There are 17 thousand such claims in Texas, a great part of which comes from West Texas, the heaiest insured area. About onehalf of this money will be used in paying Texas claims. I do not have accurate figures before me, but I estimate that the 1946 insurance program will mean in excess of 10 million dollars to the cotton producers of our Congres-sional District.

The time to kill weeds in your garden is before they begin to grow! Hoeing the surface soil in vegetable or flower garden not only destroys sprouting weed seeds; it actually prevents their germination. As soon as the seedlings break through in the garden rows so that they can easily be seen, it is time to begin stirring the soil between rows and as close to the plants as possible without dis-

turbing them. Either a hand hoe or a wheel hoe is an excellent tool. flowers and for the sake of a gar-If it rains a few days after the first cultivation, stir the surface soil again as soon as it is dry enough, but do not wait longer than a week before cultivating a second time,rain or no rain,-unless the ground is too wet to work.

Weeds within the row will probably have to be removed by hand while the plants are small. Some gardeners find an old kitchen knife a handy helper. Or, a hand weeder is a convenient tool. As plants grow larger, they usually dominate so that weeds in the row do not prove troublesome. Onions are one exdown the husky weeds.

A. Yes. All converted policies have cash surrender values, paid. up insurance and automatic extended term insurance values, together with policy loan provisons effective after the policy has been in force one full year.

Q. Is it true that National Service Life Insurance pays the ineach \$1,000 of insurance in force while he is totally disabled?

Application for the total disability income provision may be made at the time application is made for NSLI or at any time thereafter while the insurance is in force under premium paying condition.

Q. Is there a time limit for fil. ing for a waived of premiums on NSLI by the insured, and how far back may a waiver be grant-

Application for waiver of premium should be made by the insured immediately after he has been totally disabled for six months. Ordinaryily, his waiver will not be made effective for more than one year prior to date of his application. However, the Administrator of Veterans Affairs may make the waiver effective in excess of one year where he determines that the insured's failure to make timely application was due to circumstances beyond his control

Q. Can I borrow on my converted Nationl Service Life Insurance?

A. Yes. Any converted policy, in force by payment of premiums one year or longer, affords the insured the right to borrow up to 94 percent of the cash value by submitting a proper loan agreement to the Veterans Adminisration prior to the expiration of the grace period.



Timely Advice To Vacationists Given By Dr. Cox

AUSTIN-Some timely advice vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports now that swimming pools are open, was released from the State Health Department to-day by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Vacation days are apt to in-clude excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and sometimes without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports vided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibili-ties if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer out-

LOOKING AHEAD

By George S. Benson, President, Harding College, Searcy, Ark.

A SOUND THINKER

As I sat a few days ago in the spacious office of Mr. John Sny secretary of the Treasury and listened to that keen thinking gentleman outline his views on certain monetary policies, found myself wishing that all public thinking were as clear, and as cognizant of good economic horse-sense

In the first place the Secretary believes that thorough study of the necessary costs of government should be made. He believ es then that this cost should be reduced to the very minimum consistent with good government. In the second place he believes that a high national income is possible only if a sound economy is maintained. This cound economy must be based upon maxi mum production at high effici ency, which he feels would make possible a large foreign trade.

On Your Feet, Sam!

In the third place he believes we should seriously undertake liberal payments on the national debt. This should be done at common horse-sense. It is just the way a wage earner, farmer, merchant, or manufacturer, heavily in debt, with a large family, but still in good health, would have to plan if he expected ever tist Church in Bledsoe and will to get on his feet and leave any heritage to his children.

Uncle Sam is heavily in debt his children have adopted spendthrift habits, have lost the art of hard work, are quarreling with one another, and are growing more and more inclined to leave the worrying to the old man. The need of the hour is sound counsel from Washington for the entire nation to realize its critical condition, and to act accordingly.

A Sound Program

Secretary Snyder's program needs to be understood, for it is one in which the whole nation can participate. His three point program (in my own words) would be about as follows:

1. Stop the fantastic waste in almost every department of government. Pare costs rigorously, forgetting political expediency.

2. Let industry reduce prices until the profits stand at a very low level. Let labor aim for maximum production, in order to get a real raise through lower prices. Such production will permit active foreign markets, a thing not and more steady employment. only necessary for us but for other nations as well.

3. Let taxes remain on a broad base, with only those cuts being made which are necessary o induce investment in the tools production, while we all do
