## ROBT. RIDDLE, JR. IS DEATH VICTIM IN PUERTO RICO

Funeral services were held in Memphis, Tennessee, last Sunday, for an eight-year-old son of an air sergeant and wife, both former Mortons.

Robert W. Riddle, Jr., who was born in Morton, died in a swimming pool at Ramon Air Force Base in Puerto Rico, last Tuesday while on a class picnic.

Only a few details were available. The group had been on an afternoon outing, had gone to the dressing room to don their suits, and young Riddle had been one of the first in the pool. He could not swim but entered the shallow end of the pool & was found some minutes later on the bottom of the shallow end of the pool.

Funeral was in Memphis, where the boys father's parents and relatives.

Robert Jr. was the only child of Sgt. Sergeant and Mrs. R. W. Riddle, Sr. His father has been in the Air Force for about 12 years.

The family had been together in Puerto Rico for only a month or so. Mrs. Riddle and Bob Jr. joined the father who had been stationed there about four months.

The parents and the body of the boy were flown back to Memphis for the funeral. The father will be transferred to Spokane, Washington.

Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Riddle of Memphis and Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Mansfield of Lubbock.

Mrs. Riddle was the former Vera Mae Taylor who attended school at Morton. The couple moved from here about five years ago. M. D. Sims of this area is trustee of the victim.

## A. E. ROBISON, 71 DIES AT MAPLE

A long-time resident of Maple, 71-year-old Albert Eugene Robison was laid to rest Wednesday in the Tech Memorial Cemetery.

Robison, who had resided at Maple for 25-30 years, died at the West Plains Hospital at Muleshoe at 1:35 p.m. following a heart attack. He was a retired farmer.

Services were held at 2 p.m. on Wednesday at the Maple Baptist Church with Rev. W. H. Hughes, pastor of the church which Robison and his wife had founded, officiating and Rev. A. R. Coleman, assisting.

Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe was in charge.

Born in Little Rock, Ark., Robison later moved to Texas, settling in the Maple Community in 1925. He served as first deacon of the church and his wife helped get started. He was the only surviving charter member. Survivors include his wife, two daughters, Mrs. R. L. Self, Cleveland, Texas; Mrs. Helen Brinson, San Antonio; two stepsons, Harold Sanders, Aiken, S. Carolina; and Robert Sanders, of Muleshoe; two brothers, Sam of Fullerton, California; and Herman of Anaheim, California; four sisters, Mrs. Anna Held, Spokane, Washington; Mrs. Opal Hood, Montebello, Calif.; Mrs. Roxie Spear, Covina, California; and Mrs. J. L. McClung, Seagoville.

## THREE WAY SCHOOL ADDING NEW TEACHERAGES

The Three Way School is making a number of improvements. At the present time there are 4 new teacherages under construction, which should be completed by July 15. The two old houses used for teacherages have been moved to another location on the school grounds so that all new houses face the highway and are in line with the Sept. house built two years ago.

A new agriculture building, 30 x 25 feet will be built out of pumice blocks. It will be equipped with a classroom, bathroom, tool storage room and a shop. The new agriculture building will be built where the old one is. The old ag building has been sold and will be removed.

The gym, including the stage and all dressing rooms are being painted. This work is being done by Bill Gresham, school custodian and Garvin Bridges the school mechanic. The school gymnasium will be sealed. Sealing the gym and building the new ag building should be underway within 10 days. They should be complete by the time school opens next September. Inasmuch as the new teacherages are being built the school board plans to sell one of the barracks that have been used for teacherages.

## COULD BE POLIO

A 25 year old Spanish American woman may become Cochran County's first polio case of the 1956 season it was announced this week after she had been rushed to the Plainview Polio Clinic for treatment.

Believed to have polio was Stella Turin of Morton. She was sent to Plainview with polio symptoms by Dr. John Holder, Tuesday. A Singleton Funeral Home ambulance took her to Plainview.

