Ordinance Passed Creating City Library

Have we had our last freeze of the spring? Maybe so, but you probably couldn't get any oldtimers to bet on it. Last year, for instance, the temperature dropped to 27 degrees on April 21. However, in 1963 the latest freezing temperature came on March 21.

The last time a reading of 32 or below was made this year was the morning of March 17. According to weather data, only twice in the past 20 years has the last freeze been recorded in March. Strangely enough, the other time was year-before-last, in 1965, and this was on March 31.

Sometimes the last freeze has come in early May. Here's hoping we've already had the last one this year.

A week or so ago, we were saying that summer was definitely near, because of a few "repeats on television. Due to the actors' strike, we got into full swing with the re-runs earlier than anticipated.

We hate to see strikes of this nature. This particular one has been more noticeable, since it involves TV personalities you see (or used to see) every day or week.

Most times the strikes have adverse effects. Many large newspapers have gone out of business as a result of extended strikes by the unions.

The TV stars know by now (if the strike still isn't settled) that network television can go on without them. Some of them should be cautious -- a few programs have several years worth of film on file -- they might be put completely out of a job.

And, while Alan Zirkle (or whatever his name was) isn't perhaps as experienced with the CBS Evening News as is one Walter Cronkite; he nevertheless got the job done -- and probably for a lot less pay than Walter would command.

Speaking of television, Dale Smith tells us he has acquired a new appreciation for the shows for the younger set, such as "Romper Room," one of the programs seen each morning. It seems that some time back, Dale and his wife Jere started to teach their daughter, Amber a prayer for mealtime. "She said she wanted to use the one she learned on Romper Room," Dale says, and proceeded to say it.

Just recently, Amber surprised her daddy by quoting in its entirety the Pledge of Allegiance, also learned from the TV program. This was prior to her third birthday.

"I knew that youngsters picked up a lot from television, and it sure makes you appreciate this type of program which teachers something constructive," Smith concludes.

We were reading a newspaper the other day, and came across some population facts which amazed us. So, we're passing them on to you.

The Friona City Council passed a resolution and ordinance creating the City Library as a function of the city, creating an advisory board and approved by-laws for the future operation of such library at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The action came a month following a meeting during which the council had voted to take

such action, and had asked the city attorney to draw up the appropriate resolution and ordinance.

In other business, the council authorized the city manager to enter into contract with L.A. Purcell of Lubbock for the sealing of 20 blocks of pavement within the city limits. The job is to cost an estimated \$7,100.

The council agreed to strike the building permit fees for the Friona Girl Scout Building, and is looking into legal possibilities for further aiding the Scouts' cause.

The group tabled a request from the State Highway Department to furnish city water free to the roadside park east of the city limits providing the state furnish the connecting line.

After declaring the election results, Dr. Lee Cranfill was elected mayor pro-tem to replace Glen Stevick, who retired from the council.

Marion Fite and James Procter were elected to the Friona City Council Monday, and incumbent J.E. (Ed) Hicks was re-elected.

Fite led the four-man field with 165 votes; Hicks received 154 and Procter had 153. The fourth man on the ballot, Wes Long, received 70 votes.

A total of 190 votes were tabulated in the election, fair consideration that the election was not as hotly contested as has sometimes been the case in the past. Others receiving votes (write-in) were Glen Stevick, four and Stanley Benge, one.

Stevick and Joe Talley were the two incumbents who did not seek re-election. They had served four years.

Holdover members of the council are aldermen Rene Snead and Dr. Lee Cranfill and mayor W.L. Edelman.

In his monthly report to the council, city manager Jake Outland pointed out that response has been fair to the approximately 600 tax rendition notices mailed March 14.

There were three building permits issued during the month. Chief of these was that for the Friona Girl Scout Hut at 706 Ashland, to be built at an estimated cost of \$15,000.

Otherwise, a permit was issued for an addition to a residence, estimated at \$4,000; and a new storage shed valued at \$800, for a month's building total of \$19,800.

Water department records showed 16,907,000 gallons of water pumped during the month of March, an average of 563,566 gallons per day, up considerably from the previous month. Only .15 inches of moisture was received.

One new water tap was made to bring the total active water meters to 1,046.

