## Praise For Use Of TEC Facility

Fred Jackson, manager of Friona's new branch office of the Texas Employment Commission, reported this week that the office had placed approximately 40 individuals with employers since its opening, as well as several crews of agricultural workers.

In addition, the office has about 25 orders from employers for workers not yet filled, Jackson pointed out.

"We have had very good response from the people of Friona and the surrounding area, to have been open for such a short time. We at the TEC office want to send out our hearty thanks, and invite those who have not used our services to do so whenever they need to," Jackson said.

The Texas Employment Commission office is located at the corner of Sixth and Euclid, in the front of the building formerly occupied by Plains Publishers.

Jackson is in charge of agricultural-related jobs, and Ted Swindle is in charge of the non-agricultural portion.

## Grain Farmers To Plant 170,000 Acres In 1968

Parmer County farmers have signed up to plant 170,101 acres of feed grain (corn and grain sorghum) for 1968, it was announced this week by Prentice Mills, official manager of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

This represents 63.5 per cent of the county's allotment of 268,001 acres on 1266 farms. This is down somewhat from the 1967 percentage signed up, but Mills points out that an additional 28,000 acres of wheat allotment acres will probably be planted to sorghum, so that the feed grain acreage planted for harvest in 1968 should not be but about five per cent less than the 1967 crop.

The acreage to be diverted (laid out) is 95,899, or 36.5 per cent.

There are approximately 80,000 acres of wheat planted for harvest in the county, from an

allotment of 108,050.6 acres on 1221 farms.

Barring loss of wheat by adverse weather, the county should harvest 80,000 acres of wheat.

As announced last week, a total of 1138 cotton farmers signed up to plant 35,669 acres of cotton, some 80.7 per cent of the total cotton allotment for the county.

Mills points out that the county's cotton production in 1968, with a reasonable normal crop year, could very easily be twice that of 1967. "There were approximately 22,000 bales of cotton produced on about 19,000 acres in the county in 1967. Now, assuming we have a reasonable normal crop in 1968 and harvest as much as 34,000 acres of cotton, we could very

easily produce more than 40,000 bales of cotton this year," Mills says.

Mills states that he feels we can be a little optimistic about our prospects for an increase in gross farm income in the county in 1968, for several reasons.

First, moisture conditions are very good. Next, the wheat looks good, in spite of trouble from green bugs. Also, the county will receive more program payments in 1968 than in 1967.

## FOUND SHOT

# Seaney Dies Of Gunshot Wound

Funeral services for Elma Clay Seaney, 61, were conducted Wednesday afternoon in Morton.

Seaney died about 2:45 a.m. Tuesday morning at Parmer County Community Hospital. Cause of death was given as a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

He was discovered Monday afternoon in the stock room of the Pak-A-Sak 7-11 grocery which he owned, shot in the head. Seaney's .22 single shot rifle lay at his side. He was discovered by David Holcomb of Dimmitt, Cloverlake route man on a delivery.

Holcomb summoned an ambulance and Seaney was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital, where he lived approximately 12 hours. The shooting allegedly occurred about 2:15 p.m. Monday.

The Seaney's purchased the local 7-11 grocery store last September. After almost two months of commuting from Morton, they moved to Friona on November 1. The family had lived in Morton 22 years, also operating a grocery store.

Seaney is survived by his wife, Naoma, two sons, Roy Dean of Security, Colo. and Perry Don of Memphis, Tenn., and a daughter, Mrs. Joyce McDaniel, Fort Worth.

A brother, George Seaney, lives in Silverton. Five sisters also survive, Mrs. Tressie Duncan of Tulsa; Mrs. Alma Johnson of Eric, Okla.; Mrs. Eva Lee Cheeves of Exter, Calif.; Mrs. Anna Belle Lawley of Stockton, Calif. and Mrs. Mattie Hay of Linden, Calif.

Five grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were conducted at Morton's First Baptist Church, with Rev. Fred Thomas, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Bill Foil of Friona. Burial was at Lubbock's Resthaven Memorial Gardens, under the direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

## Expanded Air Service Available To Vietnam

An illustrated pamphlet "Mail For Servicemen" outlining the expanded program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through Friona Post Office window clerks, Postmaster Williams announced today.

Postmaster Williams said "As a result of new legislation and action by President

Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will help more American families be familiar with these services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford. The speedy service is now available for newspapers and magazines, to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recordings of personal messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Vietnam and other overseas bases from major U.S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address military mail.

