'HUNG JURY' HERE ON RACING COUNT

Two Morton men, both oilfield workers, were under an extended bond of \$500 here today following a hung jury, Wednesday afternoon in their trial in Justice of the Peace Pet. One Court.

Charles Collum, both who have lived here only a short while and were charged with racing automobiles on the highway, (FTM 569) The case was tried at 2:30 p. m. in the District Courtroom with the State putting three witnesses on the stand.

However, none of the witnesses could positively identify the two men, though one described the cars and said he believed them to be the two men. He was acquitted with one.

Teen-agers Miraculously Alive After Close Call In Contact With High Line

Two children of the J. W. Ponds of near Lehman miraculously escaped serious injury and did not suffer serious burns when an aluminum pipe they were holding came in contact with a high tension line early Saturday morning.

A daughter was run over by an automobile a few years ago but recovered completely. The fact that the two were holding the pipe away from their bodies, and that aluminum is not a very good conductor of electricity was believed by Sheriff Hazel Hancock to have saved the lives of the two.

The children, Jerry, 17 years of age and Anna, 14, were helping their father irrigate land about 5 miles south of Morton early Saturday morning.

They noticed a rabbit run into the pipe and lifted the pipe to try to dislodge the rabbit. As the pipe hit the high tension line, Jerry was holding the pipe with both hands and Anna held the pipe with one hand and was reaching inside with the other. The force of the electric impact somehow jarred the two from the pipe and Anna then lost consciousness. Ponds, about a hundred yards away ran to their aid as the boy huddled and he and the boy loaded the girl into the pickup and rushed her to the Cochran County Hospital. He told the boy who thought his sister was dead, to keep working her arms & legs. Nearing the hospital she regained consciousness and was able to walk into the hospital under her own power.

MISCONCEPTIONS of The CHURCH of CHRIST

New Testament Christianity has always been misunderstood. Jesus Himself was often misunderstood (see Mat. 26:61), even by His own disciples (see John 7:24-25). The apostles were likewise misunderstood and the early church was "everywhere spoken against" (Rom. 8:8; Acts 28:22). Truth has always been misunderstood and misrepresented. Some of the misunderstandings are here honest and some have always been wilful and are premeditated (see Acts 28:26-27; 2 Pet. 3:5). That the early church completely apostatized is recognized by all Bible scholars. There were many efforts at reformation and then finally the RESTORATION movement had its beginning in the early part of the 19th century in the work of the Haldene brothers, Barton W. Stone, James O. Kelley, and others. These men did not seek to establish a new Denomination, nor were they REFORMERS. Their objective was to restore the DOCTRINE, LAWS, and FRUITS of New Testament Christianity, in which each local congregation of Christians was an independent and self-governing unit, under the law of Christ as revealed in the New Testament. They appealed to all disciples of Christ to forsake denominationalism and to unite on the basis of divine truth, that the prayer of our Lord; "Neither for these only do I pray, but for all them also that believe on Me through their word; that they may all be ONE: even as thou, Father art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be ONE in us: that the world may believe that Thou didst send Me" (John 17:20-21), might be answered. This is the plea of churches of Christ today. This plea has been misunderstood and misrepresented from the very beginning. Much of the misunderstanding has arisen out of prejudice. Others say we want unity also, but you people want us to give up all that we believe and practice and accept what you teach and practice. Friends, nothing could be farther from the truth than that statement. We ask people to believe, accept, and obey the scriptures as God has given them to us, worship Him as He has directed therein without any additions or subtractions. If we are doing that, then we are the church of the New Testament and if we are not then we ask you to clasp hands with us over an open Bible and show us what it teaches and we will practice and teach exactly that and nothing more. We say to you, don't give up anything that the Bible teaches, but "Prove all things, hold fast that which is good" (1 Thess. 5:21). WORDS FROM DFRs Wendell Dove and G. R. Spiller, both formerly at the local hospital, indicate the two men and their families are enjoying themselves in far different parts of the world.

