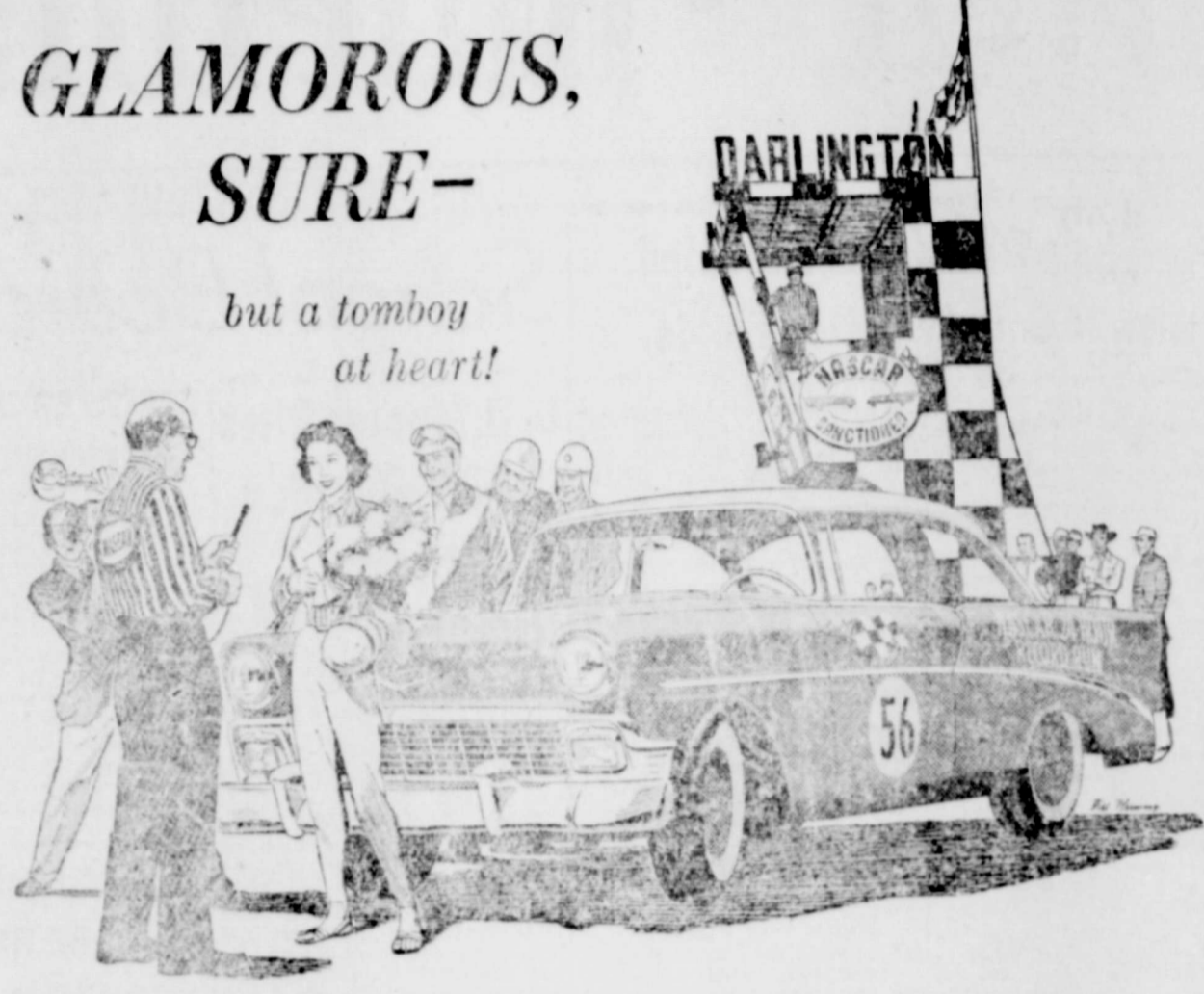

ASC OFFICE GIVES INFORMATION ON COTTON MEASURING PLANS

The following article on cotton measuring was released last week by the ASC office.

Cotton measuring in Cochran County was started on June 13. After the cotton is measured in the field the acreage will be figured in the office and producers will be notified of the measured acreage as soon as possible. If you should have more acreage than the allotment, you will have 20 days to plow up the excess acreage.

When the recorder comes to your farm to measure your cotton, you should do the following things:

1. Go to the field with the recorder and show him each plot of cotton and each plot within the cotton field where there is no cotton.
2. Assist in making the necessary measurements to get the cotton properly shown on the aerial photograph.
3. When the work is completed, examine the work to see that each plot of cotton is shown and that each furrow or deduction is shown.
4. If you planted an acreage in cotton that has been destroyed and planted to some other crop, be sure to show this plot to the recorder and help him measure this acreage, as it may help your cotton history for future years.

