Two Doctors Plan To Leave Friona

An article in last week's U.S. News and World Report caught our fancy, and we thought we'd summarize it for those of you who may not have seen it.

A college president, Miller Upton of Beloit College, Wis., had an address of his printed and the magazine entitled the piece "It's Time to Stand Up for the Underdog."

Upton said he had just about reached the end of his tolerance for the way our society at the present time seems to have sympathetic concern only for the misfit, pervert, drug addict, drifter, etc.

"In short, I feel it is time for someone like me to stand up and say -- I'm for the underdog! Upton told the honor students at Ripon College in an address.

Upton pointed out that he wasn't speaking of the wealthy, necessarily, nor people in authority -- just the doer, the achiever -- the one who does the most with what he has.

We are not born equal; we are born unequal," Upton says. The talented are no more responsible for their talents than the underprivileged for their plight. The measure of each should be by what he does with his inherited position.

Upton said it is wrong to level our guns of hostility, envy and ridicule on the successful white man, who more often than not struggled financially to get a college education, and who often works at his job more than 60 hours a week, who buys a comfortable home in the suburbs with the welfare of his family in mind.

Men of this nature often are active in church and community affairs, serve on boards of education, and in some cases shorten their life span through overwork and anxiety resulting from the basic social responsibilities they carry.

Without men of this nature, our country would be in a predicament, Upton says, and we would not enjoy many of the great freedoms of today.

"When we point an accusing finger at those who succeed within our economic system, so we accuse the system itself of faults which are not of its creation. We tend to blame the economic system for the faults of individuals who operate within it," Upton says.

We should stop referring naively to creating a "great" society, Upton thinks. We should instead, aspire to create a "decent" society.

Referring to court rulings regarding Negroes in recent years, Upton says that love is a uniquely personal experience.

"If it is idle to attempt to legislate individual morality, it is even more idle and even arrogant to attempt to force individual love," he says.

To love, or go through the pretense of loving, without truly feeling that way is one of the lowest forms of hypocrisy. It is dishonesty at its worst. We should respect all people so much that we would not dare demand one by pretending to love him when we don't, Upton told the college students.

Our serious problems and issues can be solved over a period of time by attending them directly. They will never be subject to instant solution -- just "wishing" it so," Upton states.

Nor will they be solved by running away from them by concerning ourselves with remote situations rather than those at hand.

"The main point is that problems will be solved by doers -- not people with just good intentions, but individuals with good deeds. Not those who talk a good game, but those who play a good game -- the achiever.

"We will never create a good society, much less a great one, until individual excellence and achievement is not only respected but encouraged," the college president concluded.

We tend to agree with his summary of the situation.

The two doctors indicated that it was strictly a matter of hospital policy and management ideals which prompted their move.

"This definitely isn't an attempt on our part to better ourselves," Dr. Cranfill pointed out.

There had been speculation that the two doctors might set up private practice in Friona. However, according to the contract by which they set up practice, this would be impossible.

According to their contract, upon their withdrawal from the present partnership, the doctors may not set up practice within a 50-mile radius of Friona.

Dr. Cranfill has practiced locally for the past 10 years. Dr. Humphrey has just completed four years at the local hospital.

Council Stalls Action On Gas Hike Request

The Friona City Council tabled a request from Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for an increase in the general service rates for

city gas customers at its regular meeting Monday night. After much discussion among the council, Mayor Preach Ed-

elmon in particular, and representatives from Pioneer Gas, it was agreed that the group would consider the request at a later date, when further figures are supplied the local governing body.

Representing Pioneer Gas at the meeting were K.B. (Tex) Watson, J.V. Huber and Ralph Shirley, local manager.

In other business, the council approved two petitions for annexation to the city of separate parcels of land.

The first was the Fleming-McClothlin tract, in the 1400 block of West Fifth Street. The other involved lots 1-12 and lots 42-57, block two and lots 1-16, block three of the Western Addition.

In a special meeting July 6, the council awarded a paving contract for block two of the Western Addition to Jake Diel of Muleshoe on a bid of \$13,721.40, with the water and sewer contract going to H.B. Jordan of Amarillo at \$8,557.90.

Other business Monday saw an ordinance passed to permit

arrests by city patrolmen in certain emergency cases without a warrant.

During the discussion concerning a gas rate increase, Mayor Edelman told the council "Until I see more figures than we have tonight, I think it would be foolish to approve an increase."

It was pointed out that should the city council not approve the requested rate increase, Pioneer Gas could take their case to the state Railroad Commission for appeal, and the commission would then decide the issue.

City Manager Jake Outland reported in his monthly summary of activities to the council that a total of five building permits were issued, for an estimated construction of \$36,700. Included were two new residences for an estimated \$31,300.

Water department records showed 22,630,600 gallons of water pumped, an average of 754,620 gallons per day, down from the average of over a million gallons per day during June. This is attributed to the recording of 3.43 inches of rainfall over eleven different days during the month.

Two new water taps were made and one service reactivated to bring the total active services to 1051 as of the end of June.

Two new sewer taps were also made, to bring the total number of active taps to 985. A total of 408 feet of six-inch sewer main and one manhole were installed in the Staley Addition to service the eight new apartments being built by R.L. Fleming.

