Cochran County Veterans Urged To Showers Sign Up For Vocational Agriculture and Distributive Education Training Fall Here

Veteran's Educational Supervisor and Mr. Rex Faulkner, were in Morton Thursday, August 22, in the interest of the Veteran's Agriculture training program.

Application to establish classes in Morton for veterans in Vocational training, including agriculture, distributive education trade and industry has been approved and the contracts signed by both the State Board of Vocational Education and the Veteran's State Approving committee. All veterans interested in the

training are requested to meet with Mr. Faulkner on Friday, August 30, at the County Court house between the hours of 9 a. m, and 5 p. m. Married veterans participating

in the program will receive a subsidy of \$90.00 per month, the unmarried ones will receive \$65. In the training class for agri-

culture there will be 101/2 hours of group instruction under a qualified agriculture instructor, who will divide the periods of study into classes, shop and either field trips or demonstration. The instructor will spend two hours each week with each student on the student's farm or

Classes will begin in Cochran county as soon as the twenty students necessary to start a class have enrolled

Other classes will be started as soon as practible. This training program design-

ed to aid those veterans who are operating their own farms or ranches is a co-operative program with the County School Education and the Veteran's Administration all working together to give the veterans opportunities for improvement.

At the time the cla Administration will pay to the county twenty five dollars per student each month. This money will be used to pay the expenses of the instructor and to buy supplies used in the training

The first program will be the Vocational Agriculture class with Mr. Rex Faulkner as instructor. Enrollment of twenty veterans is needed to start the class.

If enough veterans are interested there will be classes in distributive education, which in cludes the study and practical application of retailing and wholesaling of merchandise, and a class in trade and industry. As the need arises more instructors will be added to take care of the courses of study.

(AN EDITORIAL)

In less than a year, the South Plains has experienced two bank robberies-at Morton and at Levelland. The long arm of the law, abetted by an alert citizenry, has moved swiftly and adequately in both cases. Three of the four men involved in the Cochran county holdup have been appropriately chastened by the courts, while the fourth man, Matt Kimes, leader of the robbery gang, has been put away for good, the victim of an Arkansas poultry truck. The most recent case, the robbery of a Levelland bank Wednesday, August 21 saw the lone perpetrator arrested and behind bars within six hours after the crime. It is to be expected that this man, subject of two life sentences which he, somehow or the other, managed to dodge serving, will be sufficiently dealt with at the bar of justice.

Texas Tech Band Moves To Old Dairy Building

Old Dairy Manufactures building to the Texas Tech band and transfer of the chemical engineering department to a new quonset hut being erected near the Textile building has been announced by President W. M. Whyburn of

The move, Dr. Whyburn said, will give the band a permanent home and facilitate work of the Cotton Research Committee of

The Dairy Manufactures building for the past year has been used mainly for research with cotton burs and other activities to the quonset hut, just across the road from the Cotton Research Committee headquarters in the Textile building, will permit closer coordination of activities, Dr. Whyburn said. The new building, 40 x 100 feet and two stories, will provide about 7,500 square feet of floor space. Financed by funds of the Cotton Research Committee, it will be of concrete and steel, insulated, heated, lighted and ventilated.

The band, it was said, will have more space than in its former headquarters in the Textile building and will be more centrally located on the campus. The quonset hut is being erected and transfer of the band and chemical engineering units is expected to be completed within the next month. Negotiations for the move have been in progress several months.



Q. How many nests do I need for my laying hens?

A. You should have one nest for every seven hens. If trapnests are used, you should have one nest for every four hens.

Q. Is goat meat palatable?

A. Goat meat, called chevon, is recognized as a delicacy by many people. It can be prepared in any of the many ways other kinds of meat are cooked. Goat kids from 50 to 75 lbs. in weight are especially delicious when barbecued.

Q. How many market hogs may be produced from each sow in a high-producing brood sow herd in one

A. Records at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company show that each sow in the Purina herd produced an average of 19.3 market hogs during the 12-month breeding period just ended. These hogs were marketed at 6 months of age after being farrowed, grown, and fattened on the two-litter-a-year system of the Purina Hog Program of good breeding, sound manage-ment, careful sanitation, and good feeding.

Q. In using the 2-4D hormone weed killer, is one spraying suffi-

A. Most weeds will be killed by one spraying of 2-4D, but it may be necessary to spot spray about four weeks later in order to kill any weeds that are especially persistent or any that have grown since the first spraying. 2-4D does not kill

Q. At what age do range cows produce the heaviest calves?

A. According to the New Mexico Experiment Station, in tests over a period of 7 years, cows produce heavier calves and, therefore, more beef at weaning time, when they are 6, 7, and 8 years of age. This is the period when cows show the greatest weight and vigor.

C. A. Luck, Levelland businessman, who came in during the robbery, was also ordered to the floor as Pierce continued rifling the cash drawers.

All five were then ordered into the vault and the door was closed. The robbery was reported to the local sheriff's department by Cashier Bob Berry, who came in from lunch a few minutes later, to find the bank deserted and cash drawers empty.

The robber left out the back door, dropped the gun there and took an alley course west and north, officers reported. As he coursed through the alleys, he shed a blue sportshirt, which was later identified by Young Barry as belonging to Pierce. The youth told officers that he could identify the man.

Sheriff Hofacket reported that there was no doubt in his mind as to the robber's identity within an hour after the bank was looted. The search was earlier, he said, narrowed down to two men,

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for inerest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the oonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. Arter eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words
