

I at least have the consolation of knowing that I had company among those persons who were surprised when Richard Nixon was nominated on the first ballot last week in Miami, Florida.

Probably the biggest surprise, however, was in Nixon's choice for the vice-president's post. With the exception of the State of Maryland and that general area, we doubt that Sprig Agnew had much of a following prior to last week's announcement.

It is kinda surprising that the Republican nominee did not choose a better known candidate. This was one of the things which we had thought hurt Barry Goldwater's chances in 1964, the fact that his running mate was a virtual unknown.

Since the assassination of President Kennedy, and the subsequent murders of other public officials, it behooves the political parties to choose a vice-presidential nominee who is qualified to take up the reins in a moment's notice.

This helped the Kennedy-Johnson ticket in 1960, with both men being well-known; in fact both had waged a hard fight for the top spot on the ballot. Each had followers, and this helped the ticket's narrow win over the Nixon-Lodge forces.

Then in 1964, Humphrey was added to the Democratic ticket, giving another well-known name, and presidential aspirant.

Of course, we don't know who will be on the Democratic ticket at this point -- but they have the opportunity of once again having the best-known pair who will appear on the ballot in November.

Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith was one of our speakers at the West Texas Press Assn.'s convention in Abilene last weekend. Smith had some interesting remarks concerning the possibility that neither major party candidate may get a majority of the votes in November.

The election might not be settled on November 5 - and it still might not be settled on December 16, when the electors meet in their state capitols to cast their votes," Smith said. It might not be settled until January, when Congress convenes.

The goal of a third party candidate, according to Smith, is not necessarily to win, but to throw the election into the House of Representatives, which would elect the president if no candidate received a majority of the electoral votes.

However, Smith brought out an interesting point which we were not aware of. In the event that the proposition was turned over to the House of Representatives, if they could not get a majority, there is yet another, but final, alternative.

The House would consider the top three candidates, and if by chance (and it is at least remotely possible) they could not get a majority for one of the three candidates, then the present vice president, Hubert Humphrey, would become president, just as he would at the death of the president.

So you might say that Humphrey has "two shots" at the president's job, since he is one of the leading candidates for the Democratic nomination.

Ten years ago this week, the Friona Star took a daring step when it bolted from the age-old methods of printing newspapers to enter a new field of printing -- the offset method.

IN WEST TEXAS

Star Takes Top Newspaper Prizes

The Friona Star claimed one of its most successful years in newspaper contests by claiming three first place plaques at the annual West Texas Press Association's awards breakfast last Saturday in Abilene.

The Star carried off trophies in three of the four events it entered, and won the coveted "General Excellence" plaque for the fourth time in an eight-year period. This is every time the newspaper was eligible to win the award. It cannot be won in consecutive years.

"General Excellence" takes into account all of the finer points of newspaper production, including makeup, appearance, etc.

In addition, the newspaper won the association's first place plaque in the pictures competition, and took another plaque for advertising competition.

The "General Excellence" and advertising triumphs were gained in divisional judging, with the Star entering against other newspapers published in cities with 3,000 or more population. The pictures trophy was won against the entire field, as no divisions are made in that category.

All issues considered in the judging were published during 1967. The issues which won the pictures competition were from July of 1967, and all pictures were taken by Tyler Vance.

Vance was honored during the convention as the association's annual scholarship winner. He was nominated by the Friona Star, and won out over a total of 21 entrants. The scholarship amounts to \$200 per year and is renewable each year as long as he continues to study journalism.

The three first-place plaques go along with another first which the newspaper won in the state press contests in June, and five awards at the Panhandle Press Association contest in April. However, none of the Panhandle awards were first places. They were three seconds and two thirds.

The West Texas Press Association takes in over half of the state, including all of the western portion.

Other newspapers in this part of the state also did well. The Olton Enterprise won general excellence and advertising awards for towns of less than 3,000. Littlefield newspapers won similar awards for the semi-weekly papers.

The Castro County News at Dimmitt was second to Friona in both the general excellence and pictures divisions. Other newspapers winning second and third prizes included Farwell, Earth, Stratford, Floydada and Tulla.

Bill Ellis, editor and manager of the Star, attended the convention, and was accompanied by Tyler Vance, the association's scholarship winner.

Entrant Gains Pageant Finals

Becky Elliott, one of three Friona girls who were entered in Dimmitt's Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation contest last weekend made the contest finals from among the 33 girls entered in the contest.

