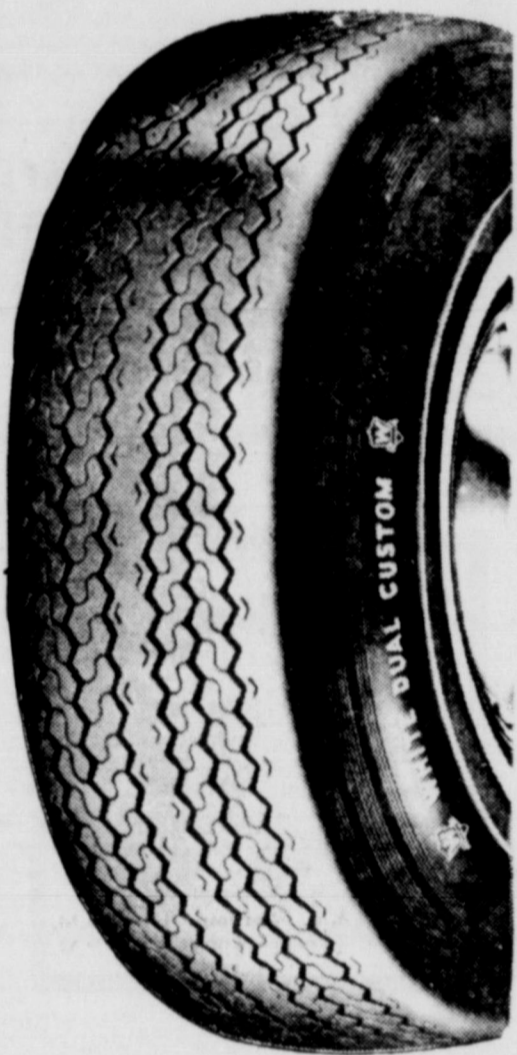

Commencement exercises will be conducted Jan. 20.

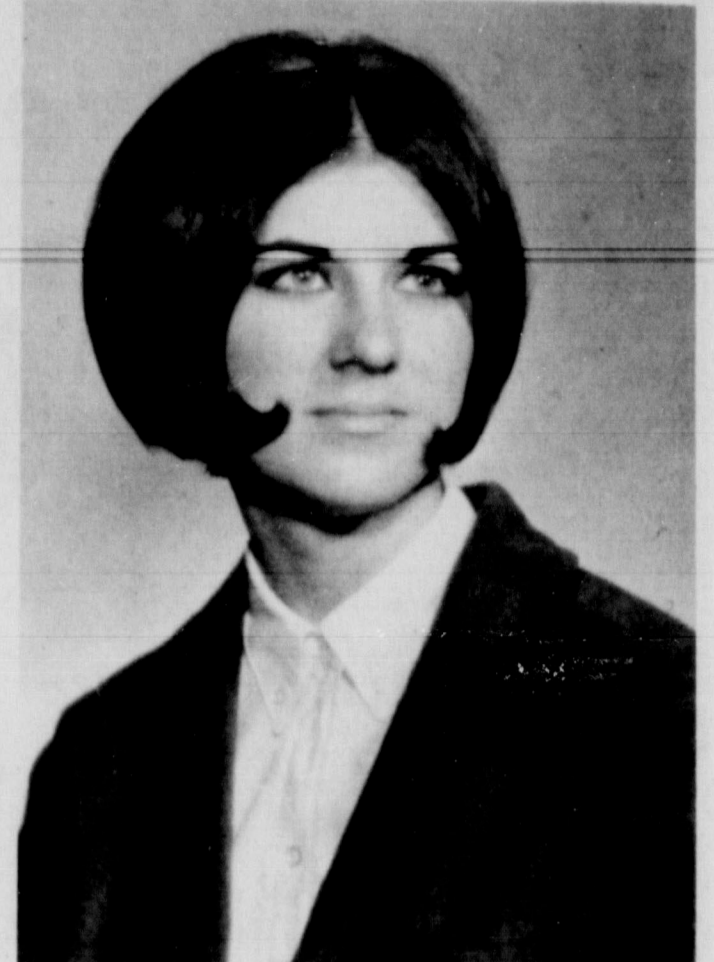

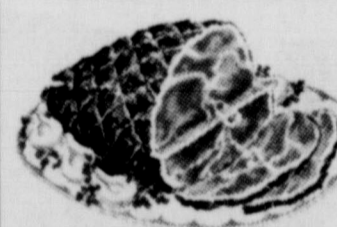

Each scout brought 75 cents, which amounted to \$13.55 in all. No decision was made on the tree, and the troop plans to return to the nursery on January 25.