A family sending a 10-pound package from Friona to Vietnam, for example, pays only \$2.75 on a package marked PAL while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$6.59, Postmaster Williams said.

On parcels weighing less than five pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail service, which provides surface transportation to the port of embarkation and airtail overseas. A four-pound SAM package to a European military post from Friona cost only \$1.10.

Open house for the new Parmer House Restaurant is set for Sunday from 2-5 p.m., it is announced by Bill Lewis, manager.

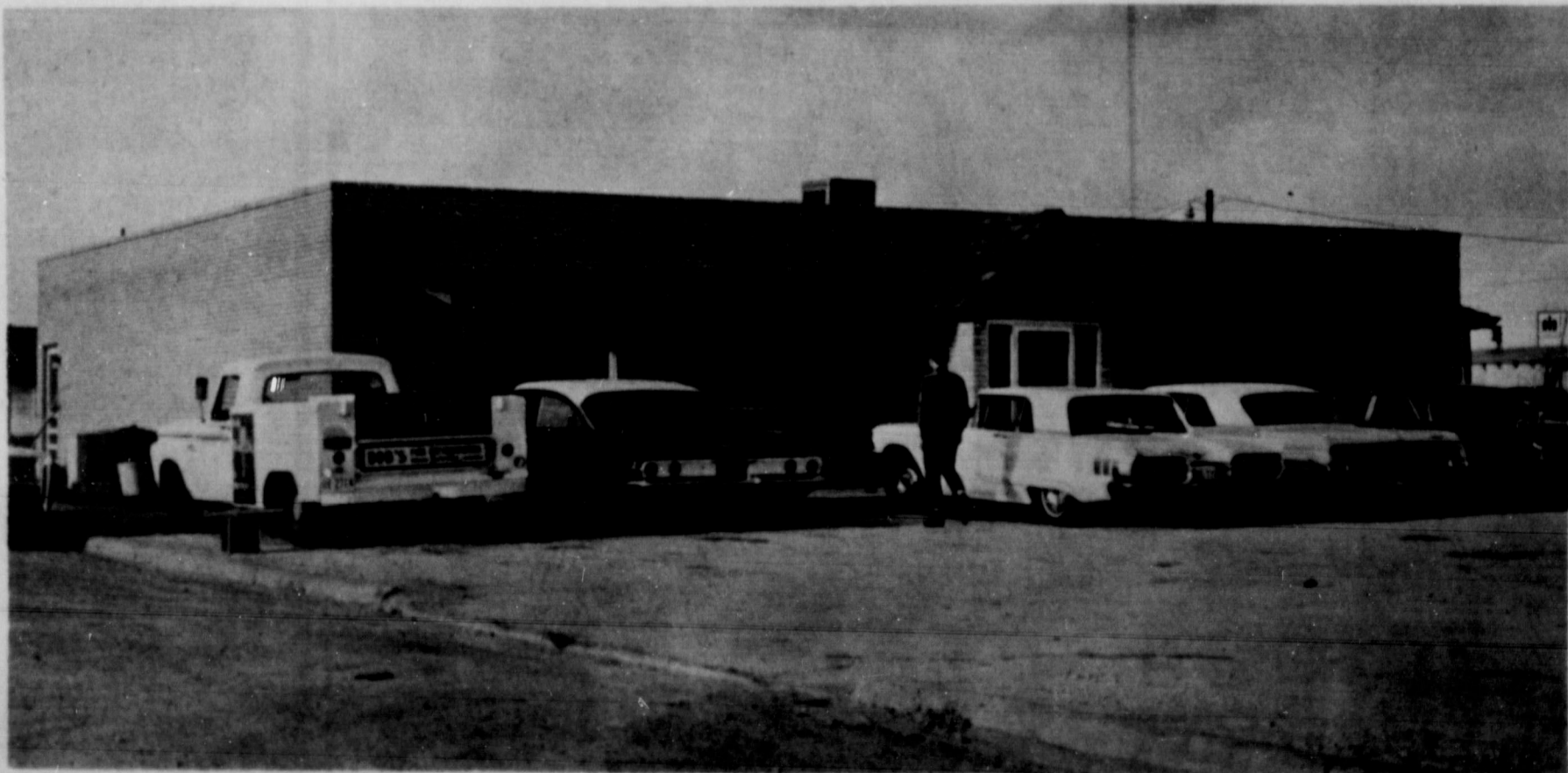
Lewis also announced that beginning Sunday the restaurant will feature a noon buffet.

