Driver's License Office Open Here January 1

A driver's license office for Parmer County has been located in Friona, and will open on January 1, it has been announced by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The new office is just one of the many new aspects of driver licensing laws passed by the state legislature earlier this year. In preparation for these changes, which will be effective January 1, the local Department of Public Safety outlined some points for the Friona Star.

After Jan. 1, no licenses will be renewed through the mail, with certain exceptions. It will be necessary to appear at the local driver's license office. One reason for this will be the addition of the operator's picture to his driver's license.

Photographic equipment will be added to the local driver licensing office, as well as a clerk, Mrs. Carolin Vaughn, who will be in charge of administering eye examinations, supervising written tests, and making photos of applicants for licenses.

The office for Parmer County will be located at 715-A Main St., and will remain open five days each week with the initiation of the licensing changes. Actual driving tests, however, will be administered one day of each week.

Jim Ward, local Driver License patrolman who administers written and driving tests in Parmer, Deaf Smith, and Randall County, called attention to several changes in the licensing laws and pointed out that a law already in effect since the latter part of August sets age limits for operator li-

ensing at 18, with some exceptions.

Drivers aged 15 may be licensed, after first having had a course in drivers education, with the restriction of having a licensed driver ride in the front seat 21 years or over. Drivers aged 16 may be tested to have this restriction removed, provided he has had driver education training Part 2.

All minors will be issued provisional licenses only clearly designated which will be good for the length of time from the granting of the license to the applicant's 21st birthday. At that time a regular operator's license will be granted. Ward pointed out that only two moving traffic violations may result in revocation of these provisional licenses.

Another new innovation in the law pointed out by Ward is the fact that all original applicants for licensing must present a birth certificate at the time of application. Drivers having old licenses renewed need not present the certificate.

Color photos of the driver will be added to all licenses issued after Jan. 1, and the licenses will be laminated between layers of plastic. Cost of the new licenses will remain the same, Ward emphasized, the only difference being in the length of time for which the licenses are renewed.

Present licenses with numbers ending evenly, for example, 40, 66, 92, multiples of two, will be renewed for four-year periods at double the cost of the old two-year type licenses. Numbers ending unevenly, such as 31, 63, 49, etc., will

be renewed for two years at the same cost as previous operator licenses.

Commercial and chauffeur licenses will also follow this pattern, with even-numbered present licenses renewed for a term of two years, and odd-numbered licenses for a period of one year.

At the expiration date of the first license renewal under the new changes, all operators licenses will thereafter be renewed for the maximum length of time, which is four years, with commercial and chauffeurs being renewed for two years.

Drivers are cautioned that they do not have to have their picture made immediately after the first of the year for the new licenses. To do so would, in effect, cancel the remaining time on their present license and cause renewal to be made earlier than needed. Drivers should wait until the normal renewal date indicated on their present license to have the picture made for the new license.

Advancing from operator to commercial or chauffeur will require a new driving test in a commercial vehicle, Ward pointed out. Advancement from operator to commercial licenses will require both written and driving tests.

Motorcycles drivers are receiving a share of attention in the changes, also, Ward says. These drivers will be tested and approved and their licenses stamped with an approval for motorcycle operation.

Anyone interested in taking the Motorcycle driving test, must bring a licensed driver and a car for the patrolman to ride with.

Emphasis is also being placed on helmets, which are now required for cycle drivers.

Prospective purchasers of helmets are urged to check with DPS officers on specifications for these helmets before they are purchased, Ward said. Many types of headgear are available but not all meet DPS requirements, and drivers using substandard helmets may be ticketed as though they were using no helmet at all.

Ward outlined several facts and fancies regarding the law changes which have been the cause of much confusion:

FACT: There will be no more renewing of licenses through the mail except, for example, those persons out of state in the military services.

FACT: All other applicants for renewal must make an appearance in person at a local driver license office to be photographed by a clerk or patrolman.

FACT: All licensed drivers must pass the state minimum standard eye examination using the Snellen chart. If an applicant has doubt about his vision, it may save time to check with his doctor or optometrist prior to visiting the DPS office.

