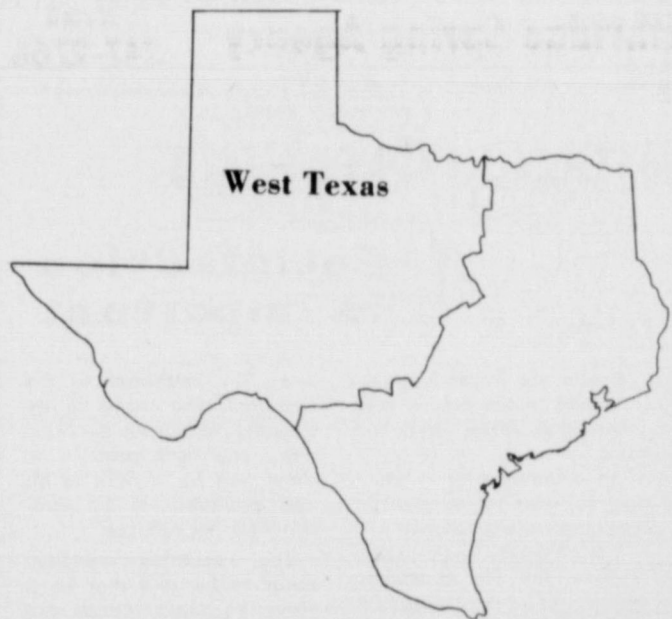
Something To Go By

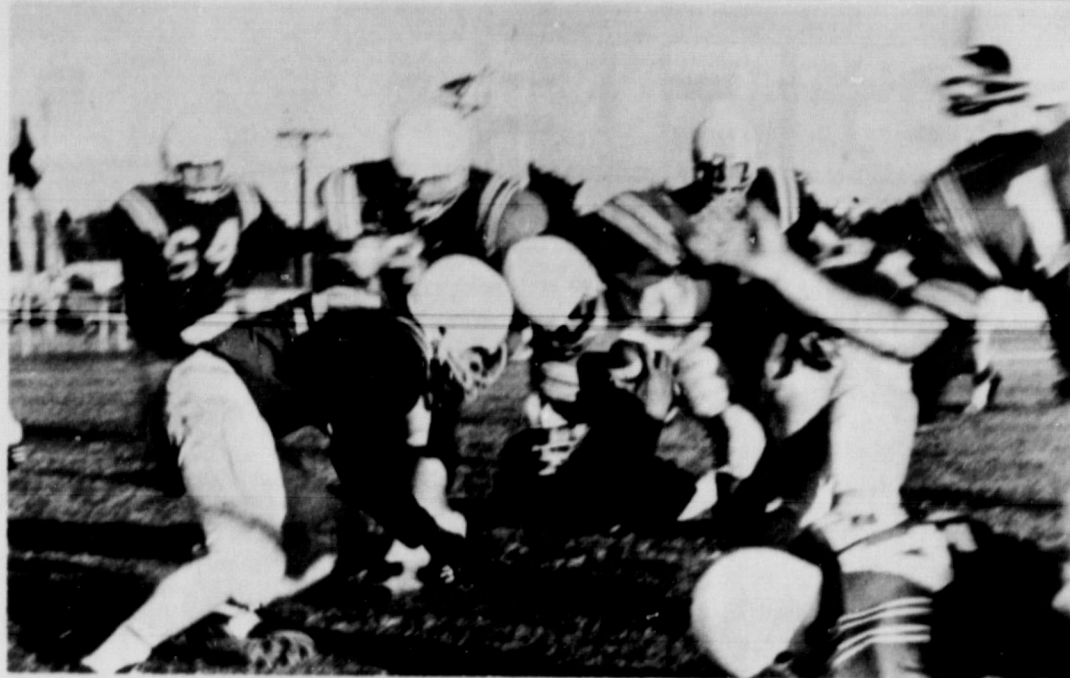

The Chieftains go to Springlake for a scrimmage Friday at 8 p.m.

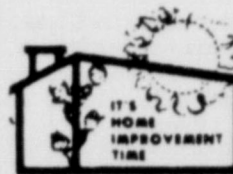
Coach Light said the team was in good physical condition, and came out of the Boys Ranch without any major injuries. First regular game of the season is here Sept. 8.

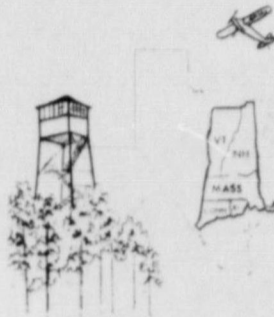

Wilbur and Orville Wright, who were brothers, were born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Then the Wright Brothers were boys, they like to play with flying toys and kites. When they were grown men, they still liked flying things. They invented the first flying airplane.