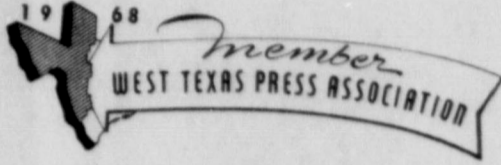

**AN EDITORIAL**

**Rules Listed For Advertising Guide**

Fairfax M. Cone, often called the senior statesman of American advertising, has set down a list of rules which provide a guide to both merchant and public in evaluating advertising.

The head of one of the world's great advertising agencies, Mr. Cone said that newspaper advertising of clothing and food is the most productive advertising in the world:

"They tell What, Where, and How Much; they say these things in the fewest possible words, in the plainest of terms, and they illustrate them without invention, with remarkable fidelity."

Mr. Cone proposed a code for good advertising which could be easily followed by any retailer:

1. Advertising should be clear as to proposition. It should select logical prospects -- no one else matters.
2. Advertising should be complete. It should leave no question unanswered.
3. Advertising should be important. Logical prospects should learn something important from it.
4. Advertising should be personal. It should express the advertiser's personality.
5. Advertising should produce an immediate decision to do something that the advertising calls for.

Mr. Cone's code is so simple that it's importance can be misleading. He is saying that an advertisement should contain everything that a good news story in the newspaper contains. He is saying that every advertisement should provide a service to the potential consumer.

In effect, he is saying that any retailer, however small, should prepare his advertisements in the same language he uses when he talks to a favorite customer.