SWITZERLAND, Germany and Holland was Dr. G. R. Spiller and his wife Josephine. G. R. is now a Captain in the service and is to be based at Beromunster, Germany in the near future. They told of the wonderful sights they had seen, the delightful and quaint things and the delicious food. Sounded like they were having a terrific time. They passed on their regards to a lot of local friends they had and somewhat longingly mentioned a fishing trip they'd like to make in the USA. Capt. Spiller has a year to go on his service hitch.

WENDELL and ALICE, are a lot closer. Since returning from South America they have located at Ft. Bayard, near Silver City, N. Mexico where he is a surgeon with the VA. They like the new location very well and invited local friends to come visit with them. They had planned to stay in the general vicinity of the southwest if they located a good deal and from what they write in their letter - they have.

THE TOORNADO the other night proved mighty interesting to about thirty or forty area policemen and telling how many other area folks, mostly because of the new use in the area of advance warning radar. The one Monday night was scouted southwest of Whiteface by Hockley County units; was followed by them and by a Cochran County unit until it wandered past Pettit; was there picked up by Lamb County units and traced until it broke up near Spade, about three hours after it had started. Fortunately it never hit the ground after being reported to have struck the ground before reaching Whiteface. But it

was the first time in recent years that we know of so many police units spotting the tornado, driving in under it and reporting back to a group of cities in its possible path, and in general - being as 'ready' for it - as is possible.

NOTWORTHY ... WAS THE FACT that only the Civil Defense unit from Littlefield was organized enough to be ready to spring into action in case of disaster. We've been hearing about the need for Civil Defense in cases of emergency or disaster, but how few of our cities actually have in effect a workable unit. Only in Littlefield did someone alert the National Defense units of the area & ask them to stand by for possible emergency service at Littlefield.

OR ITEMS ON serum this week one concerning humans, the other dogs. Dr. Brown reminds folks (see page one) that polo serum has arrived and is ready for giving of anti-polo shots now. Many have been turned down recently. The 'Doc' hopes to have enough on tap at the hospital for some 900 or so shots by the next few weeks and those wanting the shots should get to it immediately. The current thinking is that the shots should be administered after the season is underway (after one case has been reported in a locale).

ARE FOR THE dogs. It's time for anti rabies shots again, and, in the wake of a couple of dog bitings in the area, it's advisable to get that get "shot" now, before the shooting has to be done with a gun. Dr. Lindsey from Levelland will be in town June 9th - that's a Saturday - from 1 until 5 p.m. Get the family dog down there, get him shot and tagged. Give local law enforcement officers a chance to know the difference between inoculated pets, and roving stray dogs.

HAS DEVELOPED right under our noses but may be worked out before we even understood it was a problem. We've heard there are a lot of indignant persons around who say they have been forced to take to the ditches to escape from racing autos on our highways. The