Not only would she be the first Cochran County case but according to one of the staff doctors at the clinic she was the 1st patient brought in a long time. The physician, Dr. Hayes, praised to work of the polio vaccine.

As of Wednesday evening Dr. Holder had received no definite word from Plainview advising whether or not the case was diagnosed as polio.

## Preston Smith Is Lions' Sneaker

Preston Smith, candidate for State Senator from the 19th Congressional District was guest speaker at the Morton Lions Club meeting Wednesday and discussed the important role taxes must play in the support of government. Smith, in pointing out the fact that Texans are prone to brag about their size, said the state ranked well down the ladder in teachers pay, in the operation of a highway patrol to handle its huge traffic problem and in the average amount of money paid for old age benefits and public welfare.

Smith, who has spent three sessions in the state legislature, said we had good roads in Texas and attributed this to the fact that we have kept the highway department out of politics.

He told the group the state has only about half as many highway patrolmen as are considered the absolute minimum necessary by national traffic experts. He said low wages and insufficient retirement benefits are the main factors in keeping a qualified man from wanting to be highway patrolman.

Smith, in discussing the accident problem, blamed three factors for most of the accidents, the lack of knowledge of how to drive safely, the lack of driving skill and the poor attitude of drivers.

He said he had faith that the people will solve these problems in government but warned that they must be solved by an interested & aroused public — not by the legislators alone.

## SOME HAILED OUT

Rain accompanied by scattered but heavy amounts of hail has resulted in the destruction of a considerable amount of acreage of young cotton near Whiteface.

The rains last Thursday clipped some of the young cotton in the Port. Two areas as well as some of the farmers north and east of Morton. Then Monday afternoon a half inch rain in the same general area wiped out the crops of another three or four farmers at the least. Many of the farmers who did not lose their crop to hail had excessive moisture and were forced to replant. No tornadoes were reported this time.

The added weekend and early this week rains brought the early season total to the highest in a good many years. However, some of the dryland farmers got their first appreciable amount of rain and went to work almost immediately planting.

Hail also damaged some cotton southwest of Morton last Thursday but almost without exception, the southern part of the county got a good general soaking with little damage from hail.

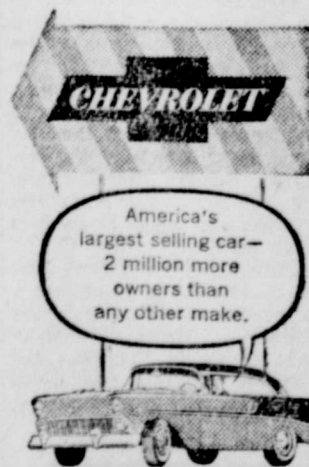

**HOT WEATHER — THREAT TO QUALITY OF EGGS**  
 When daytime temperatures hit 90 degrees, egg quality will hit the skids. Yes, egg producers must make some changes in management practices. Refrigeration is a must if high egg quality is to be maintained. 55 degree F. is the optimum temperature for maintaining proper egg environment. Two, eggs must be gathered more often during hot weather with gathering at three times a day, a minimum. Low quality is costly to producers selling on grade. Grade "A" eggs bring 4 to 6 cents a dozen more than "B" quality eggs of the same size.

Eggs can be properly cooled for as little as 10¢ a case advises Permit Schlamb, Extension Poultry Marketing Specialist. Eggs with good refrigeration, eggs should be delivered three times a week. Good cooling, means getting the animal heat out of the egg in the shortest possible time at the lowest cost. A cooling unit containing a tray for holding wire baskets with space underneath for storing eggs in cases is the most desirable cooling equipment.

initial treatments were applied soon after the cotton had reached the fruiting stage. These insecticides when needed should be applied at weekly intervals. Treated cotton set fruit earlier and showed less growth than plants in untreated plots. The increased number of forms set by plants in treated plots shed fruit extensively when insecticide applications were followed by too early or delayed irrigation, Owens says. The 1956 Cotton Insect Guide is now available in the County Agents office, advises the County Agent.