FACT: It is not true that all persons who hold a valid driving license must take another written and driving test. The patrolman may require some persons to be re-tested if there is some doubt about an applicant's ability to operate a motor vehicle safely or properly. These persons may be required to take both written and road tests again.

These explanations were outlined by Ward in an effort to clear any misunderstandings or confusion regarding the recent changes and those to go into effect the first of the year.

Two Frionans Inducted Into Army In December

Three young men, including two from Friona, were inducted into the Army by the Texas Local Board #18 at Hereford during December, it was announced this week.

Those inducted were Joe Bob Johnson and Numan D. Loafman of Friona and Richard G. Slaughter of Hereford.

State draft boards will be called upon to furnish 1,659 men for the armed forces in January, according to Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director.

This quota is the biggest monthly call since November 1966, when the quota was 2,012 men.

This compares with quotas

of 924 for December, 1,159 for November, 977 for October, 1,180 for September, and 1,421 for August.

The Texas quota of 1,659 for inducted in January is the state's share of a national call for 34,000 men, all for the army.

The Selective Service boards will forward 5,455 men in January for pre-induction examination, Colonel Schwartz said, and they have scheduled 3,485 for this examination in December.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examination in January are scheduled to be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters on or about December 6,

Brewer is survived by his wife, Wana, a teacher in the Friona School system, and two sons, Byron, a student at Texas Tech, and Galen, a senior at Friona High School.

Also surviving are two brothers, Glen Edward Brewer of Alamogordo, N.M., and Clarence Brewer of Pueblo, Colo. A sister, Mrs. Opal Spear of Oklahoma City also survives.

Born November 21, 1914, at Vici, Oklahoma, Brewer graduated from Friona High School

Deadline for joining Friona's "Project Christmas Card" is Saturday, December 16.

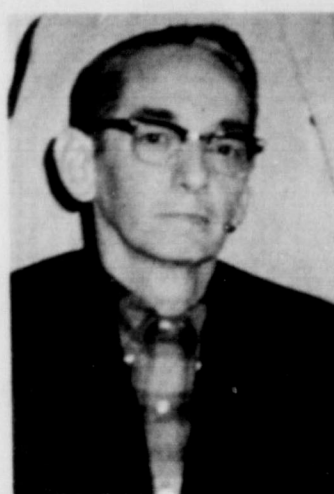

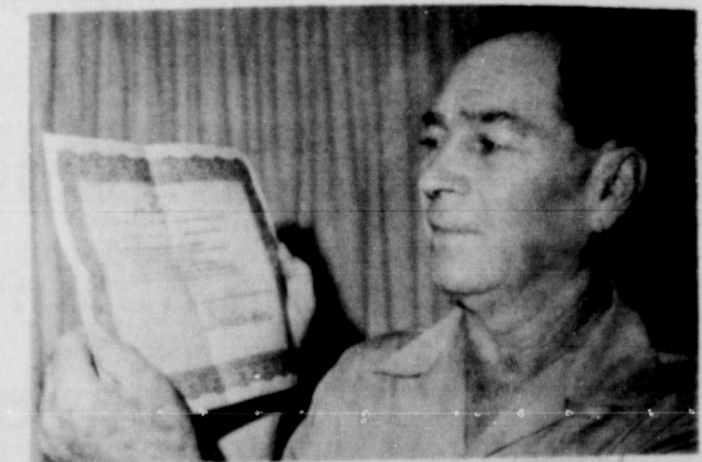

Pause And Reflect

During the summer of 1914 the city of Baltimore, Maryland, still contained some vacant lots. They were rough and weed-grown and were usually surrounded by huge billboards that advertised everything from chewing gum to automobiles. Beneath one of these signs a skinny six year old boy lay hidden in the ragweed. As a fawn freezes when hunters appear so did the boy remain rooted to the ground. He did not realize that far across the Atlantic the European continent was beginning to feel the rumble of World War I. He had a war of his own to contend with and he felt that discovery would mean a severe beating or probably death.

