



Members of the board of directors of Texas A&M University and university administrators were among members of a tour of feedlot installations in the Friona area last Thursday.

The group capped off its tour in the area with a visit to Missouri Beef Packers, which was in its first week of operation. Included in the group were Earl Rudder, president of Texas A&M, and Dean of Agriculture, H.O. Kunkel. The tour was hosted by the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, to show the rapidly developing cattle feeding industry in the area.

The group left Amarillo on Thursday morning and inspected cattle feeding operations near Amarillo, Hereford, Friona, Dimmitt and Tulla, besides the tour of Missouri Beef Packers.

The tour was planned to provide the Texas A&M officials with a first-hand view of the state's most dynamic agricultural industry. Cattle feeding in Texas has grown from 227,000 head fed in 1955 to 1,614,000 head fed in 1967. This volume is predicted to double by 1975.

This billion-dollar a year industry could be aided considerably by the research and extension activities being carried on by Texas A&M University. As the area develops into the beef producing center of the nation, research and extension work can play an increasingly important role.

The feeders association concluded the tour by hosting the visitors and other business leaders with a dinner Thursday evening in Amarillo.

As a result of the current upswing in the cattle-feeding industry, complimented by the advent of the packing industry, some changes are likely at Texas A&M, in the Extension Service, and at the experiment stations.

At least, this opinion was offered by Dr. H.O. Kunkel, dean of the school of agriculture at Texas A&M, who was one of a group of A&M representatives who toured the Friona area last week, seeing feeding installations as well as Missouri Beef Packers.

Dr. Kunkel stated that research and extension activities, carried on by Texas A&M, would need to dwell more with such problems as feedlot diseases, and the handling of waste material.

Of this latter problem, Dr. Kunkel pointed out that a steer produces some 16 times as much waste material as a human being -- so a feedlot with a capacity of 30,000 -- such as Friona Feed Yards, would produce as much waste material as a city with 480,000 population.

As both Friona Feed Yards and Hi-Plains Feed Yard reach this capacity, this would entail as much waste material, for example, as the Dallas - Fort Worth metropolitan area produces.

It has been pointed out that the state of Texas, as of March 1, ranks third nationally in the number of cattle on feed, having now passed up the state of California. Texas now has 30 per cent more cattle on feed than it had a year ago, and the High Plains Area has 17 per cent more.

Cattle-feeding in Texas has grown from a total of 227,000 head which were fed in the state in 1955, to 1,614,000 head fed in 1967. That total number fed in the entire state in 1955 could easily be fed in Parmer County alone this year.

An industry which has grown this dramatically in a short time could be aided by research through the A&M and Extension service. It has become a billion-dollar per year industry.

Many of the college and Extension Service officials were either seeing our area for the first time, or at least for the first time since cattle-feeding has grown to the proportions that it has.

We think they were impressed.

Currently, the Extension Service is conducting experiments in Swisher County as to the most economical method of feeding grain sorghum to cattle.

Methods being tested include steam flaking, moist grain (Continued On Page 10)

QUALITY PRAISED

Week's Production To Make MBP 1st In State

In only its second week of operation, Missouri Beef Packers' Friona Plant will slaughter more cattle this week than any other Texas meat packer. The plant plans to slaughter 3,500 head this week, after killing almost 2,000 in its first week of operation.

Gene Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, expressed his satisfaction at the first week of operation, and at the quality of meat which the plant was

turning out. "We are progressing much faster than we had hoped," Frye said.

The first load of beef was shipped to the King Meat Company in Los Angeles last week. Frye said a spokesman for the company called to compliment MBP on the quality of the meat, which he termed "much better than I expected."

Beef has already been shipped to both the West and East coasts, and the first shipment to the South was being planned. Frye said Monday that the Friona plant could be slaughtering 1,000 head of cattle by the end of the week -- getting the plant to one-half of its intended capacity in only two weeks. The plant killed 560 head on Monday, in only five hours.

The new plant had right at 200 people on its payroll as of Monday. At full production, 275 people will be employed. MBP's Rock Port plant op-

ened in February of 1966, and slaughtered 611 cattle its first week of operation, compared to the 2,000 killed locally last week. Friona's plant can kill 12,000 cattle per week on a single-shift basis.

Unskilled workers have been trained by the MBP supervisors.