Five fire calls were made during March. Three were outside the city limits, including one at the Roy Miller farm which did an estimated \$100 damage. Of the two inside the city limits, one at Earl's Cafe resulted in \$20 damage, and another at the James Pope residence had no estimated loss.

Police department records showed only nine arrests during the month. Chief of Police Ken McDermitt attended a police academy training school March 5-31 at Big Spring.

Of the arrests, five were for drunkenness and four for traffic violations. Ten investigations were made, including five for theft, two for vandalism, two for gunshot wounds and one prowler.

MRS. ZEMAN RE-ELECTED

Phipps, Blackburn Are Named To School Board

E.G. Phipps and John Blackburn were elected as new members of the Friona Independent School District's board of trustees in last Saturday's election and Mrs. V.J. (Mary Kate) Zeman was given a new term.

Mrs. Zeman, the only incumbent in the field of four candidates led the field with 197 votes. The first woman to serve on the Friona school

board in a number of years, Mrs. Zeman was elected to the board in 1964. The former teacher also led the balloting in 1964, tied with Cordie Potts.

In Saturday's voting, Mrs. Zeman received 197 votes, E.G. Phipps got 188, and John Blackburn received 151. The fourth candidate on the ballot, Clarence Monroe, received 106.

A total of 214 voters turned out, not bad considering that only four candidates were seeking the three positions.

J.L. Shafer, who had no opposition, was elected as a trustee on the county school board.

Two members of the board whose terms were expiring did not seek re-election. They were Cordie Potts, who has served as a Friona trustee for 18 years, and Ralph Shelton, who served the past four years.

Holdover members of the board are Dr. Paul Spring and Louis Welch, each with a year left on their terms, and W.D. Buske and W.M. Massie, with two years remaining on present terms.

Clean-Up Week Scheduled Here

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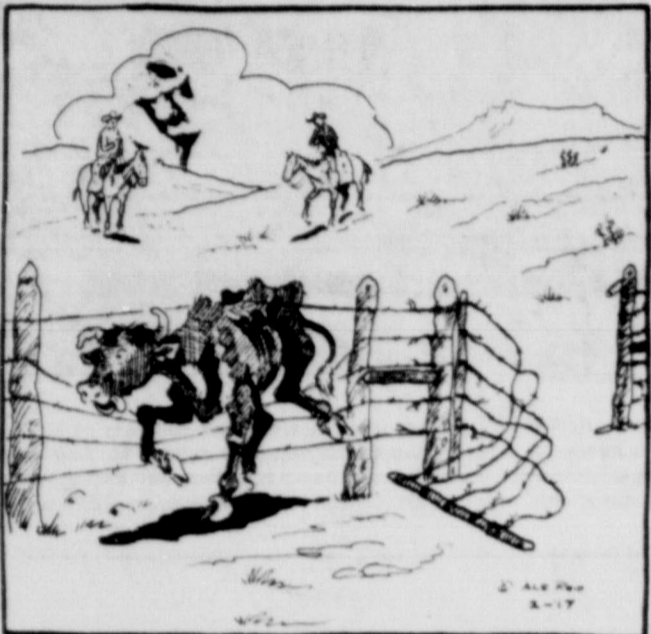

Pause And Reflect

A very wonderful teacher, whom I am proud to number among my friends, chided me by saying that I punctuated everything I wrote with an exclamation point. Not wishing to get in a rut I will overwork the question mark this week. (1) Since the publication of the rules of the Communist International Party I have been asked many questions, two of which made my blood run cold. "Are those people (the Comies) really that serious?" asked a young mother. "A high school student, a splendid young man, asked, "Can't you be a Communist and a Christian too?"

Oh Lord, how long! What will have to happen to us to blast the average person out of the awful lethargy that is slowly choking the nation to death? We can not put all the blame on the Federal and State governments. We elected those officials and only we can change them. We, the people still have a voice -- a case in point. The word came out that Gunsmoke was to be dropped from TV in less than week it was reinstated by popular demand. This is not to say that we pay more heed to a TV program than we do to our government but the fact remains that many unpopular, and probably unfair, laws remain unchanged year after year. Back to the questions, "Are those people really that serious?" Were Marx, Lenin, En-

