POLIO SERUM IS AVAILABLE DOCTOR ADVISES

Dr. Dan Brown, Cochran County Health officer said this week that 25 bottles of polio serum have just arrived and he hoped to have an additional 10 bottles in a day or so to treat anyone desiring the anti-polio shots.

Dr. Brown, at the Cochran County Hospital in Morton, said they ran out of the vaccine sometime ago and have had to turn a good many people down. He said curative thinking is that all who want shots should get them before the first case of the season is reported in the area. After the first case shows up, he added, its not advisable to administer any more anti-polio shots.

He said by the end of the next two weeks he hoped to have enough on hand to administer more than 900 shots and he urged that anyone desiring the shots make arrangements to have them as soon as possible. Thus far no cases have been reported for Morton but the "season" is fast approaching.

Jaycees Sponsor Veterinarians Visit To Inoculate Dogs

Dr. G. D. Lindsey, Levelland Veterinarian, will come to Morton on Saturday afternoon, June 9th, under the sponsorship of the Morton Jaycees, to vaccinate pet dogs against rabies.

The rabies protection program is an annual Morton Jaycee project. The price is \$2.50 per dog and the inoculation takes only a few seconds. Dr. Lindsey will be at the Morton Fire Station from 1 until 3 p.m.

Local law enforcement officers have soundly endorsed the program as needed. Each year about the time the city is swarmed by stray dogs. These, together with a host of many pet dogs that are allowed to run loose, cause a two fold nuisance. First of all, the strays may be rabid. In turn they may be the cause of the pet dogs being rabid. To ease the menace, officers are forced to conduct a liquidation campaign. Often times they can't kill the pets from the strays.

The inoculation can serve a two-fold purpose by protecting your dog against rabies, and by marking him as a pet — for stray dogs do not carry vaccination tags.

Morton Gets New Stop-light

A second signal light was being installed on the northeast corner of the square to handle the additional traffic created by the location of the Post Office just east, off the square.

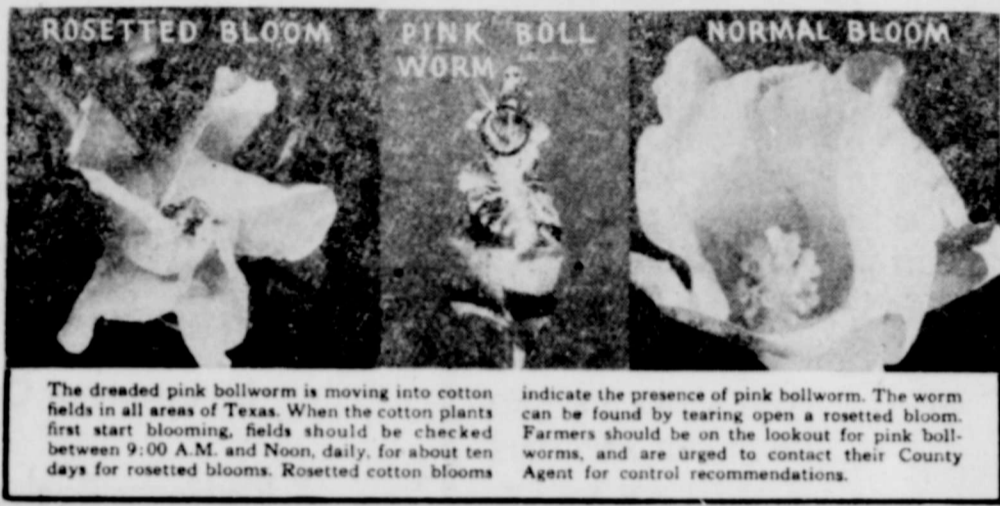

The dreaded pink bollworm is moving into cotton fields in all areas of Texas. When the cotton plants first start blooming, fields should be checked between 9:00 A.M. and Noon, daily, for about ten days for rosetted blooms. Rosetted cotton blooms indicate the presence of pink bollworm. The worm can be found by tearing open a rosetted bloom. Farmers should be on the lookout for pink bollworms, and are urged to contact their County Agent for control recommendations.

