Trailer, 2 Bales of Unginned Cotton Burned Thursday

An almost brand new cotton trailer, destroyed by fire of unknown origin, late Thursday evening as it was parked on the side of the road leading to the rodeo grounds.

The trailer, belonging to Curtis Wiloughby, local ginmer, was only five days old, Wiloughby said. It contained about two bales of freshly ginned cotton from the crop of J. W. McDermott. It was being used by a local Latin American.

The blaze was first detected by passers by at about 10:30 or a few minutes earlier. By the time the alarm had been turned in and the local volunteer firemen could get to the scene the trailer was well enveloped in flames.

Firemen emptied the contents of the small truck on the blaze but they could not get the other fire truck started. Thus bystanders and firemen were forced to stand by for 20 minutes or more while two shifts of firemen went back after the second truck. By the time it was started by re-charging the battery, the flames had burned the three remaining tires on the wagon. The flames were too heavy to allow the trailer to be towed over by hand. Wind-whipped flames kept firemen back from the trailer.

When the second truck arrived the few remaining firemen and bystanders fought down the flames, succeeded in boarding the trailer and shoveled all the burning cotton to the ground. The truck bed was badly damaged but at least the frame was saved.

It was the fourth consecutive, and sixth out of the last seven out-of-town fire fought by the local volunteer firemen.

Bond Sales Are Falling Behind

A representative of the United States government, Savings Bond Division, said Wednesday Cochran County has fallen far behind its goal for the year.

The county has a quota of \$100,000 for the year. With 10 months of that year gone only \$16,037 had been sold to individuals.

The figures were based on sale of bonds up to November 1st.

The spokesman said it was far under the record established two years ago when the local chairman received a special plaque as Cochran County led all the counties in its area, and was one of the top per capita purchasers of bonds.

The representative said he was in hopes that a large quantity of bonds would be purchased for Christmas presents and by farmers who have recently harvested their crops.

Reasons for the lag seem to be apparent, due to the prolonged drought that extended well into this year. Lots of folks who formerly purchased bonds were forced to sell them to keep going, and for a good many this is the first crop in three or four years.

The 16 percent is still not the lowest in Texas, he said. Several other counties have purchased as little as eight or nine percent of the year's quota. He also pointed out that the entire Lubbock and South Plains area is far behind, but the Amarillo area is purchasing up in the much higher percentage bracket.

Finals Saturday Include Six Games Trophies To Be Awarded At Night

The Whiteface and Bula Junior High girls teams battled their way into the finals of the Morton Invitational tourney Thursday and Friday night and Sundown's and host Morton's boys teams are paired in Saturday finals.

The journey was to wind up Saturday night, after six games played to determine eight winners, but, since the Dollar Day Special must be printed on Friday night, the scores were not available.

In winning their way to the final game, Whiteface girls got by a Spade team. Bula's fine girls set out by Morton 35 to 29. Thus Saturday in consolation finals, Sundown's girls meet Pep. In the fight for third place, Morton will face Spade. And in the championship ship finals Whiteface plays Bula. The loser will automatically get the 2nd place trophy.

In the boys bracket Sundown slipped by Whiteface for the right to play Morton who won a real 27-26 thriller of the tourney. Whiteface was to face Bula Saturday for 3rd place. In consolation games it was the Morton "B" team over Spade & Pep over 3-Way. Morton "B's" will face Pep in the Saturday finals for the consolation crown.

First Round results:
In the girls division Spade beat Sundown handily 29-11 and Whiteface trounced the Morton "B" unit, 42-7.

In the other girls bracket, Bula routed Three Way, 22-4 and the Morton A team beat PeP in the closest first round game, 34-24.

In boys games Sundown's boys slaughtered Spade 59 to 4. Whiteface hammered the Morton B team by a 32-3 count.

In the other bracket Bula edged 3-Way in a 16-14 battle and Morton beat PeP 30-19 in their first round battle.

X-RAY MACHINE TO BE HERE ON DEC. 9TH - 10TH

Next Friday and Saturday, one week from tomorrow, December 9th and 10th, the Mobile Chest X-ray unit will return to Morton, for the first time in two years, under the sponsorship of the Morton Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The portable machine will be set up in the Cochran County Activities Building all day. In addition to the travelling personnel with the machine, local club women will work with the unit in typing out the necessary cards.

Everyone in the county over 15 years of age is urged to have the x-ray, which is for the main purpose of detecting tuberculosis, but will also detect other types of lung or chest disorders, and could result in the saving of lives.

If TB is detected in its early stages, it can be cured.

All schools have been notified & are urged to have their upper high school students appear for the free X-ray.

Again it is emphasized that the X-ray takes only a few seconds, does not require any advance preparation on the part of the person being X-rayed, and involves no disturbing. All you have to do is step up to the machine and have the picture taken. Persons will be notified within a week or so of the results of their X-ray.

