SANCTIONS IDEA

Council Hears Building Plan By R.L. Fleming

Contractor R.L. Fleming appeared before the Friona City Council Monday night and presented a plan whereby he would construct five duplex apartments on the west of Fifth Street.

Fleming stated that if and when his deal for the land is completed, he would bring it within the city limits and request the city make it a "C-Zone" for brick veneer apartments, and furnish the area with water, sewer and trash service.

Mayor W.L. (Preach) Edelman voiced tentative approval of the request, and advised Fleming to draw up the necessary legal documents for annexation when the land deal is completed, for approval at the next council meeting.

The land is west of and adjacent to block four in the Stanley addition. It fronts on West Fifth Street (Loop 270), just

south of the McClothin Trailer Court.

Fleming purposes to build five two-unit apartments, with double garage separating the living quarters.

In other business Monday, the council awarded Western Fence Co. of Amarillo the contract for a cyclone-type fence to enclose water well number 7, on a bid of \$694.

A request for the city to provide water service to a trailer house sited outside the city limits died for lack of action.

A request for donation of water service to the Girl Scout Hut under construction was denied, as the state constitution forbids a city granting public money to any individual or group.

In his monthly report to the council on city activities, City Manager Jake Outland pointed out that his office coordinated the collection of delinquent tax-

es with the City Attorney. Some success was made in the collections.

Four building permits were issued during the month. Principal item was a \$21,000 permit for a filling station. Also included were permits for an addition to a residence, estimated at \$3,500; and two storage facilities estimated at \$30,100. This made the total construction for April \$30,100.

Water department records showed 21,890,900 gallons of water pumped during April, an average of 729,363 gallons per day and an increase of 200,000 gallons over the previous month. A total of .56 inches of rainfall was measured for the month.

One new water tap was made, to bring the total active taps to 1047. Removal of well sand both ground storage tanks was done the first week of the month. Approximately 18 meter leaks

and repairs were made during the last week of the month.

One new sewer tap was made, to bring the total to 983 active taps at the end of April. Three sewer stoppages were cleared during the month.

Four fire alarms were answered during April. Three were outside the city limits. Greatest loss was at the Jack Moseley farm where an explosion caused total loss to the residence. A barn and farm equipment were lost on the Kenneth Neill Farm, estimated to be worth \$2,000.

The one fire call inside the city limits was to an automobile at the hospital parking lot, an estimated damage of \$100.

Police department records show 37 arrests during the month. Twenty-one were traffic violations; seven for minors in possession or consumption of liquor; three driving while intoxicated; two drunkenness, and one each for aggravated assault, purchasing alcoholic beverage for minors, making false reports and traffic warrant.

Seven burglaries were investigated with a total of \$22 in losses and \$200 in damage to property. There were five domestic disturbances, four reports of prowlers, three thefts, two shoplifting charges, two dogs poisonings and one attempted assault. Two traffic accidents resulted in an estimated \$600 in damage.

Street department employees spent two days mowing weeds along the right of ways during the last of the month.

Three trucks were hauling trash during the annual Spring Clean-up week, which resulted in much improvement throughout various areas of the city.

The library board met at its appointed hour April 19 for its monthly business session. It was reported that 250 books were received on loan from the State Library.

Cotton John's film "On the Square" will be shown as a highlight of the meeting. Also, Mary Rando, Friona High School student, will present "I Am the Nation".