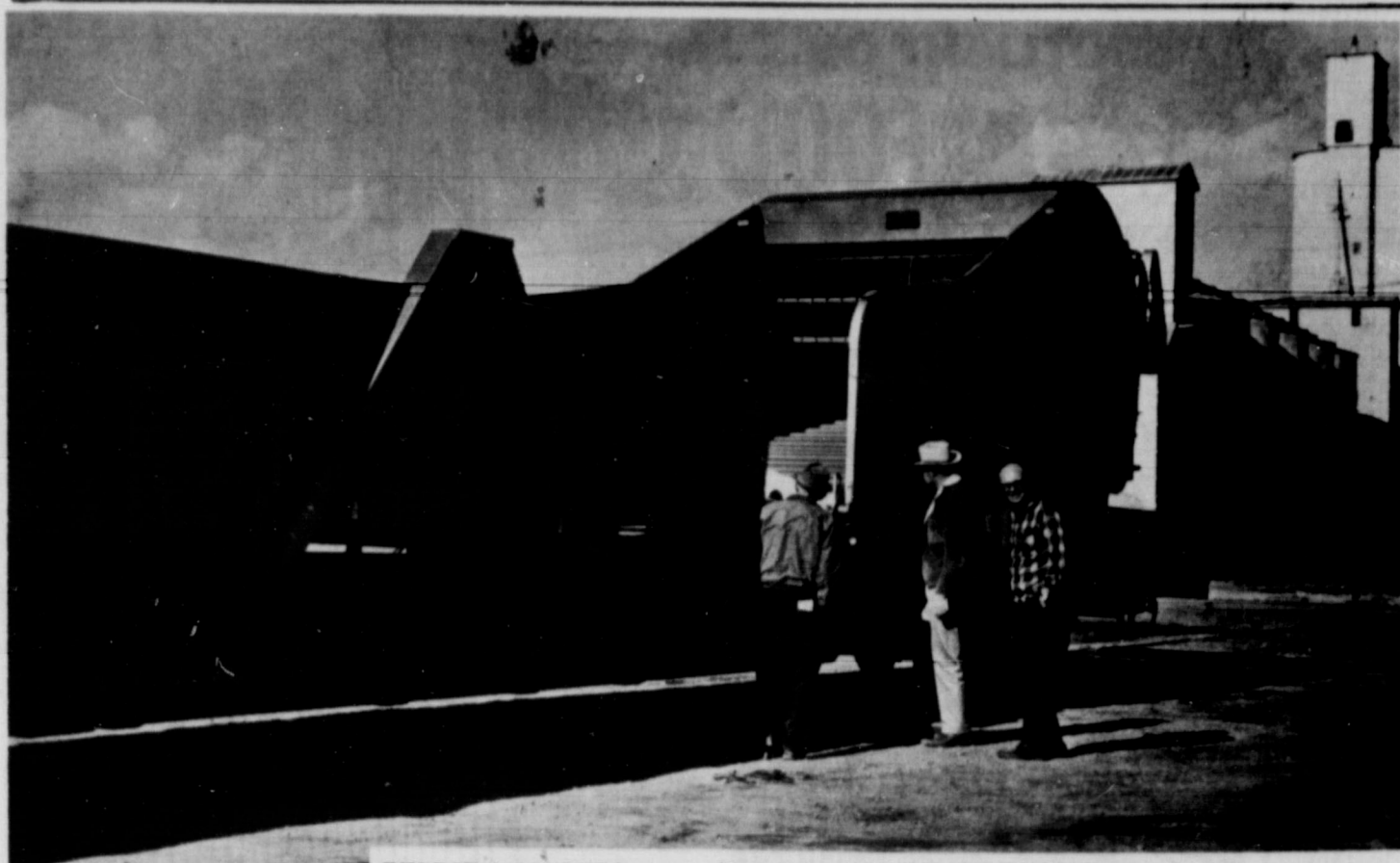

Dot books serve many purposes. These are the books in which a child follows numbers or letters with a crayon or pencil to form a picture.

The pre-schooler can learn its A-B-C's and 1-2-3's as he pictures. Later he can color the pictures he makes, or cut them out, or paste them up.

Activity books that contain dot games often have other games a child goes on to. There are mazes: "Get the pioneers through the woods and back to the covered wagon." A child follows the open spaces with a crayon until he achieves the goal. There are picture puzzles: "Find Peter Rabbit in the garden." And he turns the page this way and that until he spots Peter in a row of carrots or a radish patch.

"Usually a child wants to do these without help," reminds Alice Hanson, an activity book editor with Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wis. "But he wants help to be available if needed. And he likes to be admired." Grown-ups do best by being part-time audience and assistants.

Experts tell us that these play-books are big incentives to a child's learning. An environment in which he has tools for trying and failing - for pure fun - helps his confidence grow. Bright colors, paper to crumple, shapes to tear out keep him happily occupied.

Baby-sitters can benefit. Teens don't mind chasing youngsters. But grandmothers, honorary aunts and over 21ers would rather be sitters than racers. Here's a case where using the head saves the heels. Activity books bought at the local variety store can keep children tractable and in sight. A storybook or a punch-out book or a plain coloring book helps too.

Luckily, children like to putter and play, with only a little advice and a lot of praise.

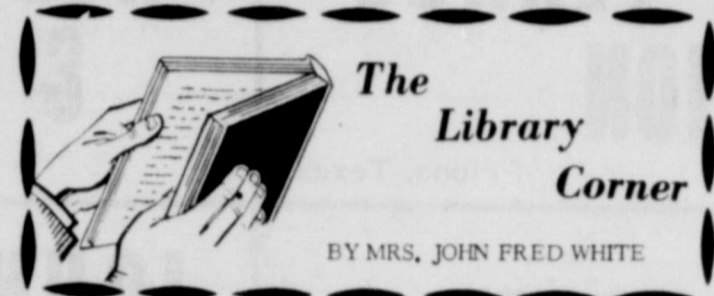

### Quota Up For April

State draft boards are being called upon to furnish 2,378 men for the Army and Marines in April, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday. The quota for local board number 18 has been set at 19, with 50 to be examined.

This compares to a quota of 1,948 for the Army in March and is the largest monthly call for the draft boards since October 1966, when the share was 2,845.

The draft boards will forward 8,500 men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations in April for the pre-induction physical and mental examinations in preparation to fill future quotas.

This compares to 7,200 being forwarded for this purpose in March 4,590 sent in February, and 5,455 in January. The March pre-induction examination quota originally was 4,200 but was increased later because of higher induction quotas.

The April induction and pre-induction quotas were mailed to local boards by state Selective Service headquarters March 13.

The April call of 2,378 men for Texas is the state's share of a national quota of 48,000, the Army to get 44,000 of this number, and the Marine Corps 4,000.

## Paper Manufacturing Is Possible Cotton Market

As long ago as 1958 the makers of cotton-content writing paper were showing an interest in raw cotton fiber as a supplement to the cotton rags traditionally used in their operations.

Since that time they have run almost innumerable tests on gin notes, used all-cotton bale bagging and various grades and staples of raw cotton.

Working with them and supplying samples by the dozens has been Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. as a part of the organization's quest for new cotton markets.

Last week, ten years and a six-inch stack of correspondence later, PCG negotiated the first sale of raw cotton to be used in manufacture of paper.

The sale of 100 bales of short staple, low grade cotton grown in Lamb County, was made to Crain & Company, Dalton, Mass. Crane is one of the leading manufacturers of fine writing papers in the U.S. and is also a major supplier of the paper on which U.S. currency is printed.

Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President, said "This 100 bales will be used in the first large scale test ever run on raw cotton fiber by the paper industry. It is a very small beginning, but it is a breakthrough toward which we have been working for years and there is a reason to hope it will eventually lead to an additional market for over 300,000 bales per year."

The cotton sold had a loan value of around 8 1/2 cents per pound and was sold to Crane for about 11 cents, Johnson reported. "However the important thing in this initial transaction is not price, but the fact that these 100 bales will be processed into paper and that the experience gained by Crane will be available to many other paper makers, all of whom are potential customers for this kind of cotton."

He noted that Crane has agreed to supply PCG with the names and addresses of 10 or 12 other paper makers who would logically be interested, and PCG will supply these with

samples similar to those on which the sale to Crane was made.

Obtaining adequate and acceptable supplies of cotton rags has been an increasing problem for paper makers in recent years as more and more materials are made of blends with synthetic fibers.

And according to the Writing Paper Manufacturers Association this fact has seriously hampered development of markets for cotton-content paper.

In 1963 the WPMA and PCG made an effort to get Commodity Credit Corporation to release some of its rapidly building stocks of short staple cotton to the paper industry at prices the industry could afford to pay, but USDA declined to cooperate.

Also the possibility of growing cotton specifically for the paper makers on acreage in addition to regular cotton allotments has been explored. This idea has not been abandoned, but to date USDA has refused to authorize such plantings.

Paper makers do not judge the suitability of cotton for their operations on the same basis as does the textile industry. They are not interested in staple or micronaire, only in cleanliness. No staple is too short nor micronaire too low for their needs.

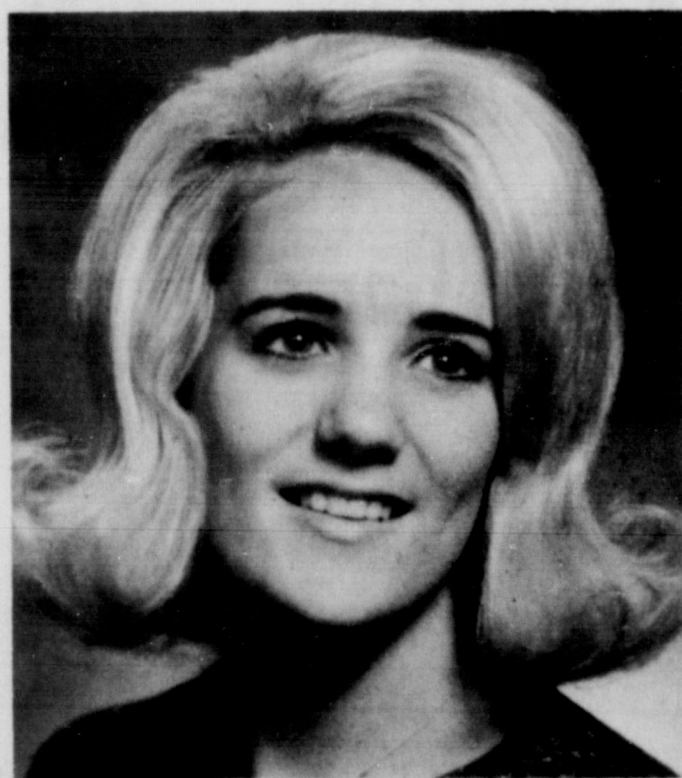

### Safety Urged In Use Of Pesticides

Safety in the use of chemical pesticides is a major concern in a world that must control food-destroying pests in order to provide enough food for its rapidly multiplying population.

In the United States it is evident that we must continue to use chemical pesticides. There is not alternate means of adequately controlling most of the rodents, insects, mites, nematodes, weeds, fungi, and other pests that take heavy toll of our Nation's agricultural production. It is estimated that nearly a third of our potential production is lost to these pests despite our use of pesticides.

Pesticides are used by farmers primarily to protect their crops and livestock. They are used by people in all walks of life to protect their health, comfort, and property. They are essential to our national economy and well-being.

Pesticides can be poisonous to humans, domestic animals, pollinating insects, or wildlife if they are not properly used. But pesticides can be safe if they are used for their prescribed purposes and as directed by competent authorities. DRIFT CONTROL

As far as application is concerned precautions to control the aerial drift of pesticidal dusts or sprays are largely the

responsibility of the pilot. Drift cannot be prevented entirely, but it can be reduced to the point where it will do no appreciable harm. Following is the basic information on aerial drift control: (1) Dusts tend to drift much farther than coarse sprays. (2) Coarse spray droplets do not drift as far as fine spray droplets. (3) High wind

velocity makes it impossible to control drift. If increasing wind velocity creates a drift hazard, stop application immediately. (4) Under some conditions, a very high temperature prevents the pesticide from settling to the ground within the treatment area. (5) Take particular care to prevent drift onto homes, barns, streams, lakes, ponds.

