For instance, the chart will show that polio is caused by one of the smallest viruses yet discovered a virus similar to the virus of foot and mouth disease and yellow fever.

The chart shows that the occurance of polio is sporadic through the year reaching a peak in July, August and September, Hence, the trend of having so many cases here in the past 50 days is not so unusual.



Science Conquers New Sheep Disease

problem in this country, has caused serious losses in many sections of

The disastrous losses caused by bluetongue infection, a relatively new disease of sheep, can be prevented. This was indicated by Cutter Laboratories' announcement that a vaccine for the prevention of blue-tongue, known as Blucine, is in production at their Berkeley, Cali-fornia plant.

fornia plant.

Bluetongue in the United States was first recognized in California in 1952 when an estimated 325,000 sheep were infected with bluetongue disease. Since the disease has been identified, there is good indication that it has also been a problem in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Nevada. The disease is transmitted by gnats and

possibly by other biting insects,
Although there is no known treatment or cure for the disease,

vaccination has proved a practical and effective method of preventing bluetongue infection. Production of Blucine provides the sheep in-dustry with an important means of preventing the serious losses this