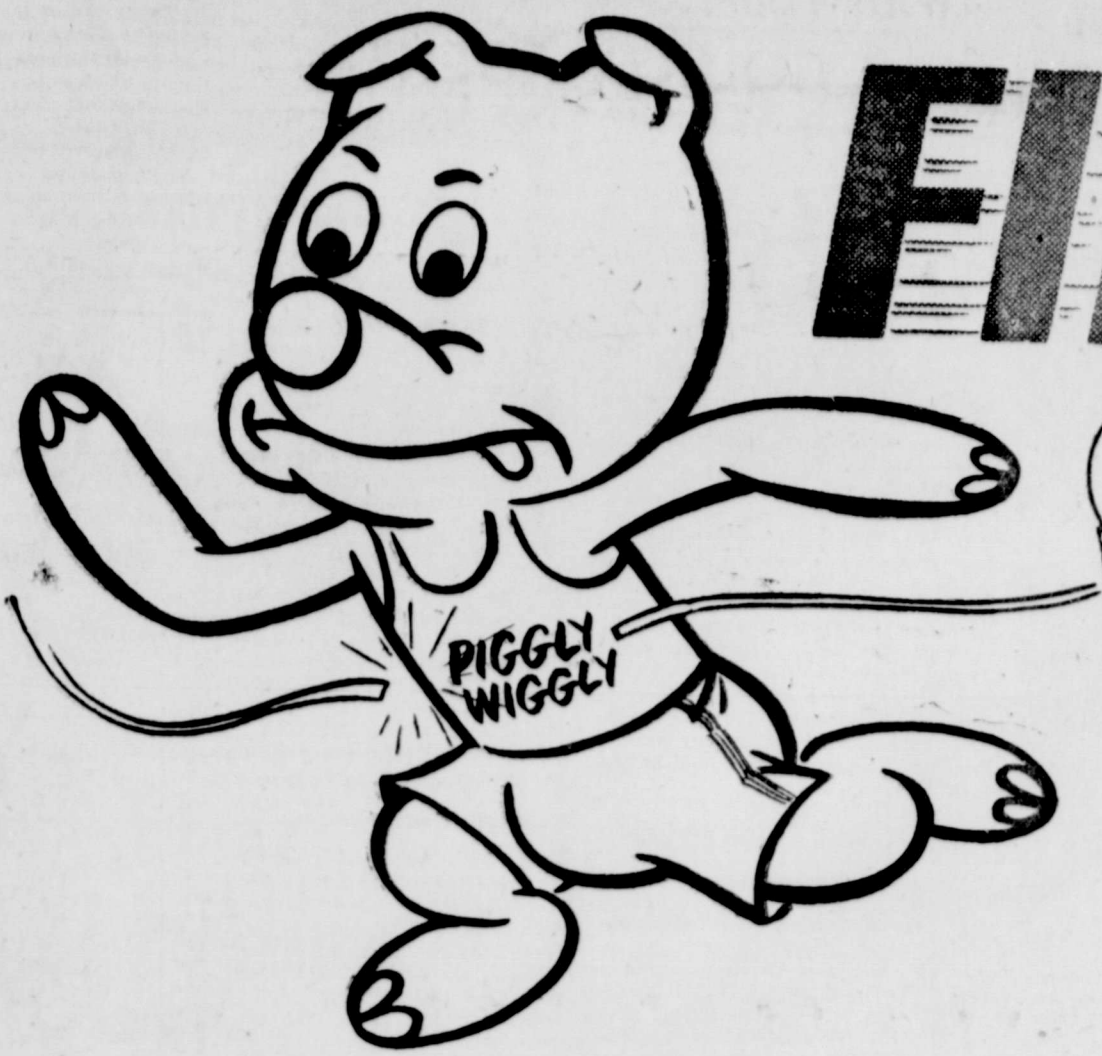

The 17th Annual meeting of the American Cotton Congress will be held in Lubbock, Texas, June 1st and 2nd in Lubbock. Very seldom do we have a meeting of national importance this close to Morton. All farmers and businessmen are interested in cotton so if you cannot attend the three day meeting, be sure to attend at least one day of the meeting. June 1 is the second day and probably will be of the most importance to farmers in this area.

The theme of this meeting is "Cotton's High Plains".

The first day meeting, May 31, will be at the Caprock Hotel. The second day meeting will be at the Lubbock Hotel. The meeting June 2, the last day of the meeting will be held at the Student Union Building, Texas Tech.

The Cotton Congress will deal with all phases of cotton through production to marketing and spending, including what's new in research.

COTTON BUREAU TESTS

Cotton burr tests at the Lubbock experiment station show that in the average of the three years of 1953, 1954, and 1955 no cotton burrs were more yield lint was 491; 2 tons per acre yield lint was 593; 4 tons per acre yield lint was 643; and 6 tons per acre yield lint was 717.

This meant an average per acre value of \$12.30 (2 tons); \$8.82 (4 tons); and \$8.30 (6 tons). The burr cost was \$3 per ton and the cotton was figured at 30c per pound. Total water in the three years, respectively was 16 inches; 18 inches and 3.0 inches.
