STOCK SHOW TO GET DIRECTORS

The Cochran 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Show committee met on Wednesday of last week at the County Activities Building to conduct a resume of the show, discuss needed improvements and complaints and set up rules for next year's show.

New rules put into effect for the future shows came as a result of complaints from this year's show. Here are the newest rules adopted by the committee:

1. To elect a Board of Directors to run the entire show. This would eliminate the possibility of any of the boards falling on the shoulders of the 4-H or FFA leaders.
2. They will have their hands full in last helping their boys get ready for the show. Heretofore, the 4-H and FFA leaders, took the responsibility and work because no one else would see to it. A bad mixer in the judging this year caused this complaint. The committee went ahead and ruled on the winner in the complaint case and heard the explanation of how it happened. But, recognizing the fact that no matter how they solved it,

3. To build a concrete run around the hog washing pens.
4. The Board of Directors to be the organizing and governing body of the entire show.
5. All animals to be designated by ear tag numbers and pen numbers in which located.
6. Panels of 2 feet, 4 feet and 6 feet length to be constructed in sufficient numbers to form several notable pens in the sales arena for the hogs and lambs.
7. Plans to locate a loud speaker in each barn so that everyone can hear the announcer.
8. Erection of a bulletin board to list the order of sale of hogs and lambs in the barn.

All of these recommendations were agreed upon by a majority of the committee present at the last meeting. However, since the directors appointed shall run the show, it should be understood they will set the rules.

Rites Held For C. B. Evans, Sr.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Tahoka at 3 p.m. Friday afternoon for Curtis Boyd Evans, Sr., 62 year old Tahoka farmer who died at his home Wednesday afternoon. He is the father of C. B. Evans, Jr., of a Morton route.

Mr. Evans had been ill for a considerable time and had been in the hospital recently. He was despondent over the nature of his health.

A resident of Tahoka for nearly 40 years, Mr. Evans had moved to Texas around the turn of the century. He was born in Alabama and his family left there when he was very young.

He had been past president of the Lyon County Farm Bureau and served as Chairman of the board of a local Cooperative Gin.

The Rev. Levi Price of Monday, a former pastor, conducted the services assisted by the local pastor of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka. Burial was in the Tahoka Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife and three sons, C. B. Jr., of Morton; Glen of Tahoka and Rev. Boyce Evans of Senaraves; and one daughter, Mrs. Melba Rogers of Levelland and nine grandchildren.

Hammonds Rites Are Pending

Funeral services were pending late Wednesday for 82 year old John Hammonds, resident of Cochran County for 23 years, who died in Lubbock Wednesday.

Very few details were available to the Tribune yesterday. A grandson, Harvey, who lives in Morton, did not know any details concerning Mr. Hammonds' death.

Hammonds, who was farming a place 6 miles north of Morton until 1951, had been in ill health the past several months and had been hospitalized frequently.

As far as could be ascertained here, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. H. L. Kent of Olney. The grandson here was waiting for her to arrive and set the time of the funeral.

Another grandson, Teddy, entered the service last fall. The Red Cross was attempting to contact him and secure an emergency leave for the funeral. Several other grandchildren survive, the names of whom were not immediately available.

MEET TUESDAY FOR DECISION ON COOP

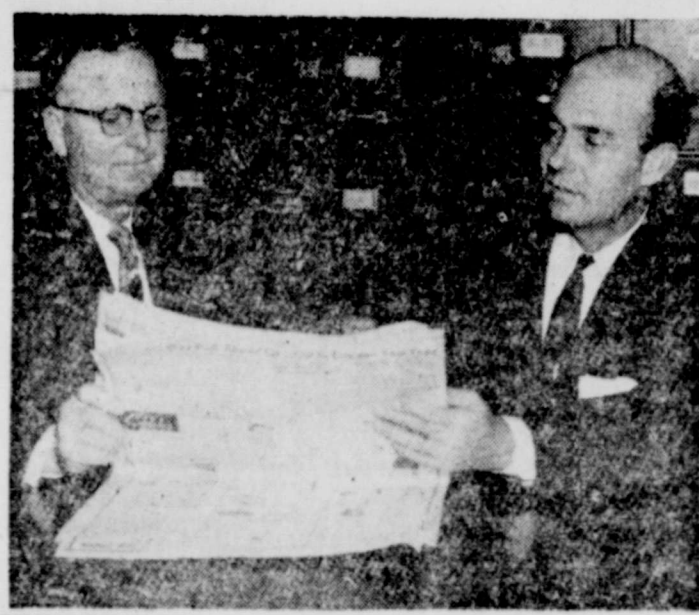

Embry died in the Cochran County Hospital early Friday morning after suffering a heart attack, shortly after dinner, Thursday evening.