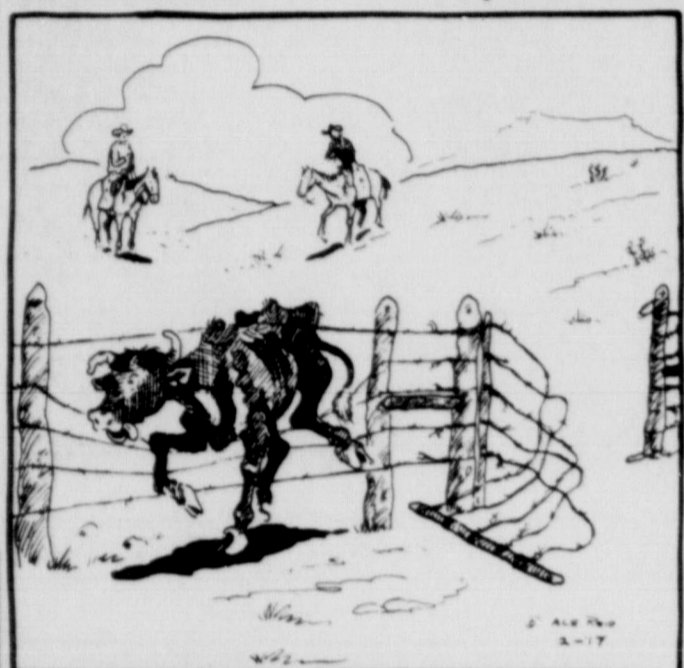

Pause And Reflect

Ninety one years ago, (May 15, 1877,) Mr. and Mrs. Charles Goodnight, together with Mr. and Mrs. John Adair, arrived at Palo Duro Canyon.

The trip from Colorado had not been particularly hazardous due to the Goodnight's expert ability as a guide and plainsman. Very carefully they worked their way down the thousand foot cliffs that formed a natural barrier against the Panhandle winds and also confined the cattle to the valley floor.

Of all the properties the venturesome Charlie Goodnight developed, the ranch in the Palo Duro was his favorite.

It was here that his knowledge of ranching and farming, coupled with the Adair money, produced a superior breed of cattle.

From the original spread near the head of the canyon the ranch grew into a veritable empire until at one time their JA herds grazed over a million acres.

The name Charlie Goodnight, is synonymous with the history of the Texas Panhandle. He chased the Indians, buffaloes and outlaws from the entire Palo Duro area and in their place established law and order.

With the help of friends and neighbors, he built a church and school.

His home became an oasis for weary travelers and Mrs. Goodnight acted as nurse, cook, and mother for lonesome young cowboys.

He was cast in a rugged mold, this Patriarch of the Plains. His tastes were simple, his wants few, and he learned very early in life that both could be best satisfied by hard work and honest dealings.

Now, almost a century after he began the buildup of the home ranch in Palo Duro, he has become a legend. His career was a part of what we refer to as our Western Tradition.

Speaking of traditions -- every State in the Union has it's favorites.

Virginia has the apple blossom festival in the Shenandoah Valley city of Winchester, and in the southeastern town of South Boston, it's the tobacco festival.

On the North Carolina Coast at Wilmington the Pirate Ship sails in under full canvas and the lusty buccaneers take over the town.

Despite Georgia's claim as the Peach State, Sparta in South Carolina grows more peaches than the whole state of Georgia, so it is only fitting that the Peach Festival is a big deal there.

We could go on and describe the colorful parades and beautiful girls, but let's stop here in the Texas Panhandle at the town of Canyon.

A fraternity at W.T.S.U. has for years celebrated "Old South Day" -- a group of young people, complete with confederate uniforms and flags, march to the president's lawn and present him with a declaration of the fraternity's secession from the University.

It's all in fun, none of this Columbia or Northwestern hippie type vandalism.

Even so this "Old South" bit rubbed some students the wrong way and of course they had to "protest"!

So here they are with signs declaring "Down with the Old South" and "The War is Over -- You Lost!"

The right to disagree should not be denied any citizen, that is as American as apple pie or the Fourth of July. But there is a right way -- even to disagree -- and rude behaviour and insulting placards have no place in the genteel atmosphere of one of our universities, most especially the one so near where Col. Charles Goodnight spent his best years in an effort to lift the West above the level of the barbarian.