When Wilbur was 11 and Orville was 7 years old, they went into their first business, kite making. They made one kite that flew very good. They sold this one and started making and selling more kites.

When Wilbur was in high school he was playing shinny and was hit in the mouth with a wooden stick. Since he could not finish school because he was so sick and weak, he read all the books Orville could find about flying.

While Wilbur was still sick Orville and Ed Sines printed a newspaper called "The Midget," for their eighth grade class.

Soon they started selling bicycles and parts. Orville was in a bicycle race and was winning but his tires went flat before the finish.

Next the brothers started making gliders. Their first glider looked like a box kite and it flew very good. They made a larger glider. Wilbur and Orville learned that the wind blew at Kitty Hawk all the time.

At Kitty Hawk they built their glider. They took turns flying the glider but they could not control it right. They went back home and built a wind tunnel and tested wings. They tested more than 200 kinds of wing shapes. Now, they thought they knew what was wrong.

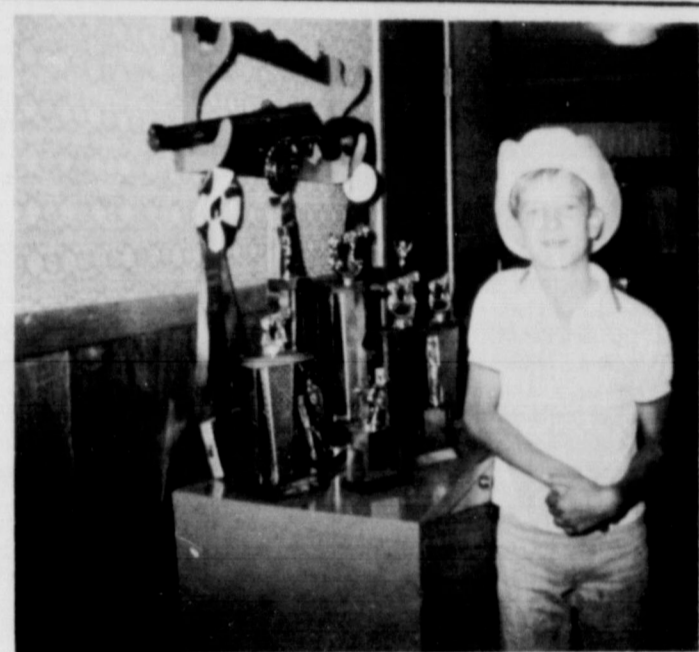
They went back to Kitty Hawk but still the glider steered poorly. Then Orville had the idea if they could make the tail fins move it might steer better. Now

their glider flew better. Now they needed a motor so they went back home and built a motor. They went back to Kitty Hawk. After a few months their airplane flew several times. The longest flight lasted 59 seconds.

Later they showed their airplanes to many people. They got many medals and awards. The brothers had an airplane company which Wilbur was head of. They sold many airplanes.

Wilbur died of typhoid fever and Orville became head of the Wright Company.

Orville lived to see planes fly faster than sound. He died when he was 76 years old.

### FCIC Insurance Again Available

Farmer County wheat farmers can help eliminate the uncertainty for their 1968 crop that plagued them this year by participating in the low-cost government program of All-Risk Insurance administered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, (FCIC).

FCIC Field Representative Jerry Austin from the district office at 1611 Avenue M, Room 105, Lubbock, is now in the county for a limited time explaining how the program operates.

He says that insured farmers in the state shared in an estimated \$310,000 in loss payments for the 1967 crop when drought, freeze and wind plus other natural causes damaged the wheat.