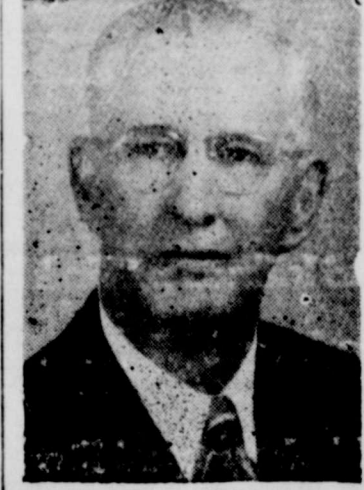

Belva Ramsey, Morton Senior, and one of the greatest all-around Morton girl basketball players to be developed, will have the opportunity to play for the nationally famed, AAU champion Hutchinson Flying Queens of Wayland College.

Miss Ramsey earned for herself a scholarship to Wayland College in a rugged elimination practice session held before Coach Harley Reddin at Plainview last Saturday.

In an almost cinderella like story, the girl who was for three seasons at Morton a guard—one of the most talented in the state—and then made the switch to post forward in her senior year to probably break all one season scoring marks here, won one of four scholarships to be awarded.

Twenty-two of the outstanding girl basketball players from Texas and Oklahoma reported for the Friday workouts and stayed over on Saturday for the final eliminations. One of the scholarships had already been awarded to a 6 foot 1 inch all American guard who was in the finals at the AAU tournament this year. The other two scholarships awarded Saturday went to

Carolyn Miller of Palestine, Texas and Louise Sharp, all-American of Clarendon Junior College.

Belva's work at forward was almost equal to that of the others, almost all of who were forwards on their high school teams, one observer at the tryouts said. But, when they tried the girls at guard, he said, Belva was head and shoulders better than any on the court.

With Wayland, Belva, who is a member of the First Baptist Church, will be going to the school of her choice as well as having the chance to become an All American cage player. With the Queens having graduated two guards this season, she could well step into a starting berth next fall.

The Queens are sponsored by a well known area flier and play the top teams all over the nation. They successfully defended their national AAU championship this year & possess the longest unbeaten skein in the nation.

Faces Long Stay In Hockley Cty. Jail

Tony Garcia, formally known as Antonio Garcia, 20-year-old Latin American, has a long stay coming up in the Hockley County Jail.

The main trouble was that Tony couldn't stay out of trouble long enough.

To start with Tony just finished serving time in lieu of a fine with the county.

He owed the City \$15 on an old fine.

Then Tony got into serious trouble last week. He was nabbed by patrolman Bill Burkett and City Marshal James Hicks for driving while intoxicated. He broke away and began to run bringing down up on himself a charge of resisting arrest. As if that weren't enough, Garcia happened to have a knife on him which is a deadly weapon.

Here's what the due process of law did—subsequent to his pleadings. They fined him \$100 and costs on the DWI and added a ten day jail sentence. That was in County Court. Over at the city he was fined another \$100 and costs on the two charges of resisting arrest and possessing a concealed deadly weapon. Add to that the \$15 he already owed. He had no money to pay any of the fines so he has to lay 'em out in the Hockley County jail.

At \$2 per day—non working—or \$3 per day working—Antonio has from 70 to 90 days waiting time.

More Than 100 Sign Up for Ball

Morton seemed pretty well assured of a lot of baseball to be played here this summer by the more than 100 boys who turned out last Thursday night to sign up for the four classifications of baseball.

At present, with other boys still signing up, it is not known how many teams will be fielded in the various leagues here, but it seems almost a certainty that both the Little League and the Pony League will have to be expanded. Add to that the possibility of a Legion team and you have a full round of ball activities.

Seventy-two signed up for the Little Leagues and Minor Leagues last Thursday and about seven others have been added to that list. Approximately 22 have signified their intentions to play in the Pony League and another 8 or 10 are expected to be added to this list.

The interest in an American Legion team seemed to be very good but it was still not known if a team would be fielded. A total of 16 boys have applied so far to be on the Legion team but no coach has been signed up.

A decision will be probably be reached in the next week as to the number of teams that will be fielded.

