

# Work Progressing At Missouri Beef Packers

We made a long-awaited trip to the Old Dorsey Mansion last weekend.

In case you're not familiar with this bit of early Americana nestled in the foothills of Northern New Mexico it was about a year ago Mr. and Mrs. K.E. Deaton, local antique and history buffs, purchased the ruins of this old showplace of the 1870s and have, ever since, been busy at the job of restoring the home to the splendor it once knew.

Almost 100 years ago, Stephen W. Dorsey, one-time Senator from Arkansas, built a magnificent summer home at the edge of the Santa Fe trail. The three-story log part of the house was built first and the Dorseys lived in it while the sandstone for the main part of the house was being quarried and carved a few miles away. It took nine years to build the home and we suspect it will take as many years now to restore the ruins.

Many of the furnishings in the mansion are original pieces that the Deatons have refinished and restored. Some of the furnishings are antiques they have purchased here and there and these fit in well with the rest of the decor.

It isn't difficult to imagine 50 guests seated around a massive dining table in the elegant dining room. Afterwards the men filed out to the billiard room for a smoke and drink. The ladies entered the parlor for a bit of entertainment on the elaborately carved old piano. One can almost hear the orchestra break into a Strauss waltz as you enter the huge ballroom where gaiety once abounded.

The ballroom is no longer the scene of music and dancing but houses the front of the old post office that made the town of Chico, New Mexico a stopover for mail wagons. There were at one time around seventy buildings surrounding the Dorsey mansion. These included the post office and a store comprised the townsite. The Dorseys usually entertained from 30 to 50 guests; many were members of congress, governors and other dignitaries. Thus they needed a large staff of servants, gardeners and attendants to care for the needs of the family and guests. These servants were the residents of the little town.

Historians disagree as to how Senator Dorsey lost the property. Some say political scandal was involved. Some say he lost it in order to pay a gambling debt. Perhaps the Deaton's could best tell the history of the old place as they have done untold hours of research into the lives of the people who once inhabited the place.

We can only hope that some historical group in New Mexico will take it upon themselves to aid the Deatons in this enormous job of restoring the mansion for public perusal. This could be a tremendous tourist attraction for New Mexico with proper publicity and easy access over paved roads.

However, it is, even now, well worth the 12 miles over a dusty unpaved road to see this old Victorian castle with its hand-carved figures, elegant water - fountains, swimming pool in the shape of a child's hobby horse, and the old carriage house, smoke house and a few other outbuildings still standing. You'll want to picnic under the gnarled old fruit trees that once made up the orchard.

The Deatons are the fifth owners and third owners to use the place as a residence.

We'd definitely say "yes" to anyone who is wondering whether or not to take the trip out to see the old Dorsey Mansion.

Work is progressing at Missouri Beef Packers, with construction approaching the height of activity, according to Rufus Davis, plant engineer.

At the present time, 24 men are working full time on various stages of construction. Within 30 days, Davis says he expects to have 70 men working in a day-time shift and 70 working a night shift, when things really reach "high gear."

Davis said Tuesday that work

at the Friona plant is roughly three weeks behind the stage that he would like to have it, but thought that with a dual-shift, work could get more closely to the schedule.

The Friona beef-processing plant is slated to be in operation by April 1, 1968, and officials of Missouri Beef Packers are still holding to that date.

Upon completion, MBP's Friona plant will have a single shift

potential of slaughtering over 10,000 head of cattle per week, or a double-shift capacity of over 20,000 head per week. The capacity would be the largest of any beef processor in the nation.

Work is also progressing on the railroad spur, to be built south of the main Santa Fe track. A new crossing will be constructed for the plant, about a half-mile northeast of the crossing presently being used

to get to the plant site. The new crossing will be equipped with the automatic traffic "arms"

Davis indicated that construction had not been hampered too much by the weather as other factors. He said that material availability had not been affected as much by the Vietnam war as had the price. "The little short railway strike also affected us somewhat," he said.

## Moisture Total For '67 Surpasses That For '66

Official moisture measured by the City of Friona for 1967 has surpassed that measured in the city for a comparable period in 1966, it was revealed this week.

Moisture measured by the City Office as of Tuesday night amounted to 7.88 inches for the year, compared to 7.53 for the first seven months of 1966. Moisture measured during June was 3.43 inches at the City Office, with 3.17 falling to date in July.

Farmers in the area have reported amounts up to 10 inches for the two-month period. Most of the rain in the immediate area has been of the good variety -- almost all falling in gentle showers, with hail damage mostly spotted.

The upswing in moisture during June and July came after only 1.28 inches were measured during the first five months of the year, with no real good single rain or snow included in the total.