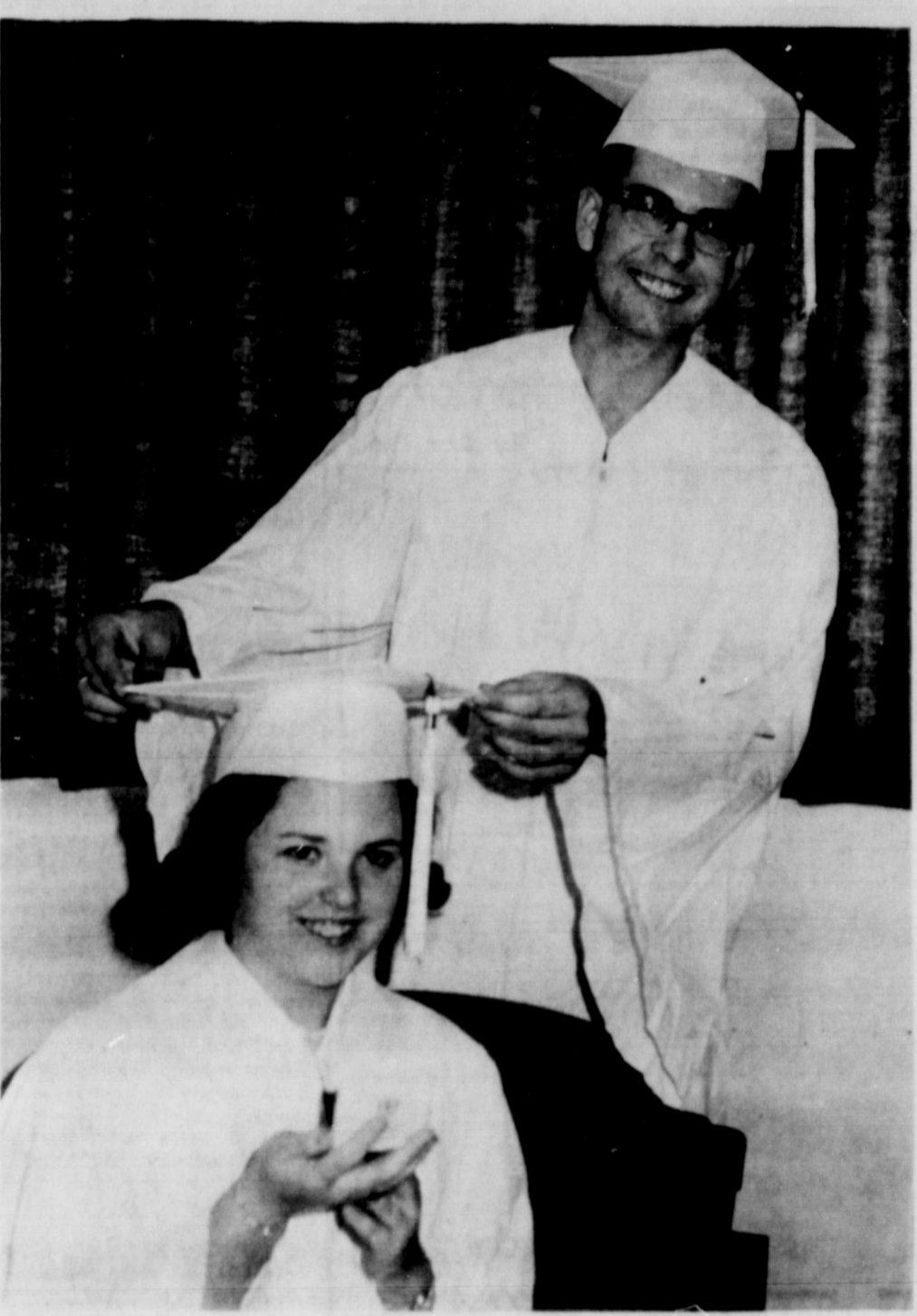
Refreshments will be served and door prizes will be awarded. Dividend checks for the past year's patronage will be disbursed.

Greedy Landowners Can Ruin Growth Potential

Word has come to us that some individuals look upon the location of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. in Friona as an opportunity to "clean up" on a real estate deal.

We would hasten to warn that this is a good way to turn prospective citizens and business away from Friona, especially in light of the fact that other nearby towns are said to have made certain choice lots readily available.

Rather than trying to "make a killing" (which probably will actually result in a perpetual vacant lot), we would suggest that lots be made as available as possible for residential and business building.

When you get down to it, one of the main reasons that the industrial development committee is buying the 200 acres and donating

it to Missouri Beef Packers is to assure that the company gets its land at a reasonable price.