ERNEST WHITECOTTON BURNED AS BUTANE UNIT CATCHES FIRE

Ernest Whitecotton, well known Cochran County farmer working on the Griffith farms west of Morton, was doing well early this week following his release from the Cochran County hospital after being seriously but not critically burned in a fire last week.

The fire, which occurred at 5:20 Wednesday evening, destroyed a new servicing unit truck and burned Whitecotton about the face, arms and hands.

The butane servicing unit, mounted on a 1952 2-ton Chevrolet, was only 6 weeks old. It had been designed especially for the job and

was not covered by insurance. It was valued at several thousand dollars.

The service unit was sitting just outside the shop, and just inside the door were two gasoline servicing units. Miraculously they did not explode. The flames in the butane unit burst suddenly, probably caused by a spark and the highly inflammable fumes. Two men were cleaning the motor and as soon as the flames burst they fled. The safety valves on the units would have stopped the blaze except that both valves on the hose, and leading to the tank were cracked open just enough to allow the flames to continue.

The local fire department rushed to the scene but nothing could be done to save the unit. Nevertheless Ray Griffith, said he would like to express his thanks to the local firemen who did all they could to save the unit and the adjoining buildings and equipment, not lost in the fire.

17 ENROLLED IN FIRST AID COURSE

The course is in session at the County Activities Building.

We would urge you to purchase cowpeas now for two reasons. (1) you still have a good supply of seed and consequently it is lower in price. Also there is a good variety on the market at the present time. Peas that will qualify for ASC payment include New Era, Chinese Red, Brabham and Iron clay. We can plant straight peas with a payment of 10c per pound or inter-plant with grain sorghum at the rate of 7c per pound. Where irrigated, 50 lbs of P205 and 20 pounds of N are required. With a payment of 5c per pound on P205 and 9c per pound on N.

On dry land fertilizer may be used at same rate of payment but is not required. Purchase inoculation when buying peas.

**THE BAPTIST CHURCH IS UN-
SCRIPTURAL IN NAME**

can turn to the Bible and read about the church of God, and church of the firstborn, but I have yet to find one passage that speaks of a Baptist church. (See Rom. 16:16; Mat. 16:18; I Cor. 1:2; Acts 14:5) John did not establish the church, nor did he do so for that purpose. Instead, he was a forerunner of Christ to prepare a people for him (Mat. 3:1-3; Lk. 1:17). The church was not in the kingdom, which is the church (Mat. 13:17). John, speaking concerning Christ said, "He must increase, but I must decrease." (John 3:30) After the death of John the Baptist (Mat. 14:10) Christ declared, "I will build My church." (Mat. 16:18)

The expressions "Baptist church," "Baptist churches," or "a Baptist" are not to be found in the Bible. Only one person in the entire Bible was ever called "Baptist" and that was John "the Baptist" and he said, "I must decrease." John was called "Baptist" because he immersed people in water. The words "Baptist" have translated the New Testament, and in their translation the word "baptist" is not found. It is translated as John the Immerser.

Some say, "What difference does the name make? The name is nothing in a name!" Why, friend, the Bible speaks differently. Please note the following passages: "I will give them a name better than of sons and of daughters: I will give them an everlasting name, that shall not be cut off." (Isa. 56:5) "And the Gentiles shall see thy righteousness, and all kings thy glory: and they shall be called by a new name, which the mouth of the LORD shall name." (Isa. 62:2) In Acts 10 and 11 the Lord had chosen Paul to bear his name among the Gentiles (Acts 9:15), is the account of the first Gentile converts. Then in Acts 11:26 we read, "And when he had found him, he brought him unto Antioch. And there he was with the church, and taught much people. And the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch." (Acts 11:26) declared in I Pet. 4:16; "But if a man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify in this name."





