"Collector of U.S. Internal Revenue: I am not in dis country long, and does not have Forma 1040A or Forma 1040. I make interest 1959 for \$1.23. Enklosed by last pagee check. Please take what you wantee and send me the money back what is left."

"Dear Internal Revenue: I've always paid my income tax in the past because I was afraid of going to jail if I didn't. Now, I read in the papers and hear on the TV and radio that this is a matter of voluntary self-assessment. If it's voluntary, I don't want any part of it, so you can have your forms back,"



#### Murphree Adds 220 Record To List Of Achievements
