Two sisters and four brothers, survive. Nephews of Mr. Rackler served as pall bearers and members of his Sunday School class were honorary pall bearers.

Burial was in Southland Cemetery.

## Mercury Vapor Lights Will Be Installed Here

At a recent meeting of the City Commission, a proposal by Cochran Power and Light was accepted which will bring mercury - vapor lights to downtown Morton, probably by the end of January.

In exchange for the installation of some 24 mercury - vapor fixtures around the square, and the moving of the present larger lights on the square to replace smaller lights on the highway approaches to the square, the city has agreed to pay a flat electric rate of \$175.00 per month to Cochran Power and Light.

The amount of money will be approximately \$30 more per month than the city has been paying but the Power and Light Company will be responsible for replacing broken globes, something that was formerly paid by the city.

Cochran Power and Light will expend about \$5,000 for the year of 1958, on improving the lighting in Morton and will continue to improve the lighting next year, the Commission was told.

The mercury - vapor units, which provide considerably more light, have already been ordered.

The agreement was reached in early December, just one meeting after the Commission had asked Earl Crum to talk with partners in the business and submit a proposal of improved lighting to the Commission for action.

The rest of the business handled at December meetings has been of a routine nature, including a discussion on Christmas bonuses for City employees, payment of bills, etc.

### COUNTY AGENT

CATTLE FEEDING  
According to the Big Spring Field Station, feeding small numbers of steers may prove unprofitable. Cattle in the high plains area of Texas who feed less than 100 steers at a time are not likely to get mu-

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ch extra income from this work. Based on a 20 year study at the Big Spring station, a margin of profit of at least 4 cents per pound is required to give an income equal to the average price paid for farm labor — and that doesn't include the risk in feeding steers.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has prepared a guide for cattlemen in the high plains to use in determining whether feeding steers is a profitable alternative to the cash market for grain sorghum under various feed livestock cost price situations.

"A cow-man goes into the feeding season knowing the feed cost and cost of steers for feed lot, and he assumes the rate of gain to determine the amount of feed he will produce." "What he doesn't know is the amount per pound he will get on the market when he sells his steers. The studies were based on feeding 100 steers for 180 days. The publication is "Economic Returns from Grain Sorghum Fed to Steer Calves on Dry Land Farms of the High Plains," Miscellaneous Publication 235.

WINTERIZING FARM MACHINERY  
Thirty percent can be added to life of farm machinery by giving it proper winter care. Time will also be saved by getting the machinery back on the job when it is needed.

If possible keep machinery under the shed when not in use. All bright parts such as mower sickles, plow wings, cultivator points, and other plow points as well as working parts of the machine should be coated with grease. Rubber tires should be blocked up to take the weight of the machine off them while in storage. Gasoline should be drained from auxiliary motors. Spark plugs should be removed and squirt in three ounces of cylinder oil in each cylinder. Replace plugs after the motor has been turned over a few times to distribute the oil.

A cover should be placed over the engine exhaust pipe to keep out moisture. Thoroughly lubricate the machine before storing. Batteries should be removed and checked regularly.

This is a good time to check for worn or broken parts and replace same. Slack time is best time to repair machinery.

Spraying equipment is precision equipment, and needs special care. Flush sprayer with warm soapy water and rinse with clean water. Dismantle the equipment and drain the tank, pump, valves, hoses, pipes and nozzles.

A light coating of oil should be applied to inside of tank after it has dried, and metal pistons and gear pumps filled with oil; clean and store nozzles.

#### Financial Operations of the School During the Year Ended August 31, 1958

The School increased its Working Capital during the above year by \$4,238.07. In doing so, all bank loans and all old accounts payable have been retired. Except for August expenses, which were paid in September 1958, the only outstanding indebtedness of the school at August 31, 1958 (other than on bonds) was athletic bills for the year 1957 - 58 of \$1,449.39 to be paid out of the athletic fund, and insurance for policy year December 1957 to December 1958 of \$4,205.58.