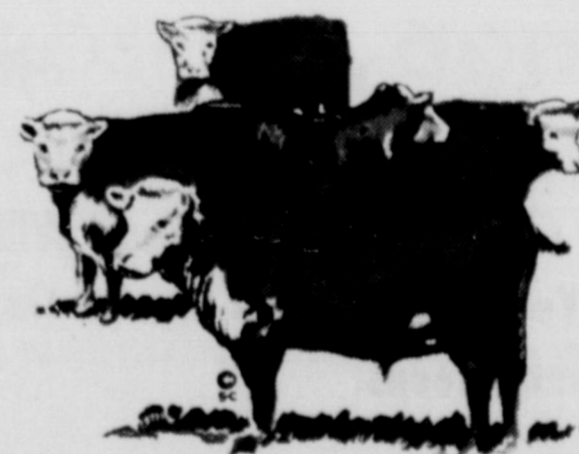

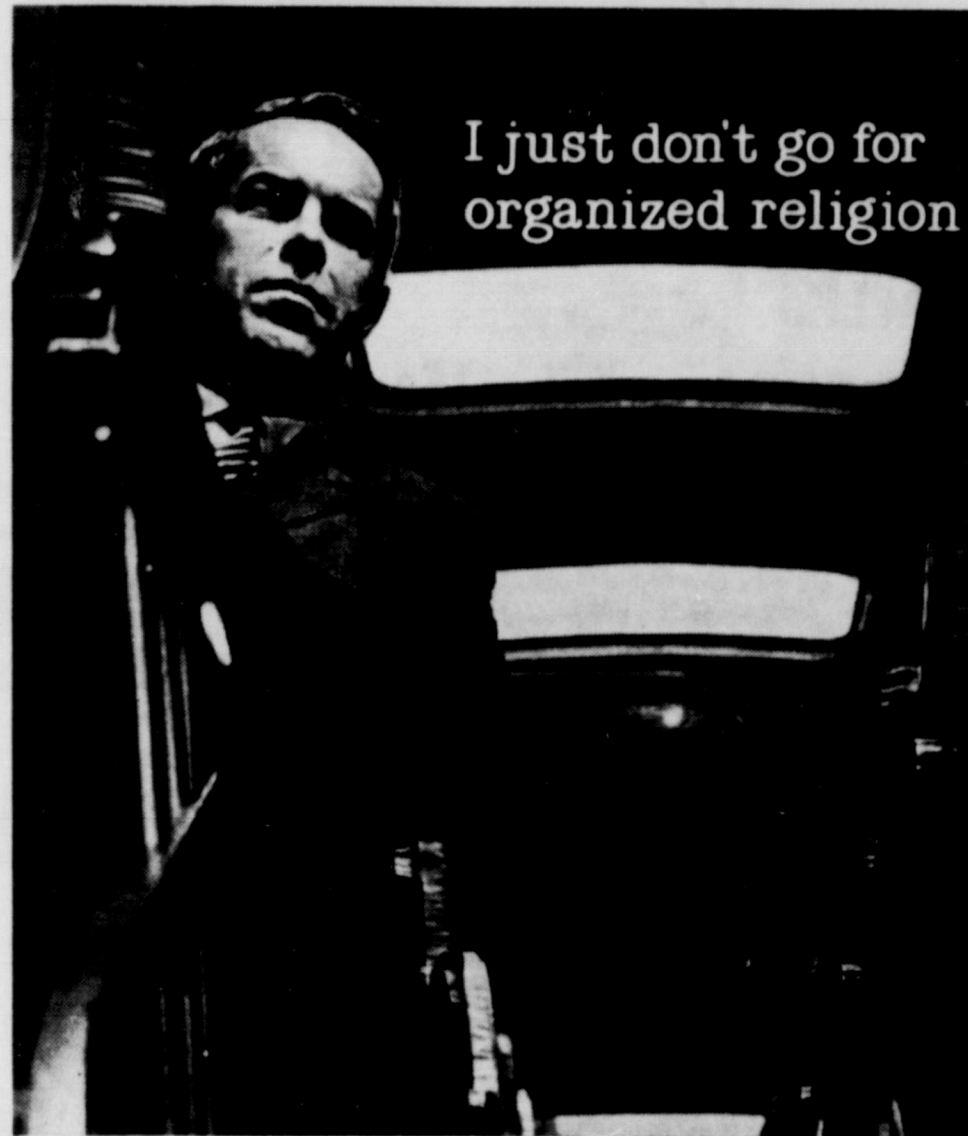

Ever heard that before? The rest of it usually goes like this: "Sure I have a faith—but I can pray just as well at home."

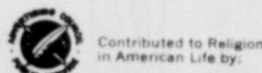
Private worship is, of course, a precious and valuable and necessary thing. But if you neglect your place of worship, you neglect the place where the very substance of your faith is kept alive and

