With the reduction of teams, the season consists of only six one-day teams, a home and away schedule with each of the three opponents.

Morton's next game will be played at Lamesa on June 24th. They return home to face Abilene on July 1st.

INSECT DAMAGE GETTING HEAVIER COUNTY AGENT WARNS FARMERS

Thrips are here in damaging numbers, County Agent Homer Thompson has warned this week. The worst infestation in years is in the making, he says. Bar ditches where the weeds are located are loaded with thrips. Some fleahoppers are there, too. Look on careless weed, thistle, white weeds — better still, just pull off the purple bloom of white weed and note the many straw-colored insects crawling. These are thrips. If you don't see them, look for the small white insects which are concentrated, you will have to fight them after they get in the cotton. When the weeds get a little dry, the movement to cotton is fast.

If you cannot see the small insect, the agent warns, you can see the damage he does. Note when the newest unfolding leaves show only a slight brownish tinge on the edges, with no silencing on the underside, thrips are present in light numbers. If when the newest leaves show considerable brown along the edges and some silencing is evident on the underside of most leaves and thrips can be seen readily, you have a medium infestation.

Soil Bank Rules Are Explained

A bulletin released Wednesday by the local ASC office has given the following information on the Soil Bank program: "Under the 1956 Acreage Reserve, farmers who are eligible to take part in the program may earn payments in connection with one or more of the specified commodities — wheat, cotton, peanuts, rice and corn by reducing their acreage of the crop below the farm's allotment. Under the rules of eligibility acreage designated for the Acreage Reserve must: (1) Be representative of the land used for the crop; (2) result in the harvesting of an increase of the basic crop less than the farm allotment; and (3) not be cropped, cut for hay, or cropped for the entire 1956 calendar year. Noxious weeds must also be controlled on the reserved acreage. In order to participate in the acreage reserve, a farmer must comply with all acreage allotments established for the farm. The special provisions of the 1956 program will be explained in an article next week.

Fire Damages House On The Gandy Farm

A fire which badly damaged the roof of a farm home east of town just missed being because of seriously injuring a fireman. The fire, which burned the roof of a house inhabited by a Spanish American family on the Gandy farm across from Willard Cox, was the first run made by the local boys in the new truck. It was controlled rather easily, considering the fact that the blaze was in the portion between the ceiling and the roof. Firemen had to stand on the roof to fight the blaze and the power of the water in the hose threw Volunteer Fred Morrison off balance and he plunged 10 feet to the ground but was luckily not injured.

Local Cemetery Has New Look

The Morton Memorial Cemetery has a new look this week with the completion of the brick entranceway. Yet to be finished is the filling of planter boxes, the planting of shrubbery, the graveling of the parking and driving surface and the paving of the entranceway off the highway. Also being completed, as fast as volunteer labor is found is reseeded areas in some of the old cemetery area in bermuda grass.

Benham replied reminding him that the delay has so far helped a lot of the smaller farmers in that the Department of Labor has not pressed the farmers for payment and they may be able to hold off until they make another crop, thus alleviating the hardship.

Experts Give Tips On Menu Planning

Economy, nutrition and suitability to the typical American family are the three points on which the American Kitchens Menu Planning Award winners were judged recently at the Mrs. America finals in Florida. All agreed that a hearty breakfast is necessary for good health, and that variety of foods is important for balance and for keeping appetites keen. To solve the "what-to-serve" problem, Mrs. Cleo Maletis, "Mrs. America of 1957," suggests setting up a basic menu pattern for each meal, then fitting different foods into the pattern for variety. Mrs. Maletis plans carefully to make sure all basic foods appear in each day's meal. Variety in color, flavor and texture are stressed for perfection in meal planning by Mrs. Ruth Shapiro of Tennessee. Mrs. Gloria Ruth of Ohio believes in balancing meals, not only for nutrition, but dish for dish, as well. For example, she teams a rich pork entrée with a light dessert—or serves hot soup for an appetizer when the main dish is a cold salad. The winning menus follow the established rules of the accepted basic foods for keeping family health above par and maintaining variety in everyday meals.

