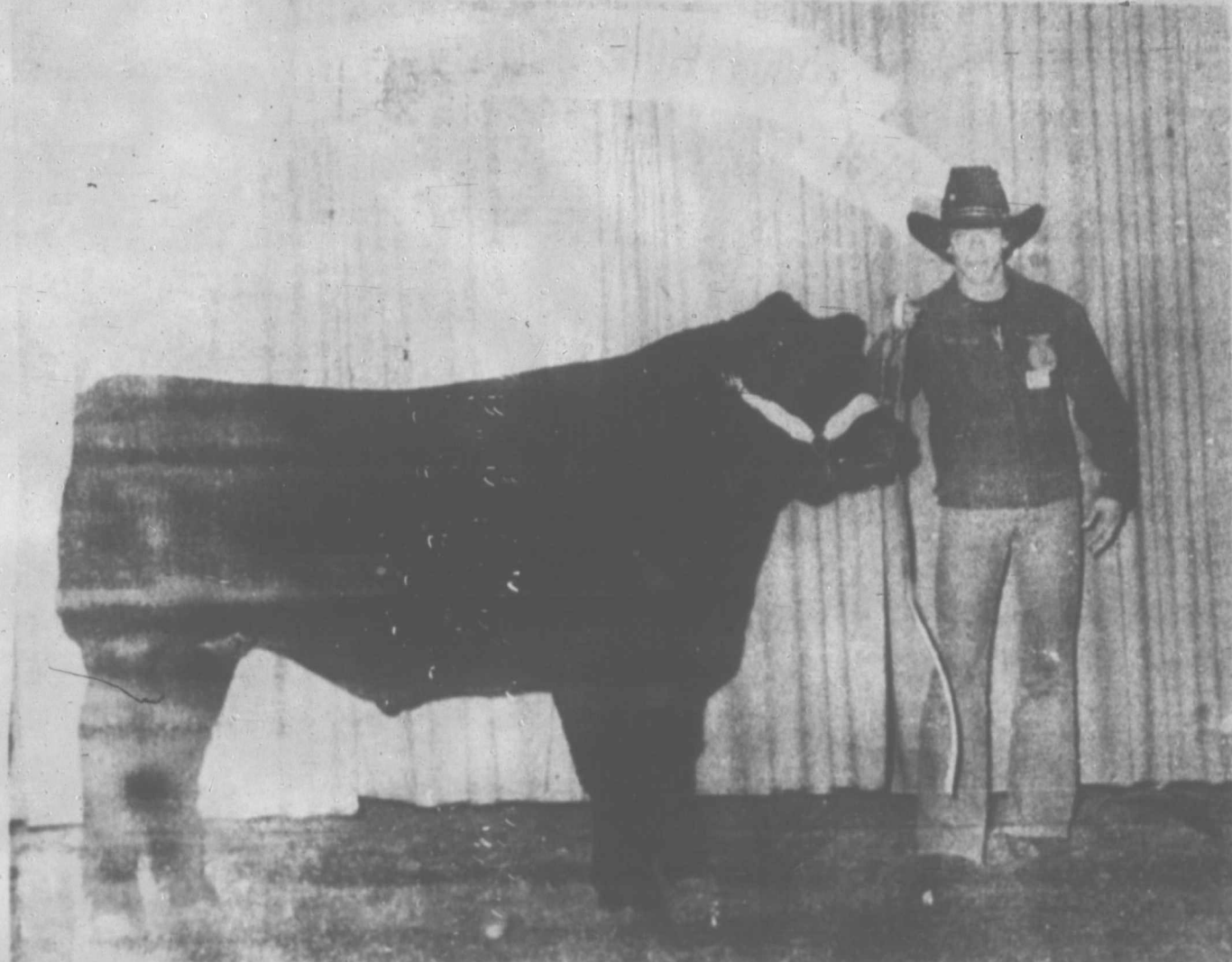

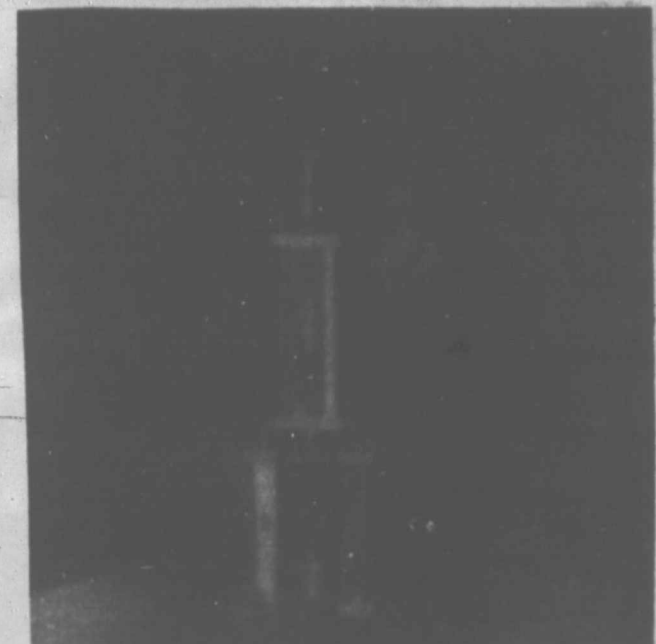

## Bank Holds Annual Meet

At the annual meeting of the Shareholders of the First National Bank, all the present members of the Board of Directors were re-elected who are: James P. Arnold, Joe P. Ellison, Grady Franklin Maples, Guy Nickels and Guy H. Walden. Guy H. Walden was then reappointed chairman of the Board, James P. Arnold Vice President and Sara M. Woods, Secretary.