It would have been of more than passing interest to see and hear what the good Col. Goodnight would have done and said to the "protestors."

He might have reminded them of some other rights they have -- the right to stay in New York or wherever they call home and attend a school where our Southern Traditions will not exist to offend their delicate feelings.

Ernest Thompson Seton said it very well -- "Manhood, not scholarship, is the first aim of education."

U.S. Doesn't Profit By Borrowing Worst

Why do we borrow the worst from countries instead of their best?

Parmer Citizens Urged To Oppose Petitions Calling Junior College Vote

Parmer County faces the immediate danger of being forced into an election to form a Junior College tax district composed of Deaf Smith, Oldham, Castro and Parmer Counties.

FACT: Under the new Texas Junior College law, any petition to call an election that is signed by as many as ten per cent of the registered voters of Parmer County would result in forcing Parmer County into a Junior College tax district election.

FACT: 100% Parmer voter opposition then could not exempt Parmer County from being brought into the proposed Junior College District, and taxed accordingly should other voting counties carry by an overall majority.

FACT: Taxes levied for such a Junior College would represent a form of double taxation, since each taxpayer is now paying his proportionate share of monies for higher education. This includes his share of revenues from the public domain. (ie) Texas lands, royalties from tideland and other oil, minerals etc.

FACT: Not less than seven excellent Universities, Colleges, and Junior Colleges now serve our Parmer County area, all within an hour and a half's driving distance, along with developing technical vocational training centers, plus several fine religiously-oriented schools within reasonable distances.

FACT: The above educational institutions are not operating at capacities, and students are not being refused admission due to any lack of basic facilities.

FACT: Bond issues in a Junior College District could be imposed over the negative vote of Parmer County voters as a whole.

FACT: If forced into a Junior College District, comparative county land values would cause Parmer residents to bear a disproportionate burden of taxes levied for its support.

FACT: Bovina and Farwell Chambers of Commerce have gone on record as being opposed to a petition for calling a Junior College election.

IN SUMMARY:
Parmer County citizens are much in favor of, and are not opposed to higher education, and those contributing to the making available for the consideration of all the above information feel that the levying of Junior College taxation could only result in unfair taxing for an unneeded institution and cause undue burden on local school systems. We note that some independent school districts of Parmer County have already found difficulty in passing certain school bond issues. We note further that, while it is assuredly an indication of proper educational progress, nevertheless, bonded indebtedness of most Parmer County school districts is at an all-time high, with some needs still to be met.

Based upon the above facts and information, we therefore respectfully urge that Parmer County voters not permit their name to be affixed to any petition calling for a vote that would lead to the placing of Parmer County in a Junior College district. We might add that many voters may not have had it called to their attention that this is not the first, but is the second attempt in as many years by a neighboring county to cause Parmer to get petitioned into group county Junior College voting.

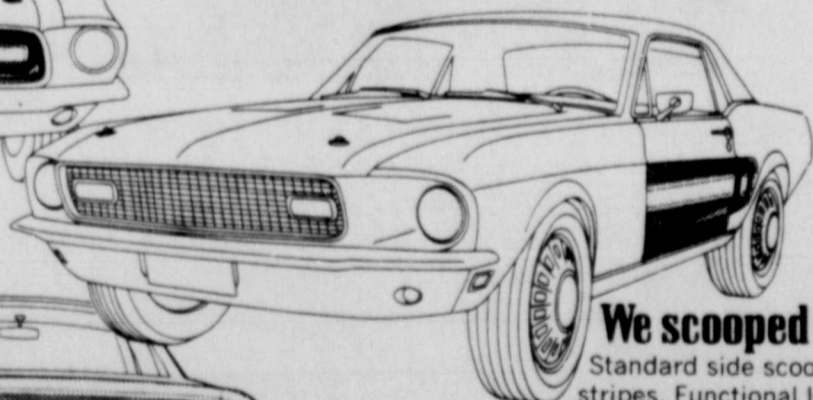

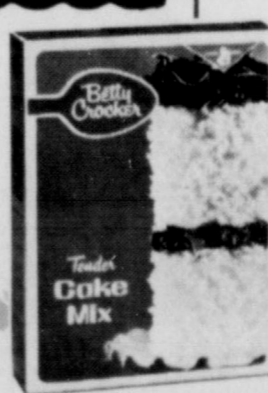

On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE MCNUTT

Listed below are crop demonstrations that will be conducted in 1968 by the county agent in cooperation with county farmers.