More prospective industries and businesses are "run off" by small towns where greedy landowners hike the price of lots than any other single factor.

Many towns are almost ghost towns today which might have been thriving cities if landowners would have sold their land at a decent price to those wanting to develop it.

Landowners should realize that when businesses come to town they make the town more of a shopping center. Then the whole town is benefitted, making all property worth more. Without the businesses and/or residents, the property isn't worth much.

Bill To Outlaw Desecration Of Flag

A bill to curb deliberate and defiant desecration of the American Flag was introduced today by Representative Bob Price.

The House Judiciary Committee will begin hearings on Price's bill next week. Price said he would appear before a Texas sub-committee with Texas Senator John Tower and Tower's brother, Lawrence, who is the President of the American Flag Foundation.

"It is strange indeed," Price said, "to see on the same day

Price's bill would authorize punishment for desecration of the U.S. Flag by up to a years imprisonment and a \$1,000 fine.

Friona and Hereford have landed some big packing plants recently. Spearman is still in the running for a plant and others, we are sure, are working on securing industry.

Fast transportation and communications make the dispersal of industry possible and the small towns have some strong

selling points to attract these industries. Besides the big advantages, there are some little things the small towns have that can mean a lot.

Lack of vandalism to property could mean much to an industry. Industry in cities spend thousands of dollars every year for repairing vandalism. It is a small problem in a little town.

Closer relations between employees. In a small town management and labor are together more socially, therefore, there is a better understanding of each others problems.

Better family conditions. In a small town there is less chance for children to become involved in juvenile problems,

workers spend less time going to and from work and have more time for their families, adults and children have more time opportunity to be a part of activities in which they are interested in churches, clubs, civic affairs, schools and youth activities.

With all the regular things industries check before locating, land values, taxes, schools, raw materials, transportation, labor supply, being favorable these extras should be able to tip the balance in favor of small towns on many industries.

