Long before Manhattan Island was purchased from the Indians -at a time when the word "skyscraper" had not yet been coined -a magnificent twenty-story palace dominated the skyline of

Yemen's capital city of San'a. This regal structure, known as the Palace of Ghamdan, was as great a tourist attraction two thousand years ago as New thousand years ago as New York's Empire State Building is today. Many historians have de-scribed the wonders of the famed palace, which had a ceiling of transparent alabaster so clear that its inhabitants re-portedly could distinguish the species of different birds as they alighted on the roof or flew

overhead. Because of Ghamdan and other palaces which once towered twenty to thirty stories in the air, the Yemenites can fairly claim that they were the first people to erect skyscrapers. Only traces of the palace of Ghamdan remain in present-day San'a, but the capital contains many seven- and eight-storied buildings with the same type of buildings with the same type of original architecture. Even to-day the upper windows of some Yemenite palaces are made of translucent alabaster instead of

glass, and the lower stained-glass windows beam forth at night in multi-colored splendor.

Although San'a is situated on a fiat plateau, some of its buildings are so tall that from a distance it seems as though the city is built on elevated land. The average Yemenite, accustomed to climbing his country's rugged mountains, is undaunted by long flights of stairs and instinctively seems to prefer tall buildings. Foreign visitors have noted with amazement that the Yemenite of the plains, when unable to live on high ground, erects a tall house—and chooses the top floor to live on! night in multi-colored splend

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

Arabian Costumes

Unlike the man in the gray flannel suit, the typical Saudi Arabian male still wears a picturesque and eminently practical wardrobe which seems as timeless as the ancient sands in this desert peninsula.

Since most of Saudi Arabia's 3,500,000 people are nomadic bedouins, roaming the desert in a continual search for water and forage for their animals, their


forage for their animals, their way of life demands a type of apparel suitable for het days, cool nights and the sudden sand storms which strike without

warning.

The basic article of clothing is a loose-fitting, neck-to-ankle robe known as the thobe, which looks like an old-fashioned night shirt. During cool weather and the months of the sand storms, the bedsuins add a camel's hair cloak called an abas. This bright-colored garment is sleeveless with slits on each side for the

on their heads the Saudi Arabians wear four-foot square cotton cloths called ghutras held in place by a black rope-like hoop known as the agal. The shutra is often made of brightly-colored cotton and is worn in a triangle with two points falling over the shoulders and the third down the back. When a sand storm strikes, it is easy to wrap the ends around the nose and mouth for protection.

The style of the camel leather sandais has been borrowed by the fashion leaders in the Western world for "casual" shoes.