1. Corn Variety for Ensilage -- Edwin Lide, Bovina farmer, is conducting this test. Ten corn varieties will be tested for yields as well as feed value. Each variety will be tested by the feed analysis laboratory at Texas A&M University for its nutritive value.

2. Cotton Variety - personnel of the Lubbock Experiment Station recommended that 9 varieties be planted in Parmer County to observe their performance. Dean McCallum of Bovina has planted five of these varieties on his farm south of Bovina. The other four varieties have been planted on James Edelman farm at Friona.

3. Grain Sorghum Fertilizer -- this test is on the Pete Jesko farm at Lazbuddie. A soil test recommended a 120-50-0 fertilizer application. This piece of ground was double cropped in 1967 with hay-grazer and wheat. Various levels of nitrogen and phosphorus will be observed.

4. Date of planting Grain Sorghum - approximately 3 different planting dates will be on this test. Jerry Smith of Lazbuddie is the cooperator on this trial. The purpose of this demonstration is to determine effects on yields as well as check sorghum midge infestations at various planting dates.

5. Grain Sorghum Variety - there will be two of these conducted. Dwain Menefee and Raymond Euler, both of Friona, will be cooperating on these trials. Dwain has planted eleven varieties and Raymond has planted eight varieties.

6. Irrigation of Cotton & Grain Sorghum - C.W. Bowman of Bovina, is the cooperator on the cotton demonstration. In this test a comparison will be made of alternate row versus every row irrigation and proper timing of irrigation water according to stage of growth.

The grain sorghum irrigation test will be conducted on the Ronald Minyen farm in the

Rhea Community. In this test a comparison will be made of two irrigations with irrigations applied at various stages of growth.

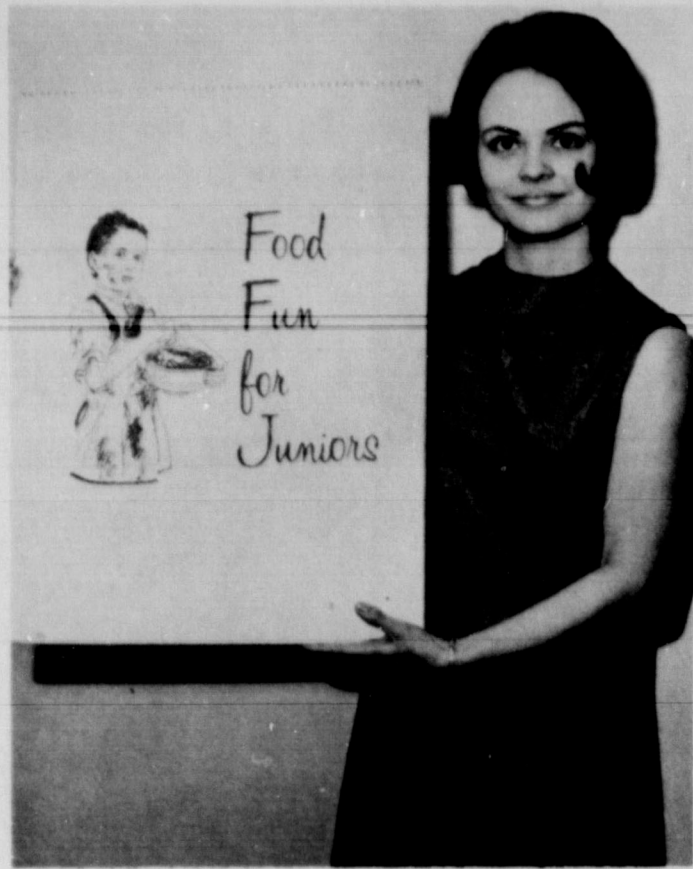
7. Soybean Variety - J.T. Ford of Farwell is the cooperator on this demonstration. Four different varieties - Wayne, Clark 63, Patterson and Hill - in the early maturing range group will be tested. 8. The Lubbock and Bushland Experiment Stations will continue the off-stations trials in 1968 in Parmer County on fertilizing grain sorghum and wheat and irrigation of grain sorghum.