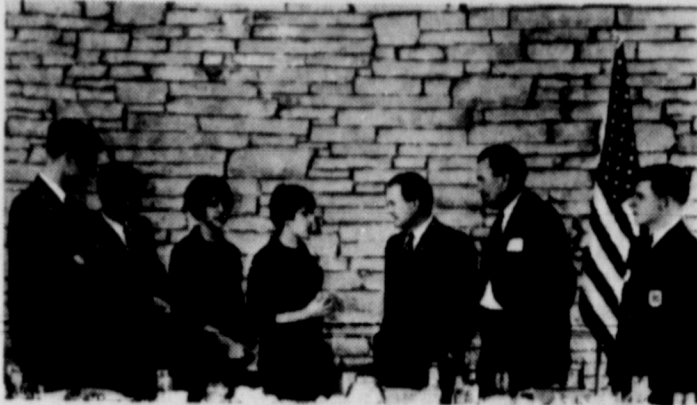
### Scouts Set Honor Court

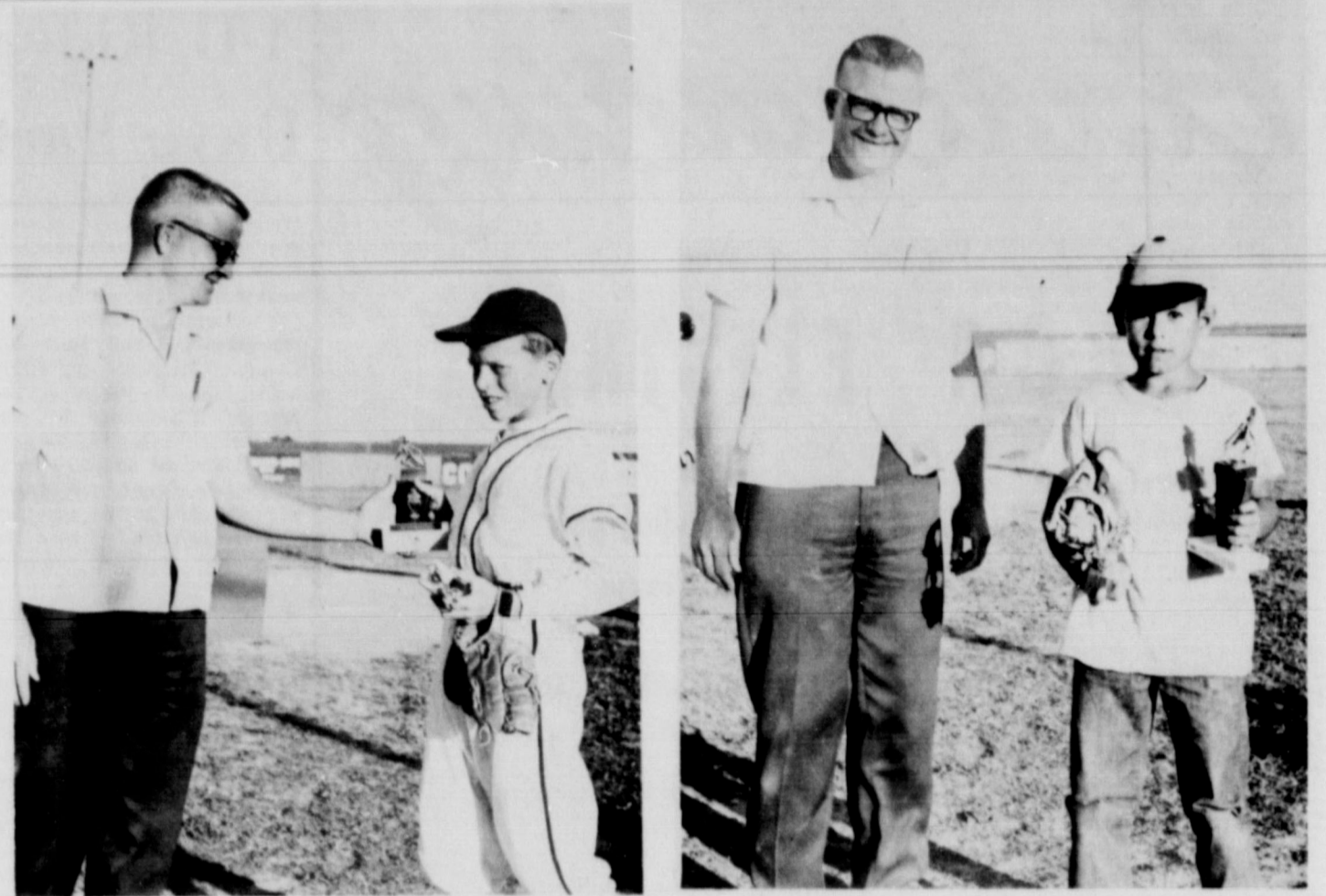

### On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE McNUTT  
County Agent

The amounts of rain received over the county this past week were varied. Amounts ranged from about one-half to two and one-half inches. Some hail and wind damage was reported east of Friona.

