WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

In all American history, there has probably been no effort to pass a piece of legislation as characterized drive to rope U. S. into Organization for Trade Co-operation, or OTC.

The administration has made at least five pleas to Congress, but Congress still turns a deaf ear to the plea.



On several occasions, the C.W. Harder, nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have opposed any further scuttling of protective tariffs.

The other day, when debating a proposal to establish import quotas, in order to protect some vital American industries and their employees from total destruction, several Congressmen had very pointed remarks to make on the subject.

The State Dept. sent a letter to the House Ways and Means Committee protesting right of Congress to establish import quotas.

State Dept. made this statement, "The bills would permit the imposition of quotas notwithstanding any international agreement relating to tariffs or trade entered into by the United States, or to be entered into hereafter."

On this, Rep. Bailey took off. He pointed out that the U. S. Constitution clearly gives Congress the power to impose import quotas. In that case, he wanted to know, by what authority did the State Dept. enter into agreements on its own hook.

"The State Dept." he continued, "is completely out of line and if they have anyone in their legal department worth his salt they must know it. Unquestionably State Dept. hopes it can cow and intimidate Congress. And it will not hesitate to ride roughshod across lines of legislative power if we let it do so."

Veteran Representative Van Zandt (Dem.) joined in the fray pointing out that the State Dept. was setting forth a set of conditions that no one could understand how they came about. He also stated under the doctrine set up by the State Dept., if permitted to continue, that department could become supreme in the U. S. government, even exercising control over immigration, civil rights, or taxation.

Thus, there are more and more indications that Congress is preparing to cut down on the almost unlimited license that the State Dept. has taken unto itself.

Protection of American industry, labor and farmers from cheap imports has given specifically by the founders of the nation to Congress. For over 20 years, this power has been nibbled at to give internationalists means with which to carry on foreign adventures.

And at every world-wide bargaining session, the U. S. economic system has lost. This is largely due to the fact that while foreign nations send their businessmen to negotiate, the U. S. is represented by State Dept. functionaries who have never met a payroll, who know little, if anything, about business except the little gleaned from an academic perusal of books on subject in ivied halls.

Responsible elements in Congress are seeking to put a stop to this bartering away of American independent enterprise by a government bureau.

The following is a continuation of the questions and answers on the Texas Egg Law that were begun in the Tribune last week...

Answer: Educational meetings, news articles, farm radio and TV programs, etc. 23. What recourse for consumers in case they purchase inferior eggs...

Answer: Yes. A tolerance is provided in U.S.D.A. standards of destination point of 1/2 per cent on AA, A, B, and 1 per cent on C grade.

Answer: No. The law does not set a maximum temperature or minimum humidity. However, these requirements will be stated in the regulations.

Report from . . .
YOUR COUNTY AGENT

COTTON INSECTS
 All cotton growers should be alert for leaf worms. The second crop of leafworms is due now and could be a tremendous buildup since the 1st crop about three weeks ago. The presence of many small leafworms could be most damaging.

Leaf worms do work in spots & their damage can be easily seen from the road. The small worms will eat the outside of the leaf layer making the leaf look very thin and sunlight can be seen through the leaf. The larger worm will rag it or eat most of the leaf. The small leaf worms have two or three weeks to eat and at this stage can do considerable damage before he is grown.

For control of this pest, I suggest you follow the 1957 Cotton Insect Guide available at the County Agents office.

and ticks. The dairy barn may be sprayed with 5 percent methoxychlor, 0.3 to 0.5 percent lindane; 2% percent malathion or 0.5 per cent Diazinon. Also, sugar baits containing malathion and Diptera may be used in the dairy barn to supplement residual sprays for house fly control.

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INSECTICIDAL RESIDUE TOLERANCE FOR DAIRY CATTLE

The Pure Food and Drug Administration has established tolerances for residues of DDT, methoxychlor and toxaphene in the fat of certain livestock. At present, no tolerances have been established for insecticides in milk; therefore, none of the chlorinated hydrocarbons or phosphorus insecticides can be used on dairy animals.

Dairy animals may be treated with spray containing 0.1 percent pyrethrin and 1 per cent piperonyl butoxide to control lice, horn flies

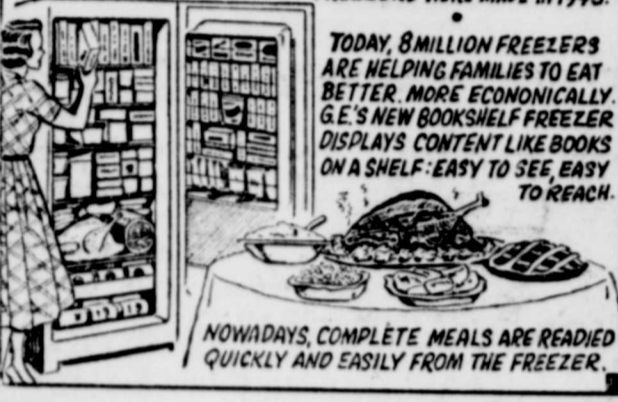
