FCDA now has 32,000 of these masks in production. Except for the lack of boots, he would be perfectly safe even if sprayed with nerve or mustard gas or poisonous germs. An FCDA secretary emerges from the air lock of a gas and germ-proof shelter built with wood frames and a new fiber "diffusion board" similar to other wallboard. This material allows air and carbon dioxide to pass in and out while filtering out poison gases and germs. The secretary is wearing a new type \$2 civilian protective mask. (FCDA Photo)

YOUNG FATHERS GET TIP FROM DRAFT BOARDS

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director has issued a timely warning to young fathers and father-to-be of draft age.

The draft call for May was 503 for Texas compared to 501 for the previous month. That's Texas share of 12,000 being drafted for the Army. The quota for May was filled with men who are 21 years of age or older on May 1st with the exception of delinquents, or volunteers, who may be older.

The warning was this: Young fathers should be alert in advising their draft boards about children

or expected children. They could get drafted before they let them know and then after they have received greetings from their friends and neighbors, it's too late.

CONTROL APHIDS AND PEST SPIDERS IN THIS METHOD

Two new ways which are almost invisible, destroy or spoil many flying and crawling insects.

Red spiders, sometimes called spider mites, are destructive to flowers as well as some vegetables. They also injure many shrubs and trees. To check for spider damage look for signs of webs. Sometimes the underside of the leaves look rusted.

Red spiders can be killed with a 3 percent armitate dust or 325 mesh dusting sulphur.

Aphids or plant lice also eat many flowers, especially sweet peas and backstrobes. Garden peas infested with aphids, soon blight, dry up before they produce a good crop of peas.

Aphids, sometimes called green bugs, may be killed with one percent lindane dust or two percent nicotine dust or sprays.

Malathion spray will kill both these insects and is also a fairly good control for scales, mealy bugs and other insects.

With Your... COUNTY AGENT

The season for bag worms isn't hand and to effectively control them is while they are small. Chemical controls do no good if applied after the worms are grown.

When a place has a large number of bag worms, as these are places where worms show up first. Several ladies have telephoned the agent's office about these worms. The history is, the worms hatch in late spring or early summer and the larvae feed on the foliage of ornamental plants. The young worms spin a silken sack and attach bits of leaves to it as they feed. The bag is carried by the worm wherever it goes and the bag produced by a full grown worm may be from one and a half to two inches long.

The female bag worm crawls from the bag and after depositing her eggs. The bags should be removed and burned as the eggs for next seasons worms go thru the winter in the bag.

These worms are little, dust with either 10 per cent chlordane or toxaphene dust. Spray with 40 percent chlordane emulsion applied at the rate of two tablespoons per gallon of water. Lead arsenate at the same rate is OK. Come to the County Agent's office and request a copy of L-159, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants." It lists also the control of insects which normally cause the home gardener the most trouble.

TRACTOR SAFETY INSECT CONTROL

Farm tractor accidents now take more than 1,000 lives annually. Operators should be careful and first sight, for it can become a killer. The number one cause of tractor accidents, do not carry extra passengers on the tractor and don't take it on the highways or public roads after dark without proper lighting on the front and rear. Fatigue is a big factor in farm accidents. Other big causes of accidents are improper use of wheel brakes; rough roads and too quick turns. Children often meet death on a tractor as an extra passenger.

The 4-H rifle team will be selected Thursday afternoon. Ken Coffman, the Instructor, is doing a fine job with these boys teaching both safety and shooting. Results of these contests will be announced and awards made Saturday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. in the Texas Tech Engineering Building auditorium. All interested folks are welcome to attend.

Jerry Bryant will enter the State Fair Awards Contest and Paul Belcher will enter the Talent Club Award Contest.

Winners in the State Fair Awards Contest will be guests of the Fair Association at the Fair in Dallas on Youth Day.