gels, Trotsky, Stalin and Khrushchev serious? Is the present administration serious as they ship war materials to the North Viet Cong? Is Castro serious just ninety miles away? Are the Soviets serious as they float over gullibility in signing the Bridges to Moscow consular treaty? Yes, dear young Mother, they are serious that from a mere handful of followers just fifty years ago they now dominate the word, but DOMINATE over half the people on earth. "Can't you be a Communist and a Christian, too?" No, American Youth, no one can be both. Communism is not just a political party or a marching army of soldiers, it is an ideology. One so craftily constructed as to promise all things to all men, namely security and a new social order. Those dedicated to the theory use any means to achieve their goals. Their agreements, treaties and so forth are not worth the paper they are written on. Like a drowning man, ignorant people grasp at the straws of false promises. No, Son, you can't be both because, as Paul said years ago, "What communion hath light with darkness?"

OUR READERS Write

Dear Friends:

The Texas Legislature has reached the half-way point in the Constitutional 140-day session. There have been over 1200 bills introduced in the House of Representatives, and some 600 introduced in the Senate. As we begin the second half of the session, over 3/4 of the bills remain to be considered by both the House and the Senate. I have introduced about 30 bills, myself, some of which I will explain briefly in this letter. I am serving on four major committees: (1) State Affairs Committee, which deals with major State-wide Legislation (2) Urban Affairs Committee, which deals with all city Legislation, (3) Conservation and Reclamation Committee, which deals with all water and soil Legislation, and (4) Rules Committee, which considers all bills passed out of Committee and places them on the Calendar for House Action. Besides serving on these four major committees, I am Chairman of another major committee, the Committee on Counties. . . This Committee considers all Legislation pertaining to counties, districts, and local governments. Our Counties Committee has had from 12 to 15 per cent of all the bills introduced this session, referred to it for study. I feel honored and at the same time a great sense of responsibility to House Speaker, Ben Barnes, for the confidence he has placed in me by committee appointments. I believe that my position on these committees will make it possible for me to accomplish a great deal for our District. One of the most controversial bills referred to my Counties Committee, is the pari-mutuel horse racing bill. We have a set public hearing on this bill for April 6th, at 2:30 p.m. in the House Chamber. We anticipate over a thousand people to attend this hearing. Probably the most controversial bill introduced this session is the "liquor-by-the-drink" bill. The Committee on Revenue and Tax heard this bill March 21st, with over a thousand people attending the hearing. This bill will probably come up before the House for a vote within the next couple of weeks. It is my prediction that neither "pari-mutuel horse-racing" or "li-

quor-by-the-drink" will pass the session. Another bill that will be controversial and require a great deal of time is Judicial Redistricting. Also the Supreme Court has ruled the Legislative Redistricting of last session unconstitutional, so this will have to be done over this time. We will also have to reapportion Congressional Districts. Daylight Saving Time has taken a considerable amount of time, with most of the correspondence from the District indicating a desire to try it because all the States surrounding Texas will be on Daylight Saving Time. It is expected the Appropriations or "Spending bill" and the Tax Bills, will take many hours of debate and consideration. Because of our increased population in Texas, it will cost more to run the State Government agencies and the public schools for the next two years. The big question is where will the State get the money. Many people from the District have visited our office during the first half of the session. Particularly, one weekend, nearly all the folks from Earth and Springlake were in town to see the Springlake Earth Girls Basketball Team win the Class A State Championship. Our office is open at 8:00 a.m., and stays open until 7:30 p.m. each day, except Saturday and we close the office at noon. We have had to employ three full-time secretaries to keep up with the correspondence and other Legislative matters. You can see by this, we are staying extremely busy. Below, I will list a few of the bills I have introduced.

I feel I should apologize for not getting a news-letter to you sooner, but we have been so busy, time has not permitted it. So, I am writing this letter over the Easter Holidays while I am home. I hope you will let me hear from you on any legislation you are interested in, because it is my desire to be your Voice in State Government. Sincerely Yours, Bill Clayton.