After a review of the earnings and expenses accounts of the 1977 operations, Guy Walden, President, noted that the bank had paid a record amount of interest to the banks saving depositors, also a record amount of salaries dividends and other fees to officers and employees, shareholders and directors. After a review of the bank's assets and liabilities and a discussion of future agriculture and other related business, the meeting adjourned.

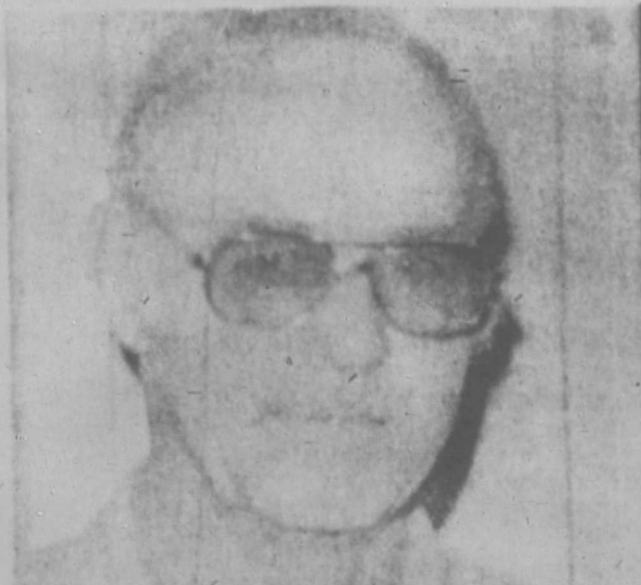

### Teamster Leader Calls On Congress

Teamster General President Frank E. Fitzsimmons called today for the White House and the U.S. Congress to take action to insure that the nation's farmers receive decent prices for their products.

In a statement issued from Teamster headquarters here, Fitzsimmons said:

"We in the Teamsters endorse the present efforts of the nation's farmers to call attention to their plight. The work of the nation's farmers is basic to our well-being, and they deserve a decent return for the service they perform for all of us.

"From the White House to the Congress, the more than two million members of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters urge action on the farmers' behalf.

"While we cannot violate our contractual obligations with employers by honoring farmers' picket lines, we do support their objectives and say it is time now that something be done to help them."

### Emergency Farm Bill

Texas' foremost authority on agriculture and legislation voiced strong support today for threatened action by U.S. Senator Herman Talmadge to force action on an "emergency farm bill" if the Carter Administration does not act in two weeks.

State Rep. Joe A. Hubenak, Chairman of the Texas Legislature's House Agriculture and Livestock Committee, voiced his support in testimony before the U.S. Senate Agriculture Committee.

Hubenak had been invited by Talmadge to testify as an expert in the field of agricultural legislation, and on the problems now facing Texas's farmers and ranchers.

"Agriculture cannot wait," Hubenak said. "The interest on the farm and ranch crop loans are increasing income is plunging, and no help is on the way." Hubenak said. "Our own state, indeed the nation, is suffering from a total lack of leadership in agricultural matters, in understanding the plight of the farmer and rancher. And in the end, it is going to be the consumer in the urban areas who will suffer just as much from ever higher food and fiber costs."

Hubenak, a 10 year veteran of the Texas Legislature is leaving the legislative field to seek the office of Texas Commissioner of Agriculture in the May Democratic Primary.

"Agriculture has become the pawn in the international diplomatic chess game," Hubenak charged. "We use food and fiber as a weapon, we use tariffs as a weapon, we use quotas as a weapon. But the weapon, is always pointed at the American farmer and rancher as we open the gates to the flood of imported meat, fish, poultry, wool and every other product imaginable."

"I do not advocate protectionism, or closing our borders to all imports. What I do is that the American farmer and rancher be guaranteed a fair share of his own domestic market, that American grown food be pushed through out our own state and federal and local institutions, our schools and colleges, our military posts," Hubenak said.

"What I advocate most is some common-sense help to ease the burden of the families who know what its like to work from dawn to dark on our farmlands, and to depend on the weather and the government interference in the market place to make a profit," he said.

Hubenak termed Senator Talmadge's position the "best news the farmer has heard in months," and he urged the Chairman to continue to fight to force the Administration to face up the problems before the agricultural community.