Miss Elliott was entered by the Friona Star in the pageant, which is open to any girl age 17-21 in a grain producing area. For her talent act, the 1968 Friona High School graduate did a patriotic reading.

The other two entries from Friona were Paula Fortenberry, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, and Pat Roberts, sponsored by the Friona Jaycees.

First Prize \$100 In Local Shopping Promotion

Over \$200 in gift certificates are being offered to Friona shoppers in a local shopping promotion which begins here Thursday.

The Friona Association of Retail Merchants worked out details of the organization's local shopping promotion at its meeting August 8 at the Parmer House Restaurant.

First prize in the contest will be a \$100 gift certificate good at any participating store. Second prize is a \$50 certificate. A \$25, \$15, and a \$10 prize will also be given.

Entry blanks for the promotion are available at the Friona Chamber of Commerce office. Shoppers are required to visit each of the stores listed on the

sheet, and secure signatures or initials of a designated person in the store.

When every store on the list has been visited, the shopper will return the sheet to the Chamber office, where it will be certified, and the shopper's name will then be eligible to go into the hopper for the prize drawing.

Only shoppers who are 18 years of age or older may take out entry blanks. No purchase is required at the participating stores. Purpose of the contest is to acquaint shoppers, especially newcomers, with stores they don't normally visit.

In other business, the group discussed its "employee of the

month" contest, and asked Chamber of Commerce president Charles Allen if the Chamber would want to use the monthly winners of this contest from which to choose its yearly "Most Courteous Employee."

Allen, who attended the meeting, brought the matter before the Chamber on Tuesday and it was approved.

His mobile circus billed as "The Greatest Show on Earth" was merged in 1881 with one belonging to J.A. Bailey and the combination achieved international fame as the Barnum and Bailey Circus.

Talented as he was, Mr. Barnum would have to take a back seat in the presence of the geniuses responsible for staging one of our National Political Conventions.

Having been subjected to several days and nights of first class entertainment from Miami (in color too!) most of us are weary of the whole she-bang.

Many notables were present as delegates, alternates, or guests, however there were other famous persons who were conspicuous because of their absence.

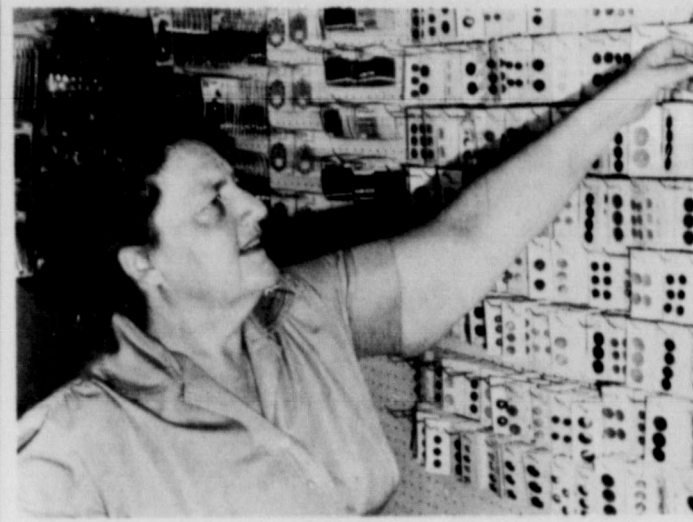
A Representative from the Clovis Social Security office will be in Friona on Tuesday, August 20. He will be at the Council Room in the City Hall from 9 a.m. to noon.

Seen above is Mrs. Pearl McLean shown as she was buying buttons in Friona's newest store Monday morning.

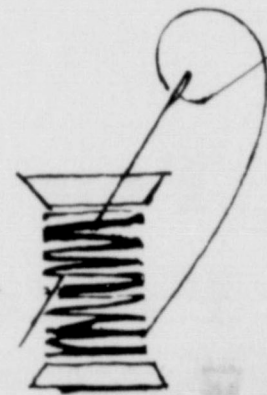

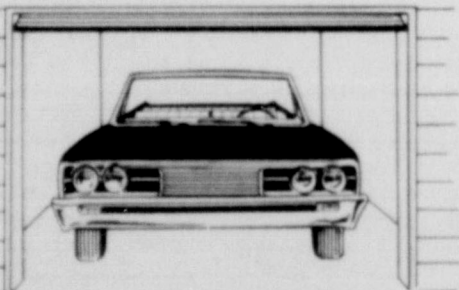
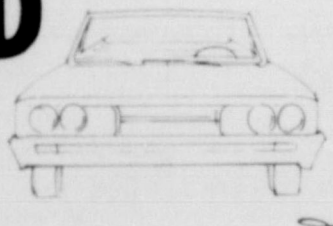
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The Library Corner

