

your senator reports . . .

LOST TIME:—The schedule of the Senate was thrown off balance by the prolonged discussion of the Revised Atomic Energy bill. As I write this, it is not clear just when adjournment of this session of Congress will come.

I wholeheartedly approve of the principle of full discussion of any proposed legislation. I have been disturbed by the fact that the extended debate on the Atomic En-

ergy bill accomplished by day and night session of the Senate, delayed our taking up measures of great importance . . . such as farm legislation, social security, foreign aid and others.

It is to be hoped that a final rush for adjournment will not result in these serious questions not being given adequate consideration.

SMALLER DEFICIT:—The Federal Government operated at a deficit during the 1954 fiscal year. But, the deficit was smaller than it has been in recent years. Expenditures outran receipts during the 12 months by \$3,029,000,000. The deficit for the preceding year amounted to \$9,900,000,000.

Actual expenditures were cut \$6 1-2 billion under the level of the 1953 fiscal year. Tax cuts approved during the present session of Congress are estimated to total approximately \$7,500,000,000.

DEFENSE EXPENDITURES:—Proper economy in the conduct of the government is greatly to be desired, of course. But some observers feel that the Administration has cut too deeply into expenditures for defense.

Outlays for national security

programs mounted to \$46,200,000,000 last year. That was a reduction of two and one-half billion dollars.

According to a statement from the White House, this cut reflects greater economies in operations, reduction of military plans, reduced stock levels, less Atomic Energy Commission spending, and delay in the delivery of materials for stockpiling.

Only history can show whether the reduced military expenditures in this period of continuous world turmoil were justified. Certainly it is of the greatest importance that we remain strong in the military and economic strength of the United States lies the only hope of maintaining freedom in the world.

WE MUST BE READY:—A horrifying example of the perils we face in these times was given by the shooting down of an American airplane by the Chinese communists. The airplane was a Pacific Airliner shot down by the communists.

We seem continually poised on the brink of disaster. When the first announcement came of the attack on our aircraft, I made a brief statement in the Senate pointing out that this is a time above all times for Americans to unite.

"The Chinese communists are shooting at our men," I pointed out. "There can be no partisanship or divided loyalties on such an issue." "We must await the facts to determine the next step. But meanwhile, we must also resolve to be cool, calm and ready to act as Americans must always act in the face of danger."

I feel confident that those are the sentiments of the people of Texas.

TEXAS DROUGHT:—Reports of drought conditions in many Texas counties continue to be disturbing. We were able to get the President to declare 23 counties as a drought disaster area, making them eligible for some assistance in the matter of feed for cattle.

But the program at present authorized is inadequate to meet the serious situation that exists. Texas' able Agriculture Commissioner, John C. White, is giving his best efforts to this whole matter. I certainly shall be of any

AUSTIN REPORTS

AUSTIN, Tex.—State candidates in the runoff races are now on the firing line, blasting away.

In the gubernatorial race, Governor Allan Shivers and Judge Ralph Yarborough have reformed their lines and are in a showdown battle for the state's top job.

Both candidates for governor had reasons for failing to score a victory in the first primary.

Shivers said that his supporters were too confident and had not turned out at the polls in the expected numbers. He encouraged them to exercise their right to vote in the coming election.

Yarborough said that he would have won the first primary except for Texas Republicans who neglected their own primary to vote against him.

Three Factors Decide

Capable of determining the August election were 400,000 Texans, eligible to vote, who stayed away from the polls July 24.

A small factor was the 36,000 who cast their votes for Davis and Holmes.

Also to be considered were the Republicans who voted in their own party primaries in July, but who are free to cast their ballots in the Democratic second primary. Most of these votes, it was generally believed, were for Shivers.

Scott in Court Runoff

Austin Attorney Alfred Scott will be in the runoff with Judge Few Brewster for Place 1 on the Supreme Court.

This race will gain more than a little attention, as will the campaign of Judges Alan Haley and Lloyd Davidson for the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Fires Hit Area

Hardly had the embers of the political fires cooled when forest fires broke out both east and west of Austin.

Thousands of acres of woodlands and three homes, now lie scorched, burned and bared as the result of fires around Volente (Dodd City) on Lake Travis west of Austin.

On the opposite side of the capitol city, the eastern portion of Bastrop State Park lost 7,000 acres of pine and live oak as the result of an eight-day brush and timber fire—quenched finally by sudden showers.

Drought Aid Arrives

Just as the hot sun has made easily flammable the forests in the area, so has the temperature and lack of rain taken its toll of the ranchlands.

Governor Shivers and Agricultural Commissioner John White have combined their efforts to obtain drought relief in the form of a federal and state-backed hay program.

Ranchers in 23 Central and West Texas counties will be eligible. Allocations for the aid, amounting to \$600,000, were provided largely by the federal government with a \$500,000 helping hand. The state will counter with the balance.

Titled "Operation Haylift" the program is the third since 1952 for state ranchers who now are weathering the worst drought in their history. The program will be almost identical to the other two and will allow ranchers to benefit from reduced transportation charges on hay.

