Mrs. Roy Young Dies Suddenly AT Bula, Friday

BULA (Sp.)—Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church at Bula Saturday for Gladys Wales Young, 45, who died suddenly of a heart attack Friday morning.

The young Bula woman was enroute to the hospital when she died at 10 a.m. She was the wife of Roy Young, Bula farmer and the couple, together with their daughter, Carolyn, 15, had made their home in the Bula community for the past 14 years.

Rev. Geo. W. Bryant of Lubbock officiated at the services after which burial in the Littlefield Memorial Park followed under the direction of Hammons Funeral Home.

Mrs. Young, born Nov. 17, 1908 at Florence, moved to Littlefield with her family in 1926 from Georgetown. She was a resident of Littlefield for several years and taught in the Littlefield school system.

She married Roy Young, August 14, 1934 and the couple was about to celebrate their 20th wedding anniversary. In addition to her household duties, Mrs. Young found time to be active in the Bula P-TA and the Methodist Church.

Survivors, in addition to the husband and daughter include five sisters.

COUNTY WILL NOT LOSE ACREAGE IN FUTURE COTTON ALLOTMENTS

Cochran County farmers who go ahead and plant their cotton this season, regardless of whether or not they harvest a crop will not suffer a loss of acreage due to a poor history, in future allotment plans.

At least that's the opinion of F. Marlin Rhodes, national Department of Agriculture representative, in a reply received this week by County Agent Homer Thompson.

Thompson, worried about the drought condition which will prevent many county farmers from harvesting their allotted quota of cotton, had sent an inquiry to the Department of Agriculture.

Here is the text of the letter received by Thompson:

Dear Mr. Thompson:

This acknowledges your letter of June 30, 1954, to the Secretary of Agriculture, enclosing a statement signed by members of the Cochran County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee concerning the redistribution of unused cotton allotments in Cochran county to place overplanted farms in compliance.

If farmers in Cochran county have planted most of the county allotment to cotton as declared in the county ASC Committee's statement the county will not suffer any loss in cotton in establishing future county and State acreage allotments. Under the marketing quota regulations for 1954 the acreage planted to cotton on a farm includes all acreage of land seeded to cotton within the farm acreage allotment. Therefore, all acreage of cotton seeded within the farm allotments in Cochran county regardless of whether har-

vested or abandoned because of drought or other natural causes will be counted as cotton acreage in establishing farm, county, and State allotments when 1954 becomes a part of the base period.

The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, sets forth the procedures for establishing State, county and farm acreage allotments and prescribes that marketing quota penalties shall apply to farms on which excess cotton was produced on acres planted in excess of the farm acreage allotment.

One provision of the Act provides for reapportionment of allotments which farm operators declare will not be planted and which were voluntarily released by them. The Act specifically provides that such released acres may be reapportioned to other farms on the basis of past acreages of cotton, land, labor, equipment available for the production of cotton and other physical factors and soil and other physical

facilities affecting the production of cotton. There is no provision in the law of regulations for effecting by offsetting such excess acreage with allotments planted to cotton but from which cotton is not being harvested in the county.

Cotton acreage allotments are established for farms wherever possible prior to the marketing quota referendum for the applicable crop. In all instances it is an established policy of long standing of the Department to make known to the farm operator prior to planting his allotted acreage for cotton in order that he may know his rights and responsibilities with reference to such allotment.

If a policy were adopted of shifting unplanted allotments to overplanted farms (determined by measurements of crop after seeding) great confusion would inevitably result among all cotton farm operators. I believe you can see that few would be able to plant with any degree of certainty of compliance or non-compliance.

Also succeeding years would doubtless find many overplanting in anticipation of picking up "unused allotment" which might or might not materialize and thus cause great amounts of overplanting and collections of marketing quota penalties or large expenses to farmers of producing acreage which would have to be destroyed to get their farms into compliance.

The usual method of destroying excess cotton acreage by producers has been by plowing down the excess acreage in a manner acceptable to the county ASC Committee as precluding any cotton maturing for harvest. However, other means will preclude cotton maturing and being harvested may be accepted by the county committee where determined desirable to avoid erosion problems.

City Commission Drops Tax Rate By Ten Cents

The City Commission announced this week, after a meeting Monday that the 1954 tax rate has been set at \$1.20 per \$100 valuation, a drop of 10 cents per \$100 valuation over the rate last year.

The valuation rate, set in the form of a resolution, was the most important piece of business attended to at recent commission sessions.

A resolution purchasing a "wet spray" was also passed and City Clerk Joe Gipson said this acquisition would greatly aid the fly control program. The Commission expressed the hope that citizens would help maintain basic sanitation, the key to a successful fly control program.