Soil Stewardship Week, May 19-26

National Soil Stewardship Week will be observed May 19-26, according to Leon Grissom, chairman of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Soil Stewardship Week is a week set aside nationally each year to call attention to everyone's moral responsibility as a steward of the soil and other natural resources provided by God. Nationally, the week's observance is sponsored by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts with the guidance of an interdenominational Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee. In Texas, the observance is sponsored by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The theme of this year's observance is "A Time for Initiative," Grissom said. The theme is developed with the idea that "clearly this is the time for initiative action, innovation, trail runs, and exploration. It is a time for ideas, to assess problems and prospects, and a time to identify alternatives," Grissom said.

Classes will run for five days from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Afternoon classes will also be offered when enrollment exceeds thirty. These classes, where needed, will be from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m.

Girls completing the week-long course, will be honored at

a graduation party and presented with a diploma.

Miss Nancy Hicks of Canyon has been employed by the Co-op for the summer months to conduct the Food Fun Classes. Miss Hicks is a junior student in the Home Economics Department at Texas Technological College in Lubbock. She is majoring in Child Development.

A highly qualified person for the position, Miss Hicks has had college courses in Nutrition, Meal Management, Household Equipment, Child Psychology, Child Guidance, and Child Growth and Development. In addition to these accomplishments, she has taught in Sunday



At Home In Parmer County

The last meeting of a series of Clothing Workshop in Parmer County was held this week in Farwell. A total of 36 homemakers attended classes held in Bovina, Friona and Farwell and taught by the Extension Agent.

One group met at night for a period of 3 hours. Most all of these homemakers had experience in sewing but felt the need to improve and update methods of construction.

Clothing construction like everything else, has changed with the coming of new fabrics, new size patterns, all of which require new improved techniques. If a dressmaker has not added to her knowledge of sewing techniques in the last five years, then she is outdated and lack of good sewing techniques show in the finished product. Some of the more obvious signs

observed in outmoded techniques are -- riding out of underfacings, gathered or puckered set in sleeve applications, puckered seams, and poor fitting techniques.

4-H leaders met in Bovina and Lazbuddie for another part of the training on "Use of the Sewing Machine." Leaders will teach 4-H girls prior to their sewing project work. The training on the Sewing Machine for 4-H Leaders will be completed at a later date in the summer.

A FEW HINTS ON THIS AND THAT

The price of hosiery may indicate special quality in color, size and fit, but not in wear. Price of hosiery won't stop runs. A test panel found that three models of hosiery at varying prices fared about the same for wear. Hose costing \$1.50 a pair, 50 cents a pair and a mail-order brand priced at three pairs for \$1.32 plus postage were tested.

The average test life of the stockings was 115 hours or about 10 days. Some individual stockings tested ran as soon as they were put on, others were worn about 300 hours.

-- A good homemaker is curious, cooperative, capable, creative and conscientious. How do you rate?

-- If a sponge is one of your favorite helpers, here's a tip on keeping it clean and fresh for a long time. Occasionally boil it with a little soda and vinegar in water. Be sure to let it dry where there is good air circulation to guard against mustiness. -- Many good bulletins are available free at the Extension Office here in the Courthouse. Come by and look them over. One new one is "Child Guidance Techniques," for parents.



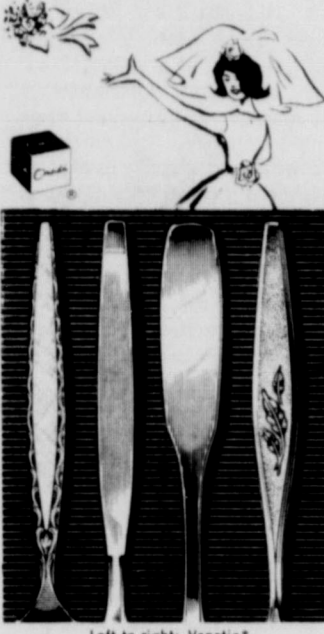

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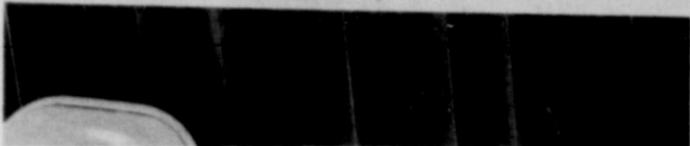

Auxiliary Has Played Vital Role In Growth Of Hospital

In these days of consternation over rising costs for medical and hospital services, the enormous contribution in both money and woman - hours of hospital auxiliary organizations becomes even more valuable.