Junior Golf Tournney Set

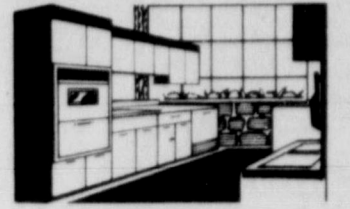

Friona Country Club pro Skinny Carter said the golfers would play on the handicap basis, and the flight breakdown would depend on the number of entries.

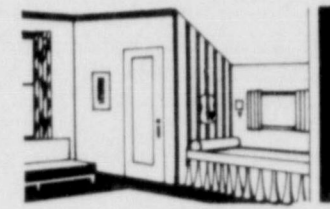

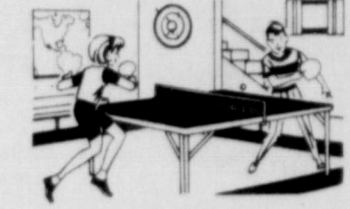

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
 NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

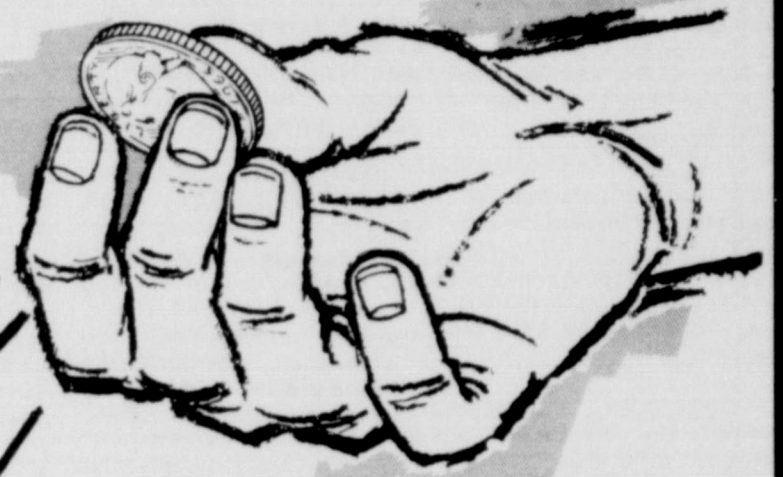

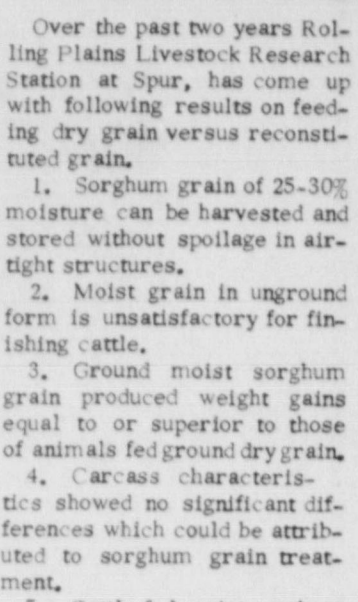

On The Farm In Parmer County

Over the past two years Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur, has come up with following results on feeding dry grain versus reconstituted grain.

1. Sorghum grain of 25-30% moisture can be harvested and stored without spoilage in airtight structures.
2. Moist grain in unground form is unsatisfactory for finishing cattle.
3. Ground moist sorghum grain produced weight gains equal to or superior to those of animals fed ground dry grain.
4. Carcass characteristics showed no significant differences which could be attributed to sorghum grain treatment.
5. Cattle fed moist sorghum grain have required approximately 10-20% less dry matter per pound of gain.
6. The digestibility of dry matter and organic matter have been improved 15-30% in moist grain.
7. The feeder may not realize the improvement in feed efficiency normally associated with reconstitution if the dry grain is ground before water is added or if the temperature within the moist grain is too low for the initiation of germination.

Soybeans
Maximum yields from soybeans normally require a summer irrigation prior to bloom initiation with succeeding applications made on 10 to 20 intervals until pods are well filled.