Ben Wormell, Extension Poultry Husbandman, says such topics as the random sample tests, what Texas Breiter records show, poultry situation and outlook, feeding programs, breeding for efficient use of feed and egg production, feeding and rearing methods for laying replacements, egg legislation and turkey selection problems will be discussed. Out of state speakers will be S. J. Marsden, head of the USDA, Beltsville Experiment Station and Dr. George Jaap from the poultry science department of Ohio State university.

Diseases and parasites along with control measures and suggestions for aiding in setting up a sanitation program for the farm will get top consideration on the 3rd days program. **FLY CONTROL.** Declare war on flies — as warm weather begins in earnest. Experimentation with various insecticides began in 1953. Results indicated residual sprays to be most satisfactory while diazinon, malathion, and chlordane were the most effective materials used. The insecticides used as wettable powders and emulsions at specific concentrations. Malathion emulsifiable concentrate diluted to 5 percent gave protection for 87 days. Diazinon was used only where sanitation was poor, and where there were numerous nearby fly breeding areas. These sprays do much better where good sanitation practices are carried out.

**CONTROL OF THIRPS AND FLEAHOPPERS**  
 Control of these two pests increased the production of cotton. The early season for cotton insect control is now on — the next three weeks is the critical period for thrips and fleahoppers. Much trouble can be avoided from fleahopper if the farmer will spray the weeds around the field in the hot ditches and irrigation ditches. If done now perhaps good control can be had before they move into the cotton fields. Fleas to prove it — show this. Control of thrips and fleahoppers resulted in gains of 310 lbs to 602 lbs of seed cotton per acre in the high plains area in Texas in 1955. Average cross value of the increased yields was \$70.44 an acre says W. L. Owens, Jr., Associate Entomologist, Texas A and M College.