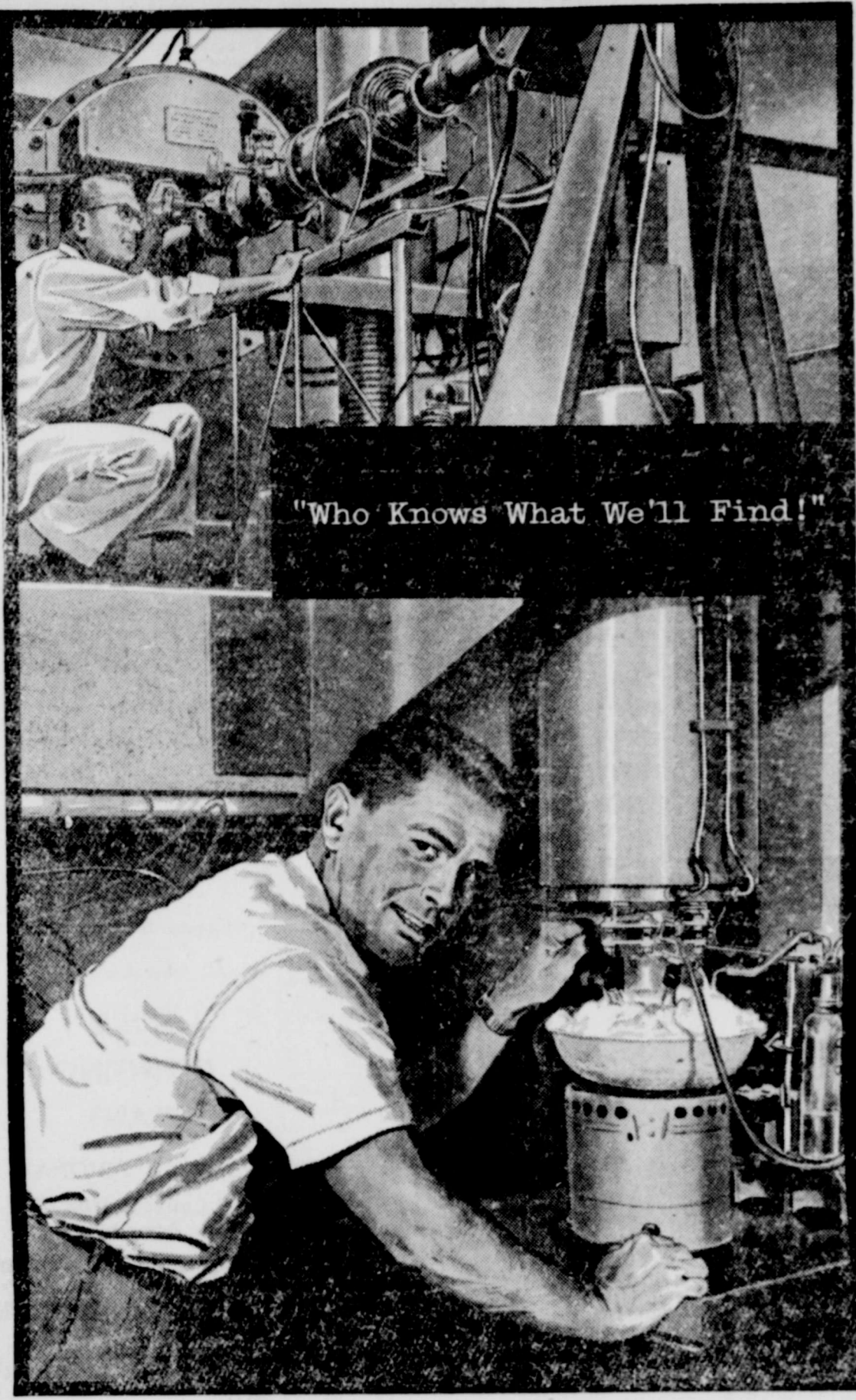

This others may use to decide to cast their vote for another candidate. Certainly, at this stage of the race, this is what we would term the thing most likely to cause Senterfitt's defeat. He is a simple and effective speaker, but not dynamic. He appears to have an honest and sincere feeling for common, simple, things; for small and rather obscure human dignities — all of which are unimportant as far as the vote swaying is concerned.

his record is...

IMPRESSIVE. Especially in the eyes of the legislators themselves who have long praised his efficiency at organization and his capability at expediting matters of business as Speaker of the House. His home-folks also have told the world what they think. His home box has not yielded a vote for an opposition candidate in his political history, and that covers a long time — approximately 14 years.

his platform...

HAS BEEN described as the unglamorous subject of state finance and re-organization. Highly important, but not likely to be vote getters in a state where racial segregation, and other inflammatory problems seem to be on more minds.

dubbed...

MR. INTEGRITY of Texas politics by a fellow legislator, Senterfitt might be just what we need the most. But regardless of the votes he gets, we liked his style — just plain, old country folks, non-political, un-glamorous. — we simply hope the folks do one thing, and check his background. Think they may find he's considered one of the men in our state government most intimately acquainted with the problems.

also here...