It was announced that the construction of a high pressure gas line to the west sector of town is almost complete, a move that will furnish distribution lines with another drop, helping to equalize the pressures in all parts of town and giving a more constant supply of gas to the smaller mains.

One short extension of the sewer line has also been completed and progress on another has been delayed by the shortage of tile but is expected to be installed soon.

Mayor Max Bowers said this week that the recent resetting of the City water well has developed more water and it seems quite likely that no additional water facilities will be needed in the near future.

Yes, the weather has been hot here, I understand, but two weeks at West Hood, Texas would make the South Plains area seem like Alaska. There were no official thermometers there, but the mercury broke all the cheap ones around Ft. Hood, I believe. Anyway, I'm glad to be back on the South Plains of Texas.

GRAIN STORAGE

More grain storage needed in Cochran County, if we get the rain we are looking for. The question you should ask yourself is "Will I have sufficient storage place for my crop?"

If not, you need to build some kind of farm structure to put your grain sorghum in. The grain storage program has been successful to date in most respects. One distributor of building indicates he has sold 1,200,000 bushels of storage space for South Texas. At the present, the difference in market price of grain sorghum and the support price in the Corpus Christi Area (\$1.12)—the farmer could pay for his storage in one year. That is a lot to pay, when you may not be able to get the loan price for lack of storage space.

NATIONAL FARM AND HOME SAFETY

National farm and home safety week has just come to pass July 25-31. Thoughts are keeping down accidents by remembering:

1. Farm accidents are not choosy—it could happen to you.
2. Faulty equipment or hidden obstructions can cause accidents, but correct these, you can.

3. Just ask yourself one question and you can save a lot of trouble—It is, "Can I possibly get hurt doing the job this way?"

4. Tractors fascinate children, but the operator can refuse a ride. Sure it is fun, children love it, but the next ride may cause a life time regret.

SMITH DOXEY COTTON CLASSIFICATION

Cochran County has already applied for the free Smith-Doxey Cotton Classing Service. Let's take care of our cotton at harvest time—to get the best grade, even though the classer did a bum job. We'll need some thought on handling cotton at harvest time so we can blame it all on the classer.

The ASC Committees of the county will be elected during the month of August. All committees will take office Sept. 1, 1954.

Each county will have a county election board. The county election board will be composed of the following members: The county agent is chairman, and the heads of these organizations on county level make up the members: FHA representative, SCS representative, the president of local Farm Bureau. If other Farm organizations existed the heads of each would be on the Board.

The County ASC Committee met Friday, Aug. 6th and set the election date as Aug. 23, 1954. All voting will be done by written ballot. The county ASC office manager will mail out the ballots to all farmers in its respective community.

such communities. Here is briefly the way it shall be done according to recent regulations stipulated as follows:

The county election Board has appointed a nominating committee of 3 eligible farmers or ranchers from each community and one alternate. These committees nominate groups meet and list the names of 10 eligible farmers or ranchers to be placed on a ballot. These ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters in the respective community. The voters will vote on any five & return the ballot either in person or by mail. There will be provided space on ballot to write in any new names a voter might wish to elect. Any 10 voters can petition a name on a ballot if done 5 to 10 days prior to Aug. 23, the election day.

The nominating committee will re-convene after the 23rd of Aug. to count the ballots. The farmer receiving the highest number of votes will be the representative of the respective community on a county election board. The next highest the alternate delegate. The delegate from each community will convene within 5 days of the election and they will select or elect a county committee. The county committee will be composed of three members one of whom shall be elected as chairman, a vice-chairman and two alternate committeemen.

On Friday, Aug. 6 the county election board met and selected the nominating committee from each of the five communities. These nominating committees met on Monday, Aug. 9th, and selected the ten eligible farmers or ranchers of their respective community to go on the ballot. In the next few days all ballots will be mailed out to all farmers. Vote on any five or write-in any five and return the ballot as directed.

FARM BUREAU
The Farm Bureau directors and officers met in the county agent's office Thursday evening Aug. 5th. They are quite concerned with the new farm program which is to emerge from Congress within the next week or 10 days. We do not know what the next year's farm program will be yet, but from all indications it will be a good test for our program building in the county. Diverted

 CHINA AND THE UN:
 Senate spoke with one voice
 against the entrance of Red China
 into the United Nations.
 The vote unanimously to write
 the foreign aid bill the opposi-
 tion of Congress to the seating in
 United Nations of the Com-
 munist China regime as the repre-
 sentative of China.
 The amendment we adopted also
 asks President Eisenhower, in

the event of Red Chinese admis-
 sion to the United Nations, to in-
 form Congress "of the implications
 of this action upon the foreign
 policy of the United States . . . to-
 gether with any recommendations
 which he may have with respect to
 the matter."
 I know from the many letters I
 have received on the subject, that
 this will meet with the approval
 of the people of Texas.