Several farmers say this is the most rain they have seen for July and for this time of the year particularly.

Weeds are growing everywhere. If you think you are the only one having weed problems, talk to almost anyone and you'll find out you are "one of the group."

**SORGHUM MIDGE**  
According to Don Rummel, Area Entomologist, there is a possibility of increased sorghum midge damage this season. During the past three years only minor midge damage has been experienced. However, the unusual amounts of rainfall and cool weather have provided favorable conditions for a midge buildup this year. The most important consideration is the fact that a larger acreage of grain sorghum will head this year after midge populations have had time to reach economic levels.

During the past five years grain sorghum which bloomed by August 1 usually did not suffer economic damage. However, this may not hold true every year. It should be noted that damaging infestations occurred approximately 10 days earlier than normal in Central Texas this year.

Early midge populations are maintained on johnsongrass and other wild hosts; where several generations may occur. As the wild hosts mature, the midge migrate to nearby grain sorghum. The early grain sorghum infestations are not sufficiently damaging to warrant control. However, these early infestations contribute directly to the midge populations which cause damage in late grain sorghum.

The extended planting period this year makes the development of damaging midge populations in late planted sorghum more likely.

At this time it is not definite that a serious midge infestation will occur. However, conditions exist which make this a possibility and a warning to this effect is in order.

Producers who have late planted sorghum are urged to watch early heading fields in their local areas for midge activity. The observation of midge activity in early heading sorghum may suffer economic damage. The midge control recommendations should be studied so that insecticides can be applied properly should control be necessary.

**CHEMICAL CONTROL**  
Insecticides recommended for control of the sorghum midge and additional comments are given in MP-339, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Grain and Forage Crops. **PROPER TIMING OF APPLICATIONS TO CONTROL SORGHUM MIDGE IS MOST IMPORTANT.** The midge deposits eggs immediately before or during the blooming of a given floret. Consequently it is imperative to apply insecticides 1 to 4 days following complete emergence of the head from the boot of the plant. Due to the lack of uniform maturity in fields, thorough chemical coverage for a minimum of 8 to 10 days is commonly required for effective control. Additional applications may be required where heading in a given field, or parts of the field, are staggered. In most cases, it is usually not profitable to apply chemical control after the midge are found in a sorghum field. The need to apply insecticides should be based on the midge population (as determined by checking surroundings, blooming fields) at the time a given field has the heads emerging from the boot.

Once damaging midge populations are observed in a given area, most sorghum booting after that date will be damaged unless control measures are applied. Research has shown that one insecticide application will sel-

## Leaders Make Plans For 4-H Club Camp

Parmer County 4-H'ers, leaders and parents are looking forward to and making plans for the Annual Parmer County 4-H Camp, July 31-August 3. The camp is held each year in the Santa Fe National Forest in New Mexico.

A new camp site will be used to provide adequate control. Under conditions of heavy infestations at least two and usually three applications are necessary.

### INSECTICIDES RECOMMENDED:

**Carbaryl (Sevin)** - May be applied to forage sorghum without limitations. Allow 21 days between last application and harvest of sorghum grain.

**Carbophenothion (Trithion)** - Do not apply more than twice per season. 21 days waiting period between last application and harvest or grazing.

**Diazinon** - 14 day waiting period between last application and harvest or grazing.

**Endrin** - Must not be applied within 35 days of harvest. Apply only once per season.

**Ethion** - Allow 30 days between last application and harvest. Do not apply more than three times per season.

**Methyl parathion** - Allow 12 days between last application and harvest or grazing. Cause leaf burn on certain sorghum varieties.

**Parathion** - 12 day waiting period from last application to harvest.

**Toxaphene** - Apply only once after heads start to form. Do not apply over 1/3 gallon per acre within 28 days or over 1/2 gallon within 40 days of harvest. Dairy animals or animals being finished for slaughter should not be pastured in toxaphene treated fields. Do not ensile treated forage.

### CORN EAR WORMS REPORTED

Some corn ear worm damage is being observed in some corn fields in the county. Some farmers have started a control program.

The Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Grain and Forage Crops can be obtained from the County Agent's office in Farwell.

