Rains which fell in the county in the past week, some Saturday night, some Sunday, and some early Monday morning, could not be called general but did deposit from a half inch to an inch and a half of moisture in sections in the west, south, and southeast part of the county.

A strip of land southeast was reported to have received 6 and as the rain went west the fall was heavier. East of Morton, from a point near Neely Ward to the State Line the rainfall varied from an inch to one and a half inches. Still further north, near Stearns, Goodland, and that area heavier rain was reported to have fallen, much of it in "dry-land" farming area.

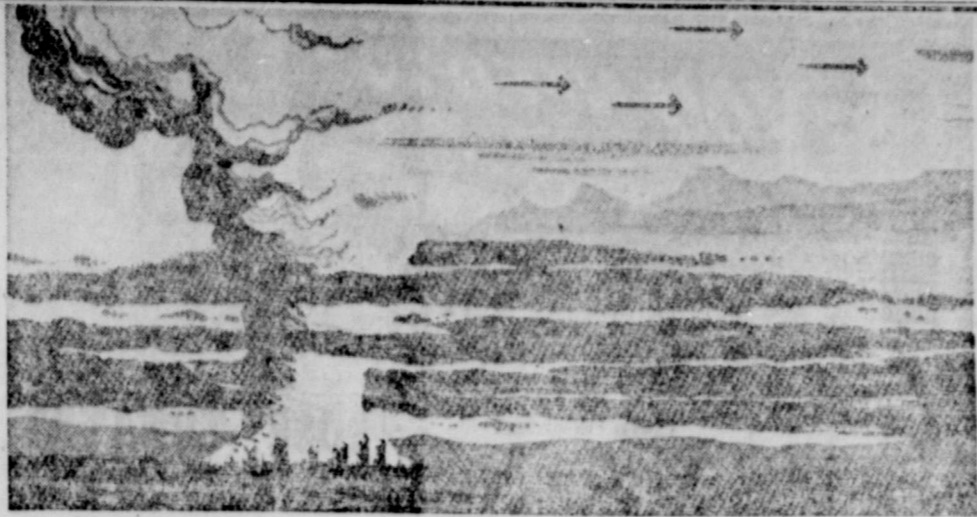

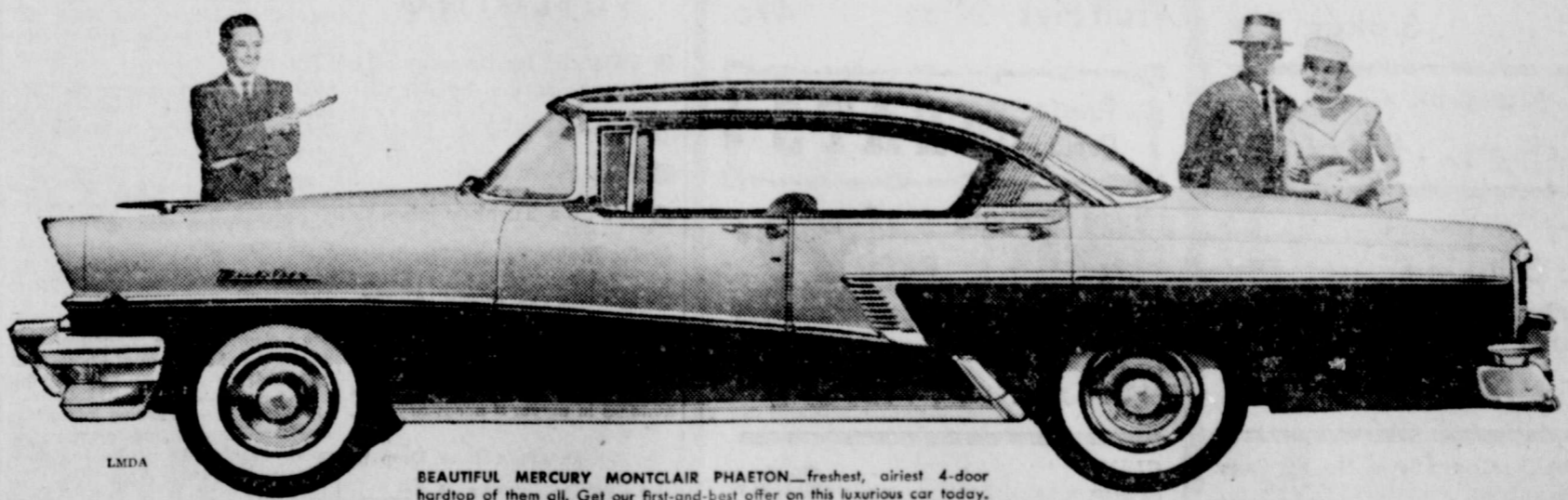