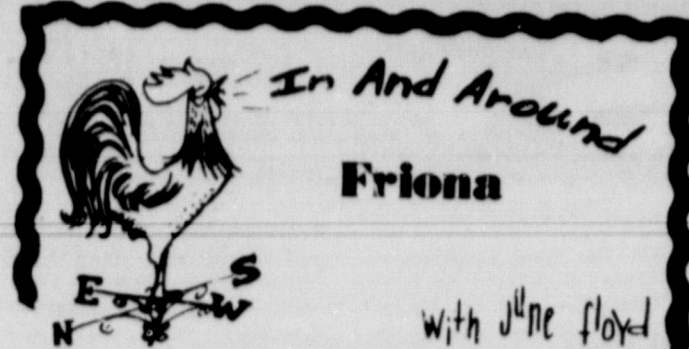

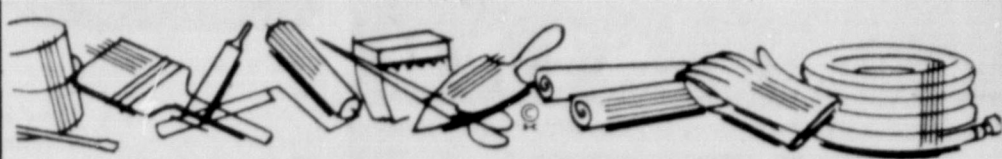

Bond Sales Given For Parmer County

Frank Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee, announced today that February sales of United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County totaled \$2,179. During the first two months of 1967 sales in the county totaled \$5,347 which is four per cent of the 1967 goal of \$130,000. During the first two months of 1967 Savings Bond sales in Texas totaled \$29,451,247 which is 16 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.3 million and a 15.2 per cent increase over sales during the same period of 1966.

Nationally, the sale of Savings Bonds during February totaled \$426 million and were 23 per cent higher than a year ago, and the highest for any February in 7 years. The January-February total was \$917 million, 12 per cent over sales for the first two months of 1966 and the highest January-February sales since 1963.



DeKALB CONTEST

Area Farmers Among Top Grain Producers

Top farmers throughout the sorghum belt shoot for maximum yields. Some have set amazing records, but are still aiming higher.

One of the best yields recorded in 1966 was on the Billy Lytal farm at Dimmitt, Texas. Lytal's high yield effort of 9984 lbs. harvested from an acre was in conjunction with the DeKalb Sorghum Master's Club program.

More than 200 farmers from seven states joined Lytal in this concerted high yield effort. Included in this group was Royce Gene Welch and A.L. Black of Friona. Welch averaged 9141-54 pounds per acre and Black had 9100.86 per acre on test acres. Both planted DeKalb F-65.

The Sorghum Master's Club has been in existence for four years. The common goal is to produce top economical grain yields under practical farm conditions.

A new farm and hail damage during the growing season failed to stop Lytal from another record performance in 1966. He also had the highest yield in the Sorghum Master's Club in 1965, 10,521 lbs.

The entire 198 acres of sorghum on Lytal's farm averaged 6300 lbs. per acre in 1966. The base yield on this farm in past years had been 3500 lbs. Lytal expects to bring the farm average over 7000 lbs. in 1967.

His formula for top yields -- High Fertility -- Lytal applied 123 lbs. of actual nitrogen in 1966 as anhydrous ammonia. At the present time he is making plans for a complete soil test to solve any soil deficiencies which may be present. In addition, he plans to make fertilizer application in 1967 adequate to meet his over-all farm goal of 7000 lbs. and his top yield goal of 11,000 lbs.

Population and Row Width -- Lytal's top yield came from a field which was planted in eight inch rows at a rate of 18 lbs. per acre. This population and plant distribution requires a lot of water and was not utilized on the entire farm. The remainder of his land was in 40-inch rows planted at the 10-15 rate. Lytal is considering twin 10-inch rows on 40 inch beds for most of his sorghum acreage in 1967.

However, his all-out field will again be eight-inch rows. Lytal had no difficulty in irrigating the extremely narrow row width even though there were two rows in the furrow.

Planting and Water Management -- Lytal planted his Sorghum Master's Club field on May 20 after a pre-watering. During the growing season, the sorghum was irrigated seven times. The bulk of Lytal's sorghum acreage was irrigated five times. Generally, earlier planting dates have been beneficial in Lytal's high yield efforts. Early planting enables him to plant a full season variety and still harvest comparative early in the fall.

Weed Control -- Lytal tried two chemicals in 1966, propazine and atrazine. His Sorghum Master's Club field received 1 1/2 lbs. of propazine and no cultivation. This worked so well that he has decided to use propazine on his entire

acreage in 1967.

Hybrid Selection -- Lytal chose DeKalb F-65, a short, full season hybrid which adapts well to narrow rows and high seeding rates.