THE heaviest rains seemed to be in the southeast and south west and the lightest, in the northwets.

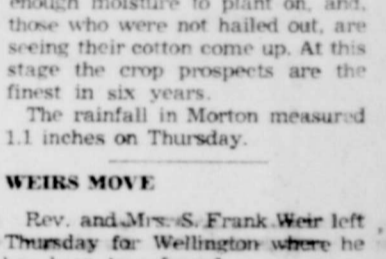
For her third time in this young season, hail was also reported. A few small pellets hit Morton, but the hail was hard enough to ruin a few cotton patches south of the city.

WASHINGTON AND 'SMALL BUSINESS'

There are some around Washington when asked "What do you think of American foreign policy?" reply with cynicism.

The reply: "No question about American foreign policy being foreign—as foreign to everything American as anything could be."

Deploable part of entire situation is that money needed for development and expansion of independent American business is being siphoned off via trade routes to engage C. W. Hager in all types of confused adventures, many appearing to be nothing more than attempt to pull British chestnuts out of fire.

For out of billions being poured out in foreign aid, some is being given Israel, some to Arab nations. Some is also given Pakistan and some to India. And it is quite interesting that communist as well as non communist nations share in this never ending flow of bounty.

Thus in two different areas of disagreements, State Dept. is taking stand with both sides due to situations stemming back to past British diplomacy, or perhaps better known as machinations.

In Middle East, England is in trouble with oil supply with which she has long attempted to create world monopoly. Whether or not this is with the connivance of several U. S. firms is now being investigated.

For years British also exercised monopoly in natural rubber and tin in her Malayan colonies. American development of synthetics and colonial drive for

independence is upsetting this apple cart.

British West Africa supplies major share of world's cocoa, Ceylon leads in tea, and Pakistan in jute. But in those areas, unrest leads away from British domination. The Empire is indeed in trouble.

It would be interesting to speculate what British position would be today if she had not doggedly tried to dominate world with monopolies and cartels.

Eventually, monopoly tactics lead to disaster. Abraham Lincoln once said, "You can fool part of the people all the time, all the people part of the time, but you can't fool all the people all the time."

However, based on record of past 24 years, it could probably be said you can fool U. S. State Dept. all the time.

For much of the foreign give-aways fall into a pattern seemingly designed to help British monopoly whenever and wherever it gets into trouble.

And as it by now well known, there is a move in Washington to remove from British monopoly anxiety from year to year over how much they can tap Uncle Sam for.

The plan is to set up a give-away program that would be saddled on U. S. taxpayers for a long period of years.

And thus is presented a most ironical spectacle of all time. Independent American business is handicapped in order to make it possible to bulwark, at least temporarily, the British system of cartel business. What Patrick Henry would have to say about this situation if he were around today.

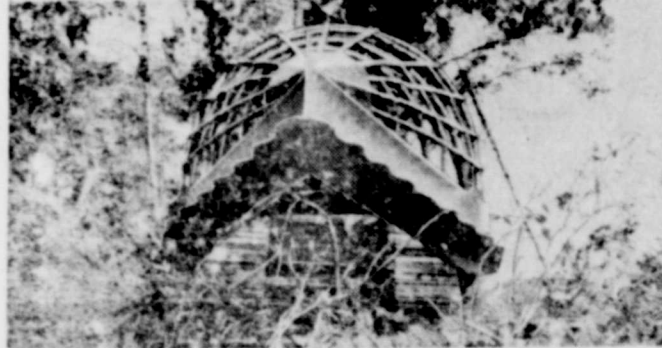



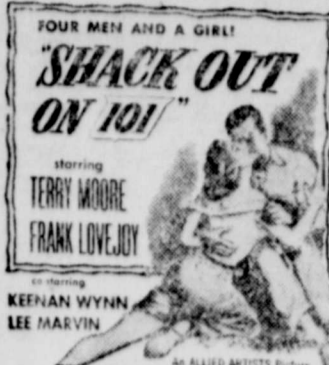

Wise to Check On Effectiveness Of Irrigation

Now that we are in the middle of the irrigation season, we should do a little checking to see what type of job we are doing. There are several things that could be done that might improve the efficiency of this irrigation.

