in some cases

IT IS SOMEWHAT of a qualification that a person has lived all of their life in a certain county. In no case do we know does the fact they were born in any particular county qualifies them for a job. That is, assuming of course, that a voter is voting on qualifications, and not on popularity, sympathy, or personal friendship with one or more of a candidates relatives. In all cases, we think the candidate should get up and say what their business experiences, their educational experiences, and any other pertinent experiences have been in reference to the particular office.

that doesn't mean

IF A PERSON has never served in the Treasurer's office, and another has that the latter would be more qualified. But it does mean the people have a right to weigh all things pertinent. We certainly think a treasurer should know a thing or two about money, something of keeping records, etc. We think it helps if a Sheriff candidate is well acquainted with the area in which he will serve; or if an Assessor - Collector Candidate is somewhat acquainted with values of property in general, brick homes as against frame homes, dryland, as against irrigated, etc. But each of us sets our own terms that qualify a man or woman for office.