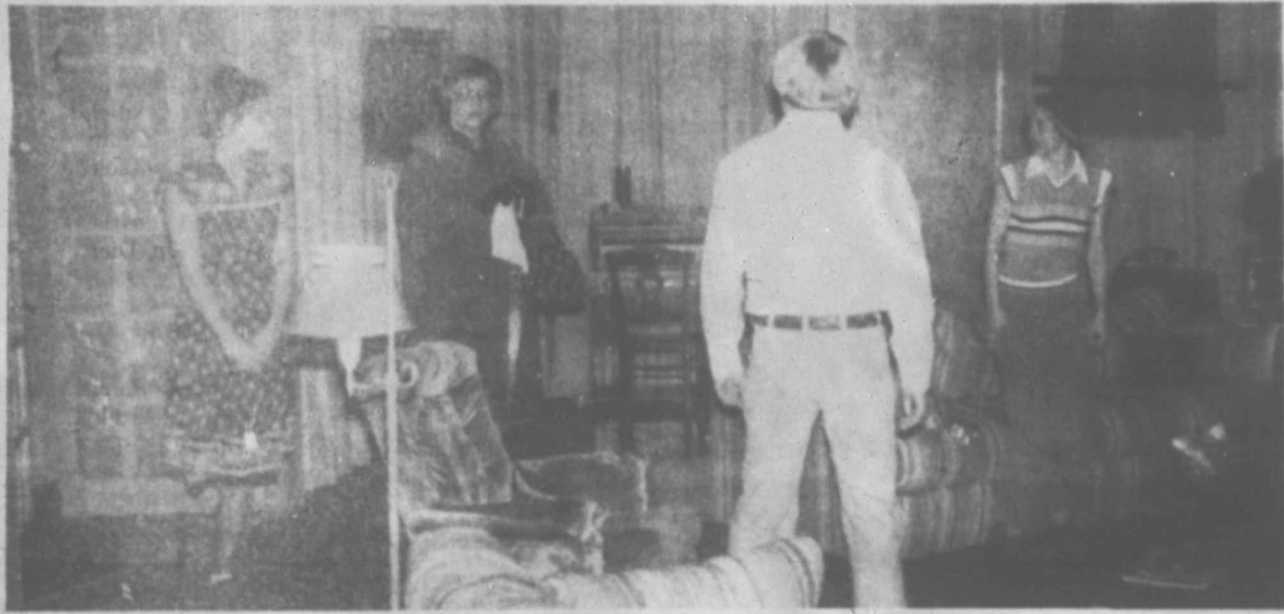

## Texas Farm Bureau

The Texas Farm Bureau will support legislation which would provide higher payment incentives for cutting acreages of wheat, feed grains, and cotton this year, according to Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart, president of the 214,000 member organization.

The Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors Friday (Feb. 24) adopted a recommendation to the American Farm Bureau Federation which states, "We support higher target prices and set asides such as those proposed in the Dole Bill."

The AFBF Board, of which Chaloupka is a member, will meet March 5-9 in Washington D.C.

"Our intent is to get a workable program that will pump money immediately into the farmers' pockets, reduce production, and not be too costly to the taxpayers," the Dalhart cattle and grain producer said.

"We are not locking ourselves onto any one proposal, but are free to work in any way we can for the principles of the Dole Bill which is designed to cut production in return for higher target prices," Chaloupka said.

The Dole Bill (S. 2481) by Senator Robert Dole of Kansas provides a formula of variable government-set target prices for set aside acres. The more a farmer sets aside, based on past history, the higher his target price would be. The government would pay the farmer the difference between the market price and the target price. This is known as a "deficiency" payment.

Under the Dole Bill, a 50 percent reduction in wheat acreage would provide a target price of \$5.00 per bushel.

Corn acreage reduced by 50 percent would result in a target price of \$3.45 per bushel. Grain sorghum, and other feed grains if the Secretary of Agriculture so designates them, would have a target price based on corn.

Cotton producers could earn a target price of 84 cents a pound by cutting acreage in half.

Theoretically, the program should not be costly to the taxpayers. If production is cut enough, market prices would rise and the "deficiency" payments would be minimal.

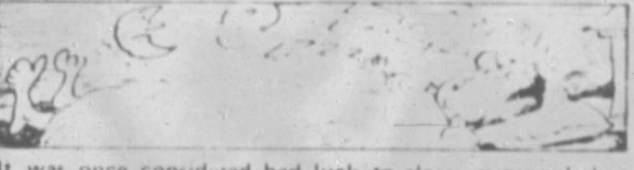
championships and three national titles. The book includes an epilogue on Royal's retirement from coaching last year.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered Sudan ISD at Community Center Building in Sudan, Texas, in said School District, with Margaret Smith as Presiding Judge and Elsie Cate and Louise Parrish, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Lucy Kent is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Kenneth Noles are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Superintendent's Office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. Absentee voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and Margaret Smith, as Presiding Judge, Elsie Cate and Louise Parrish, as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Lamb County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.
