

SOIL BANK PROGRAM FOR

FARMERS IN COUNTY

EXPLAINED AT MEETING Friday June 22, about 100 farmers and interested businessmen attended the morning meeting to hear the Soil Bank program explain-

The County and Community Committee met Tuesday, June 26, in the ASC office to review the status of each farm by communities. There are five communities in Cochran County. Each community has three regular committeemen and two alternates besides the three county committeemen. The program was explained by the County Agent, ASC Committeemen, and Mrs Ruth McGee, manager of the ASC

The big problem among the farms grouped by yields not to e ceed the county average of 152 nd farms, dry land farms, irrigated farms and young irrigated fa rms had all these factors consid-

ered in finding a weighted aver age by respective groupings to come within the normal 5 year as erage allocated to the county satisfaction about the poor 5 year normal yield average given Cochran County by the State ASC Committee, Cochran County did not get what the actual yield made in in the 5 year average, because of the formula applied at the State office. The formula states that for any year in the 5 year base per iod that the lint yield per acre of cotton is less than 75 percent of the 5 year average, that year will be thrown out and the yield shall 5 year average. It further states that for any year that the yield per acre is over 125 percent of the year normal average that the yield will be reduced to 125 percent of the 5-year normal average. This last gadget is the one that hurt Cochran County the most. Due to the fact that the formula factor was applied, has left Cochran Co-

vield was concerned. The State Statistician had our five year normal average figured at 180 lbs per acre; so the formula supplied reduced the yield per acre average 28 pounds or to 152 pounds or the yield established bby the State ASC Committee for

At he meeting with him it was discovered that the Bureau of Census sted only 12 gins operating in the 1954-55 season, when, as a matter of fact there were 13 gins operaing. 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
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