We have such an organization in Friona and a very active one too. Back in August 1956 a group of Ladies met over the coffee cups to plan a help-our-hospital club under the direction of Mrs. Paul Spring whose idea this originally was. The club came to be known as, The Parmer County Community Hospital Auxiliary and aimed to help the hospital in any way possible. The first officers elected were President-Katy Osborn, Vice President-Deke Kendrick and Secretary-Treasurer-Eufaula Ethridge. These ladies have been among the staunchest hospital supporters ever since.

The first major task of the newly formed club was to have guided tours of the new hospital before the patients were transferred from the old barracks building and 470 people took the tours and were treated to refreshments. The big moving day was October 6th 1956 and the auxiliary members served breakfast to the patients and a total of 85 lunches to patients and workers that day. Shortly afterwards they were raising funds for landscaping the hospital grounds, providing a children's corner complete with tyke-sized furniture and toys and a series of magazine subscriptions to keep the waiting room supplied.

At present the auxiliary has 32 members and undertakes numerous projects for the comfort of the hospital patients and to help the staff.

Sewing Committee-works all the year round on mending and sewing new towels for surgery.

Decorating Committee-sees that the furnishings are kept in repair throughout the hospital and clinic. Chairs are re-covered, new curtains provided,

pictures hung, some painting done and recently a decorative screen was placed in the waiting room as a cover for the concession machines. Landscaping is often renewed and plants and magazines provided for the waiting rooms. Four fully automatic beds have been provided during the past year.

Children's Corner Committee-keep the area provided with toys and books to be used during the wait in hospital.

Hospitality Committee-provides tours of the hospital periodically and arranges for refreshments to be served. At Christmas time a decorated tree is placed in the waiting room and other decorations provided throughout the hospital.

Disaster Committee-Should a tornado or large scale wreck ever happen close to Friona, this committee has a program of work for various members which would be put into action.

Television Committee-sees that patients have a working TV set in their rooms for a

small charge.

Finance Committee - arranges for funds to be earned mainly by the annual rummage sale. Plans for the future include renovating the labor room and four rooms for O.B. Patients. As soon as repairs and decorations have been completed, new automatic beds will be provided as well as new lockers and bedtables. As soon as funds warrant it, the waiting room will be re-decorated and furnished.

Where does the money come from for all these projects? From you the people of Friona mainly. The principal money-maker is the ever-popular, annual rummage sale held each Fall. A local merchant will lend us empty building for several weeks and the auxiliary members ask for anything from a nickel to 2-3 dollars and the money rapidly accumulates. The sale is always well patronized so remember the auxiliary at Fall cleaning time.

A little money is earned from the TV rentals and thanks go to Mr. Bill Turner for so promptly doing the repairs at cost for us. Also to Friona Clearview Company for hooking our sets onto the cable system as their donation.

Another little-known project which the auxiliary began in 1958 is the Hospital Memorial Fund. Instead of sending flowers to a funeral, a donation in the name of the deceased may be paid into the Friona State Bank or directly to the hospital. 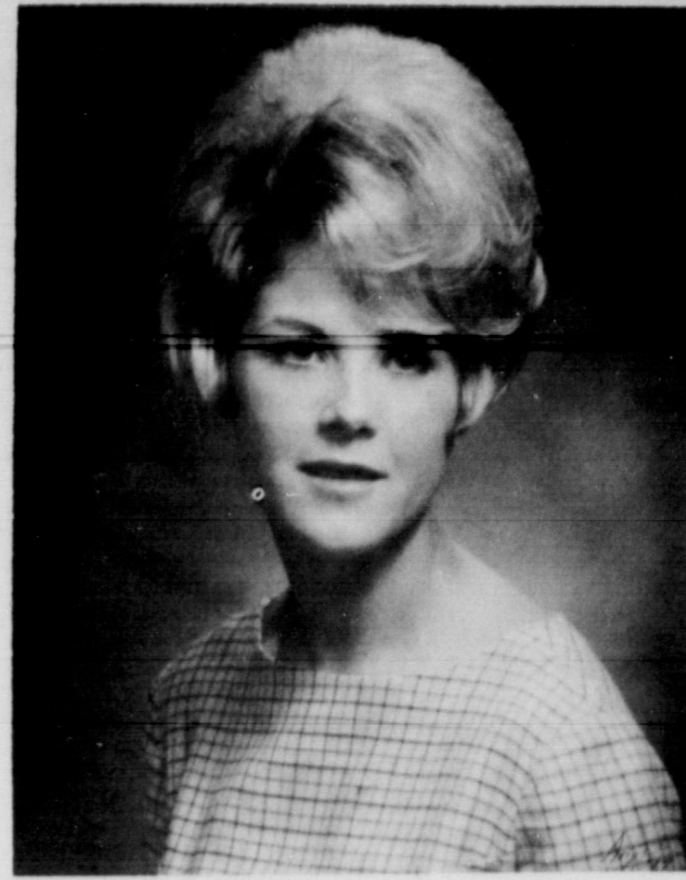