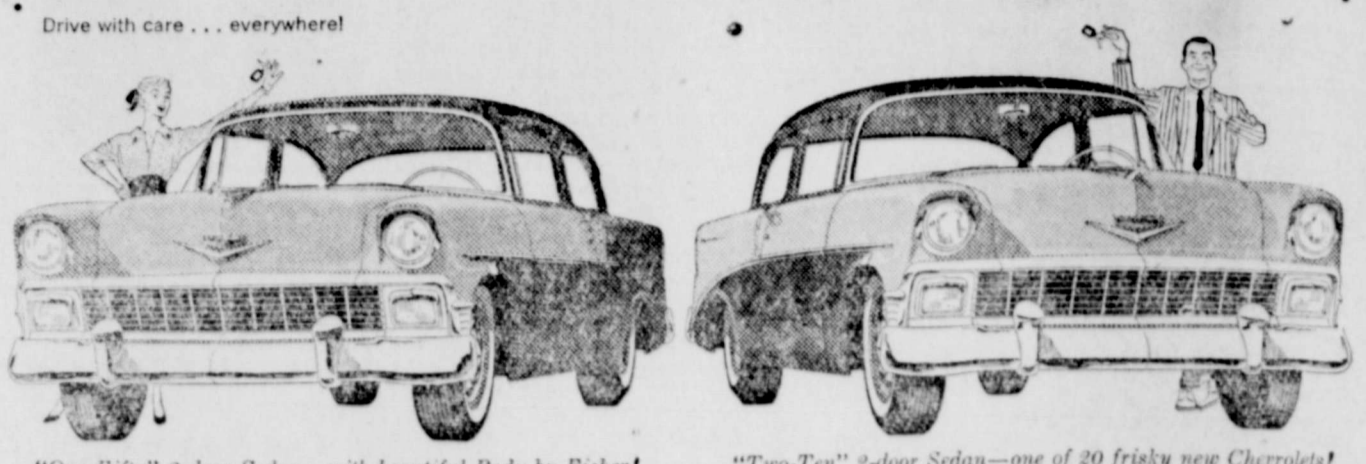

BAPTISTS ARE UNSCRIPTURAL IN DOCTRINE

Baptist teach that a sinner is saved by faith only. The Bible says, "You see then how that by works a man is justified and not by faith only" (Jas. 2:24). Do Baptist believe in justification by faith only? In reality, I don't think so. I do not think they believe the doctrine any more than I do and yet they teach it. Does a sinner need the blood of Christ in order to be saved? Is the grace of God essential to salvation? Must one repent of his sins in order to be saved? Almost all Baptist will answer yes to these questions. Will someone explain to me how the answer to those questions can be "yes" and yet salvation be by "faith only." Repentance cannot be essential to salvation and salvation be by faith only.

The Bible says we are 'saved by hope' (Rom. 8:24) we are saved by the gospel (I Cor. 15:1-2) and "—receive with meekness the engrafted Word, which is able to save your souls." (Jas. 1:21) Then again Peter said, "The like figure whereunto even Baptism doth also now save us —" (I Pet. 3:21) Thus we can see that we are not saved by "faith only" but by hope, the gospel, the word, baptism, and in fact, a number of other things are attributed to our salvation in the Bible.

Baptist teach that once you are saved from past sins, become a child of God, that it is impossible for you to fall from grace. That it is impossible for you to be eternally lost. The Bible declares, "Whosoever of you are justified by the law; ye are fallen from grace". (Gal. 5:4) In I Cor. 10 we read where the Children of Israel: (1) were baptized, verse 2; (2) ate spiritual meat, verse 4; (3) drank a spiritual drink, verse 4; (4) spiritual rock was Christ, verse 4; (5) they fell by transgression, verse 8; and God said they "should not enter my rest" (Hebrews 3:17-19) Judas fell by transgression (Acts 1:25) In I John 3:4 we read that "sin is a transgression of the law." Therefore Judas fell by sin.

"For if after they have escaped the pollutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end is worse with them than the beginning." (II Pet. 2:20) Notice the things stated in the verse: (1) they have escaped the pollutions of the world, (2) they are again entangled therein, and overcome, (3) the latter end is worse than the beginning, Peter says it is possible for them to become even worse than they were before escaping the pollutions of the world and Baptist say it is not true. Which will you believe, Peter or the Baptist?