### "Food" For Thought.

"Lack of exercise is probably reducing the American male's life expectancy by as much as five years", so says Dr. Jean Mayer, Professor of nutrition at the Harvard University School of Public Health. The 68.5 - year life expectancy for the American male ranks him 37th among his counterparts in other civilized nations of the world. It's interesting to note, also, that eighteen years ago he was in 11th place.

According to Dr. Mayer, Norway, Israel, and New Zealand males can expect to live to 75 years, while Russia and her European satellites show a higher life expectancy for men than the U.S.

He added that except for our Lazy Habits there is no reason that we should not have the same life expectancy as that of European countries.

From all of this it does appear that our "affluent," society is far from being the most healthful.

Eating between meals is a well-established habit in these United States, especially among children and teen-agers. Do the snacks you serve supplement the days diet or just add extra calories?

It is estimated that 10 to 15 per cent of a person's daily calories is applied by snacks.

Good snacks add essential nutrients to the diet in addition to the calories they supply. What is a sensible snack? Foods like celery, carrots, and other raw vegetables, nuts, peanut butter, cheese, apples, oranges, and other raw fruits and milk are sensible foods for snacks, because they are "chuck" full of essential nutrients.

The following recipe are nutritious sensible snacks.

**Choco-Mint Shake**  
Put 2 tablespoons chocolate syrup, 1 cup milk and 1 large serving of peppermint ice cream in a mixer and shake well. Makes 1 serving and good too.

**Uncooked Peanut Butter Fudge**  
1 cup peanut butter  
1 cup corn syrup  
1-1/4 cups sifted powdered sugar  
1-1/4 cups dry milk.

Mix peanut butter and syrup in mixing bowl. Add dry milk and powdered sugar all at once. Mix together, first, with a mixing spoon and then with hands. Knead until all ingredients are mixed in. Turn onto a board and continue kneading until smooth. Form into a roll and slice or press out by hands or rolling pin onto a block 1/2 inch thick. Cut in squares. (Make about 2 pounds) Happy eating!

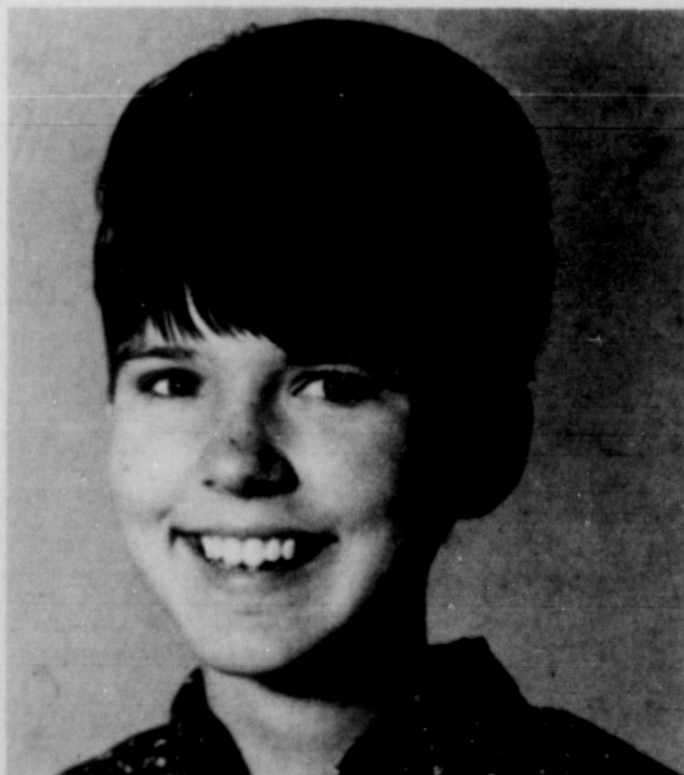

**Waterways Built As  
Erosion Deterrent**

Several farmers in Parmer County have recently constructed waterways on their farms to stop erosion and control runoff water. Some of these that have recently completed their waterways included Joe Jones, and John Aldridge of Farwell, Dean McCallum of Bovina, V. M. Ferguson and O.T. Patterson of Friona.