In the center of the vacant lot a wooden post had been set into the ground, and to the post a young man was tightly bound. Man and post were encircled by a sinister gang of young hoodlums. At a signal from the leader the torture of the victim began. Bricks, bats, sticks and stones were the weapons and they fell fast and furiously until the poor captive's head dropped and he found relief in unconsciousness.

As quietly as they had come, the torturers sneaked away. Two came dangerously close to the terrified boy.

When the fear of discovery was past the boy left the clump of weeds and his bare feet made short work of the several blocks between himself and his home. Never again did he disobey his mother by going to that part of town to play.

Next day's paper carried a short story of a gangland victim being admitted to Johns-Hopkins hospital.

The little boy is now an old gray-haired man. The first World War came and went. Years later a second World War began on the same battleground and later spread all over the globe. Korea erupted and was quieted only by the blood of thousands of the boy's companions. Now his son and his friend's sons are being sent into another war and to him it seems sometimes that it is still the same battle that began in a vacant city lot half a century ago.

Violence is not new. It started in the Garden of Eden and today its ugly face is seen in every land.

Any war, any place, is a deplorable occurrence and is extremely hard to justify on any grounds. However, wars do not materialize overnight, they grow from the seeds of unrest, greed and are nourished by treason. These seeds of war have been planted in our own country for many years and are now beginning to bear their hateful fruit.

Our national crime rate is now 16% ahead of last years. It is considered dangerous to walk the streets of our cities, including our nation's capitol Children murder children. Young ladies are unsafe in public buildings. Parents are brutally done away with by their offspring. City buses and subways have become hangouts for criminals. The motorist who happens to have a flat tire on our highways faces robbery or death.

An alleged minister of the Gospel, holder of one of the world's most coveted awards, turns out to be a worse snake than the one that infested Eden.

Ill-bred rabble-rousers are permitted to travel over the face of the earth spewing a doctrine of hate and bloodshed and remain as free as the man next door.

Dope peddlers invade our college campuses there by striking the very roots of our future and arf given the blessings of some bone-headed doctors, professors, and scientists.

Arrest, conviction, even a jail sentence, has become a badge of honor to this sorry crowd.

Where will it end? It will not end until an aroused public demands more responsible action from all those in authority at all levels and of all political parties.

Isn't it about time we started separating the wheat from the chaff?

We expect a new shipment of books this week with several Christmas titles.

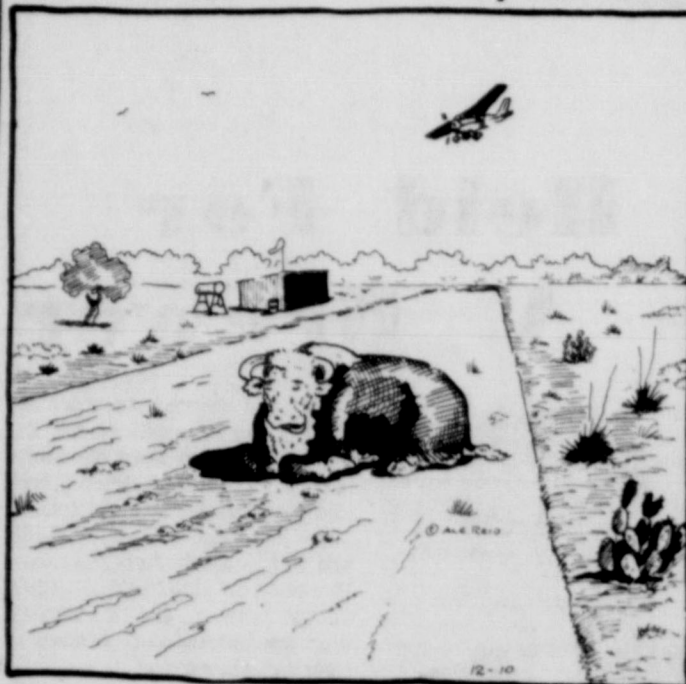
We had 16 new readers in Nov. We have checked out 9061 books to 3983 readers this year. We are proud of this record.