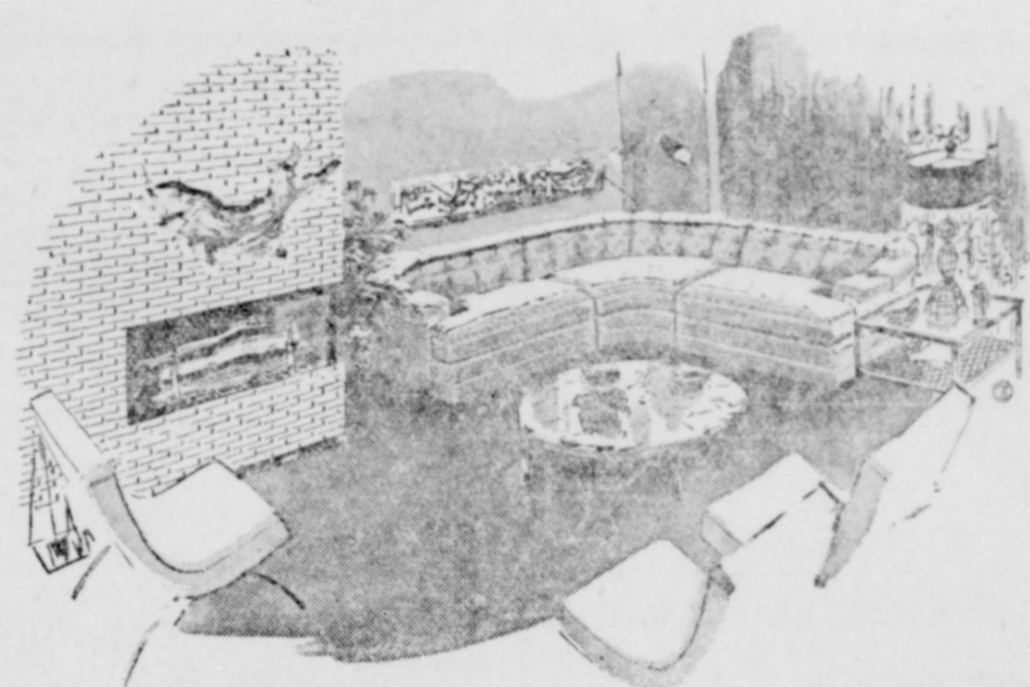

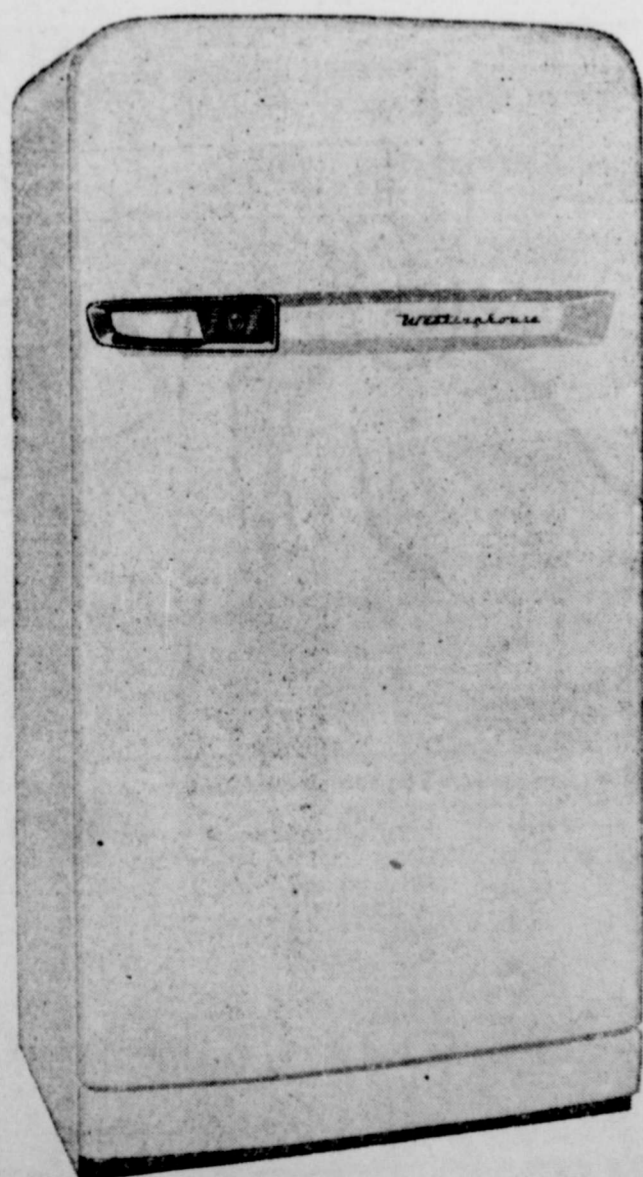

BUREAU OF CENSUS SHOWS 1954 AGRICULTURE PICTURE FOR COCHRAN COUNTY

The U. S. Department of Census, this week released a report on the value of farm products sold in 1954 in the Counties in Texas, and the figure for Cochran County was listed at \$6,623,085.

With no comparison figures listed, here's the complete report the department released concerning Cochran County.

The value of products sold in 1954 by operators of 479 farms in Cochran County was \$6,623,085, according to a preliminary report of the 1954 Census of Agriculture published by the Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The value of all crops sold in the county was \$6,234,993 and included \$6,234,008 for field crops, \$155 for vegetables, \$230 for fruits and nuts, and \$800 for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$388,092 and included \$27,902 for dairy products, \$34,470 for poultry and poultry products, and \$325,720 for li-

vestock and livestock products.