 "CATCH-ALL MONEY BILL"

ONE of the final actions of the
 Senate Appropriations Committee
 during this session was to send to
 the floor of the Senate a \$2,015,771-
 000 supplemental appropriation
 bill. The bill is a sort of "catch-
 all" for funds which must be made
 available before Congress adjourns.
 The measure provides extra
 money requested by President El-
 senhower to carry out the pro-
 grams of scores of agencies in the
 current fiscal year. It was \$162,000-
 000 less than the total requested.
MILITARY CONSTRUCTION: The
 supplemental appropriations bill, as
 reported by the committee, includ-
 ed substantial sums for military
 construction. Among specific re-
 commendations were the following

The committee voted \$796,000,000
 in new funds for Air Force con-
 struction at home and abroad. It
 authorized a total of \$907,000,000.
 The difference between the two
 figures will come from money car-
 ried over from past years.
 For naval base construction, the
 committee approved \$114,000,000 in
 new funds and a total authoriza-
 tion of \$209,000,000. For Army con-
 struction, the sum of \$205,000,000
 in new money was approved. Also
 included was \$175,000,000 for 11,000
 military housing units.

IMPORTANT TO TEXAS: So far
 as Texas is concerned, the suppl-
 mental appropriations bill also was
 important for one item it did NOT
 contain. I refer to the request of
 the Federal Power Commission for
 a supplemental appropriation for
 \$300,000,000 to handle work expect-
 ed to arise if the Supreme Court
 decision in the Phillips Petroleum
 case stands. This is the natural
 gas decision of such great concern
 to Texas.

I expressed to Senator Bridges,
 Chairman of the Appropriations
 Committee, my vigorous opposition
 to the FPC request for the addi-
 tional \$300,000, making three
 points: (1) Texas has a motion be-
 fore the Supreme Court for recon-
 sideration of the decision; (2) I
 have requested the President to
 establish a commission to consider
 the matter and report back with
 legislative recommendations; (3)
 Action should not be taken until
 the FPC has consulted the gas in-
 dustry and determine the steps it
 will take once the issue has reach-
 ed a conclusion.

The gas industry is a Texas asset
 of tremendous value. The Supreme
 Court decision in the Phillips case
 has caused consternation through-
 out the industry. An appropriation
 at this time to enforce it would
 merely add to the confusion. Noth-
 ing will be lost by postponing a
 decision on the appropriation until
 the next session of Congress.

Naturally, I was happy that the
 Senate committee agreed with me
 and refuse the request of the FPC

for the supplemental appropriation. Armored Division will hold special
 maneuvers in Texas this fall. The
 ultimate aim is to develop an
 atomic army.
 The maneuvers will be conducted
 with a view of shaping practically
 the entire Army into a radically
 different structure. There will be
 smaller divisions but more of them,
 each independent of the other. A
 new mobility will be achieved
 through the use of helicopters and
 converti-planes. The converti-plane
 is a plane which rises like a heli-
 copter but flies close to the speed
 of ordinary aircraft.
 So Texas once again will be in
 the position of making extraordi-
 nary contributions to the national
 security.

A large number of proposed
 buildings in Texas are included
 among the Federal building pro-
 jects listed as eligible for construc-
 tion. I am hopeful that a fair share
 of them will be placed on the
 priority list.

Letter to the EDITOR . . .

I am writing you in regards to the cotton insect situation, which is very wide spread, however naturally, we are most vitally concerned with a situation of this nature in our immediate surroundings and locality. Since the weather has been extremely dry (about one and one half inches since the six in October) and in view of the fact that only a very small percentage is under irrigation in the Three Way School District, we only have a limited number of acres in cotton that is doing any good at this time. Cotton insects constitute a serious problem. I have been making checks on these insects on individual farms and on an individual basis, and have found there a few thrip, rather heavily infested with flea hoppers, a few forms falling off and punctured by boll worm and an occasional boll worm larva, a few lygus, and red spider in at least one field. The build up

of beneficial insects is very good at this time and will likely continue at least until poisoning is started.

Wednesday July 14 I assembled a few of the interested farmers (some fifteen) at one P. M. to go to some fields as a group. We met Mr. Bill Mobley, who is working for the department of entomology, who in turn went with the group to three representative fields known to be infested with harmful insects. The farmers could take a look in these fields hear what Mr. Mobley had to say about the situation then go to their own fields look for the insects and take what had been said at the meeting as a guide and come to some conclusion as to just what they might best do and at least keep a close check on their own fields.

We feel that this meeting was very beneficial to those of us in this locality and may it be a warning to others