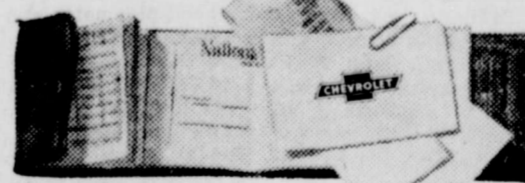

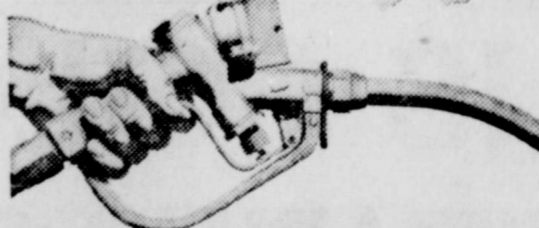

RELIGIOUS GAMBLERS

Yes, as strange as it may seem we have many teachers of religion who gamble with the most valuable possession in all the world. (Mat. 12:21) Honesty and sincerity does not alter the situation. It does not matter how certain the grocer may be with reference to selling a pound of merchandise by guess, you still insist on his weighing everything. You insist on getting sixteen ounces for a pound, twelve inches for a foot and three feet for a yard, but if a man is an honest guesser in religion and thinks he is right, that makes it right for him. (He thinks.) He wants his sugar, bacon and beans measured on tested scales, and his gasoline from pumps approved by the government standards, but the measure of his religion is the deceitfulness and fickleness of the human heart.

He who is weighed in the balance of the New Testament teaching and found wanting is wrong. He who meets the New Testament demands in his religion is right.

When a modern religious guesser assures you that it is right to have multiplicity of churches, although the Bible says there is "but one body" (1 Cor. 12:20) and "the body is the church" (Col. 1:18), you can mark him down as a gambler of the most vicious type, willing to bet your soul and his that he is right and the Bible is wrong.

When he sees that you can be saved outside the church, when he cannot find one single person in the Bible who was saved outside the church, after Pentecost (Acts 2), and when he cannot cite one passage of scripture that says you can be saved outside, he is a gambler with souls. He denies that "the Lord added to the church daily (day by day) those that were saved." (Acts 2:47) Notice they did not "join" the church, but by the same process and at the very same time their sins were forgiven they became members of the church. The Lord forgave their sins upon their obedience and the Lord added them to the church.

Science Conquers New Sheep Disease



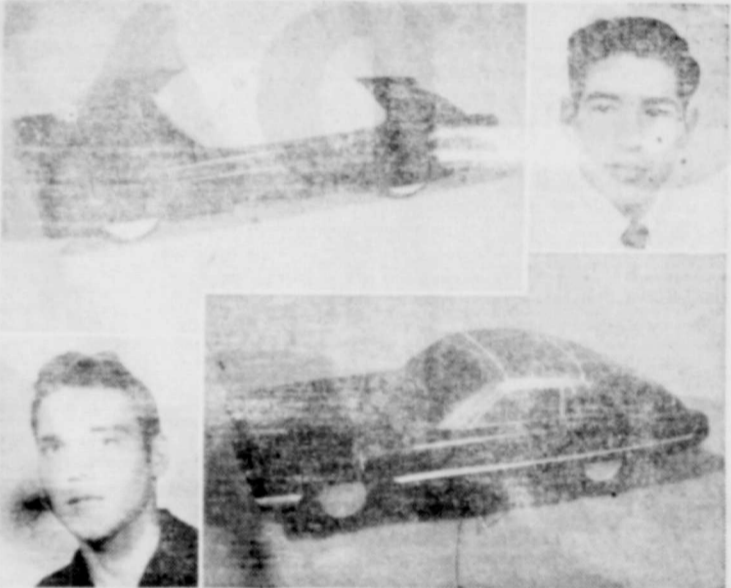
Dr. N. H. Casselberry, veterinary medical director of Cutter Laboratories, injects a number of sheep with Blucine, the new vaccine for the prevention of bluetongue, a new sheep disease problem in this country, has caused serious losses in many sections of the west.

The disastrous losses caused by bluetongue infection, a relatively new disease of sheep, can be prevented. This was indicated by Cutter Laboratories' announcement that a vaccine for the prevention of bluetongue, known as Blucine, is in production at their Berkeley, California plant.

Bluetongue in the United States was first recognized in California in 1952 when an estimated 325,000 sheep were infected with bluetongue disease. Since the disease has been identified, there is good indication that it has also been a problem in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Nevada. The disease is transmitted by gnats and possibly by other biting insects.

Although there is no known treatment or cure for the disease, vaccination has proved a practical and effective method of preventing bluetongue infection. Production of Blucine provides the sheep industry with an important means of preventing the serious losses this disease may cause.

Texas Boy Designers Win

Vendor Is Newest Way To Sell Milk

The newest device for convenient, economical sale of milk to the consumer is the big outdoor automatic vending machine, now appearing in various parts of the country, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These automata may hold as much as 200 quarts of milk, refrigerated to 38 degrees F. or lower. They dispense fresh cold milk in quart or half-gallon cartons seven days a week, and 24 hours a day. The shopper simply drives up, puts money in according to the number of quarts wanted and automatically gets her

purchase with no waiting. Some machines even make change.

Try-outs of these outdoor vendors were made by one dairy cooperative in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area during 1952 and 1953. With 19 in operation in late 1953, the tests showed an average sale per machine of 140 half-gallon containers of milk per day.

Since then, these big vendors have been installed in many states. When conveniently located so that enough people can reach them easily, their records show increased milk sales. In Minnesota they generally were placed near gasoline stations where it was easy to drive up and stop, and where the machines had good lighting by night. Delivery and operating expenses were low enough so that milk could be offered at two cents a quart less than in stores.

It costs money. The National Foundation is asking for money right now so that they can continue with their research and still provide all the gamma globulin needed. Your donations are urgently needed.

Another will be, why don't more older people get polio. The answer, many of them, perhaps even most of them have already had polio when they were younger, and threw it off in the early stages as 50 to 80 percent of the people who contact it are now doing.

It's just another problem we must face, like many others, with wide open eyes if we are to combat it the most effective way.

Don't get panicky, Please. Just make sure you bring your child in for a checkup if several of these symptoms begin to show up.
