



Farm Bureau Office in Charge of **SCD Equipment** The Cochran Soil Conservation

District equipment is now in the custody of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Palmer. They are handling the equipment out of the Cochran County Farm Bureau office, three blocks east of the Court House on the Levelland Highway.

To rent the equipment, contact the custodian between 1 and 5 p. m. Monday through Saturday. By rules set up by the District Board of Supervisors, a deposit is required on equipment prior to rental. When the equipment is returned and rental charges paid, the deposit is returned.

District equipment, that is available to cooperators for the application of soil and water conservation practices are - Stubble Mulch Plow. Land Planes. Grass Seeders, Farm levels, Broadcast Seeders and a Manure Spreader, Users of the District Equipment are urged to maintain the equipment to keep repair cost at a low level. Cost of repair of equipment will be from funds collected through rentals.

Good Conservation equipment provides the means for carrying out a good conservation plan. Conservation pays it does not cost.

#### Agt. Recommends Spraying of **Peach Trees**

The County Agent's office has been contacted many times in the last few days regarding the control of the caterpillar larvae and other larvae on peach trees, which are heavily in bloom. Every year peach trees should be sprayed four times at three week intervals beginning at the bud stage. If you haven't started, I would start immediately and spray four times at three week intervals, said the

The control of this larvae may be obtained by spraying with one of the following compounds. Use the wettable powder in each compound, as that means it is soluable in water. #### **Nubroot Reduces** Cotton Yield By 26 Percent

Deterioration of the embryo roots within cottonseeds is probably the pricipal cause of nubroot a condition which can reduce yields by 25 percent, according to Harlan Smith, extension plant patholigist.

Cotton plants with nubroot are weaker and set fewer bolls than normal plants, tend to wilt readily, and may topple over during periods of moisture stress. In some years this condition results in a big loss for Texas cotton pro-

Scientists of USDA's Agricultural Research Service traced nubroot to seed deterioration after noting that many seedlings grown from deteriorated seeds had injured radicles or primary roots. It had previously been found that high temperature and humidty during storage damage the embryo plants within cottonseeds and that seedlings grown from such seeds are less vigorous than normal. It is known, Smith said, that nubroot is a part of the cotton seedling disease complex when caused by fungi.

The condition may also be caused by strangulation of roots by soil compaction or hardpan, or damage to seedlings by soil fungi, the patholigist said. Nubroot oc curred in plants grown from deteriorated cottonseed, however, when neither soil conditions nor fungi was a contributing factor. As a test, scientists selected 100 seedings with damaged radicles

and grew them in sterilized soil along with 20 normal seedlings. Examination of half of the plants six weeks later and the other half three months later showed that all the seedlings with damaged radicles grew into plants with varying degrees of nubroot. The norseedlings produced plants

with normal taproots. These results, Smith added, show the importance of finding adequate tests to determine the degree of deterioration of seed as a means of improving stands