Two other farmers who have put together the high yield formula on their sorghum acreages are Bill Gentry of Hereford, Texas and Walter Dittberner of Panhandle, Texas. Gentry had a top yield of 9662 lbs. in 1966 and Dittberner turned in a 9387 lb. yield. Both farmers used DeKalb F-65.

Gentry has a total of 540 sorghum acres and maintains a high over -- all farm yield level year after year. Dittberner is also a high yield veteran. In 1964 he harvested 10,423 lbs per acre and in 1966 received the Sorghum Efficiency Award presented annually by the Ford Motor Company.

Lytal, Gentry and Dittberner have proved that high sor-

tions are necessary to process the return. "It also helps us utilize the full capabilities for which the Automatic Data Processing system was designated he said.

If your name or address has changed make the necessary corrections and strike through lightly the preprinted information. If you have a refund due, this will help insure delivery of the check to the correct address.

Taxpayers should also verify that their correct social security number is entered on the return they file.

The filing deadline for 1966 tax return is April 17, 1967.

Chamber Manager Gives Report On Meeting

A meeting of the Legislative Advisory Committee to Congressman Bob Price, composed of Chamber of Commerce Executives from West Texas met recently in Amarillo with Congressman Price. Mary Kaye Everitt, local chamber manager, had this to report: "Since the organization of the committee when we first came in contact with Congressman Price my general comment of him is that he has gained a lot of confidence and poise, and seems to have an excellent grasp of the situation. Of course, our first meeting was before he actually began his duties and he had not gotten his 'feet wet.' By his own admission, he has really learned a lot in the last several months. This was very evident in his presentation.

The purpose of this committee is to present items of interest to this area to Congressman Price for action. He, in turn, presents happenings in Washington. Generally speaking, we are to establish a "direct line" of communication with legislature that affects this area.

Some points he discussed in relation to pending legislation he either introduced or bills that are before this session are as follows: air pollution, in-

creased social security benefits; highway beautification; increased benefits for service families; amendments to UN charter; Seven point food program; International Coffee Agreement; new bill concerning civil rights; truth in packaging; crime control and war on poverty.

Several more were mentioned but these are the main ones he is involved with.

Time did not permit discussion of each bill individually but he did express his views on a few. He stated that he was against trading with communist countries as long as we are engaged in war in Viet Nam. He stated further that he endorsed the President's policy in Viet Nam and that the President had done everything possible to talk peace.

Price voted to unseat Adam Clayton Powell in the recent controversy and predicts that Powell will run again but if he wins, the Congressman feels that he will not be given a seat.

The mood of Congress at present is to move slowly take time for re-evaluation. Price echoed the general opinion of most citizens concerning excess Federal Government. Some programs, of course, have much merit but there are others that could be cut considerably.

Cancer Crusade Being Conducted This Week

Research into the causes and treatment of cancer will once more take the major share of funds raised in this year's Crusade Against Cancer in Texas. The annual fund-raising drive, which has a goal of \$2 million, will be conducted in every community in the state, along with a massive volunteer effort to distribute life-saving cancer information pamphlets and to carry out the first Cancer Education.

Frank A. Spring, Crusade Chairman for Parmer County, has announced that this year's Crusade will be conducted on April 4, 5, and 6.

A total of 31% of funds raised last year in the Crusade -- \$597,911 -- is being sent for research this year, including grants to investigators in Texas hospitals and medical schools. Areas under investigation by American Cancer Society grantees include the relation of viruses to cancer, irradiation therapy, chemotherapy (treatment by drugs) basic molecular research, and use of new diagnostic tools.

The second major allocation of funds was 28% to Public Education. This \$527,805 supplied free films, pamphlets, exhibits and posters for all Texans through school, church and civic groups and on display at shopping centers and conventions sites. A new program in the public education effort was the development of a fleet of Cancer Mobile Van Exhibits, small trucks which contain moving exhibits on smoking and lung cancer, and on other major kinds of cancer.

Service to cancer patients by volunteers of the American Cancer Society used 13% of the funds this year. The \$248,551 purchased dressings, sickroom supplies and loan closet items which are all given to cancer patients upon authorization by a physician. Volunteers also provided transportation and a range of other services to cancer patients and their families.