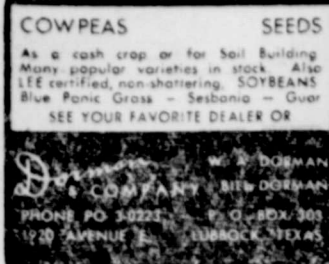

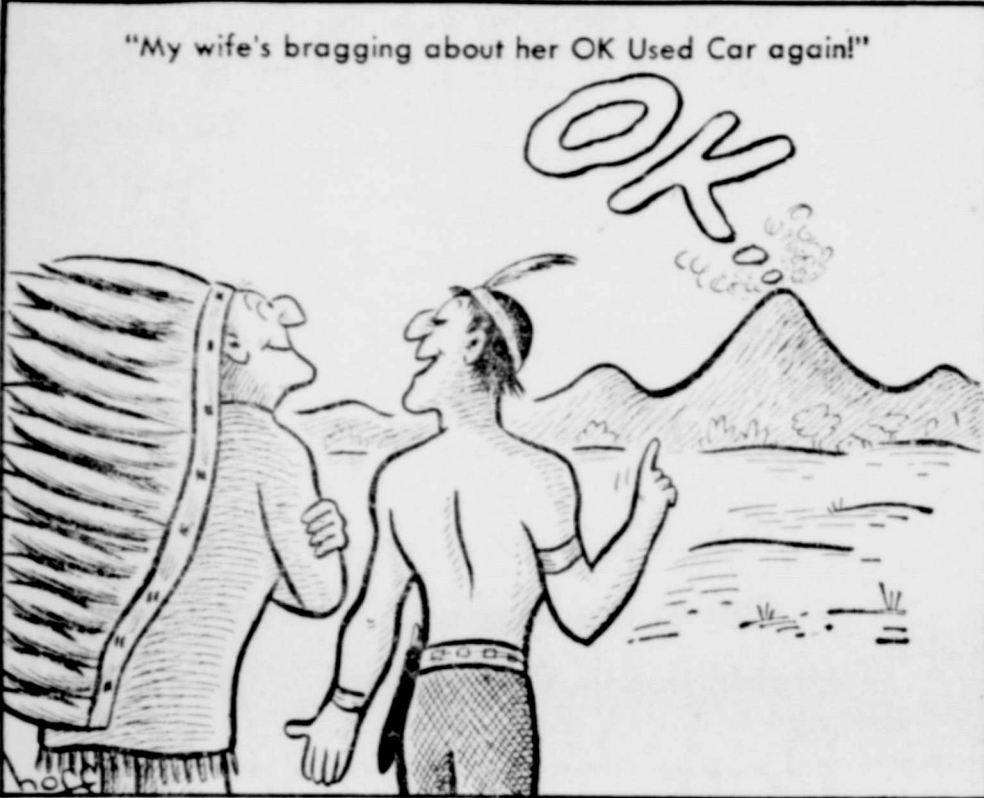
INSECTICIDES FOR THE GARDEN SHELF

Spring brings a variety of hungry insects out of hiding. It's time to stock the garden shelf with ammunition to protect flowers, shrubs, grass and trees from damage. There is no one miracle insecticide. You will need at least four different packages on the shelf. Include DDT, chlordane, poison bait and malathion.

Malathion spray or dust will kill aphids, lace bugs and spider mites. Use a spray for white flies and yellow scale in the crawling stage. A 10 percent chlordane dust will kill cut worms, leaf-eating caterpillars, sowbugs, termites, fleahoppers, grass hoppers, cedar bag worms and many kinds of beetles. It is our best control for ants.

A 10 percent DDT dust will control thrips, blister beetles and other beetles, army worms and many other worms. It also kills some of the insects mentioned above such as lace bugs, pill bugs, sow bugs and termites.

To get best results from insecticides, read directions on the package carefully and follow them as given. Also, check for safety precautions in use. Some insecticides are very deadly.

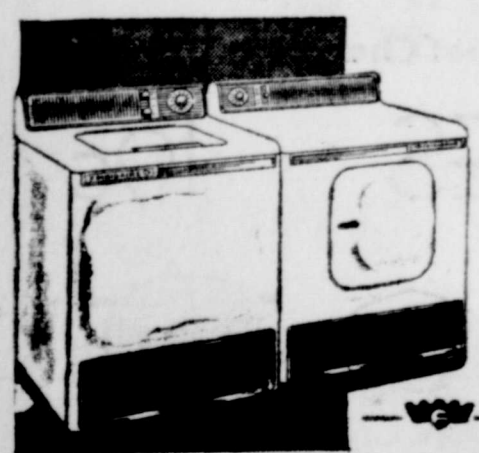

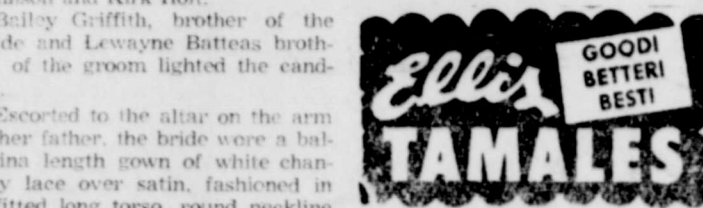

WELL SIR the hot rodding has really started somewhat of a controversy now. But the solution just isn't as simple as building a drag strip.

JUST AS WITH any other problem there are those who want to do the right thing; and there are those who want to take advantage of a situation. Theories by the hundreds have been advanced to bar men from endangering the lives of others with 'souped up' cars or vehicles of any kind.

the old jail sentence . . .

PROBABLY will do as much as any one thing to stop it. But lets not put the cart before the horse. You and I may not like fast driving, but others may, and do. Isn't going to be any law passed to put governments on motors; now are the auto going to be made slower. The public, by and large, demands a lot of speed. And they're going to get it. So the problem isn't one of stopping fast driving. It's one of controlling it so selfish persons who think only of themselves and their rights won't endanger others who also have the right to live. We are not altogether opposed to a drag strip. We were raised within shouting distance from the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. We had the fever just like the rest of the crowd, but we tired after a few years of meeting the dawn of Memorial Day with a list of favorites and facing the sunset that night knowing one of two things that would race no more

call it . . .