Special Display Of Books Set For Whiteface

In a letter sent out to all patrons of Whiteface Independent School District, Supt. Noah Cunningham has advised that a display of 500 new and recent library books covering some 21 major subjects will be on display at the Whiteface Elementary School auditorium, Dec. 1 through Dec. 11, an exhibit made possible through Books on Exhibit, a cooperative service of the country's leading publishers.

The purpose of the display is to provide schools and libraries with a complete representative collection of Junior Library books, so the teachers and librarians can see the books and get an idea of which of the volumes they really need for their shelves.

Actually the display is open to anyone from 8 until 5 on the days listed and should they desire some of the books they can get the titles, author and publishers names and order them from a book store or direct from the publishing house.

On Saturday and Sunday of the above dates, the display will be open from 2 until 5, and a special program has been planned for Sunday December 11.

Whatever your hobby or interest direct from the publishing house, collection that will interest everyone, Cunningham advised.

Cunningham said that library extension and improvement is a major goal of the Whiteface schools this year.



Young Southwestern Artist, J. Meigs Shows Paintings In One Week Show

Some 75 to 100 persons attended the guest tea last Sunday at the Cochran County Community building for John Meigs, popular young Southwestern artist.

The tea was sponsored by the 356 Study Club of Morton. The artist's appearance was also the kickoff of a one week showing of some 40 of his drawings and paintings in the Activities Building. The pictures were on display through Friday. Some several hundred students viewed the pictures at various times throughout the week as their classes visited the display. A good many others visited during the week, including some 210 FFA members and guests from all over the Levelland district who held their district banquet in the activities building dining room Monday night.

Special guests at Sunday's tea included Dr. E. N. Jones, Texas Tech president; F. O. Maaten on whose ranch Meigs is doing a mural, and an old man friend of Meigs from Dallas.

Meigs spent the week at the ranch of Meigs working on the mural which adorns one long wall. He had previously completed most of the sketches but had to replace a few. After final sketching he was to start the painting of the mural which will depict the history of what we now call the Last Frontier area. Many of Cochran County's old time residents are depicted in the mural. Among them are Charlie Henry Silvers, Jake Wylie, and even Dr. Jones.

Meigs feels he is at his best on this type of project — and so do many of his followers and friends of this area. One of his avowed goals is to preserve the Southwest for posterity.

In pursuing this goal, the ex-writer, who only a few years ago decided to start all over and follow as a profession painting, thinks the Cochran County and Eastern New Mexico lands are a tremendous place for painting. He also is fond of painting in the White Mountains of New Mexico and makes his home in San Antonio.

Meigs, an associate, and former student of Peter Hurd, who was commissioned to do the mural on the library walls at Texas Tech, has received numerous awards in his rapid ascent to the topmost rank of young painters in America. He has recently had numerous private showings all over the United

States and has received high acclaim.

He has pioneered the field of doing paintings for individuals of the middle class and selling them on an installment basis. He says his paintings bring from \$100 to \$150 and up, and theorizes that it is well within the range of middle class buyers who pay that much for chairs, tables, couches etc. for the living room. He wants painting to become more of an accessibility for people of all economic status rather than simply a pleasure hobby enjoyed only by the wealthy.

He has taught a course last summer at Texas Tech, and, if the college decides to offer the course again this next summer, he probably will again teach it. Several Morton women have announced plans to enroll.

Classified basically as a landscape painter, Meigs says he likes to portray scenes where nature's beauty is contrasted with man's constructions—just any man made objects. As most writers, painters, and artists of all kinds have pet projects and symbols, so Meigs is no exception. He says he can hardly do a picture of the southwest he is portraying without including a windmill, whether there is one on the scene or not. He even has gone so far as to cast the shadow of a windmill in a picture that had no windmill in the scene. Its obvious, though he did not say, the windmill to him is symbolic of the lifeblood of the southwest and the problem that is ever present, the need for water for survival.

At present Meigs has made plans to compete for one of the highest awards this country can make to a painter, the Guggenheim Fellowship which will not only bring a sizable cash bonus to a certain number of young artists, but also carry tuition and expenses for further study under some of the world's top masters, and at the top schools.

For the Fellowship competition he will undertake a four picture project depicting the stages of the growth of "his" southwest.