Railroad Pays \$35,868 In Taxes

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in Parmer County totaled \$35,868, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the more than \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' 33,410 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many of whom live in Parmer County, own their own homes.

"With the future of our country and state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am delighted that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."

Friona Student Will Get OS Tech Degree

Tom Bill Shelton, a student at Oklahoma State Tech, Okmulgee, from Friona, is among the 274 students slated for graduation at the end of the fall trimester. Shelton is completing a course in Auto Mechanics. This brings the total number of graduates from the vocational-technical school to over 8,600, with some completing each of the 32 different courses plus specializations that are offered at OST.

Exercises for the 58th graduating class will be held Wednesday night, December 20, at 8:00 p.m. in Covelle Hall with Wayne W. Miller, Tech director and dean, presenting Certificates of Accomplishments to the graduates.

Commencement speaker for the fall graduation exercises is Donald S. Kennedy, Oklahoma City, one of the state's leading and well-known industrialists and presently is serving as chairman of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

He holds four honorary doctorates and serves as a director of two banks. Kennedy also is listed in "Who's Who in America."

Of the 274 students completing courses, 51 are in industrial fields, 58 in commercial subjects, and 17 in the foods division.

Friona High School FFA's farm skills teams placed second and third at the area contests two weekends ago against Plainview. They each lost out to Abernathy, which went on to place first and second at the state contests.

It was the first time in several years for Friona to fail to qualify a team for the state FFA contests, especially in the farm skills division, where FHS has dominated district and area competition in recent years.