SENTIMENTALITY, or whatever else you want to, we got sick of it after a few years. One by one they got killed. They men that the school kids of Indianapolis learned to idolize. There was Jimmy Snyder, Babe Stapp, Rex Mayes, and dozens of others before the recent fatalities like Bill Vukobich. These men had families, most of them

left at an early age, widows and children. Some were philosophic and some were bitter. But whatever the attitude it didn't bring the racer back to life. What would the baseball fans think if everyday a game was played one of the boys wasn't likely to ever take the field again. A lot of the fans would get fed up with it.

we aren't interested . . .

IN RACING. But others are, and have a right to be, so long as that INTEREST DOESN'T INFRINGE ON ANOTHER'S RIGHT. The real question is, just what will be the result of a county, or a Jaycee, or any other group sponsored drag strip? Will it tend to take the hot-rod racers off the road? Or will it tend to tempt hundreds of others into building their already fast autos into death traps capable of racing on highways and drag strips? As we see it, building a drag strip may provide needed entertainment; may provide some mechanics with some business altering motors; may provide profit for a sponsoring club; may even be the cause of teaching some young drivers to drive better; may shock a few into safe driving; may do a lot of other things — all good. But, on the other side of the fence, it won't cut down one drop of the racing on highways; could and probably will increase it by simply causing lots of others to revamp their cars into speed models; may kill a few people; may prove not a profit maker at all, but loss in investment; may cause a suit or two; and could do countless other things that aren't good.

these, then are . . .

TWO SIDES TO a problem. We don't pretend to know which is the best. We have an opinion, but others have and are entitled to theirs, only, please . . .

LET'S NOT confuse the issue by claiming the building of a drag strip will do a lot of things that it can't do — because they are contrary to human nature. Vote for or

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## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Consumers hold key to continued expansion or collapse of American system. What they do in encouraging private enterprise should decide future.

That is opinion expressed by Ernest Gaunt, former New England textile manufacturer now residing at 16333 Peo Avenue, Orlando, Florida, in his latest booklet, "Consumerism and Independent Small Business."



In this, his newest study of present American economic trends, Mr. Gaunt finds too many consumers accepting situation as long as their desire for goods and services is met, yet little aware that their ability to purchase them depends on maintaining a system of independent enterprise.

But he also points out that with merger after merger being compelled by tax laws, other forces, more control of production is being combined in fewer hands. Under normal conditions consumers would already be feeling the pinch.

So far, however, he believes the consumer is kept from realizing the economic stresses by inflationary measures which are creating illusion of prosperity.

Apparently, he does not hold this viewpoint alone, because governmental forces are reportedly working behind scenes. As it nears time when Monopoly Labor and Monopoly Steel negotiate a new contract, there is evidence of great activity.

Obviously, steel is a keystone of the economy. During past few labor-steel negotiations, there

has been little, if any, attempt to arrive at a settlement in keeping with the economy.

Seemingly, Monopoly Steel, presented with Monopoly Labor's demands early in the morning, fought them bitterly until sometime between lunch and dinner before giving in, but not so late that Monopoly Steel could not announce a price increase before breakfast next morning.

So now Sinclair Weeks, Commerce Secretary, is reportedly trying to persuade Monopoly Steel to fight Monopoly Labor demands at least a little bit, and when it does give in, not to advance steel prices too sharply.

On the other side of the fence Labor Secretary James Mitchell is reported to be trying to talk Monopoly Labor into some restraint in the matter of wage demands at this time.

This being election year, it is not desired that another boost in steel prices increase prices on everything from washing machines to automobiles.