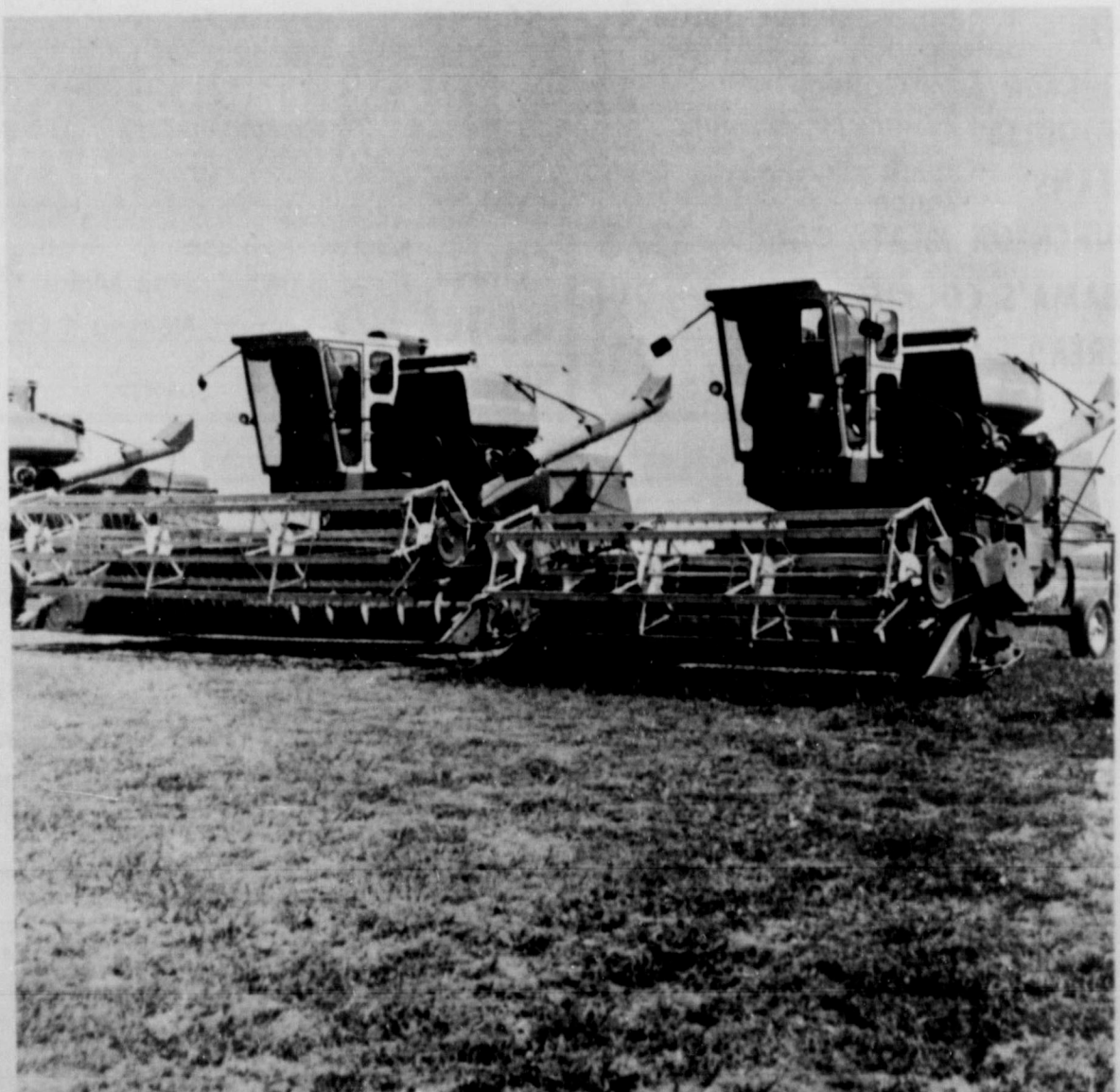

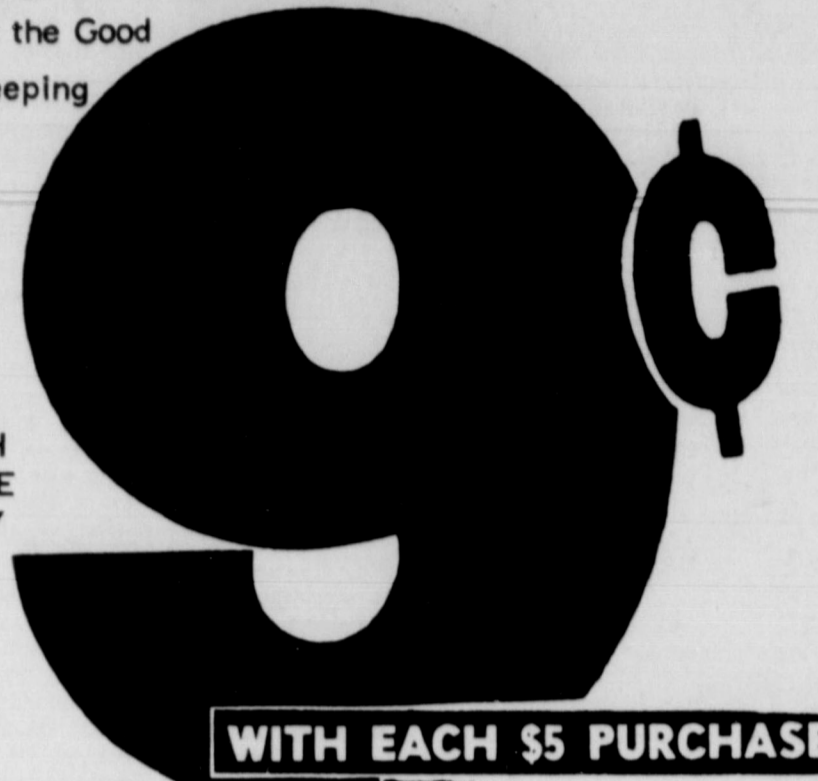