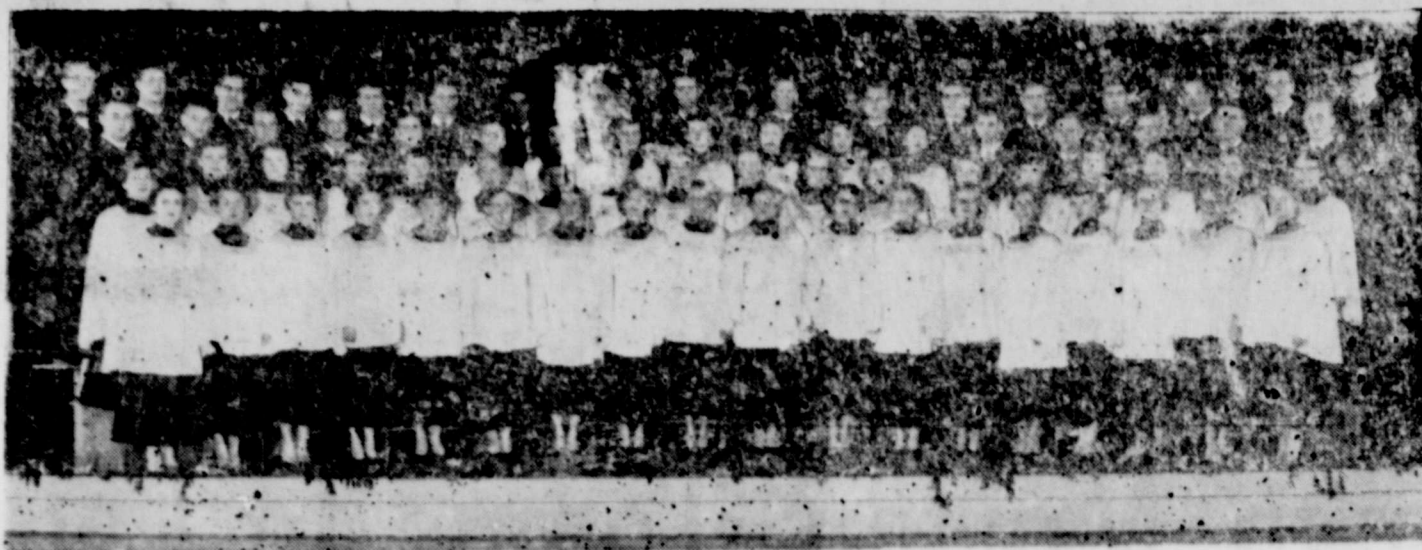

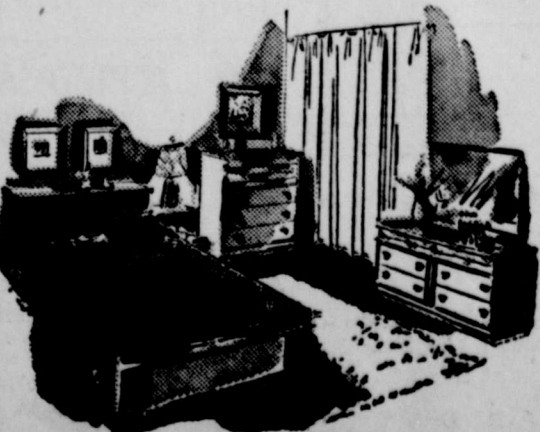

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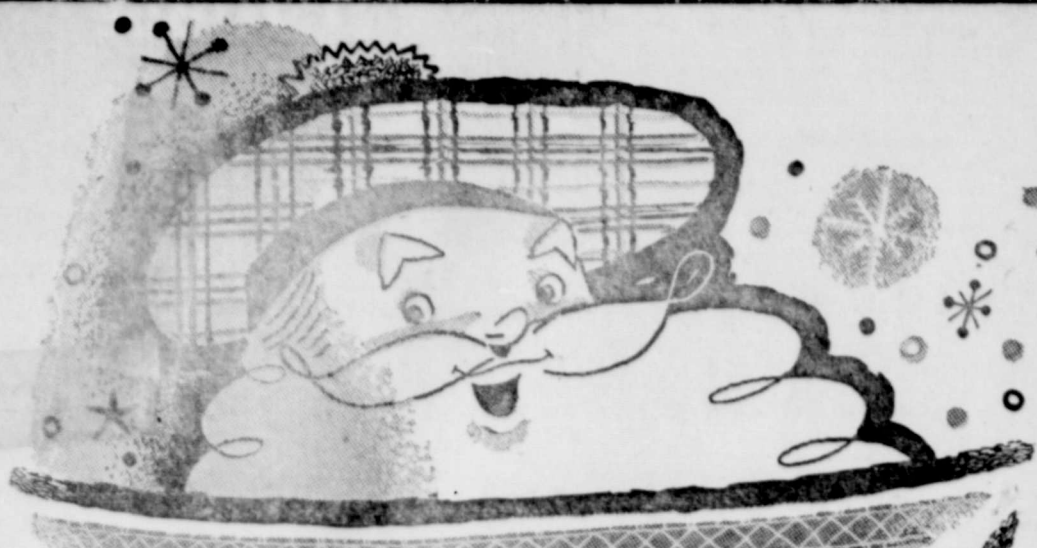