Former Friona Boy Wins Squaws Take Trophy At Boys Ranch

Bobby Drinkard, one of the two former Friona boys now making their home at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, was awarded the first place trophy in the 117 pound division of the Boys Ranch Intramural Wrestling Tournament.

Sixteen-year-old Bobby, who has been at Boys Ranch for almost three years, is a sophomore in the Ranch's fully-accredited, 12-grade school system. Bobby also participates in the Vocational Agriculture Program, one of the 16 skills available to Boys Ranchers.

To win the first place trophy in his division, Bobby had to outperform all the other Ranchers of his weight since all 346 Ranchers, with the exception of varsity wrestlers, participated in the tournament. The intramural wrestling tournament consisted of 375 matches held in Cal Farley Gymnasium

and lasted for 4 weeks. Forty-four boys made the finals and the winner of each division was awarded a trophy, with medals going to the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place finishers.

The intramural amateur wrestling tournament is one of the most important events at the Ranch. It allows a large number of boys to win the recognition that was so greatly stressed by the late Cal Farley, founder of Boys Ranch, who was himself a world-champion welterweight wrestler as well as a successful Amarillo businessman. Since Boys Ranch was established in 1939 by Cal Farley, it has helped over 2,000 boys grow up by successful men and good citizens.

Also from Friona and now making his home at Boys Ranch is Don Brecht.

