To Get Degrees At Texas Tech Commencement

Graduate Walker Miller of Morton (Mrs. Ermon Miller) is one of 24 candidates to receive master's degrees at Texas Tech's Commencement, May 28th, in Jones Stadium.

Miss Miller, a teacher in the local schools for much of the past several years, will get her master's degree in the field of education.

One Morton man, Freddie Wells, will receive a degree in Electrical Engineering and a Bachelor man, Kenneth Dale Krebs will receive a bachelor's degree in Science. Gerald Lee Thompson of Bala will get his bachelor's degree in agricultural education.

The 24 candidates for master's degrees and 573 students scheduled to receive bachelor's degrees will be at Dr. William H. Cowley of Stanford University discuss American higher education in the commencement address.

The Rev. W. A. Welch, minister of Texas' largest Disciples of Christ congregation, will deliver the dedicatory sermon at 8 p. m., Sunday, May 27, in Jones Stadium.

In case of inclement weather the dedicatory sermon will be given in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium and the commencement will be switched to the Lubbock stadium.

50 Boys Appear At Little League's Trout School

Approximately 50 boys, who are new newcomers to the Little League program here or were in the minor leagues last year, were on hand Saturday morning to bid the one of the vacancies on the 4 new Little League teams.

The selection was the pre-season Little League school at which the four team managers and their assistant managers looked the situation over and rated the boys for the player draft which was held on Tuesday. Bula Coach Singled Out for Honor Of Coaching All Star Six Man Team

Coach Claude Morrison of Bala has accepted an invitation to be coach of the West All Star Six-man football team at the Coaching School which will also include the East-West game at Kerrville on Friday night, August 3rd.

E. A. Works, executive secretary of the Texas Six Man Football Coaches Association from Patton Springs, has notified Coach Claude Morrison of Bala that it has been the custom to offer the coaching school job to one of the three regional winners with an outstanding record.

The school runs from July 30 through 3rd.

Playing for Morrison on the West team will be two of his star performers for the past four years, Carl Wayne Halford and Gerald Noel. Said Morrison, "I couldn't have hope for a better time to coach an all-star team, having one of the best fullbacks I have ever had and one of my best quarterbacks to run my unbalanced line. If I can't win now, I probably never will."

Halford was the unanimous choice of the district committee to represent the district. He is a four-year letterman, having substituted as a back in his freshman year and having shown great promise as one of Bala's greatest potential athletes. In his sophomore year he was a regular end and won the honor of being the first sophomore known to have made an all-district team in six man ball.

He is credited that year with having been a major backbone in the growing Morrison defense and having intercepted the pass that broke the back of the Lazbuddie Long horns to give Bala a clean shot at their first district championship. Carl, running the 100 in 11 seconds flat in a football uniform, was one of the best pass receivers because of his ability to break fast and nab the pigskin on the run.

As a junior Halford was shifted to the fullback slot. There he has remained the past two years. His speed, determination and ability plus a tremendous love for the game have combined to give Bala an all-time great. His blocking ability has been a big boost. Studying the films of the games in which he has played, district coaches have spoken of Halford with great respect. He has been rated by many as the greatest all-around player Bala has ever produced.

Carl's stary is even more remarkable with the obstacle he has surmounted to become a star. During the beginning of his junior year he had the two inside fingers of his left hand snatched away in a gin accident and the two outside ones were mangled. However, he has returned to play football and baseball both the years, and basketball his senior year. He has been a regular in every sport.

Losing the fingers has no doubt had a great bearing upon Carl's plans for the future. He has declined an athletic scholarship at Texas Tech and will not play college football. On June 29th he will marry Ramona Motes, his classmate

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THE MYSTERY MAN

During the course of time that my articles on "Why I Left the Baptist Church" were being published, it was talked around town that I was mis-representing the Baptist. I emphatically deny that I mis-represented Baptist doctrine and practices in any way.

One Baptist Brother (as he prefers to call himself) has proceeded to tell us what "Baptist Believe." He could have saved his time and money, I was telling what the creed of the Baptist church teaches. Though I admitted that not all members of the Baptist church believe all of those things. It seems quite evident that the "brother" forgot to check with his "pastor" concerning the matter. He declared that Baptist are "without any written or binding creed." The word "creed" comes from the Latin "credo" and means "that which I (we) believe." I have in my library two copies of the Baptist Creed, containing the 18 articles of the Baptist Faith. They can be bought at nearly any religious book store for the small sum of one dollar.

In the afore-mentioned article, the gentleman who wrote it declared that "we accept John 3:16 and Eph. 2:8-9 at face value." I accept them at "face value," but their "face value" is not what Baptist teach concerning salvation. The face value of money depends on what is back of it, likewise the "face value" of a passage of scripture depends on taking into consideration the context and also what the Bible has said in other places on the same thought. John 3:16 declares that the person who believes on Christ "should not perish, but have eternal life," and John 1:12 declares that those who "believe" have the "power to become sons of God." This power, FAITH, is exercised in OBEDIENCE to the commands of the gospel: Repentance, Confession, and Baptism; at which time the individual becomes a child (son of God) and not before.

In Eph. 2:8-9, Paul, is reminding the Ephesians of how they had been saved and is not telling them what to do in order to become a Christian. The letter is addressed to the "saints at Ephesus" (Eph. 1:1). A careful study of the conversion of the Ephesians as revealed in Acts chapter 19 and the Ephesian letter reveals the following facts: (1) They "heard the Word of truth" - Eph. 1:13. Acts 19:1-5 tells when and who preached it. (2) They "also believed" - Eph. 1:13 (3) They repented - as is seen by their deeds in Acts 19:18-19. (4) They "confessed" - Acts 19:18 (5) They were "baptized into the name of the Lord Jesus" - Acts 19:5. Later when Paul wrote them in Ephesians 2:8-9 he said: "For by grace have you been (are you) saved through faith . . ."

I wonder why the gentleman is not so willing to accept the Word of Christ at "face value" when he said: "Go in to all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Why will he not accept at "face value" God's Word when it declares: "You see then how that by works a man is justified and not by faith only" (James 2:24).

The gentleman says "We regard baptism and the Lord's Supper as symbols and not in a conferring of saving grace." It does not make any difference how an individual (continued on page eight)