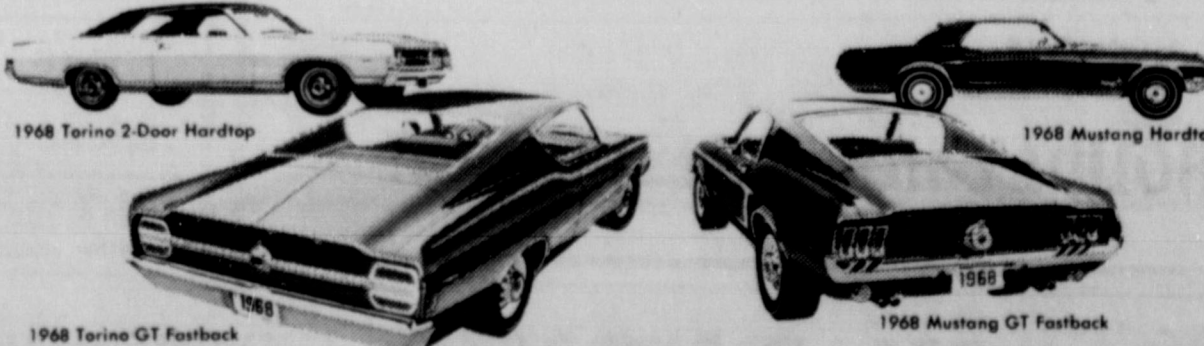

Varsity Teams In Tulia Meet

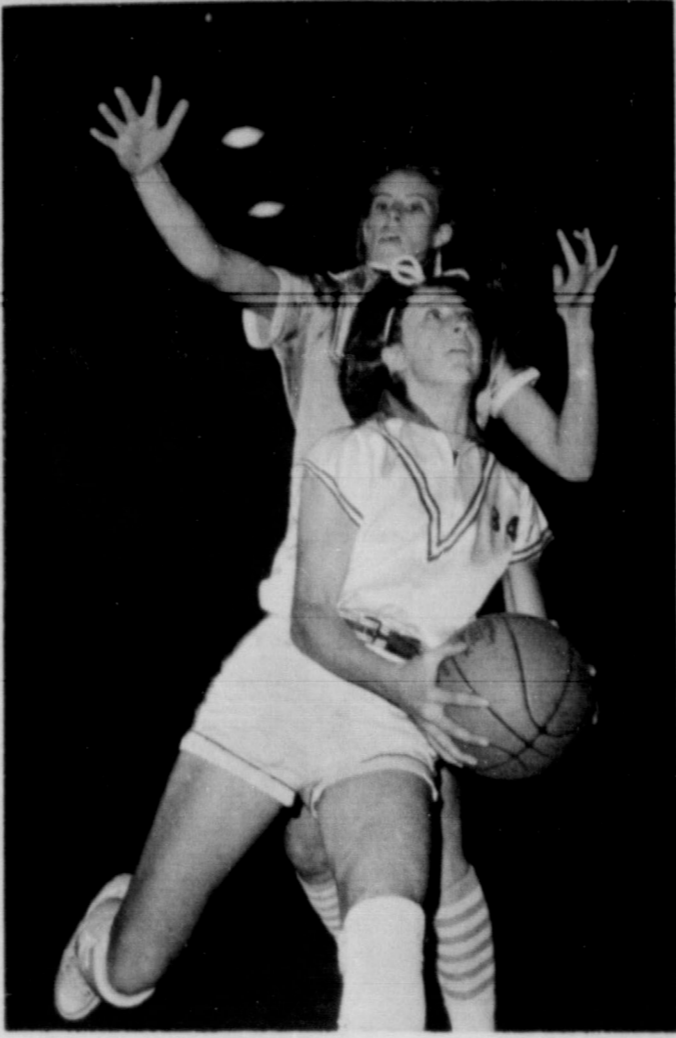
Friona High School basketball teams will participate in the Tulia Invitational Basketball tournament this weekend.

BRISCOE COUNTY FARMER HAS NEAR RECORD MICRONAIRE

It is a quite interesting story to hear the experience of Mr. Joe B. Mercer, a member in the Briscoe County Co-Op Gin, who lives in Silverton and farms on the High Plains near that city, as he relates his experience with a new cotton that was first released in 1966. Mr. Mercer has a verticillium wilt problem on his farm and he planted the new Gregg 25V that has the glandless seed, both years of 1966 and 1967, and no wilt showed up in the cotton. In 1966 he watered in July and then again just before the rain started around the 20th of August, which lasted for 4 or 5 weeks, and he says the cotton didn't make at all. This year he planted the same cotton again, but he managed it differently and he has a quite different story to tell.

Out of 97 wrap-ups from approximately 48 acres he had 80 bales ranging in micronaire from 3.7 to 4.3 with only 11 bales falling below the 3.5. The lint yield per acre averaged 1054 pounds are not tolerant to verticillium wilt. Gregg Seed Farms, 2700 Lockney Highway, Plainview, Texas.

15/16. The planting was finished by April 18, and harvesting was completed by November 12.

Here is a salute to you, Mr. Mercer, a farmer of the Plains on the northern fringe of the cotton belt with a record like this on wilt infested ground, in a bad year for micronaire like '67. When Mr. Mercer was asked how he watered the cotton in '67, he replied, "I watered in July 20th, and that was it, and it never rained any afterwards." He also states that he had a neighbor who had the 25V in '66, and that he watered in July, but had not watered again when the rains started, and that he had one of the best fields of cotton around.

And if you like a high production cotton with an excellent turnout you cannot pass up the new Gregg 45. The 35 and 45 are not tolerant to verticillium wilt. Other schools entered in the meet are Frenship, Springlake, Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Sudan and Floydada.