The police department reported 47 arrests. Thirty-four were for traffic violations; four for warrants; four minors in possession of alcoholic beverages; two for DWI and thefts and one for driving while license was suspended.

Five traffic accidents were investigated, with an estimated property damage of \$2,200 and three injuries.

Anni Jensen Back For Visit

Friona folks must have made a pretty good impression on a warm-skinned damsel from Denmark a few years ago, because she has returned along with her husband, to visit Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Massie, her American parents.

Anni Jensen, now Mrs. Eric Jensen, was a senior at Friona high school during the 1961-62 school year, and graduated with some Friona students. She was Friona's first exchange student.

Eric and Anni were married on May 17 of this year. "This date also marks my parents' 25th wedding anniversary," noted Anni. The Jensen's cere-

mony took place in the State church of Denmark, to which 97 per cent of the population belong.

"She prefers a Danish wedding to an American wedding," said Mrs. Massie. The couple are now on their honeymoon in the United States. Part of their travel expense provided by the Massies as their wedding gift to the couple.

Anni's home is a town on the West coast of Denmark called Esbjerg. One of the larger cities of Denmark, it boasts a population of about 55,000.

The newlyweds arrived in New York City by plane on June 24, and took a bus to Texas. "We saw a lot of the country

while traveling on the bus." The trip from New York to Texas took three days.

Erik Jensen is a law student, studying Danish International Law. Home town for him is Oksbol, where his father holds the position of mayor. He has one sister, Bodil, age 20, and a brother, Peter, age 7. "The first thing Erik did when he arrived in Friona was buy his brother a pair of cowboy boots," said Mrs. Massie.

After leaving Friona in 1962, Anni attended two years of college in Denmark, and then started working as a laboratory technician. Her father works as a postman and her mother is a housewife. She has one sister, Vibeke, 17 years old.

"It's much warmer here than Denmark," said Anni comparing the two countries. "We have an average temperature of 17 degrees centigrade, which when converted to Fahrenheit becomes about 63 degrees. "We also get more rain in Denmark"

The couple left Wednesday to visit Erik's uncle in Houston, but will return in about four days. "We hope to take them out West before they leave," said Mrs. Massie. "Maybe to the Grand Canyon. We also plan to give them a tea before they leave, so all their friends can come and see them before they return to Denmark.

The Jensen's just returned from Conchas Lake after a weekend of water skiing. This


was Erik's first attempt to water ski, because as Anni puts it, "The water in the North Sea is too rough to ski on." When asked about his first attempt, Erik said, "Oh, it's just fine." "He really did very well," added Mrs. Massie.

The couple is scheduled to catch a plane in New York on August 21 to return to their new home in the town of Aarhus, where Erik will continue his studies. Aarhus is the second largest city in Denmark, and the site of Aarhus University.

"It's nice to be back again," said Anni. "I'm surprised that so many of my friends still remember me. "The town hasn't changed much since I left, and neither have the people."

Bank Deposits Show Increase Over 1966

Deposits at Friona State Bank at the close of business June 30 stood at \$6,293,161.48, it was revealed this week by the bank's quarterly statement.

The figures represented a 2.7 per cent increase over a

similar statement for June 30, 1966, when deposits stood at \$6,112,851.67.

Other bank figures also showed gains. Loans were up from \$4,694,221.51 in the 1966 statement to \$5,026,759.66 currently. Total assets showed an increase from \$6,734,739.40 to \$6,967,972.65.

About the only figure which showed a decline from a year ago was U.S. Government Bonds. This figure stood at \$569,220.26 in June of 1966, but came to only \$370,626.88 the past June 30.

Chemicals Give Hope For A Hungry World


Public opinions polls generally place such things as the Viet Nam War, the cost of living and the racial strife at the head of the list of great issues that concern people the most. But one growing problem over-riding all others is that of world-wide population growth. Senator George McGovern of South Dakota, speaking on this problem, called it "the most challenging crisis for the rest of this century," and he speaks with great reason.

World population in the year 1887 was 1.3 billion persons. By 1957, just 70 years later, it doubled to 2.6 billion. By the year 2,000, careful projections indicate a world population of 6 billion people must be provided with a minimum diet in order to exist.

In the matter of food production, the United States has become the shining hope of the world for the simple reason that it has demonstrated what modern technology can do to increase the productivity of the land. Free enterprise agriculture, coupled with revolutionary advances in the development and use of machinery, chemical fertilizers and pesticides, has produced dramatic results. Take but a few typical crops.

Corn production in the 1925-29 period approximated 26 bushels per acre. In 1965, it was estimated at 72 bushels. Wheat yield per acre went from about 14 bushels to 27. Cotton production has trebled in the last 30 years. Milk production per cow has nearly doubled in the same period. In the forefront of the list of tools upon which we must increasingly depend to augment agricultural production are pesticide chemicals - the wide variety of insecticides, fungicides, weed killers, rodent destroyers, and plant growth regulators available for safe use in food production, processing and marketing.