Copies of the preliminary report showing the above information for the entire State of Texas, are available from the Bureau of Census, Washington 25, D. C. at a cost of 10 cents each.

Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of the U. S. Treasury Department, advised County Agent Hays Thompson in a letter this week. "Under the provisions of Public Law No. 466, approved April 28, 1956, farmers are relieved of the burden of Federal Taxes on the gasoline and special fuels used on their farms for farming purposes. The relief in the case of the gasoline tax, is accomplished by providing annual refunds payable by the Federal Government, directly to the farmers. The first claims to be filed will be with respect to gasoline purchased after December 31, 1955, and used on farm for farming purpose before July 1, 1956. These claims must be filed on or before September 30, 1956. Subsequent claims will cover the fiscal year period July 1, to June 30.

An agreement has been reached between this office and State Extension Director, Mr. George Gibson, to distribute the necessary claim forms through the offices of County Agricultural Agents.

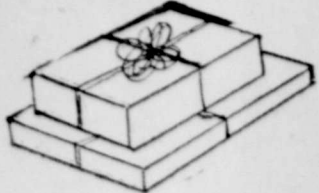

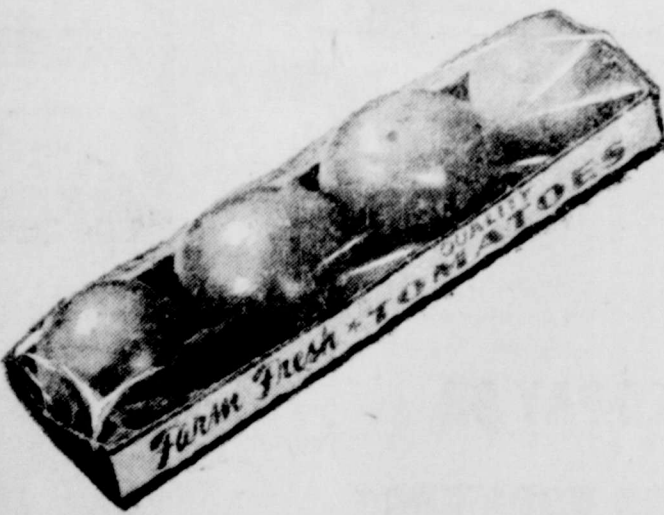