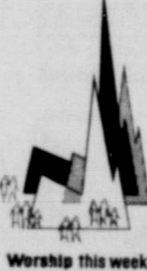

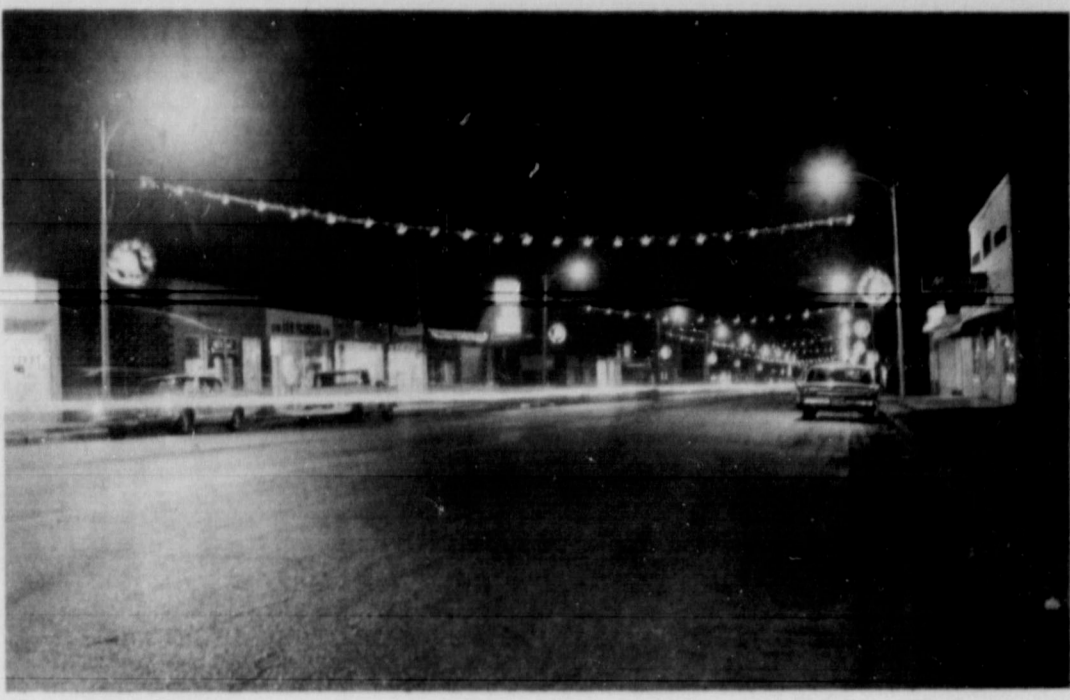

On The Farm In Parmer County

Listed below is information which was presented at the Fertilizer Short course at Dimmitt in November.

Large amounts of nitrogen are removed from the soil when crops are produced, and this deficit must be replenished. For example, 6,000 pounds of grain sorghum produced on an acre of land will take with it 100 pounds of nitrogen. Fur-

thermore, it takes 200 pounds of the nutrient to produce the 6,000 pound yield. Thus, large amounts of nitrogen are required to keep a soil in high state of fertility.

The process of nitrification which involves the changes that occur to nitrogen compounds when they are applied to the soil so as to become available for plant use is very interesting. Nitrates are the available forms of nitrogen compounds and their formation is affected by soil temperature, aeration, Ph level and moisture. Nitrification best occurs when the soil temperature is above 50 degrees F. Also, the soil should be fairly loose for good aeration and contain adequate moisture. The Ph range should be between 6.5 and 8.

As far as the application of nitrogen, on sandy soils, the element should be applied just prior to planting or by side-dressing according to research. On clay or tight soils, however, times of application is not significant. Phosphorus deficiencies do not always show up as visual symptoms (discolorations) in plants. Significant responses can be obtained from crops by the application of phosphorus, under certain circumstances. According to researchers, applying phosphorus preplant by either banding or broadcasting is best for top results.

The species of plant as well as its root activity plays an important role in the amount of phosphorus used. Also, the solubility of the phosphorus compound is an important factor and the element's renewal rate in a particular type of soil must also be taken into consideration. Fertility tests conducted by the Lubbock Experiment Station indicated on some loose, sandy soils in which the addition of phosphorus was made zinc deficiency resulted. This occurred through a chemical change in the soil in which the available zinc joined with the phosphorus to form insoluble zinc phosphate.