Amyx, manager and co-owner of Silvers Butane Co., had lived in Morton most of the past 25 years, except for a few years he lived in Indiana. Pall bearers were Tommy Lynch, M. A. 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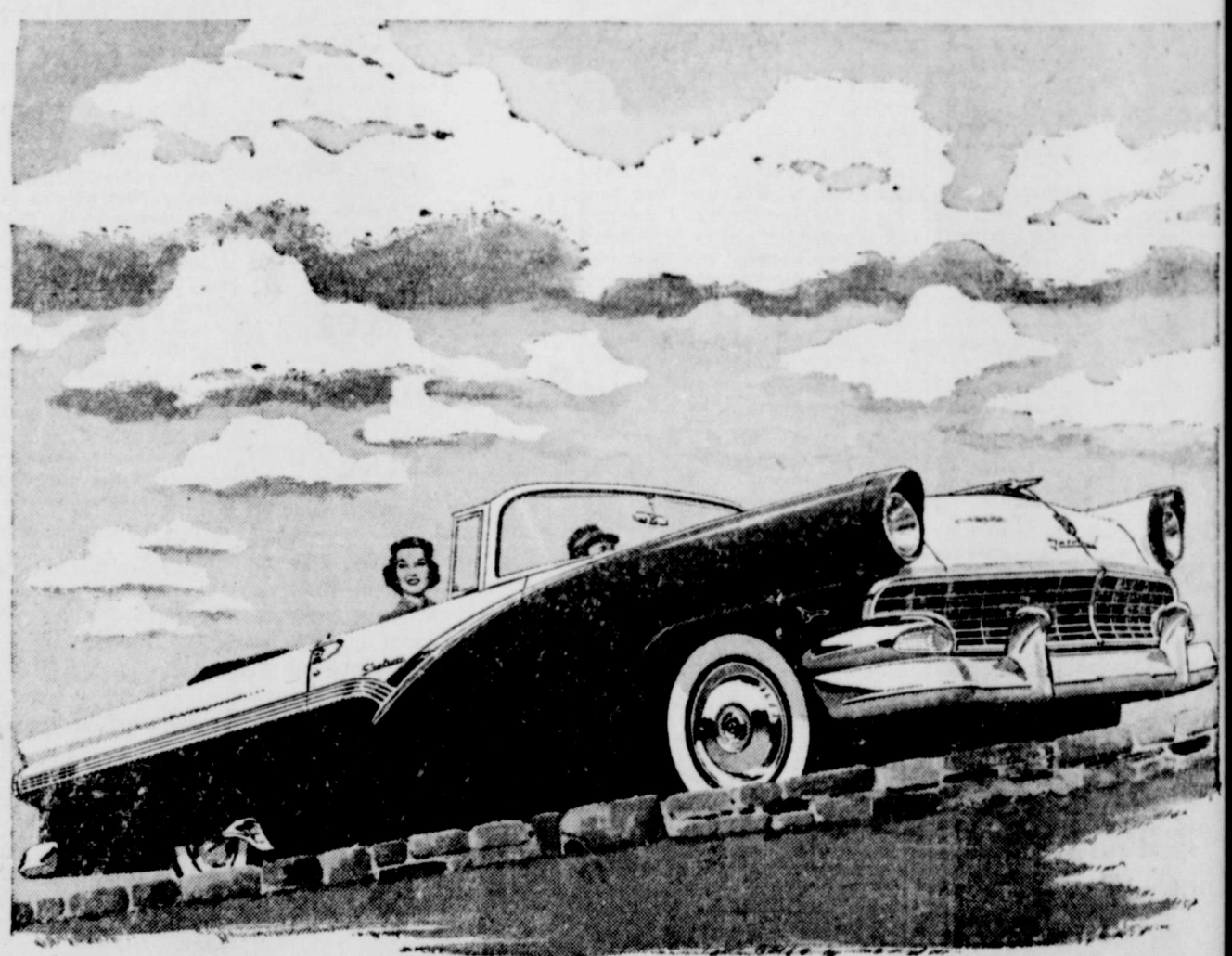

