Paula Burnett and Dickie Walker were among those over the district to receive Gold Star 4-H awards at the Gold Star Banquet in Lubbock Monday evening.

Paula, one of the forty to receive the Gold Star Certificate at the banquet in the Student Union Building at Texas Tech. is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Burnett of Morton.

Dickie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Walker of Morton.

Paula has been an active 4-H Club member for five years. Her projects have included food preparation, frozen foods, dairy foods demonstrations, dress making and bed-room improvement. She has given 10 demonstrations to the public on care of clothes, bed-room improvement and food preparation.

She is a freshman in Morton High School. She belongs to the First Methodist Church and attends Sunday School and Methodist Youth Fellowship regularly. She takes piano lessons and is a member of the Morton High School Band.

Dickie, in the 8th grade, is 13 years old and a member of the 7th, 8th and 9th Grade 4-H Club. He lives at Star Route Two Morton, is in his fourth year of club work and is the only son of the A. V. Walker family, which includes two daughters.

Dickie has made a fine record in 4-H Club Work. He has served on the 4-H Entomology team for two years, competing in the district contest both years, and has received a county award in Entomology. The team finished 3rd in the district, and 5th in the district, in the two years he served.

Only his age has kept Dickie off the District Championship Rifle team from Morton. He has been on the team and qualified on the top four, but because of age, couldn't compete. He has been in 4-H Rifle Work four years.

In addition to being Gold Star Boy for 1958, Dickie will receive the Boys' Agricultural Award. He has entered the district 4-H Cotton Contest this year.

His 4-H demonstrations in 1958 placed as follows: 2nd place, Fat Hampshire; 5th place, Fat Hampshire, in County 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Show.

He participated in the Tractor Maintenance Schools held in the county.

His father, A. V. Walker, is a leader in 4-H Work. He is especially interested in 4-H Swine work and 4-H Rifle Safety Training. Dickie attended most of the 16 training meetings.

Home Demonstration Agent

LONGER LIFE FOR CHRISTMAS PLANTS  
With proper care those potted Christmas plants can give your home a colorful holiday air throughout the winter months.  
Here are some pointers on how to keep them looking lovely longer from A. F. DeWerth, head of the Texas A&M Department of Floriculture and Landscape Architecture.

Plants often fail because they are drowned with too much water or are allowed to dry out in the warm dry atmosphere indoors. If the pot is wrapped in metal foil, plants may suffer from lack of drainage unless a small hole is cut in the bottom of the foil cover.

A potted cyclamen will bloom for several months if kept at a temperature of 65 to 68 degrees where it can get morning light. Never allow soil to dry out completely while the plant is blooming. When it starts to lose leaves, allow the soil to become drier than in the growing season - but not powder dry. Some moisture must be present to keep the corm from drying up completely. Store in a cool, dark place, to carry it over a second season.

African violets need a sunny window during the middle of winter but can be put in the shade about the last of February. Let the soil get dry before watering, and then use water several degrees warmer than room temperature.  
Primroses need abundant light in winter and do best at about 65 degrees. Too much watering rots them, but they should not be allowed to dry out completely.  
The Jerusalem cherry and ornamental pepper like cool temperatures, high humidity and plenty of sunshine. Smoke or gas in the room will cause leaves to drop.  
Poinsettias will stay attractive for the most of January if kept at temperatures around 65 degrees. Let them dry gradually and plant outdoors.

DO YOU BRUISE EASILY?  
If you bruise easily, a Vitamin C deficiency might be responsible. Citrus fruit is an easy, pleasant way to meet daily requirements of Vitamin C, the vitamin that is not stored in the body. It must be supplied each day.

Fresh, canned or frozen citrus fruits and juices are rich in Vitamin C. They are quickly and easily served as appetizers, desserts, salads, garnishes, and as the fruit course for breakfast and as between meal snacks.  
Other foods important for Vitamin C include strawberries, tomatoes, salad greens, broccoli, and cabbage.

Recent surveys show that many Texans are not getting enough Vitamin C in their diets. How about you and other members of your family?  
THAT LEFT-OVER TURKEY?  
Wondering what to do with that left-over Christmas turkey? An easy way to solve the problem, and stretch the holiday bird over a longer period of time is by freezing part of it. Extension foods and nutrition specialists suggest packaging meal-size units of the turkey meat in moisture-vapor proof material for the freezer.

Other suggestions for left-over turkey include such tasty dishes as turkey pie, turkey-croquette, turkey chow mein, turkey croquettes and casserole dishes. Recipes and other suggestions are given in B-201, "Let's Eat Turkey." Copies of this are available from this office.