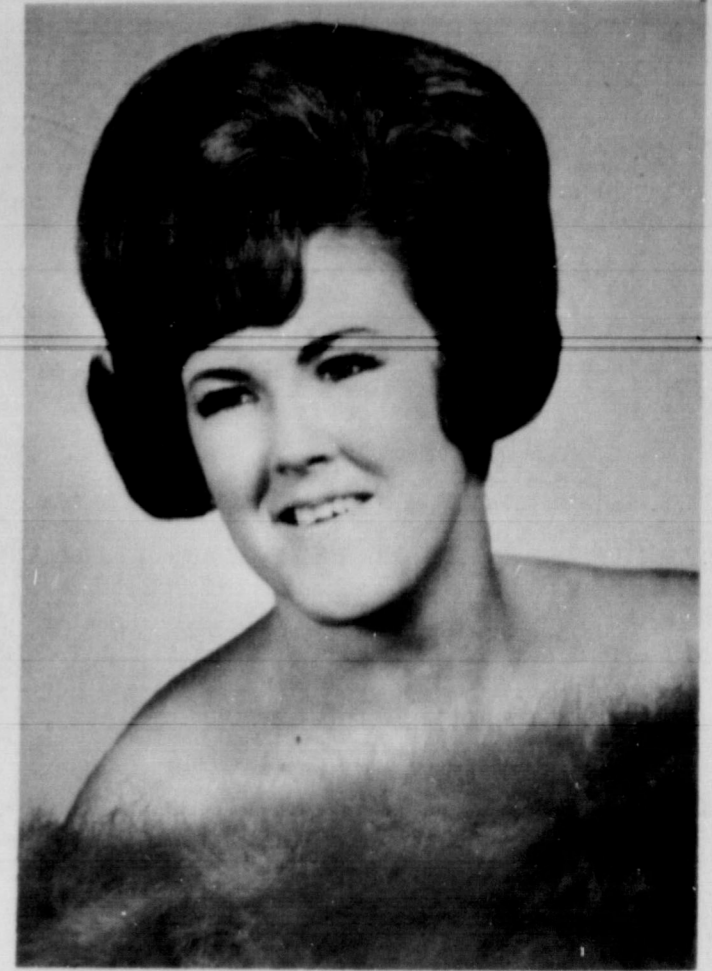

Other voluntary tasks of the club members include, helping Mrs. Tommie Mercer, school nurse, with various health programs during the school year, helping the hospital auxiliary to decorate the hospital and clinic during the Christmas holidays and presenting the local doctors and dentists with traditional red carnations, symbol of Doctor's Day on March 30th each year.

We are proud of the youth of Friona but especially so if this small group with their record of dedicated service and invaluable help given to our hospital.