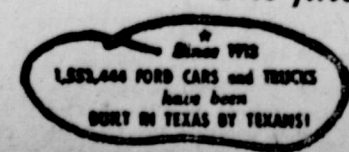

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Civil Defense Has Key Role in Peace

Natural disasters can strike anytime, anywhere. From pioneer days to the present, neighbors have always helped each other in times of distress. But often the power of a great hurricane, flood or tornado completely outmatched the valiant but disorganized effort of untrained volunteers.

TODAY THE UNITED STATES has a form of disaster insurance—civil defense. Like any other insurance, it doesn't guarantee that disaster won't occur.

But by executive order, the Federal Civil Defense Administration does have the responsibility for coordinating all disaster relief efforts of the Federal Government under Public Law 875. This guarantees that the resources of the entire nation can be marshalled against nature on the rampage as required. It's a job which requires the skills of many specialists, such as the Army Corps of Engineers, the National Guard and the American Red Cross. Trained civil defense workers in the general disaster area put their rescue, traffic control, first aid and other skills to practical use.

Red's chickens—caged layers—arrived last Thursday and in the space of about six hours the birds had been put into the newly constructed cages and had been started on a strict daily routine of feeding that is expected to produce approximately 362,500 eggs this year.

But the caged layer story is a

long one longer than we have the space or time for this week. After a trip around the newest birdhouse we hope to publish the complete story next week, complete with a few pictures. Until then, if you hurry, Red might take you through the building. After the layers begin to produce he won't want a group of folks continually tromping through, because it will upset the routine considered so very important. But the layers aren't expected to produce for another week or so. The caged layer program is far more interesting when witnessed than in just reading about it.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Congressional passage of the so-called bank holding company bill is claimed by many to have averted a possible national financial disaster.

In fact, some claim situation could have faced country far more serious than crisis that existed when President Andrew Jackson scattered the Bank of the United States which was a private banking monopoly chartered by the Federal government.



Leaders in drive for this new law included Sen. Homer Capehart (R., Ind.), Sen. Paul Douglas (D., Ill.), Rep. Brent Spence (D., Ky.), and Rep. Abraham Multer (D., N. Y.).

During long fight for this reform measure, nation's independent businessmen, polled through National Federation of Independent Business, overwhelmingly favored passage of law; consistently supported the movement.

Reduced to non-technical essentials, new law first provides any firm that holds 25% or more interest in two or more banks is a bank-holding company.

Therefore, they have two years to divest themselves of their interests in non-banking companies. In addition law now makes them subject, as any bank, to Federal Reserve Board regulations. This in turn will make it necessary for them to secure FRB approval before buying any additional banks. Also, law is designed to prohibit them from buying up banks in states where laws prohibit such transactions. Certain technical exceptions were provided for.

Thus, there has been ph...

up a loophole, which if left unplugged, could have resulted in all banking resources being tied up in hands of a few, or possibly even one, huge bank holding corporation.

Banks, as repositories of public's money, are closely controlled in their operations by law. In addition, government guarantees their depositors against certain losses, thus regulation is necessary.

Therefore, banks should be independent elements of the economy, and not tied directly to the fortunes of other commercial enterprises. Banking law has long recognized this principle.

However, the emergence of bank-holding companies avoided this principle. These concerns could, in effect, have their cake and eat it too. By ownership of control in banks, they were in the banking business. But by not being bound by bank laws, they could roam at will through nation's economic fields, engaging in commercial enterprises that suited their fancy with their control of banking assets a mighty handy thing to have indeed.