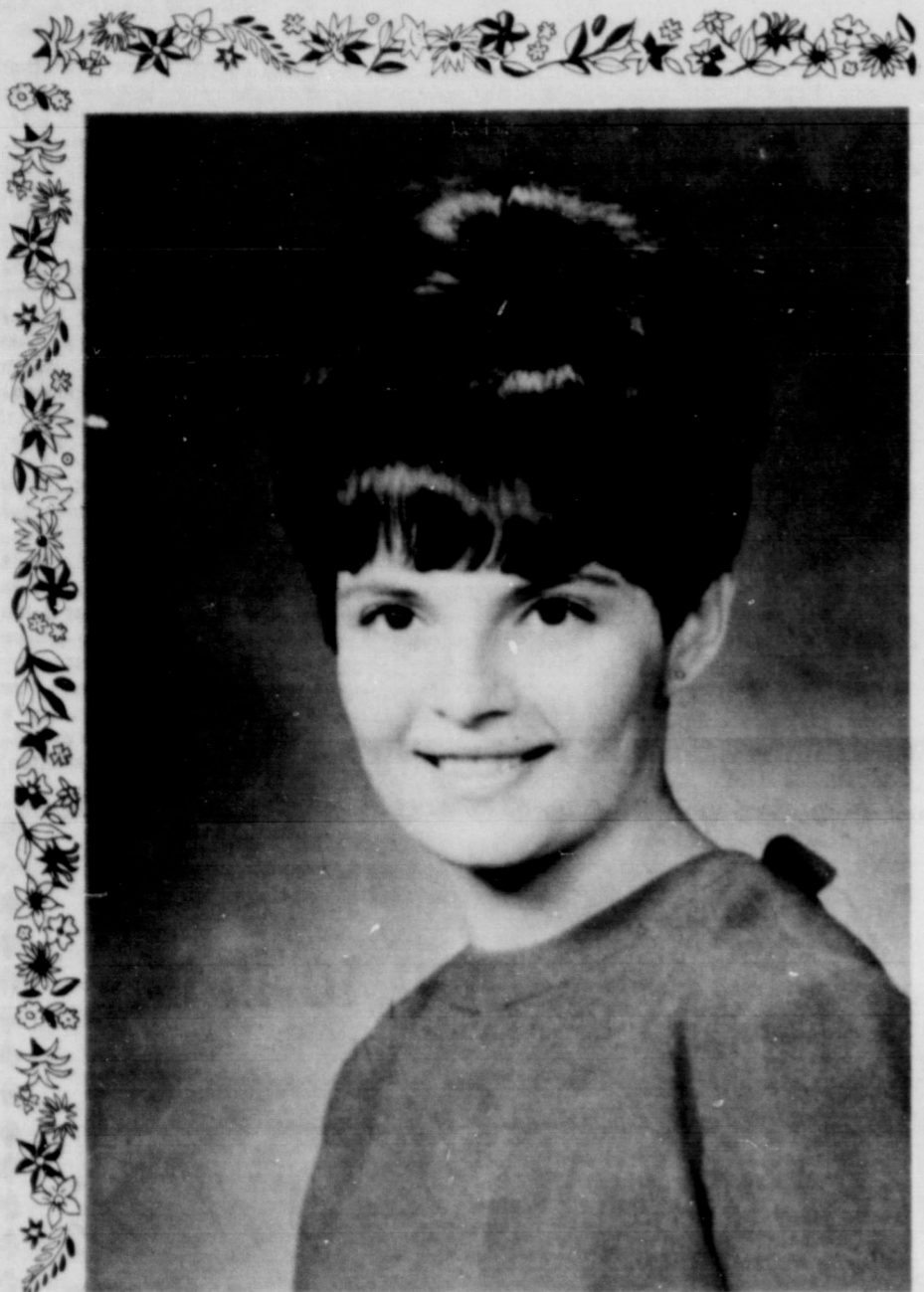

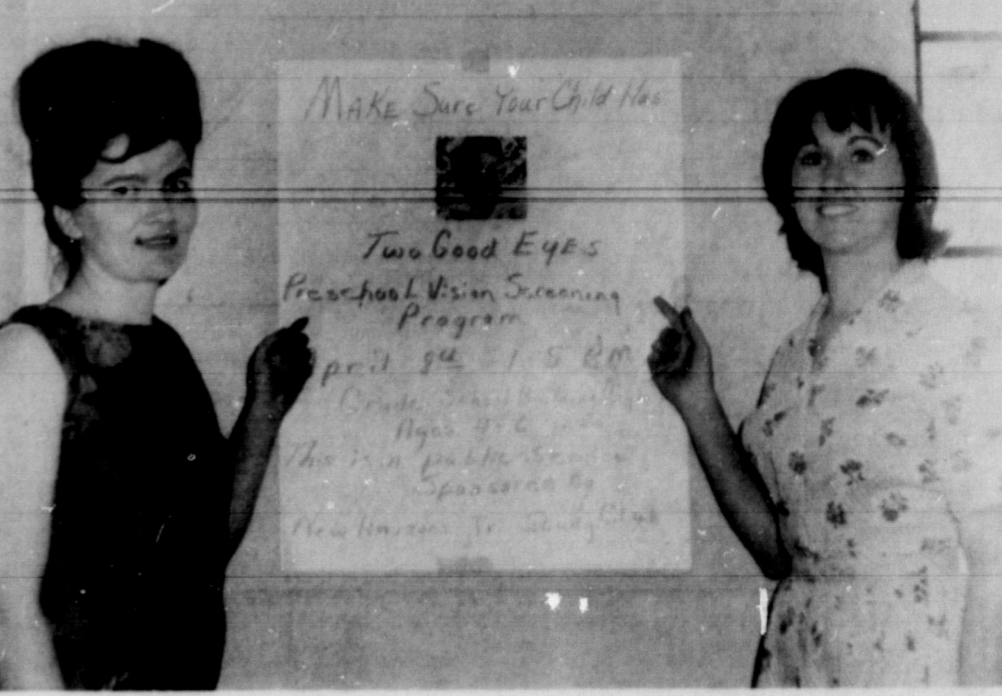

Visual Clinic Local Club Women To Be Conducted Receive Awards

A visual clinic for children ages four through six will be conducted in the elementary school gymnasium from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Saturday, April 8. Free eye tests will be administered by members of New Horizons Junior Study Club who have been trained to detect amblyopia or "lazy eye blindness."

The Texas Society For The Prevention of Blindness, co-sponsor of the clinic, stresses that the volunteers have not been taught diagnostic techniques, but have been trained to administer a simple vision test to children in this age bracket. Failure to pass the test by any child will be reported to the parents by letter and will be an indication that the child should be taken for a complete medical eye examination.

One of the major eye defects which should be detected and treated as soon as possible is Amblyopia or "lazy eye blindness." The defect can result in permanent visual damage unless treated before a child reaches the age of seven. In Amblyopia one is defective and the child uses only the good eye, thus preventing total development of vision in the weaker eye.

Parents of children in the four to six age group are urged by Dr. John Humphrey, city health officer, and Mrs. Jimmy Maynard, chairman of the project to bring their children to the gymnasium for the free clinic.