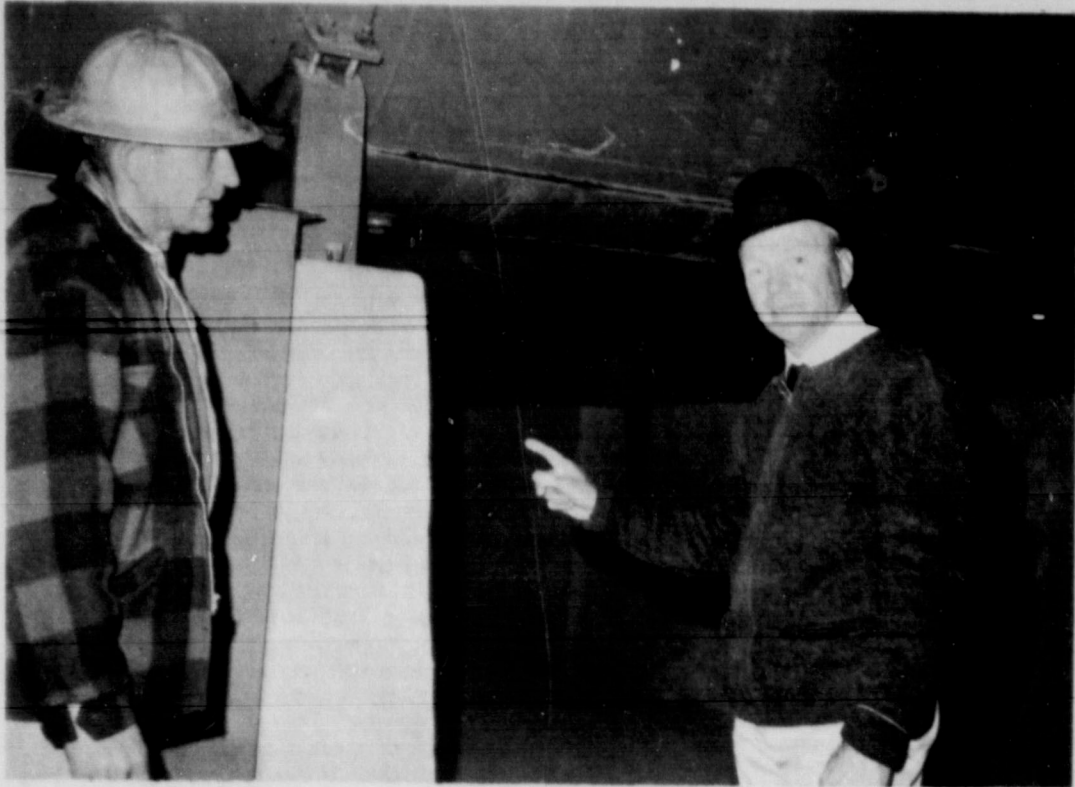

Grandsons served as pallbearers. Burial was in Friona Cemetery under direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

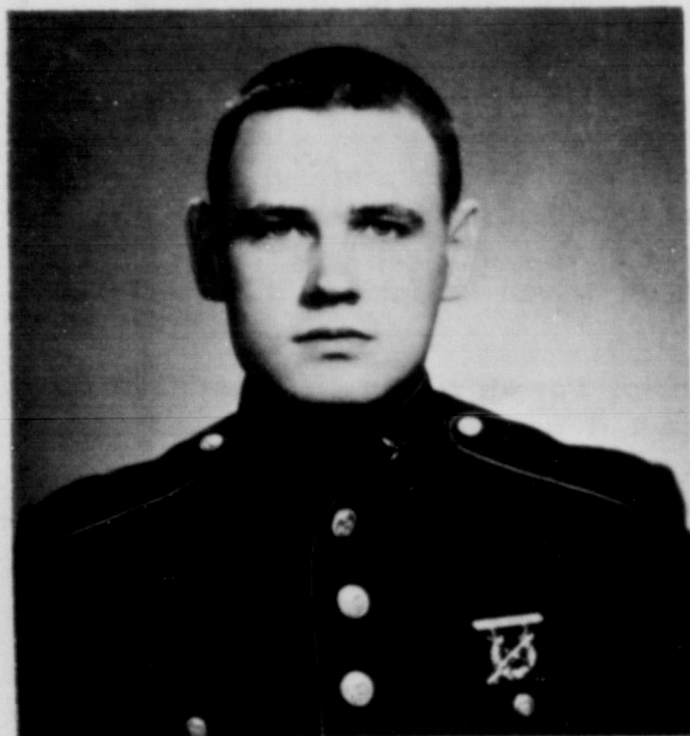
Services For M.F. Fite Sr.