During heavy rains, more water falls on nearly all cropland than can be held by the best crop rotations, strip cropping, or even terraces. This water will run off through some kind of waterway. Unless a safe waterway is provided, it will probably cut a gully. Usually it is easier and cheaper to use a natural depression for a grassed waterway to carry the water away safely. However, in Parmer County this is impossible because of irrigation. The waterway is usually built along the side of the field that has the drainage problem.

Any grassed waterway that is to carry extra water safely must be designed to take care of large rains. Its grass cover must be dense enough to keep water from running on bare slopes, and it must be kept in good condition year after year.

If properly built and maintained, a waterway will pay its own way in added income. Many are handled as a pasture and grazed by livestock. Some are bailed for hay. All of the waterways can be pastured at certain times of the year. Pasturing, if properly managed has the added advantage of improving the sod.

After the waterway has been shaped, preparing a good seedbed is the key to getting a good stand of grass in the waterway. Young plants must have a firm soil for their roots if they are to live through periods of unfavorable growing conditions. When the grass becomes well established, it should be fertilized often with a nitrogen fertilizer. If the sod becomes damaged, it should be repaired as soon as possible. It will be easy when the damage is small, but each rain increases the damage and the cost of putting it back.

Assistance on construction and seeding of waterways is available from the Great Plains Conservation Program or the Agriculture Conservation Program. Anyone desiring additional information on waterway construction or seeding is invited to come by the Soil Conservation Service Office in Friona.

**CREATE 'WORD ENVIRONMENT' FOR YOUNGSTERS**

Don't baby talk your children—it hinders rather than helps them learn says Dr. James I. Brown of the University of Minnesota.

A noted reading authority, Dr. Brown is the author of a new Visual Linguistic Reading Program published by 3M Company which incorporates sight, sound and touch to teach better reading and learning habits.

"The home is an important education center," says Dr. Brown, "and parents can do much to help their children learn by creating a 'word environment' in which both depth and scope of words are plentiful."

"A key is to keep conversation on a natural adult level to stimulate children to reach out for new word meanings. And, they must present reading as a reward rather than a rigor."

According to Dr. Brown, parents can also turn television or radio into a learning situation by viewing with the children and explaining words and verbalizing their meaning.

In encouraging, he advises parents to direct children to reading that is interesting to them. Reading to them aloud is also an important learning technique.

"The surest method of increasing their reading and learning power is to create a continuous parent-child communication, exposing as many words as possible and encouraging further word exploration through reading."

Next to water, soil fertility is the major limiting factor in production throughout this area. For efficient production, soil fertility, particularly under intensive cropping systems, requires periodic evaluation and correction. To insure continued progress, soil fertility research is being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the fertilizer industry, and area farmers.

**FERTILIZER-RATE STUDIES**

One of these studies is being conducted on Donald Christian's farm located 3 miles east of Lariat. The soil type at this location is Amarillo fine sandy loam. Wheat had been planted without fertilizer, grazed, and plowed under for the 3 years prior to the establishment of this study. It did, however, receive some supplemental irrigation in past years. The variety Concho was planted at a rate of 60 pounds per acre on October 28, 1966 and harvested on June 9, 1967. The field received one postplant and two spring irrigations.

Increasing the P205 Rate from 0 to 40 pounds per acre increased yields an average of 4.2 bu./acre for all rates of N and K2O. Increasing P205 application rates from 40 to 80 lbs./acre produced a smaller

response than did the first 40 lbs. increment.

No response to either potassium or iron was observed. The low yields and small response to fertilizer treatments in 1967 reflect the freeze damage encountered in late April and early May.

Keep in mind that this is only the first year's result and that this test will be conducted for 5 years.

Other tests were conducted on Pullman soils in the Panhandle area by the Bushland Experiment Station.

The results from the 1967 tests on Pullman soils indicate that responses to applied nutrients are difficult to find. Small but consistent response to nitrogen was observed. Very little fertilizer response was observed except at the lower

rates of nitrogen application. Forty pounds of nitrogen per acre appeared to be adequate under the prevailing conditions.

