Pierce Is Re-elected By Slim 37 Vote Margin

Cochran county voters showed an amazing faculty for backing winners in the election last Saturday as they turned out 1614 strong to back every state office winner and elect a new judge, a new sheriff, and two new Precinct Commissioners in county races.

The County races proved as close and as hotly contested as any in many years as W. M. Harryman outpolled Herman Crockett to gain the office of Sheriff-Tax Assessor Collector. Crockett is finishing up his first term in the office. Fred Stockdale became the winner in the County Judge race by a healthy margin but his opponent J. A. Love came considerably closer than any of Stockdale's opponents

had come in the First Primary held last month.

A plan for filming all games is under advisement.


Two films made last year were shown by Carl England. One was