Neither was there any limit to the banks and their assets they could take over.

Thus, though not widespread, there was surely emerging, through bank-holding companies, the greatest concentrations of economic power the world has ever known. Because in the final analysis, money is a commodity, with the difference that with money the commodity, goes the power of money.

No Congress has acted to stop a trend toward a money monopoly which in time would have been a power monopoly. This act may go down in history as one of the most important measures ever enacted in the long history of mankind's struggle for economic independence.

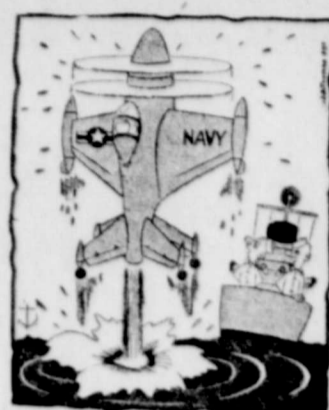

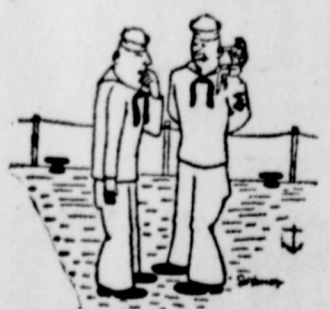

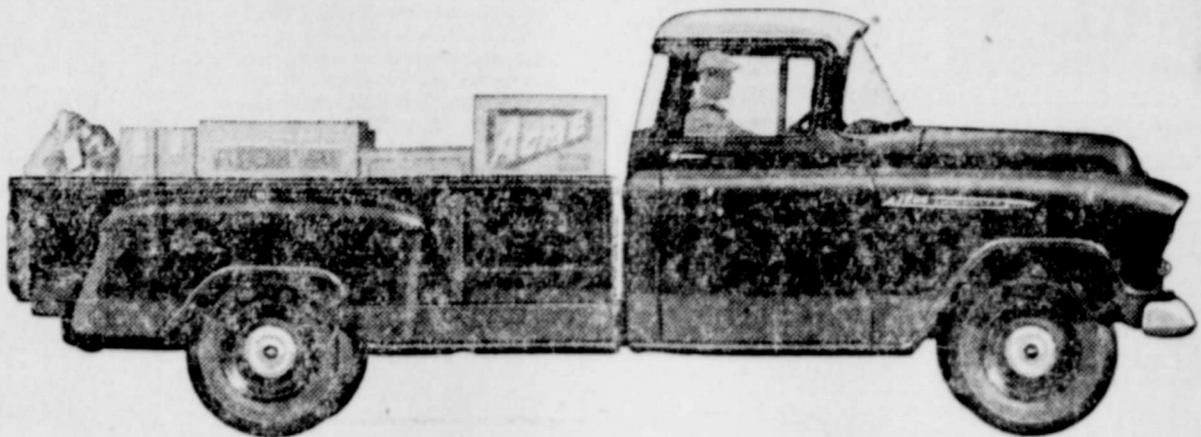
WHEAT HARVEST UNDERWAY

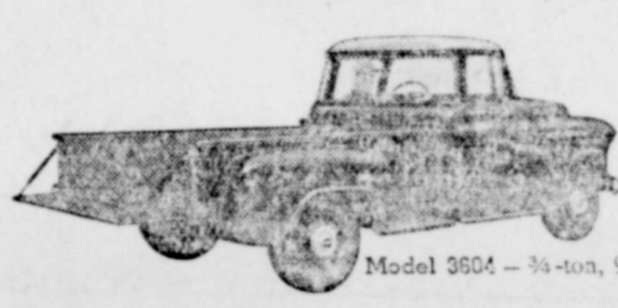

Misconceptions Concerning The Church of Christ

Objection: "You do not believe in the work of the Holy Spirit."