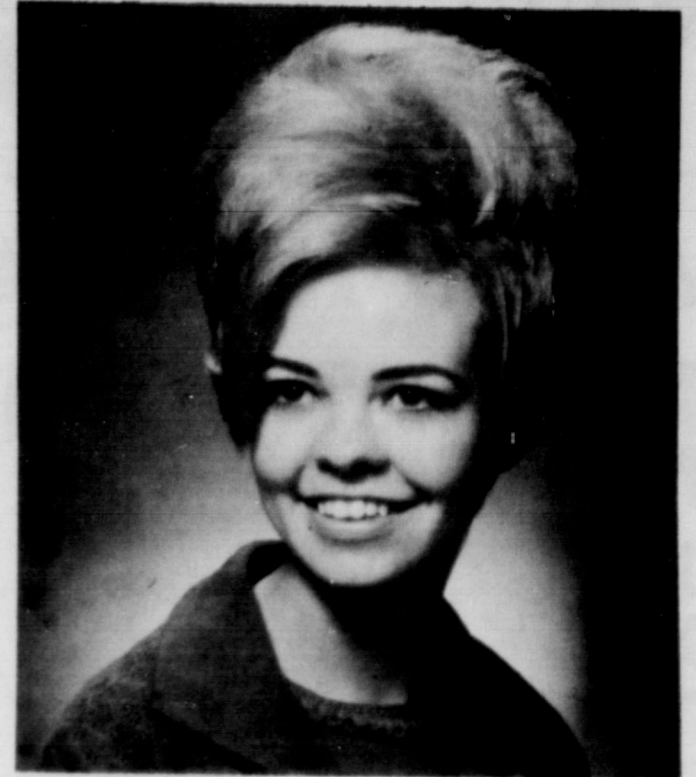
Banding applications did not produce a consistent increase in yield over broadcasting. There were not significant responses to split applications of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, or iron. Normally one application of nitrogen can be made on heavy soils, such as Pullman, without excessive leaching losses.

Results from the 1967 test indicates that band applications appeared to be superior to broadcast applications and this advantage increased with increasing rates of phosphorus. Split application of nitrogen produced an average of 4.3 bu./acre more than the single preplant application. This is a typical response on furrow-irrigated sandy soils.

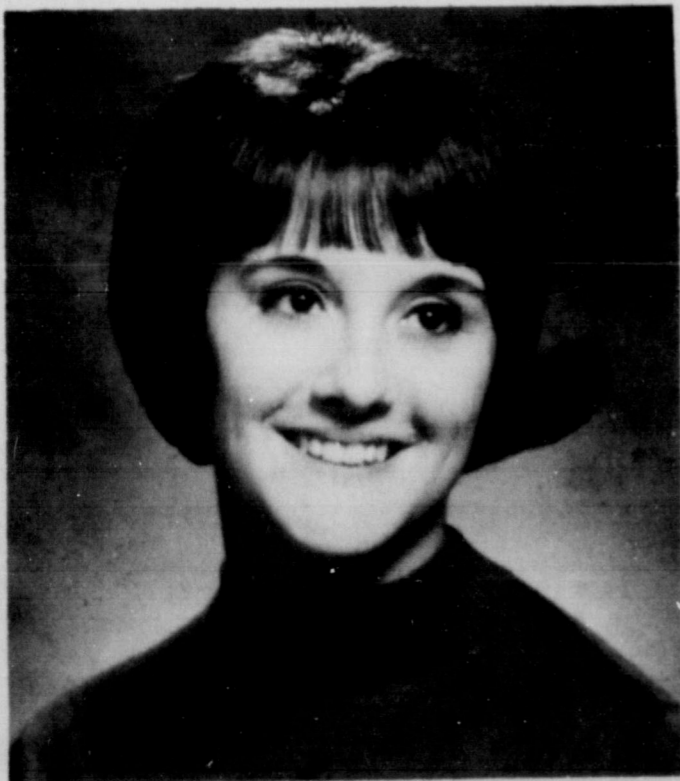

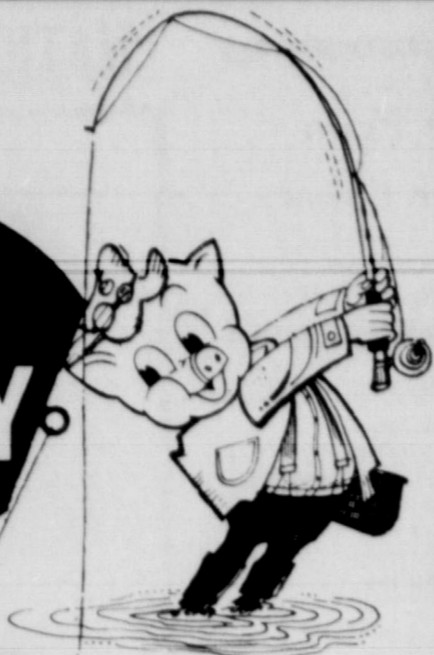