But it is interesting to note in this year of 1956 even Cabinet officers get in hand to Monopoly Steel and Monopoly Labor asking boys not to rock the boat.

Even in high level Washington, there is concern over reactions of 160,000,000 consumers.

The nationwide activity on behalf of small business is having an affect in many directions.

For it appears, as Mr. Gaunt points out, that consumers are slowly becoming aware of the danger to them in unrestrained big interests.

While consumers can bargain with small business, who is big enough to bargain with Monopoly Business or Monopoly Labor?

against it. Take an interest in the issue, or let others worry about it. But when the safety of others is involved, such as in racing on the highways, your duty as a citizen is to protect the rights of others by cooperating with law enforcement to stop it. They can't stop it without your help.

NEWSPAPER BUSINESS are reminded constantly of the fact that we have a duty to expose wrong doings, but no right to hurt innocent persons in doing so. We try not to. We are, as the Bible points out, our brother's keeper. We owe to everyone the same respect and rights we demand.

if the majority of . . .

FOLKS THINK A DRAG STRIP will solve some of our problems, we would support it, and try to use it for the promotion of safety in auto driving. Perhaps it could be done.

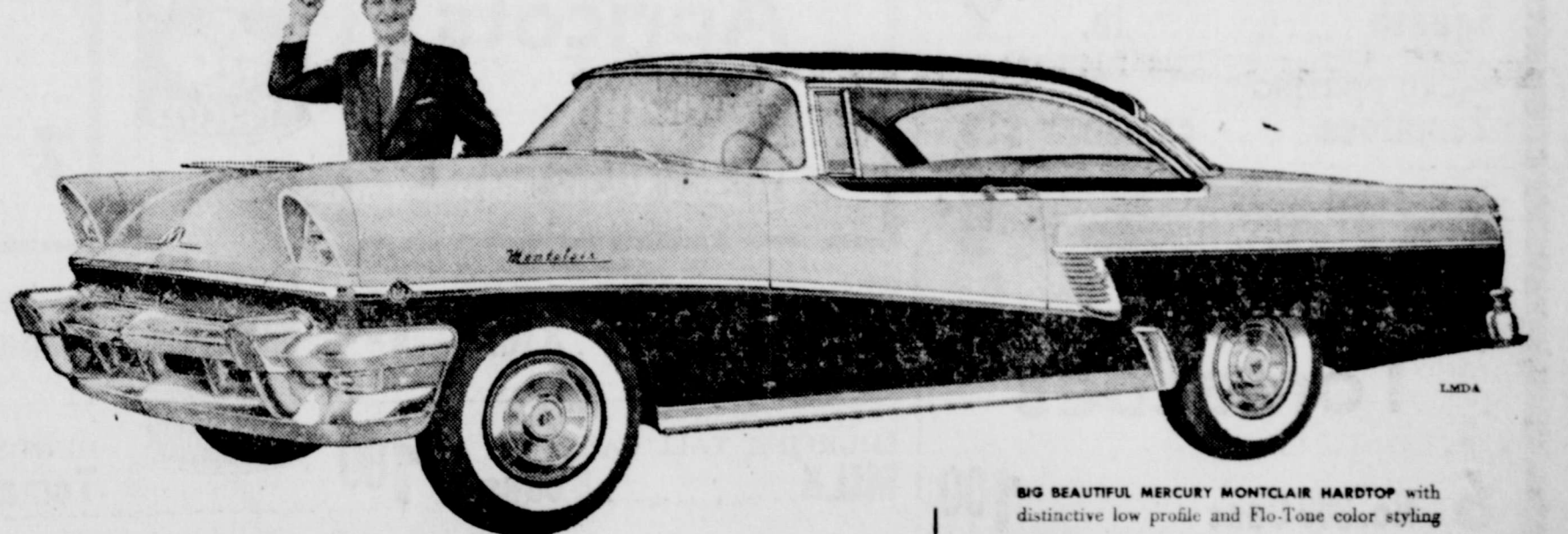