The period of high moisture use usually occurs in the months of August and September.
Castorbeans
In years of normal rainfall the first irrigation water usually is applied in late June or early July just before the first raceme or seed head appears. The peak water requirement period usually is during July and through August, when plants are fruiting heavily. Castors require approximately 20 to 24 acre-inches of water to produce high yields

Bulletin On Freezing Available From Agent

The Extension Office is having many calls this time of year on the preparation of vegetables and fruits for freezing. Often the questions goes like this, "My neighbor says she just washes, packages and freezes her corn or vegetables and she likes the results; is this method recommended?"

The answer is always this: For a good quality product, it is necessary to heat vegetables before freezing to slow or stop the action of enzymes. Until vegetables are ready to pick, enzymes help them grow, and mature. After that they cause loss of flavor and color. If vegetables are not heated enough, the enzymes continue to be active during frozen storage. The vegetables will develop off-flavors in a few months and may discolor and toughen. Heating also wilts and makes vegetables easier to pack. Too long heating period will result in softening of texture and an unnecessary loss of water soluble vitamins and

minerals. Research has given us helpful information along this line.

At Home In Parmer County

With one more County contest, the Bake Show, the 4-H Project work for 1968 will be almost completed. After that comes the judging of records, selection of the Gold Star Girl and Boy for this year, the County 4-H Banquet and enrollment for next year's projects.

The adult leaders are to be commended for their part in training these girls and boys in worthwhile activities. Especially in the area of clothing, and food, the interest among 4-H'ers is greatest. This has been especially true this year. A total of 70 girls and boys participated and completed projects in these two areas.

Just about everyone is busy as beavers, canning, freezing and preserving the abundance of good foods growing in this area. The common

run of vegetables such as corn, peas, beans, squash, cabbage and tomatoes are in good supply, but many other varieties that are easily grown here seem to be lacking. One of these, an excellent source of vitamins A and C, is often overlooked in the home garden. This is broccoli. It is so easily grown and is excellent for freezing, but seldom is it found fresh in the markets.

Summer has brought about changes to the family life - not the least of these is the longer hours for children to play outside. This demands mothers be prepared for appeasing hungry appetites.

Some sensible snack foods are celery sticks, carrots, other raw vegetables, fruits, nuts, cheese and milk.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas, the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustee thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

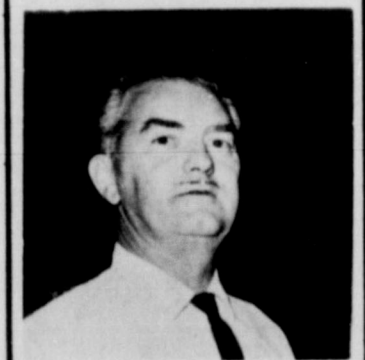

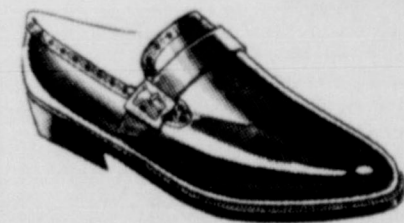

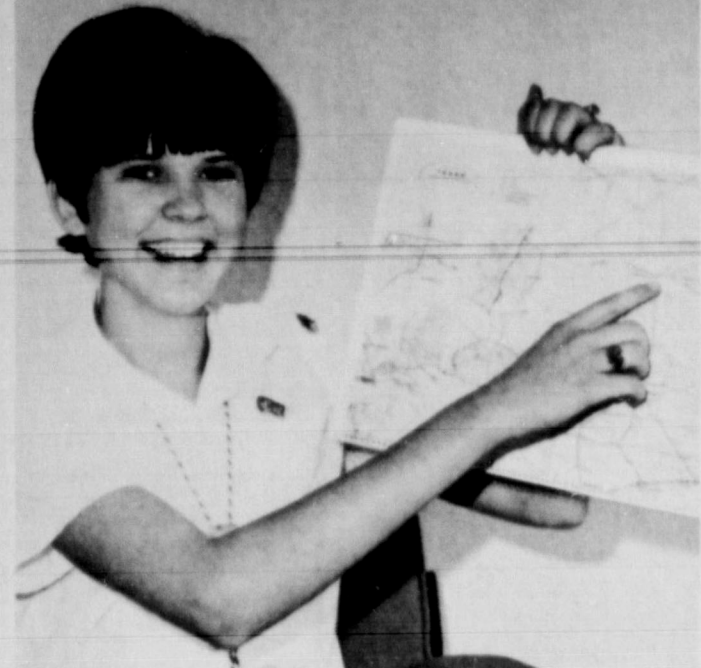

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

Section 1. That Article VIII Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j.
