John Markham wins 1st in Morton's 1st Invitational Tourney

John Markham, one of Lubbock's finest golfers, better golfers for several years, set new course records at the Morton Country Club on Friday of last week, bettering the best score of 65 by a stroke. He then went on to win the Morton's 1st Invitational Golf Tourney, which was the 1st Annual Morton's Invitational Golf Tourney. Markham lost medalist honors to Russ Haberer of Muleshoe, Thursday as Haberer won in a 69, but Markham played the better golf in the championship by six strokes with a blistering 65, having a 1-up over E. L. Willis; dropping Haberer in the semi-finals by 21 count and then beating Babe Dan of Morton, 4-3 in the finals. Markham, son of C. B. Markham of Morton, was the odds on favorite of the field. Al Allison, Lovell, went 20 holes to beat Button

Silvers for the championship consolation honors. Other winners in flights were Wayne Mantooth over Tom McAlister, 4-3, in the 1st flight; Neal Rose in the consolation; John Barnes over A. S. Stovall in the 2nd flight, 2-up and Ruel Kelly consolation winner; and Sam Damon over LeRoy Scott, 1-up and in the consolation, Jim Middleton.

Check With SCS Before Plowing Up Stand of Grass

Grass seedlings have moved steadily forward since the middle of May. Some fields are up to an excellent stand, others are just fair, a few show a poor stand.

Should you be one that feels the stand will not justify leaving, we ask you to please contact one of our Soil Conservation Service personnel before completely giving up on the project as lost. In most all instances you will find that nature did not cause all of the planted seed to germinate at the same time; consequently there will be a few plants up, there will be some seed sprouted and at the same time dry seed lying dormant waiting to see if the plant that did get its head out can survive the trials of erosion above the surface of the soil.

As to what constitutes a good stand of grass, should plants be found from 8 inches to 18 inches apart, this is a good stand. We consider that bunch grasses will expand from a seedling one thirty seconds of an inch in diameter to 8 to 12 inches within a period of one year, thus closing an 18 inch gap almost entirely.

Grasses give excellent wind erosion protection, condition the soil, are used for grazing, will keep soil temperature on a more even keel, will hold rainfall a longer period of time, thus allowing more and deeper penetration as well as giving a catch crop from seed and providing additional humus.

Your Cochran Soil Conservation District has on hand approximately 100 lbs of weeping love grass.

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Report from ... YOUR COUNTY AGENT

Friday afternoon, June 22, a county-wide hindweed control demonstration was held in Cochran County on the H. E. Goodman farm, 5 miles north of Morton, Texas on Highway 214. About 30 interested farmers and club boys attended the demonstration.

Delbert Wood and Grass Control Service Co. from Plainview, Texas actually demonstrated the application of CMV on hindweed. It was a fine demonstration and the CMV material was applied in the hindweed and out into the cotton field. The weeds prevented that the hindweed and field not be disturbed to also it is a chance to kill the hindweed. Mr. Goodman said he would surely use this material and I will represent the State Hindweed Dept. will represent the County Agent. This CMV material cost about \$1.00 per gallon. A solid acre treated with this material requires about 60 gallons. An acre can see it in your possession, not to count the investment in machinery to apply it. Even a square inch must be covered to obtain the results desired. The weeds of this material could be applied without the proper equipment.

The area where the demonstration was held is staked off and a sign will be erected to identify the area. Passers are urged to stop and observe it and learn to identify the hindweed on sight. If you observe the patches of it on your premises please notify the county agent and it will be placed on our map so we may know where these spots are. Remember the hindweed will spread fast and nothing will produce where it grows. Let's stamp it out before it gets started and ruins our productive land. Too, the cost to eradicate it will be small when discovered early enough, but to wait may make the cost prohibitive.

Demonstration On Rindweed Control Held Friday

In a demonstration and talk before some 20 persons north of town Friday afternoon, Fred Doherty of Plainview guaranteed he can kill the dreaded deep rooted bindweed.

Doherty and crew came here to explain their method of application and to show what they propose to do. They conducted the short demonstration at a patch of bindweed on the Horace Goodman farm about 5 miles north of Morton.

The cost is expensive, but one treatment will do the job, they guarantee. Anyone seeking more definite information on the subject should contact County Agent Homer Thompson.

The formula used by the Company that calls themselves, Doherty Weed Killers, is a DuPont Product called Herbicide. According to the representatives, it goes straight in to the soil and eventually gets to the roots where it kills the plant. The killer is non-toxic, will not affect the water or wash off, and will not harm animals. They recommend water used on top after it has set, to help push it into the soil faster. They ask the user to allow two years for the killing agent to do its work.

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Misconceptions Concerning The Church of Christ

OBJECTION: You don't believe in heartfelt religion.

ANSWER: I surely do! A change of heart is absolutely essential to conversion. However, a change of heart is not some mysterious emotion, but an intelligent process that goes along with hearing, understanding, believing, and obeying the gospel message.

The heart of the Bible is not the fleshly love in the church that people often pat over and talk of a change, as is seen from the following passage. "And on this manner of Absalom to all Israel that came to the king for judgment, so Absalom stole the hearts of the men of Israel" (1 Sam. 15:6). The heart of man as referred to in the Bible is composed of three things as can be seen from the following things-

1. Man thinks, understands and reasons with his heart. (Mat. 9:4; 5:8; 15:19; Prov. 23:7; Gen. 6:5; Mat. 13:15).

2. Man believes with his heart. (Rom. 10:10). However the faculty of man that does the above is known as the INTELLECT of man.

3. Man purposes, determines, and obeys with his heart. (1 Cor. 7:37; 2 Cor. 9:7; Rom. 6:17-18). The faculty which man performs these things is known as the WILL of man.

4. Man loves, rejoices, fears, trusts, with the heart. (Mat. 22:37; Psa. 33:21; Deut. 28:67). The faculty which man performs these things is known as his EMOTION.

According to the Bible the heart of man is thus composed of his intellect, will, and emotions. Thus when a person hears the gospel message, his thinking or intellect is changed, his will is changed in his determination to obey the Lord's commands. Upon the completion of his obedience to the commands of the gospel he rejoices that he is now a child of God, and he takes pleasure in living a life of faithful obedience to Christ. He has turned from love and practice of sin. Thus in a sane and sensible manner, man has a change of heart.
