FRANK GRIFFITH team competed in the meet at Whitharral last week. Placing first in the meet from Three Way were . . .

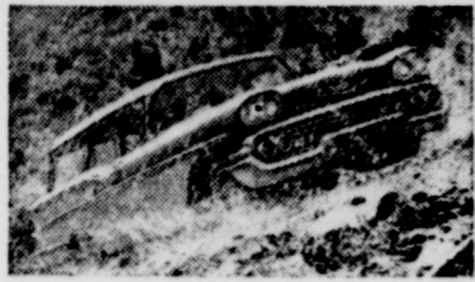

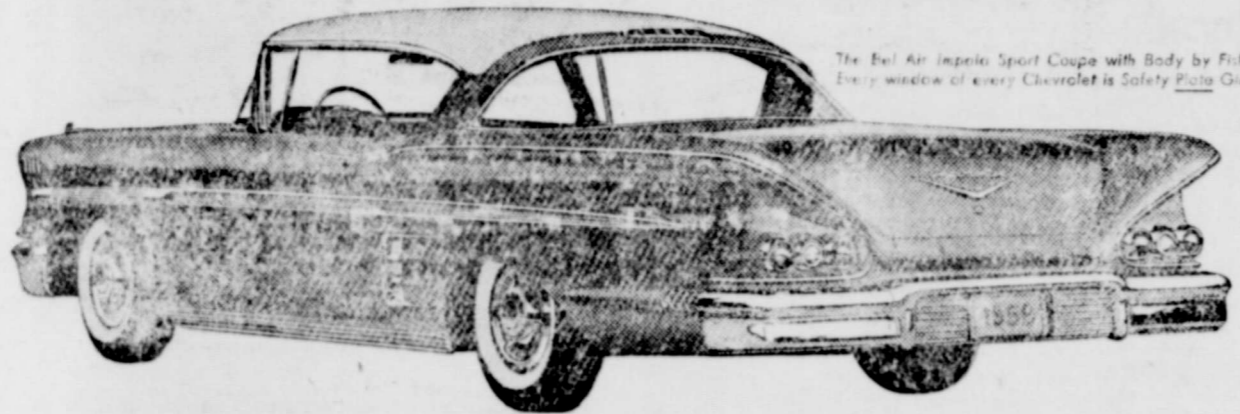

Some farmers are irrigating in June — about June 10 - 25th. As a rule of thumb method of painting grain sorghum — here is the past average yield tests for planting date at the Experiment Station: May 25 — expect about 4,000 lbs. yield. June 10 — expect about 5,000 lbs. yield. June 25 — expect about 6,000 lbs. yield.

Most soil in this area will hold about 1 1/2 inches of water per foot. Then this condition as now exists, additional water, to be sure, will go deeper, but as it does it can leach out some of the plant nutrients. Remember, nitrogen follows the moisture, and, if leached into the soil, some of it may be lost. You not only circulate water in and out of the soil, but some of the vital plant nutrients as well. Only soils leach more plant nutrients out than do the heavier clay soils.

Moisture this time of year is considered to be at full capacity, and, too, there is extra moisture conditions now when any pre-season irrigation which you have ever been able to apply. We are thankful for the way the moisture has fallen, because most of it has stayed where it fell. The saying goes, it is not how it rained, it is how much of it has gone into the soil that counts.

Moisture keeps the ground cool, so cotton does not grow as well. Last year at Lubbock Experiment Station, the optimum date for planting cotton was May 21. Rather late, isn't it? That means the cotton planted on that date succeeded in yield all the cotton yields planted earlier or later. Let's hope we have a good year this year.

Plant cotton when the ground temperature gets warm enough. That is 60 degrees average temperature at 8:00 a.m. for 10 mornings in a row, 8 inches beneath the surface. Get you a soil thermometer. The bank yields each year seem to follow this temperature of the soil. You can't beat nature.

Remember too that grain sorghums are better when planted in