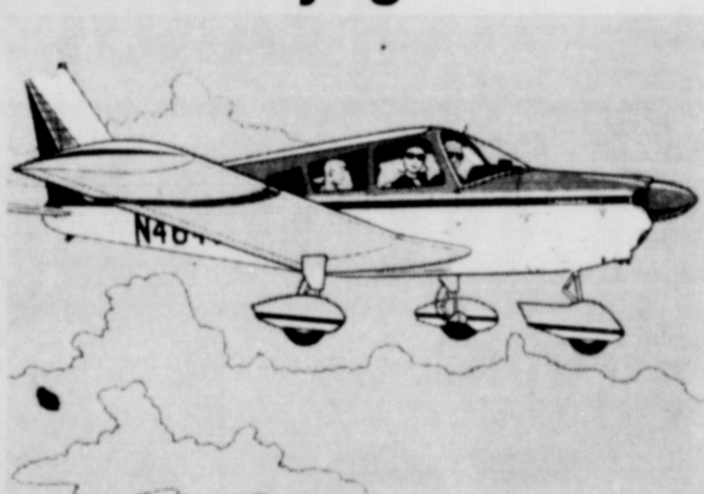
It is the mediocre men of this continent who drop everything that is important to them, and don uniforms and sail halfway 'round the world to fight and die that liberty may live.

Drager On Furlough From Vietnam; Slates Return

Aaron Drager, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Drager of Route 2, Friona, has been home on a furlough, having returned after 10 months in Vietnam.

Drager will report to Gulfport, Miss., on May 15, for six months of training, and will then return to Vietnam for the final six months of his duty.

A member of the Seebies, Drager served as equipment operator, running equipment and supplies from Hue to Phu Bai, the military base eight miles south of Hue at which he was stationed in Vietnam.

Drager was with an "advance party" of 150 men who went to Vietnam 10 months ago. He left Friona last July 4 for Southeast Asia. He went into the service in April of 1966 for a three-year tour.

A driver of dump trucks, and other earth-moving equipment, Drager helped with road construction and rebuilding bridges which were blown up by the North Vietnamese.

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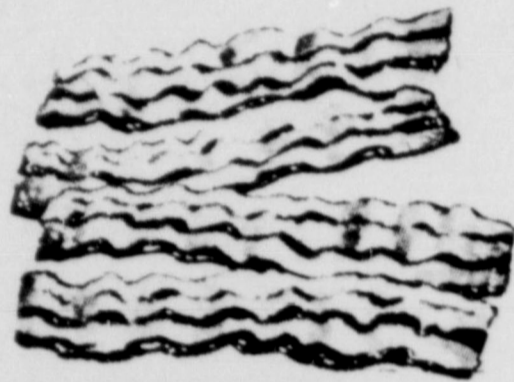

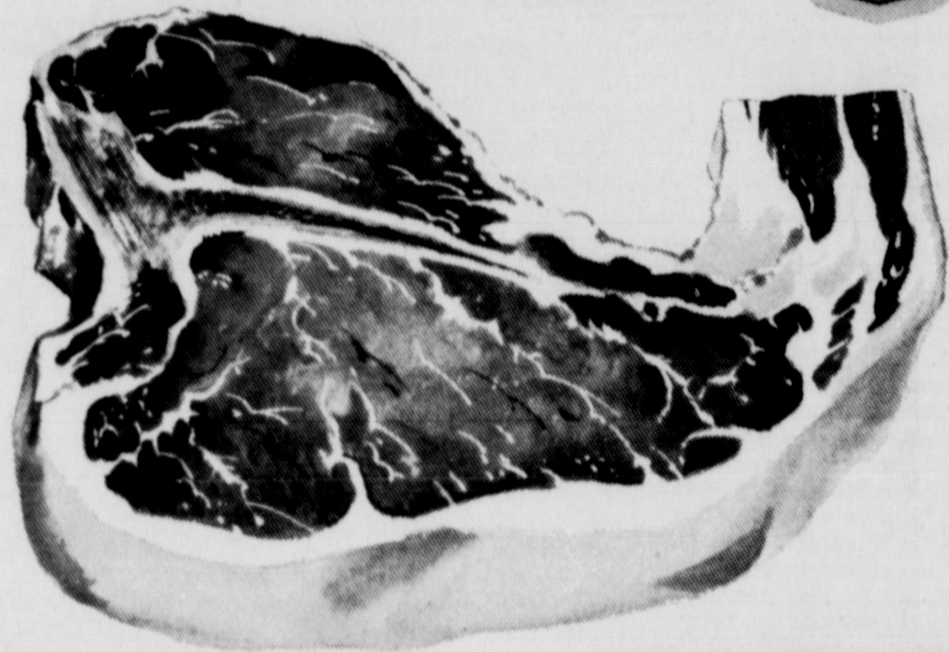


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