DURING SENTERFITTS appearance at the Lion's Club were an ex-representative, well known to a good many Mortonites, Preston Smith, candidate for senator; J. O. Gilham, our representative and a candidate for re-election, and Truitt Lattimer, young Congressman from Abilene, son in law of Mr. & Mrs. LeRoy Johnson.

all of these men...

HAD SOME interesting things to say, on the side, but their short talks before the Lions were non-political — at least non vote stirring.

is it legal...

OR AIN'T IT — the switching of cotton allotment acreage from dry land to irrigated land, that seems to be the question this week. It's a question that has caused considerable unrest among the smaller of the farmers for the past two years because they feel like they were being made the scapegoats on this plan to reduce cotton surplus.

for the time being...

WE ARE DEALING only with the aspect of whether its legal or not. As we have been told by the agricultural services, it was legal last year, but is not legal now. As to whether its ethical or even practical, that's another matter. As to whether its actually being done here or anywhere else, again that is another matter.

we'll wager this...

THE BIG BOYS will find a way around the cutting down of cotton acreage. Everywhere you go, in big farming, which is big business, in other big business fields, wherever the money lies, ethics plays a small part in the program. It is always the little man who suffers. And, we don't imply the methods used by the big boys are always illegal. Sometimes they just conveniently find a loophole. But we recognize this as a part of the free enterprise system. Every system has its drawbacks. If everyone operated on a live and let live basis, it would be indeed an interesting world.

nor would the...

SOLUTION BE to put the little men on the local committees, for they, as fair minded as they might be, would be duned by some fast-thinking, fast talking big boy, who would take advantage of their belief that everyone wanted to operate on the "up and up."

Daniel said 29,352 Texans had written their approval and offered their support, while only 429 had expressed their opposition.



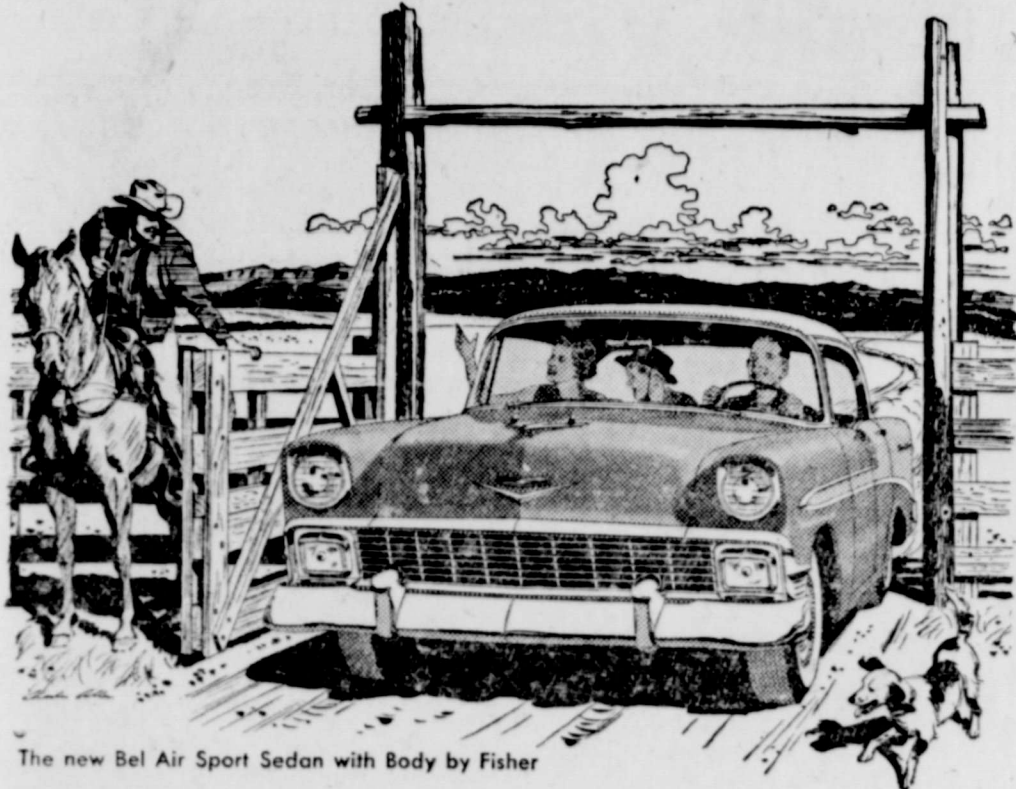
KILMER CORBIN TO SEEK ANOTHER TERM IN SENATE
