INSECT ON CUCUMBERS

Five cucumbers, cantaloupes and watermelons may be controlled by using 4 per cent malathion, or 3 per cent lindane, or 3 per cent malathion, or 1 per cent parathion. Squash bugs may be controlled by using 3 per cent lindane or 2 per cent malathion or 20 per cent sabal. Insect control should be started when plants are small. It is practically impossible to kill full grown insects with anything less than a hammer.

Agent Finds Insect Damage Still Light Here

The first three weeks of July, County Agent Homer Thompson visited 171 cotton fields checking insect damage. He drove 1132 miles in this same period. The agent has had many requests for cotton field checks for insects made by the farmers. The Agent has not been able to get to all the farmers who have made requests, but 90 percent of the requests have been complied with.

The insect situation has not been serious since early thrips damage began. Fourteen fields have light fleahopper damage. Six fields showed heavy damage on older cotton. Especially where recently irrigated and where very few older squares had developed. Bollworms are appearing in nearly all fields but had not reached even the light damage stage. Only 6 fields checked for boll worm were in the light damage stage, that is, four to six small boll worms per 100 cotton stalks and here treatment was recommended.

The most serious damage observed generally in all fields was bacterial blight. There is no practical control for this disease except plant cotton varieties which are highly tolerant to this disease.

Most fields show about 5 to 10 percent damage. Only one field showed as much as 20 percent damage.

Haley Seen To Be Gaining Strength

John A. Haley, rancher from Kermit was in Morton Saturday morning campaigning for his uncle, J. Everett Haley of Canyon, a candidate for Governor.

Haley said that his uncle had been labeled as a mixer candidate at the start of the race, but that due to support he was gaining in East Texas, he was now considered to have a good chance to make the runoff.

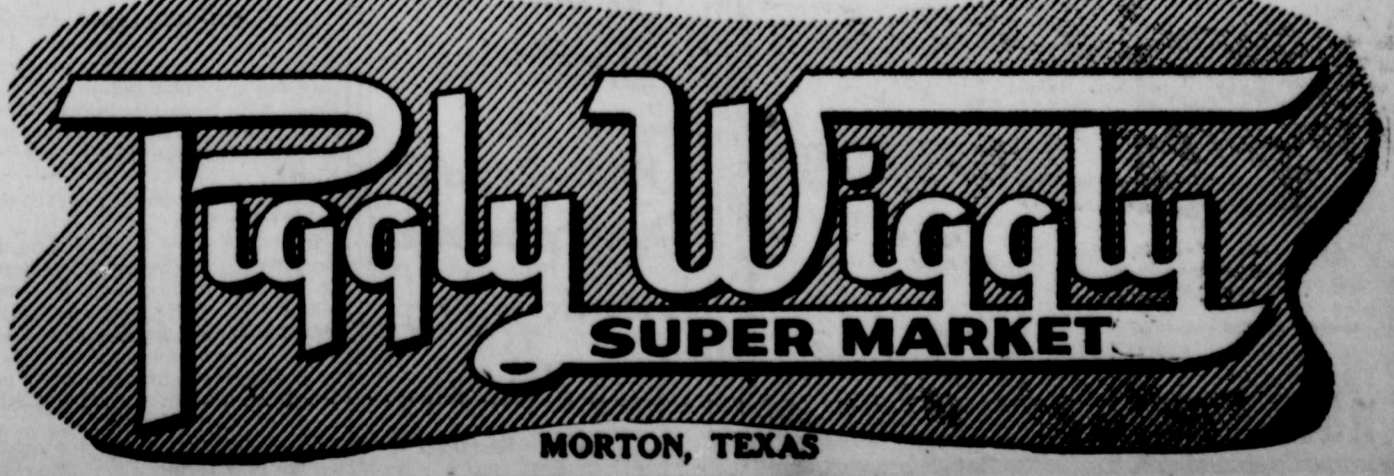

New Tax Forms Are Available at Int. Revenue Office

Increased taxes are levied on the floor stocks of the following items on hand as of last July 1st: gasoline; tires of the type used on highway vehicles; truck, bus and tractor chassis and bodies, and tractors. A new tax of three cents per pound was imposed on tread rubber. An instruction sheet accompanies the new forms.

must have a private income. He said he had that income and would not be the paid representative of any lobbying group. He touched on the insurance scandal pointing out it was a natural and dangerous thing that some Senators had accepted retainer fees to help augment their incomes. Referring to the recent intimation that he was seeking Republican backing, Smith told the group he welcomed the backing of all honest people but had never voted anything but the Democratic ticket. He said he felt anyone had the right to vote as they pleased, and should not be dictated to by a party.

Carroll Cobb spoke next and he gave an eloquent address dwelling mostly on freedom of rights and the need for cleaner government. He said he was the independent candidate in the race but debunked the theory that you have to have other income to be a capable and honest Senator. He said the salary of \$25 per day was ample to live on during the legislative sessions.

Cobb called for tighter laws to punish those who violate their oath of office and the people's trust. He said he was a candidate in the race on his own and called for a Veteran's land program to continue but to be cleaned up. He referred to the insurance scandal with the thought that with only a total of 240 insurance companies

in the United States, 1,300 are in Texas. He said it was too easy to start an insurance company in the state of Texas.

Corbin said he does not represent big business, or a chain of stores, in a slap at Smith. He said his family was his big business. He said he had been the constant opponent of the Shiver's administration and that he was willing to be counted on his record of office. He said he had been vilified and castigated by the Avalanche Journal, but said he was willing to take that for the cause. He said the Journal represented a small clique of men trying to handpick the men who will run the State of Texas. He said the fight was bigger than his candidacy, it was a fight of the people.

Corbin said he had fought any kind of a sales tax, had been very instrumental in delaying the give-away bus bill and had supported farm legislation and necessary tax bills. He said he wants no Republican vote now, or in November.

R. L. Bowers and J. O. Gillham stayed mostly with their own qualifications. Gillham emphasizing he believed his experience was the important issue.

James Moore, candidate for District Attorney told of his experience as Assistant District Attorney and Gillerson, who spoke a little later, after arriving late, emphasized his all around experience as top ranking law student, as an FBI worker, as a civic worker and as County Attorney. Moore made a reference to the fact that the people didn't want a man who had been too closely associated with Federal agencies. He harped on the usual mismanagement of Federal agencies.