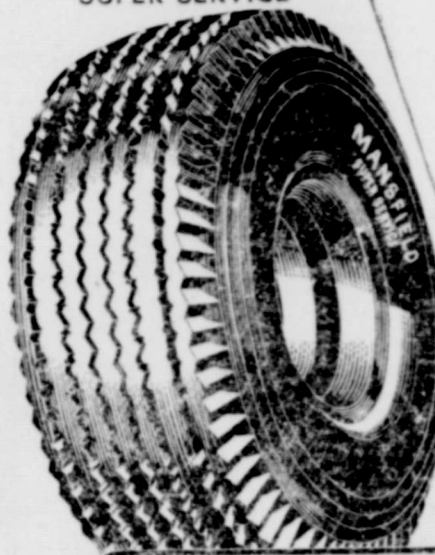

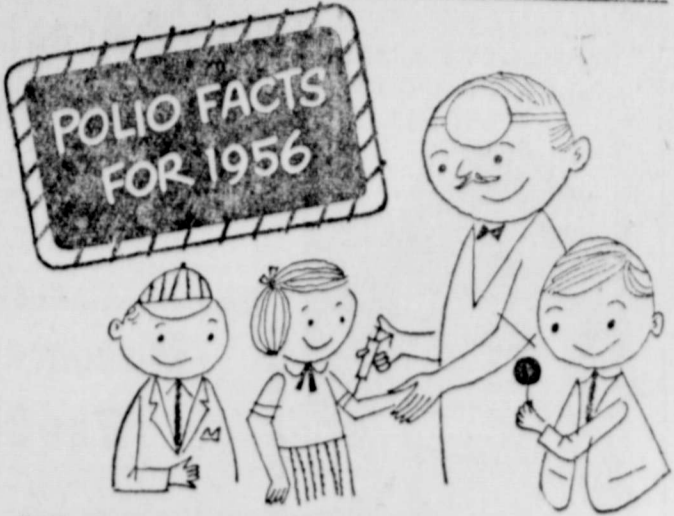

More Grasses And Legumes Being Planted

More grasses and summer legumes are being planted for soil improving and cash crops.

Tim Tanner, one mile west of the Star Route Grocery has planted 100 acres of New Era Peas interplanted with grain sorghum. C. T. Sullivan, one mile Southeast of Morton has planted approximately 50 acres of New Era peas with grain sorghum.

The ASC has a program set up for partial payment on establishing summer legumes for protection from erosion. Anyone interested may contact the Soil Conservation office or the ASC office for details.

All legume seed should be inoculated with fresh inoculate. Those that are drawing ASC payment on Summer Legumes must have the seed planted not later than July 1, 1956. Those who have planted grasses this spring, are urged to keep constant check on the moisture condition. Several checks were made by the local SCS personnel and some plantings were found to be needing water. Most all grasses will need frequent irrigation until they are well established.

Misconceptions Concerning The Church of Christ

Objection: "You do not place enough emphasis on repentance."
 Answer: I give the same place and importance to repentance as did Jesus and the apostles. Jesus said: "I tell you nay, except you repent you shall all likewise perish" (Luke 13:3). On the day of Pentecost as recorded in Acts 2:38 (when the first gospel sermon was preached in fact and fact) Peter said: "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." The apostle Paul declared: "The times of this ignorance God winked at; (overlooked) but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent." (Acts 17:30)
 Be it noted that sorrow for sin is NOT REPENTANCE, but is the cause of repentance. Crying, praying, lamenting and the like are not in any sense, repentance. You may shed many tears and feel the lashings of conscience because of wrongdoings, and not repent. It should always be remembered that there are two kinds of sorrow; sorrow of the world and Godly sorrow and neither are repentance. The sorrow of Judas when he said, "I have sinned in that I have shed innocent blood" (Mat. 27:4) was sorrow of the world. Worldly sorrow worketh death, but "Godly sorrow worketh repentance." (2 Cor. 7:10) Worldly sorrow leaves one morbid, bitter, miserable and with a goal of conscience but gives no peace and promises no alleviation.
 Repentance is actually a turning and with reference to eternal life is a TURNING FROM SIN. This is clearly seen in Mat. 12:41; Jonah 3:8 and Acts 26:18. Note the following example of repentance as taught by the Master: "A man had two sons; and he came to the first and said, 'Son, go work today in the vineyard.' And he answered and said, 'I will not; but afterward he repented himself and went'" (Mat. 21:28-29). Note what happened:

- (1) The son declined to work in the vineyard; "I will not."
 - (2) His mental attitude was in opposition to the "will of his father"
 - (3) Before going to work in the vineyard, his attitude had to change.
 - (4) Jesus said: "He REPENTED and went" (that is, he changed his will from being opposed to the father's will, to being in harmony to the father's will).
 - (5) He did not go till he repented.
 - (6) He did not go till he changed his will.
- Thus it is plain to see that repentance is a change of will, and results, always, in a changed life. It is absolutely essential to conversion.
