

Board Dismisses MaryKaye Everitt

A news release from the Social Security Administration told this week some facts concerning the first full year of Medicare in Texas.

According to the regional Assistant Social Security commissioner, over \$130,300,000 was paid out by the federal medicare program for the care of people age 65 and over in Texas during the year.

The Social Security official said that there are 895,500 people over 65 in the state who are eligible for hospital insurance under Medicare. This group produced 300,000 hospital admissions. (Some of these may be duplicates).

It was stated that there was an increase in hospital use by older people, but it was described as "within reasonable limits."

Overall, the program was credited with increasing the total hospital occupancy during Medicare's first year by around five per cent.





Jim Griffith, 711 Fifth Street, is noted for the large Russian Giant Sunflowers he grows each year. Griffith termed his flowers as "small" this year. He competes annually in a national contest against flowergrowers for the largest sunflower head, which turned out to be a 24-inch diameter giant from Oregon last summer. His largest flower has been 18 inches across. Griffith doubts that sunflowers ever become a commercial crop locally because of our high winds. Approximately a quart of seed is harvested from each flower each year. Griffith also grows castor beans corn and several varieties of flowers in his garden east of his house.