The United States, among the developed countries, faces the challenge of playing a decisive leadership role in helping teach two thirds of the world's people how to produce enough food to feed themselves. Advanced agricultural techniques cannot be applied overnight in countries with vastly differing eating habits, crop requirements and political systems. U.S. agricultural progress itself depends on public understanding of our economic system of free markets and private enterprise. This system provides the incentives to create and apply the constant flow of technological developments on which we and the rest of the world's people depend for survival.



OUR READERS Write

To the Citizens of Friona: Greetings:

An explanation of my position concerning the petition of Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for a gas rate increase in Friona is as follows:

1. The information presented by Pioneer Natural Gas supporting the request for this increase in rates concerned only the distribution systems within the 55 cities affected. No information was presented concerning the transportation system which delivers gas to the city gate at 28¢ per MCF for domestic use and 21.29¢ for commercial use. Under such an arrangement it would be possible for the entire operation to be near a reasonable return yet show a low return on the distribution system.

2. Under our franchise system certain prescribed procedures were agreed upon when the franchise was granted. Namely:

a. Changes in rates could be made when mutually agreed upon by the franchise holder and the city commission.

b. Changes in rates either up or down when requested and not mutually agreed upon only after a hearing before the Railroad Commission of Texas in which hearing the commission granted the requested rate change.

3. And finally the acceptance of the proposed rate increase without exploring every avenue to protect the interests of the people of Friona would, I feel, be neglecting my duty as your mayor and I pledge my opposition to any such rate increase until I am convinced that is justified.

People are so busy these days that they hardly have time to speak to each other. Food preservation, harvest, camps, vacations, gardening - trying to keep up with the weeds and the many other things that go with daily living. Or is it living? Some times we are so busy making a living we really have no time for living-in its' fullest sense.

COST OF MEAT ON THE FORK
Cost of food can run high during summer, for company, for camps, and vacations. There are many foods that are offered as bargains that are not truly real bargains when cost per serving is considered.

Take meats for instance. The cost per pound does not tell the whole story -- it's the cost per serving -- the edible cooked meat you get on your fork that really counts.

To compare take the favorite barbecued spare-ribs that so many like. How does it compare to other meat cuts-per serving, that is.

Spare - ribs -.59¢ per lb. serving per pound - 1-1/3 servings. - 56¢ per serving. Sirloin steak - \$1.59 per lb. -

serving per lb. 2-1/2 cost per serving-.3039¢.

Thighs - ready to cook -.89¢ per lb. - 3 servings per lb. - cost per serving -.30¢

Ground Lean Meat -.69¢ per lb. - 4 servings per lb. - cost per serving -.17¢

Picnic Ham (bone in) cost. 49¢ per lb. - will cost. 25¢ per serving while

Ham full cooked - (bone in) will cost .31¢ per serving.

It does pay to consider price of "bargains" when shopping for meats. "A serving is 2-1/2 ounces of edible cooked meat.

I'm dreaming of some fresh pan-fried catfish or trout for my vacation - that won't cost anything, that is, if you have a fisherman in the crowd.




Holly and Iris Stephenson, Vicki Pryor and Marilyn Jones.

New Conservationist Added To Local Staff

The local Soil Conservation office added a new employee this past week, with the appointment of Jerry Isbell to the staff.

Isbell comes to Friona from Dell City, where he was employed with the Conservation Service. He has been with the service for four years.

He replaces Eddie Willmon, who recently resigned from the service to go into private business.

Following his graduation from Odessa high school Isbell attended college at Texas Tech in Lubbock, majoring in Animal Husbandry.

His family consists of his wife, Jeanie and two children, Terry, age three, and Becky, one year old. The Isbells reside at 1001 Woodland.

Isbell will be working as Work Unit Conservationist at the local office, directing operations of the Friona Work Unit, and giving technical assistance to farmers and land owners of the area.

"We administer the Great Plains Conservation Program, which is set up to help farm-

ers with conservation practices, says Isbell. "This is a real important program for the county."

Since the Conservation district was organized in 1947, 513 farmers have been developed into cooperative agreements by which they agree to treat their land according to its needs. "There are some 1350 farms in this county alone, several of which we have not developed as yet in to agreements Isbell said. Isbell also noted that 30,892 acres of farmland in the county are being used to grow crops that replenish the soil. This is in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service.

A fifty per cent increase in number of books checked out daily was noted for June, 1967. During June, 1966, the daily average per library day was 102 books. This June the daily average was 154 books borrowed. A total of 2160 books were loaned during the fourteen library days.

The number of readers daily showed a 21% increase, as on concludes that there is an increase in readers and also in the number of books being checked out by readers. The record number of readers was 114 on June 22 who borrowed 263 books. This contrasted with 36 checking out 66 books on June 3rd.

There are now 162 school age children in the Summer Reading Program. Thirty five have already read 12 or more books and thus earned a place on the Honor Roll at the library. At the end of the reading program in August reading certificates will be awarded. Books read by members of the summer reading program will be recorded through August 19. There is still time to join and earn a certificate.

Two story hours were held in June, with an average attendance of 27. Story hour will continue on Thursday mornings from 10 to 11 through August 10th. Pre-school children from 3 to 6 years of age are invited.






