49,000 Bales Is **Total Ginnings** Of 1957 Crop

The official word from the U.S. Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, is that Cochran County's cotton crop last year was approximately 7,000 bales short of the 1956 crop.

This week, for the 1st time since the gins shut off their equipment, figure has been released on the total ginnings. The bureau officially lists the 1957 - 58 cotton crop ginned in Co-

chran County at 49,065 bales.

The figure for the previous crop, 1956 - 57, was 55.927 bales. Of course the report made no ention of the quality of the crop, nclement weather having taken a far greater toll by lowering the quality of the cotton, rather than cutting downt he number of bales ginned. Cochran County's decline, in number of bales, was a little under the average percentage of loss in other South Plains Counties. The overall picture of the cot-

Bessemer, who had received English patent on the proin 1855, applied for and tained his American patent ights in 1856. As soon as ly learned of the Bessemer tents he filed a claim of ority of invention. In 1857 was granted a patent

claim to the satisfaction of the U. S. Commissioner. Further evidence of the validity of Kelly's claim came when both patents ran out in 1870. Kelly's patent was extended and Bessemer's U. S. patent

was denied. The Bessemer converter was slow in being introduced, but once it was put to use its tremendous impact on steelmaking was quickly evident. Where only about 3,000 tons of steel was made by the Bessemer process in 1867, by 1888, the year Kelly died, production by this process was nearly 3,000,000 tons a

Invention of the Bessemer converter process had a pro-nounced effect on life in our country. As the steel industry grew, so grew agriculture, manufacturing, transportation, construction, communications and the other elements of our industrial life. It might be said that here in America the Kelly-Bessemer process became the key for opening on the process after demon-strating the priority of his of us.