Answer: I believe that the Holy Spirit came on the day of Pentecost, and is to abide with the church throughout the Christian age. I believe that the Holy Spirit according to the promise of Jesus, convicts men of sin, righteousness and judgement to come (Jno. 16:7-12). Be it far from me to attempt to place limitations on the Holy Spirit. It is not a question of power, but a question of method. The Holy Spirit is not the cause of confusion, but is orderly in His methods and operations. He does not inspire one man to "preach up" an "ism," (such as Methodism, Presbyterianism, Lutherism, Catholicism, etc.) and another to "preach it down." There is no scriptural evidence that the Holy Spirit ever operated upon the heart of the alien sinner in any other way than through the written or spoken Word. In the conversion of the Ethiopian, the Spirit sent the preacher to the sinner, instead of going to the sinner directly, (Acts 8:29). The same is true in the case of Peter and Cornelius. (Acts 10:19-20).

The Gospel is THE power of God unto salvation, not simply A power, nor ONE of THE powers, (Rom. 1:16). It is the power of God, because the Spirit is in it. The Gospel is the sword of the Spirit, not because the Spirit wields it, but because the Spirit REVEALED it, (Eph. 6:17). (Here the Ephesian Christians are exhorted to wield this spiritual sword.) If the Holy Spirit operates independent of the Word in the conversion of the sinner, why has not the entire heathen world been converted? The Spirit of God is in the Word of God, (Jno. 6:36) to such an extent that what is done by the One is said to be done by the Other; and there is no scriptural evidence that the Spirit operates in the conversion of a sinner in any other way than through the Word of God (1 Cor. 1:21).

Thus we suggest that it is not a question of the Holy Spirit working, but the METHOD employed by the Holy Spirit in His working.

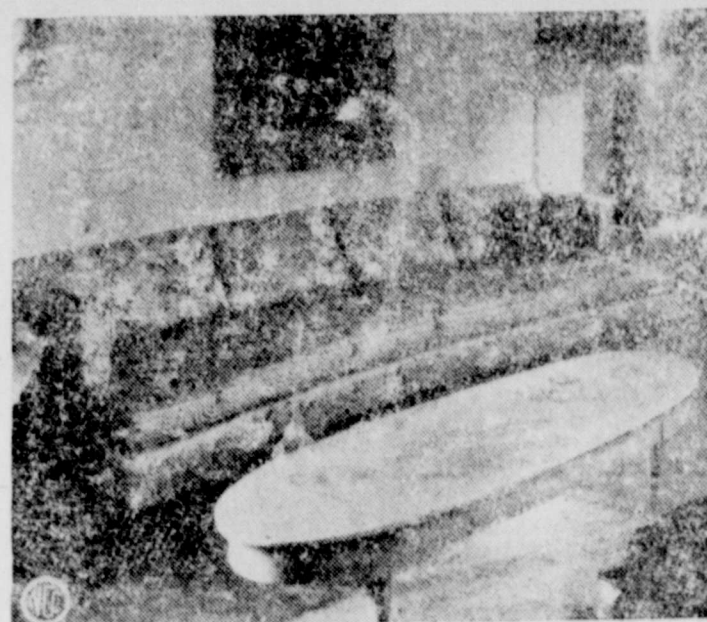

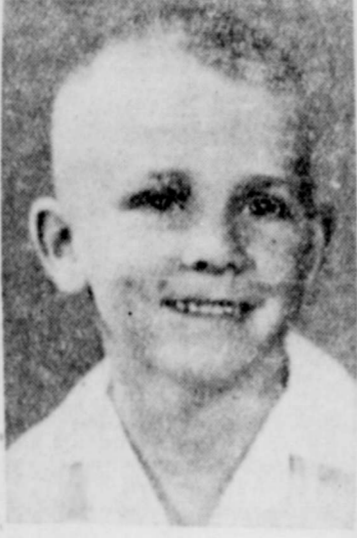