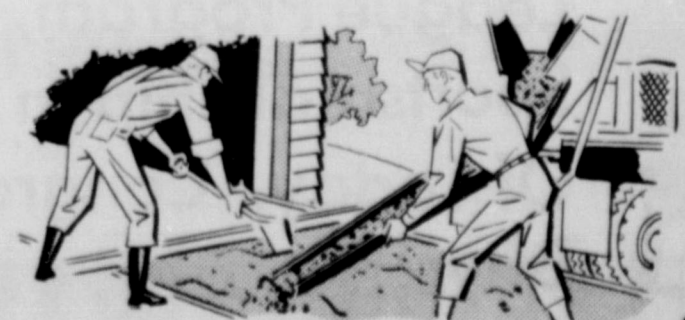

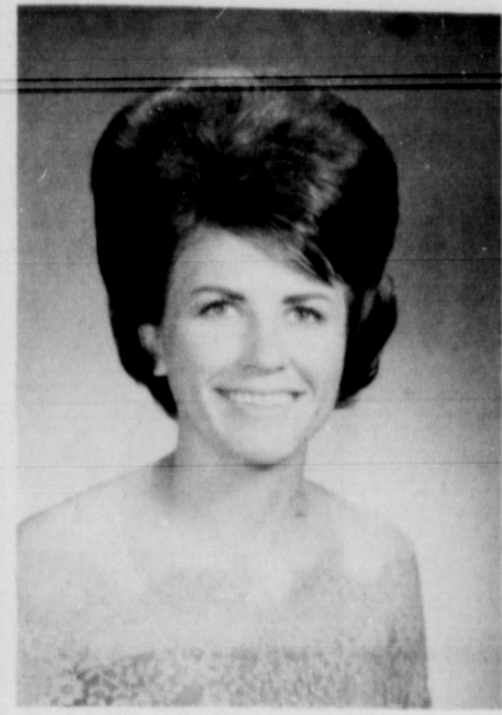

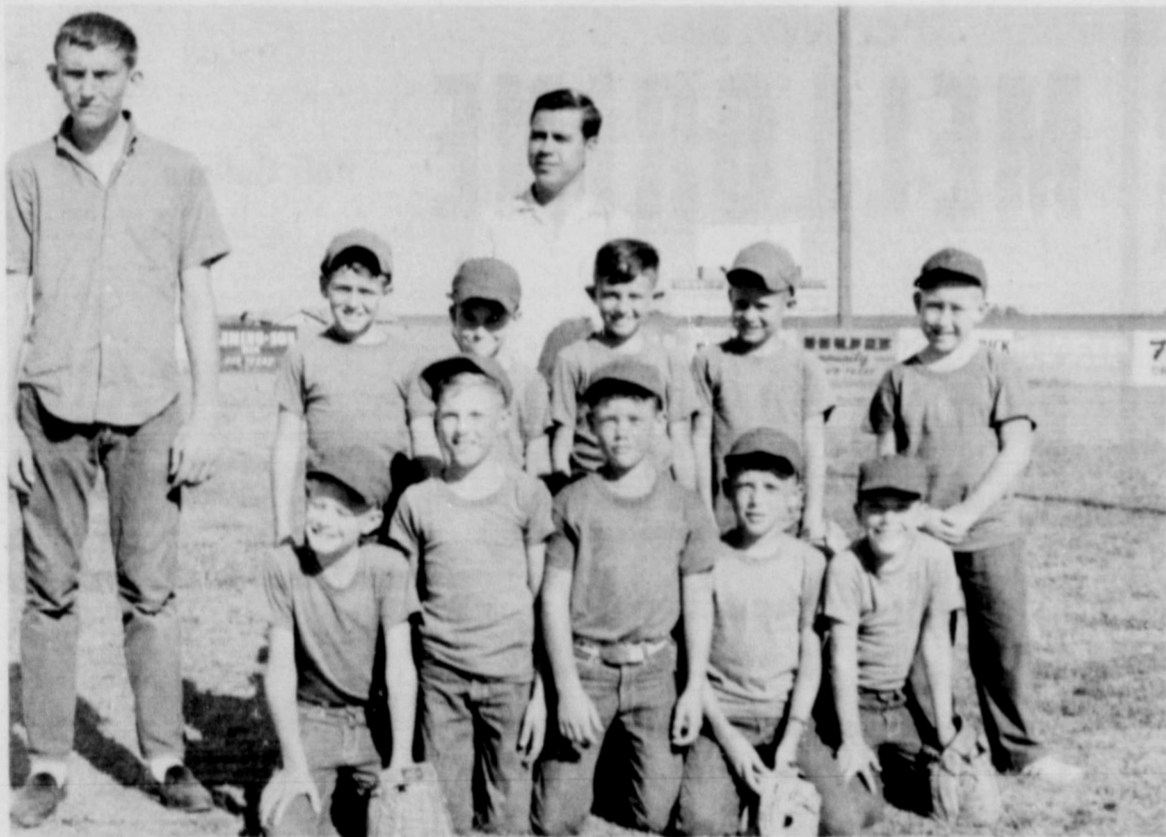