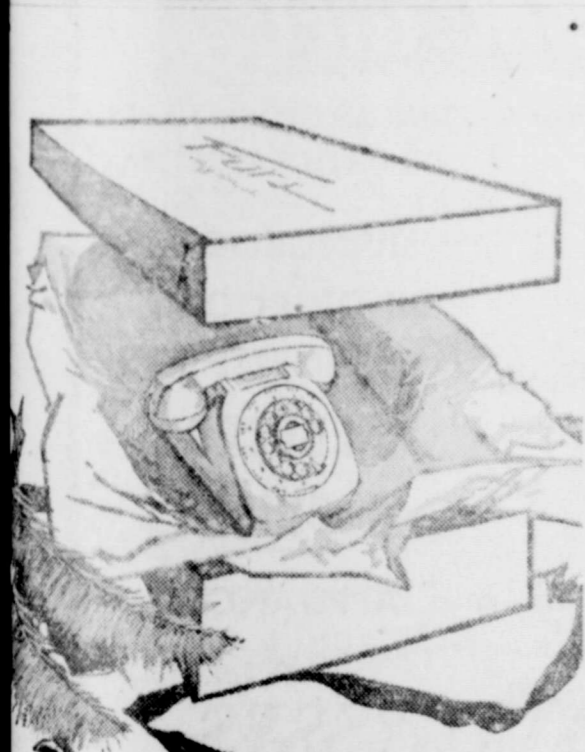

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**WAC Executives Are Being Sought**

Women interested in becoming executive in the Women's Army Corps have less than a month to submit their applications for the next officer training class. M-Sgt. Forrest D. Pesch, announced today.

This class begins on February 23rd. All applications must be submitted at least two months in advance to insure necessary processing and selection.

Accepted applicants receive a direct commission as a lieutenant & then attend this five months course at Ft. McClellan, Ala., before their initial duty assignment.

Qualified college graduates and certain non-graduates are eligible to apply. Non-graduates must have completed at least two years of college and have sufficient leadership and supervisory experience in civilian life.

Executive level assignments are in many career fields. A few examples are personnel, intelligence, communications, and public relations. Experience in a particular field is not a prerequisite for assignment to most of the career positions open to WAC officers.

WAC officers have opportunities for overseas assignments in such places as Germany, Japan and France.

Set Pesch explained that women who meet the qualifications will find this is an excellent opportunity to begin a new vocation which is both interesting and rewarding.

**SMALL BUSINESS**

By C. WILSON HARDER

It will be perhaps a few weeks yet before the data is gathered on spending in the recently completed political campaign.

But already, with figures in only up to September 1st, an idea is gained of the vast amounts of money Big Labor threw into campaign activity.

Up until September 1, organized labor groups had spent on campaign purposes a recorded total of \$226,000 as compared to only \$731,000 spent by one of the major political parties.

These totals only give an idea, not the full amount as it is only required under Federal law to report campaign expenditures by political committees that operate in more than one state.

Thus, while the totals on labor's political spending is largely under the banner of the AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education, presumably, unions operating inside a state that have set up local political organizations can also spend freely on campaigns without reporting.

It is interesting to note that of reported political campaign spending, labor accounted for 20% of the total.

It is also interesting that the law does not require reports on moneys spent in primary elections even though in many cases they are equal in importance to the general election.

Under the law, it is illegal for labor organizations to make contributions to candidates for national offices.

Generally speaking, businesses are prohibited by law from making political campaign contributions. Thus, for all practical purposes, the biggest single factor in election spending is Big Labor. This is a fact which the Senate Privileges and Elections Sub-Committee recognized during recent Congress and expressing the feeling that some action will have to be taken to tighten up the laws in this respect.

Undoubtedly, entire situation points up need for businessmen to take a far more active part in the political affairs in order for business to survive in an economy where labor looms so important in political arena. And while it is undoubtedly quite unwise for business to try to enter into political campaigning with political funds, it also seems obvious that business must take some action.

It seems without doubt that the best influence businessman can have on political matters affecting small business is to make known, without trying "pressure" tactics, the problems of independent enterprise, and express opinions on measures that do affect small business welfare. It is in this area that the National Federation of Independent Business functions. Only in this manner can the American politico-economic scale be kept in proper balance.

# INDIANS RACK UP NOS 4, 5, and 6 . . .

# INDIANS, MAIDS WIN TROPHIES AT WHITEFACE TOURNEY

The Morton Indians sandwiched their two best shooting performances of the young season around a rather poor, but adequate, showing which ball handling was their biggest difficulty, to win three games and capture first place in the Whiteface Invitational tourney last week.

The Maids had a little more difficulty, losing a first round game to the Sudan girls, and then coming back to beat Bladsoe for the Consolation title in their division of play.

Sundown's girls, with the help of some cold shooting and some very timely Sudan fouls, upended the Sudan girls to win the Girls' first trophy.

