RESEARCH STATION AT HALFWAY NOW GROWING VARIETIES OF SESAME

Increasing interest in the Agricultural Research program now underway at the High Plains Station located at Halfway, Texas, is in evidence thru the groups visiting the station from various sections of the High Plains area.

A group of business men and farmers from Canyon and Randall County made a tour of the 319 acre farm on April 17. Glen W. Dowlin, Happy, a member of the Regional Council for the Station, was leader

of this tour.

The Hale County Soil Conservation District visited the High Plains Station on their Spring Tour, April 23. This group was under the direction of Elmo Snelling, Chairman of the District and Don Newman, work conservator.

The officers of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association led by R. G. Poeler, Hereford, President; and Elbert Harp, Abernathy, secretary-treasurer; will visit the Station soon. They will consult with the staff regarding the research in variety, fertility, and irrigation tests on Grain Sorghum to be conducted at the station.

The comparatively new crop, sesame, is receiving increased attention by farmers in the irrigated section of the High Plains Area. The acreage devoted to this crop has progressively increased each year since its introduction by the Texas Research Foundation in 1954. The market for this new crop has developed constantly ahead of production.

The sesame variety tests conducted at Lubbock in 1956, sponsored by the Southwestern Public Service Co., will be continued at the new High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation this year. Fifty varieties will be tested in plots repeated 4 times in 20 foot rows. Five of these varieties are of the direct combine non-shattering types. Runner No. 15, non-shattering, will be produced on a larger acreage for testing and seed production. In addition there will be 4 varieties of sesame tested on dry land in 2 row plots 100 feet long at the Station at Halfway.

A discouragement in the preliminary stage, can save a lot of disillusionment later on — and, by the same reasoning, a little information now, as these students are preparing to go off to college, or at least to graduate from High School, may change the entire course of their future, and may save them hours, days, months, or even years of wondering about wondering just what they should do.

FIGURATIVELY speaking, to the four boys who are going to become Eagle Scouts, from Morton this next Sunday. But all of us are proud to know we have so many boys in Morton who are putting in so much time on such worthwhile projects.

FORGET TO DOFF the hat is in favor of the scattered few who have really pushed this program in Morton. Eagle Scouts aren't born, nor do they often develop on their own initiative alone. The difference between Scout Troops and Scoutmasters, is the different attitudes that develop within. Some are doing just a job — some make it a challenge.

TO LET YOU folks know that there is a purpose behind the ground observer corps training. We weren't far enough along to go on the alert the other day during the severe weather warnings. But we in all likelihood will be called out the next time. Think of how important it could be to Morton if three minutes before a tornado struck the people were warned by siren because the GOC was on duty. In 3 minutes at least everyone would be able to lie flat, huddle in the right corner of a building, or even dig a small trench. It might save a life or lots of them.

JUST NATURALLY the curious type, the type that likes to be in on what's going on. If you are one of those people, sign up for the local Ground Observer Corps. Just tell Earl Crum you'd like to do a part. It's not a difficult thing — but it is needed in times of war, disaster, attack, or weather alerts. There's a meeting Sunday, if you would like to know more about it, be there.

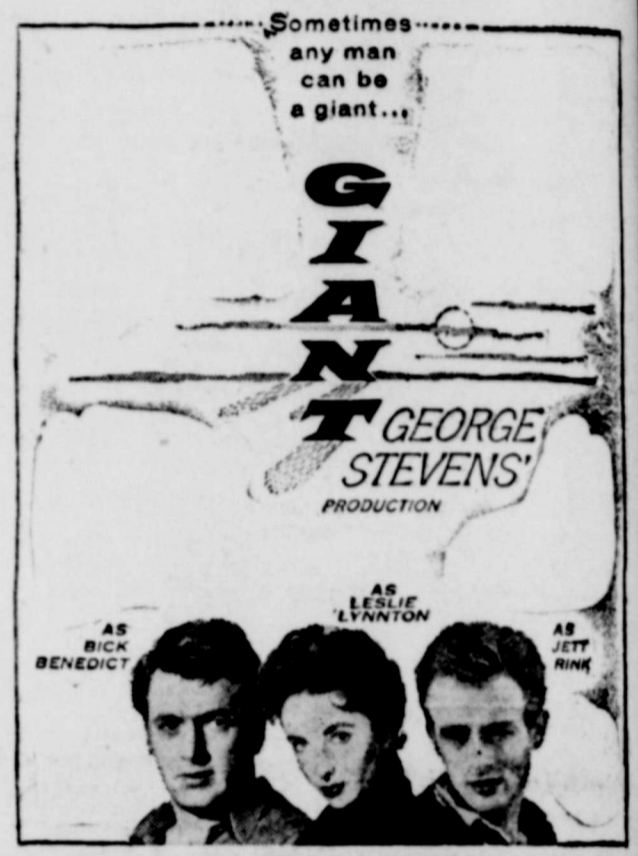