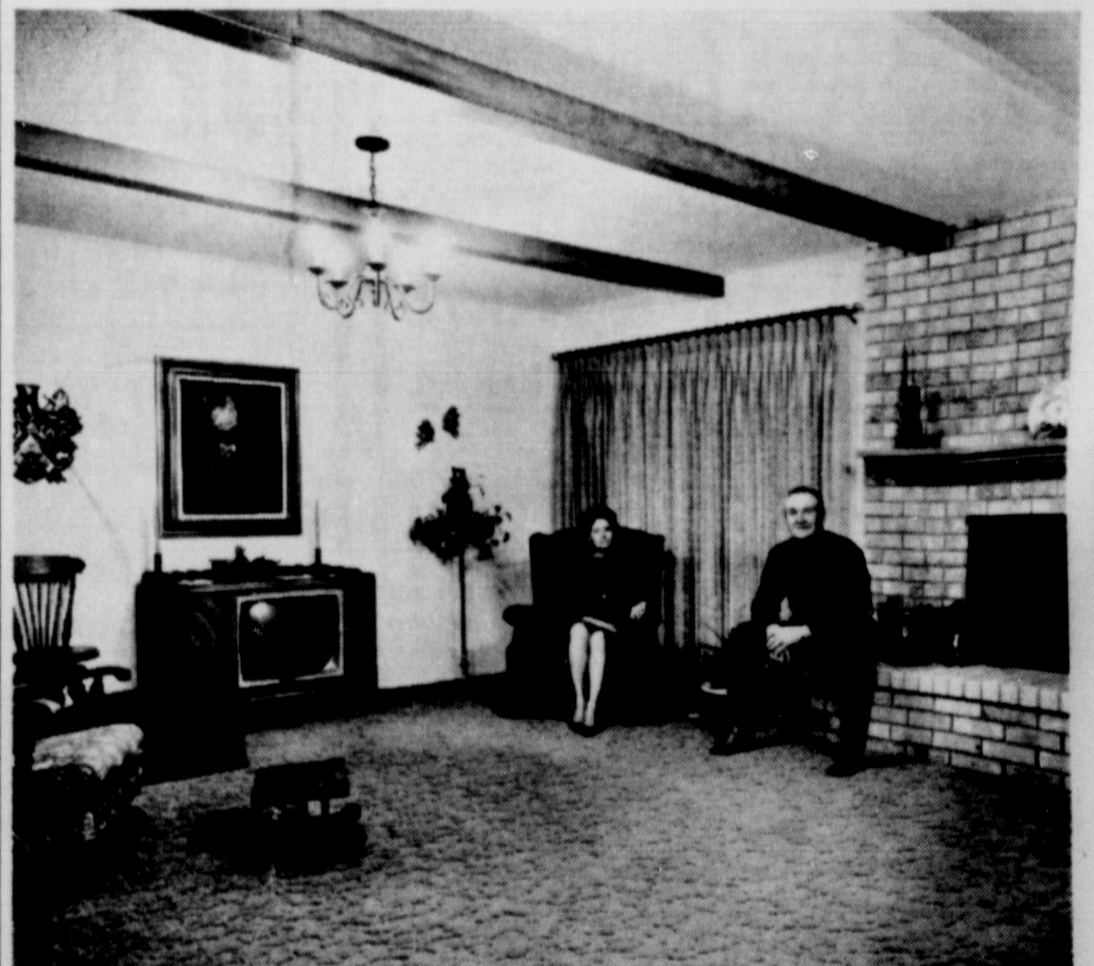
### Son Born To Gary Browns

### Pep Plans Homecoming

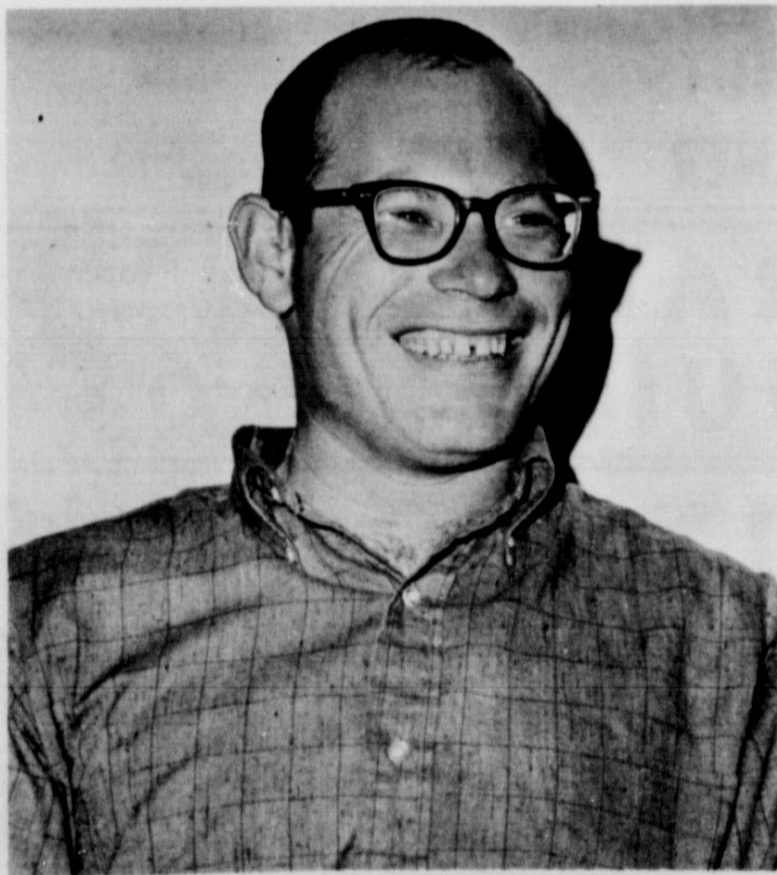