The officiating in much of the tourney was extremely tight — something that plays havoc with most fast moving ball clubs — and this accounted for some of the shoddy play by both the Sudan girls and the Morton boys — as well as the poor performance of other teams in the tourney.

But the dazzling shooting percentage of the Morton boys and the Sundown girls was the death blow to their victims. Morton shot a good deal fewer times in their game with Whiteface, then they do in most of their games, but they scored the nets for a 40 per cent average to run up a tremendous 41 to 11 halftime bulge, and then coasted to a 62 to 29 win in the final game.

Their other great shooting performance came against Sudan, which almost bewildered the charges of Coach Francis Smith, whose boys, only a few days earlier, had made Morton "hump" to win a 5 point decision.

The shoddy performance of ball handling came against an Amherst team that boasted plenty of height, but just couldn't seem to handle the ball without "traveling." Their performance evoked a bad performance out of the Indians, who nevertheless made a good shooting record and coasted to an easy win.

Consolation honors in the boys' division was won by Sudan. The Amherst girls and the Sundown boys were third place winners.

And, of course, Sudan's girls and the Whiteface boys were runners-up in the meet.

The Indians, who had a tough time last Tuesday notching their third win, at Sudan, finally getting a 60 to 55 win, did a much better job on the Hornets at Whiteface in their tourney opener last Thursday.

With each of the five regulars chipping in at least one basket, the Travismen took a 19 to 15 first quarter lead. Seven out of nine free throws played as much of an important part as anything. But it was in the second period, Morton broke Whiteface's back. Clyde Brown hit on four of five shots in the second period and when the halftime horn sounded, the Indians had almost doubled the score, 38 to 20.

Four free throws in the last minute of the third quarter gave Morton a 51 to 29 bulge, before the locals began to let up by inserting substitutes. Sudan, switching three teams throughout the game, didn't give Morton a lot of choice in running the first team as long as they did. Sudan continued to be the best shooting team Morton has faced in the early season play, hitting 15 of 51 shots from the field for a just under .300 shooting mark.

The Indians, with the whole first string shooting near the .300 mark for the season, bucketed 17 of 51 for a neat .333 mark, and this in spite of the fact that second stringers managed only one field goal in eight shots in that fourth period.

The Indians fired for a .450 shooting average in the first three periods, connecting on 18 of 40 shots against Amherst on Friday and in the final totals wound up with a .375 shooting mark. They had a 15 to 8 first period lead and 29 to 19 halftime edge. But here is where the Amherst team folded up. In the first five minutes of the third stanza, Morton ran the score to 46 to 19

by pushing in 17 straight points before Amherst scored. It was 48 to 21 at the three quarter stop and Morton had already used a second team for five minutes. They finished with a third team that tallied only two baskets in 16 shots and the tall Amherst crew pumped in 13 points in that final period. Morton employed a stall for four minutes, a drill in ball handling, which also mercifully cut down the score.

Gary Middleton was the hot fliker in this game, tallying 18 points, while Brownlow had paced against Sudan, with 24.

But the finale was really the performance that had Morton fans raving. Coach Travis' charges took just 41 shots at the basket & made good on 20 of them for a slightly under 50 per cent mark for the entire game. That's shooting in a dynamic way — for high school basketball.

Contrasted with Whiteface's unusually cold shooting, it made the Morton shooting seem even greater. Whiteface got only four field goals in the first three quarters in 32 shots. They added four more in the final period.

The quarter lead was 15 to 4 and by halftime Morton ballooned it to 41 to 11. They played strictly possession ball the final half, shooting only 14 times and connecting on 7 of these.

The shooting went this way: 6 of 15 in the first quarter, the poorest performance of all, only 400; 7 of 12 in the second quarter; 2 of 5 in the third period; and finally, 5 of 9 in the last stanza. Middleton had 15 points and Brownlow 14 in the game. Paul Zuber and Mervin Gathright getting eight each for their usual steady performance. Jeff Jones stepped a notch in his scoring average but continued to handle the ball longer without errors (bad passes, double dribbles, traveling, etc.) than any other man on the team.

The Indians, for the fourth time in six games, made great use of the free throw line. They dumped in a fine 20 of 31 free throws, and one man missed 7 of the 11 that were missed. So, excluding his performance, the others tallied 18 of 22 free tosses for a near remarkable average.

Coach Travis' great teams of the last two years both had a tremendous struggle at the free throw line. It was this that often kept them from being a really great team. But all except one or two men on this team are hitting free tosses in great style so far this season. Since a fast breaking team usually gets fouled more often than a slow team, Morton gets a lot of free throws in a season, and it is very important that they keep up their fine shooting.

In girls' play, Sundown beat the Whiteface girls, 55 to 49, as Diane Carpenter poured in 43 points for Sundown. Sandra Powell had 31 for Whiteface but Diane, an unusually clever ball handler as well as a great shooter, was too much for the Whiteface girls.

