ROY TARVER, Jr. IS ELECTED HEAD OF JAYCEES

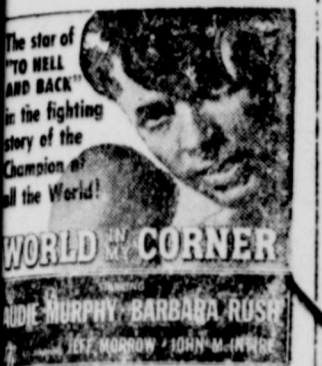
Roy Tarver Jr., proprietor of Tar-

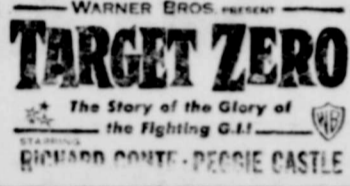

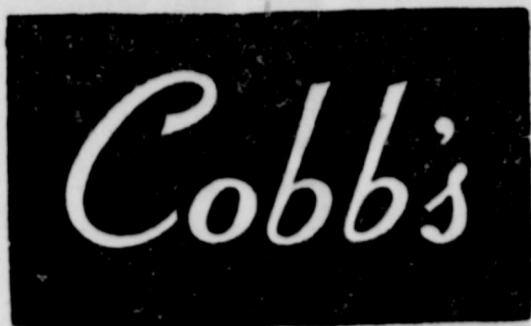
