


Clayton Asks

End To DST

Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake asked Governor John Connally in a letter this week to include a Bill to exempt Texas from Daylight-Savings Time in the upcoming special session of the legislature.

Clayton stated that the people of Texas having tried d.s.t. for one year disapprove of the advanced time. A Belton poll shows a general disapproval all across the State and several polls taken in this Area indicates a great majority of the people here do not like Daylight Saving Time.

Rep. Clayton stated that after a fair trail of D.S.T. and after having an expression from the people in the District by polls and by personal contact that he would support any action to exempt Texas from the Time Change.