After the free water has soaked into the soil, but the ground is still muddy, take a steel rod and push it down until it becomes hard to push. This will indicate the depth that has been wetted. After a check of the depth of irrigation up and down the row, it is easy to see the type of irrigation that is being applied.

Channels are, in most cases, the water has gone deeper at the ends of the row than in the middle. This will indicate that the length of the rows are too long. It could also mean the irrigation time is too long.

After checking the field by the probing method, it may be found the depth is not as much as it was thought to be. If this is the case, the water is being pushed across the land too fast. Then the necessary change for this situation is a longer set.

A better result can be obtained by waiting until the water has gone in as much as it will and dried on the surface of the soil, then by boring or digging holes along the rows to check the moisture content at different depths.

These conditions will vary with the different types of soil and the changes in grade of the rows. The local Soil Conservation District will be happy to work with you in any way they can.

It is much better to have one good irrigation than two light ones. There will be evaporation loss during each irrigation, of which there would be less evaporation in one operation than in two. The top part of the soil that will be dried out by the air will lose water only one time if the first irrigation is sufficient. This same amount of moisture will be lost again with each watering. This loss is about one half inch per irrigation which could amount to several acre inches of water loss per year.

For additional information and help in your irrigation, check with your Soil Conservation Service office.

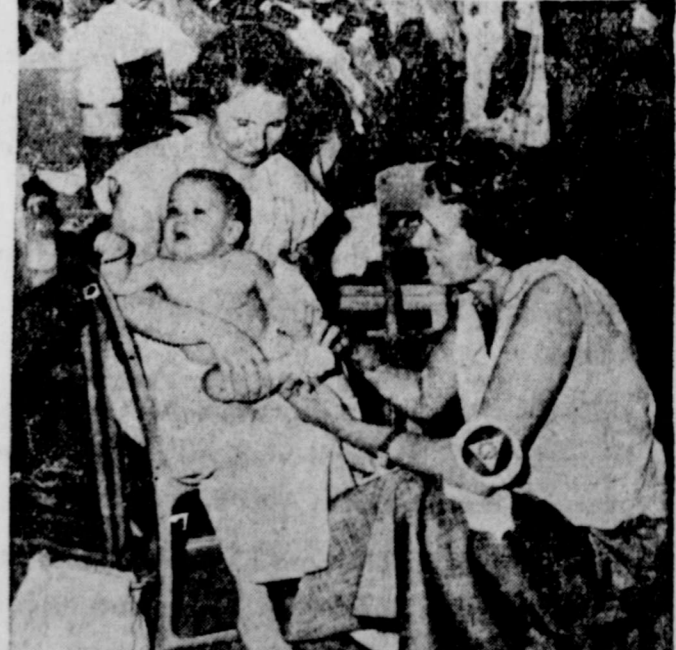

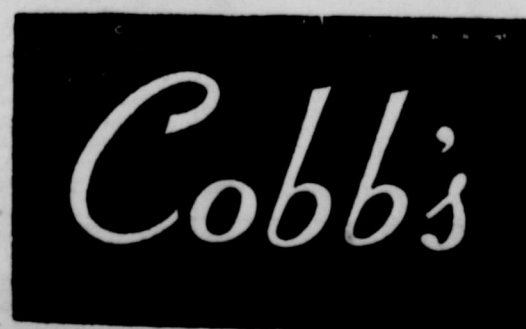