Morton's girls, who had bowed earlier in the week to Sudan, just couldn't get started. The game was tightly officiated and Morton lost one of its stellar regular guards in the first minutes of the second quarter. Sudan, too, had lots of personal fouls whistled against them, but they were pressing Morton before the Maids could even get a shot from the field. The result was that the Morton girls got only 12 shots from the field in the first half and went until the fading minutes of the second quarter before

they tallied a field goal. They didn't do as well as they have on the free throws but what they did do kept them in the game. The officials did a reversal of form in the second half, calling the game loosely, but by that time Morton was hopelessly. Berniece Fincher had 29 points for Morton while Glynn Masten had 25 for Sudan.

On Friday, Berniece Fincher got 28 points to lead the Morton Maids in scoring as they walloped Bladsoe, 18 to 21, for the Consolation championship. Bessie Bihrey had 17 for Bladsoe which fell too far behind early in the game.

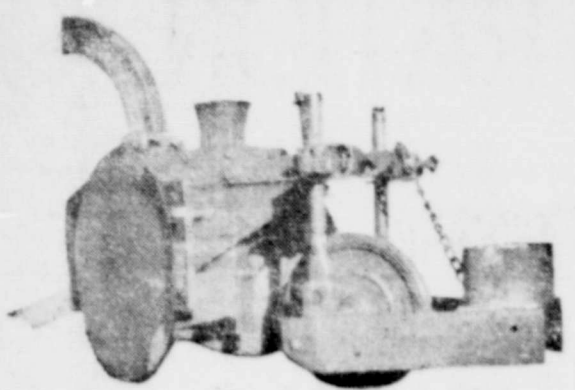
Sudan's boys administered a 39 to 26 thumping to Bladsoe's boys for the consolation title in the boys' bracket. Otis Prout's 13 was

high for Bladsoe and for the game. Glynn Masten tossed in 18 to lead Sudan past Amherst in the girls bracket, and of course, Morton won the boys game, beating Amherst 53 to 34.

Saturday Sundown beat Morton 63 to 36 in the boys division as M-Intuff had 21 points to Koth Bledsoe's 17. Judy Bowman poured in 27 points for the Amherst girls as they topped Whiteface, 48 to 36. Sandra Powell had 22 for Whiteface.

These games were for 3rd place. In the other final game, Diane Carpenter tallied 36 points for Sundown as the Sundown girls won an easy 53 to 45 triumph. Sundown held usually high scoring Glynn Masten in check, with a fine guarding job, although close officiating had as much to do with it as anything. Billie Stori had 20 points but Diane Carpenter again showed her amazing ball handling ability as she time and again stopped or pivoted around Stori's guards to toss in most of her shots. Her shooting average for the tournament must have been the best in either bracket.

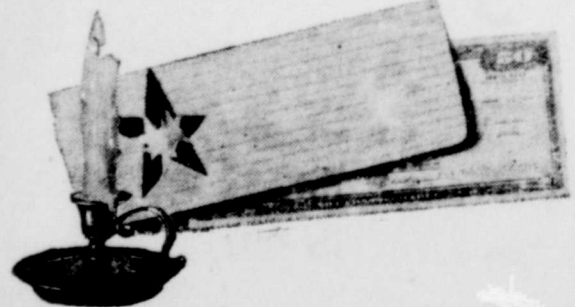

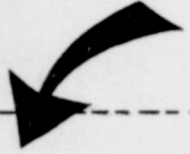

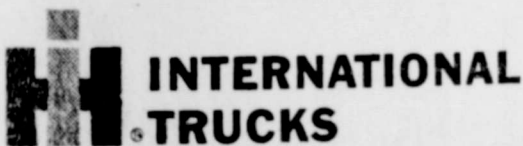

### Social Security Raise Will Come In January Check

The social security district office has had far more inquiries than usual these past few weeks. John G. Hutton, manager reported recently.

A good many of the calls were from people who are now receiving monthly retirement, disability or survivor checks, and who are now concerned about getting the increase that was authorized by Congress and the President recently.

Mr. Hutton reminds all social security beneficiaries that the increase in monthly benefits will come to them automatically; they don't have to phone, write or visit the social security office to request or to file any kind of application for the increase.

The checks for January of 1959, which will be mailed out the first of February, will include the full increase the law provides, an average jump of about seven percent, he said. In dollars, this means 65 year-old workers will receive from \$3.00 to \$7.50 more, depending upon the amount of their present benefits. Where total family payments reach \$254.00, individual benefits other than that paid to the worker may show a lesser percentage increase, Mr. Hutton concluded.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Morton on Dec. 15, at 2:00 p.m. at the Courthouse Basement and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.
