COTTON SEED

Many farmers are requesting the County Agent for the source of supply of Blightmaster Cottonseed for next year's planting. According to Don Jones, Superintendent of the Experiment Station, there is no cotton 100 per cent resistant to Blight disease, but Blightmaster cotton has perhaps the highest tolerance. Gregg cotton seems to have some tolerance to the disease according to Mr. Jones.

Every farmer who wants to obtain Blightmaster cottonseed is urged to contact anyone of thirteen individuals or firms listed by the County Agent. All these firms recgived the registered seed from the Experiment Station last yyear and are now growing the Blightmaster cotton this year for seed to be cer-tified. See the County Agent for these names.



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
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