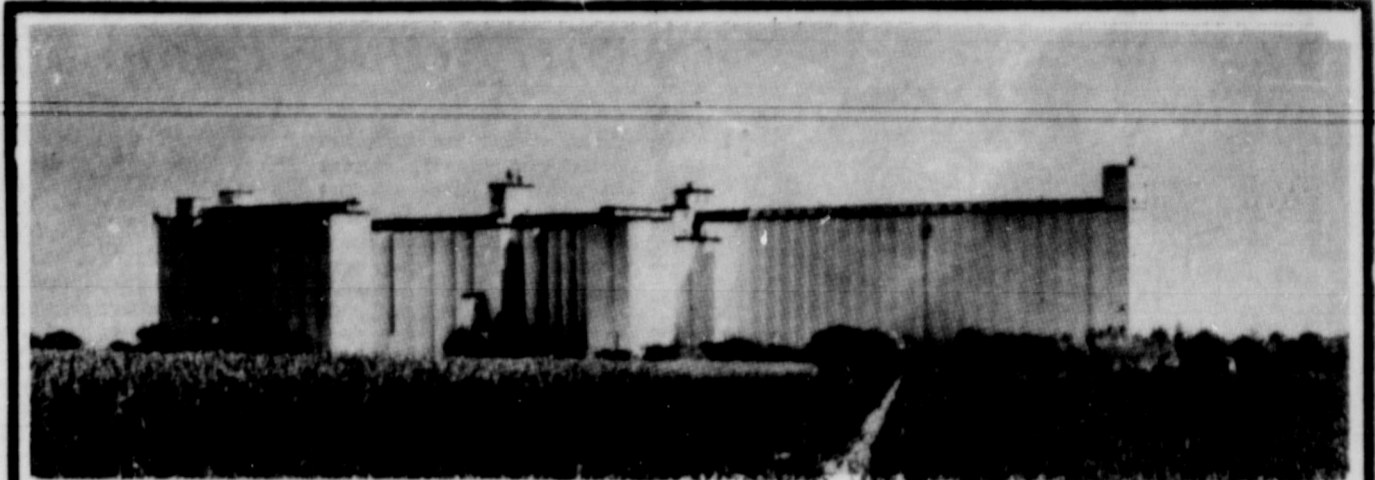

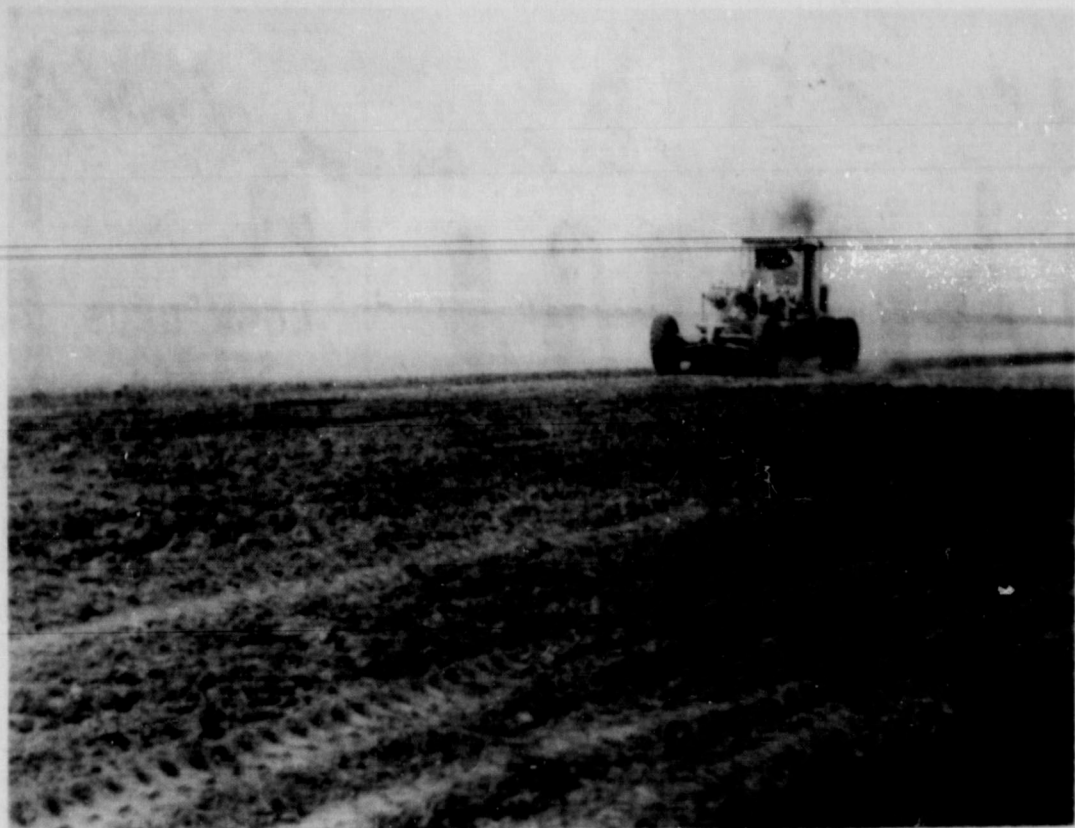

More information and pre-registration can be accomplished by contacting doctors in the area, or members of the Shrine. The clinic is for children from infancy to 18 years of age. All costs are met by the Shrines and the specialists, doctors and nurses donate their time. Registration in Hereford begins at 8:30 a.m. and will extend throughout the day, May 13. Pre-registration blanks are available from Shrine members in Bovina.

Transfer Question To Face Cotton Farmers

Parmer County cotton farmers will vote within the next few days to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county. Referendum on the question will be conducted during the period of May 15th through May 19th. Ballots may be returned by mail or delivered by hand to the ASCS County Office during that time.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next two years to farms which are owned or controlled by someone else and located in other countries. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote permits such transfers during the next two years, 1968 and 1969.

Two similar referendums

were conducted in 1965 and 1966 throughout the cotton belt, and growers in 412 counties have already approved the allotment transfers. The vote this time will be held only in counties where such transfers have not previously been approved.

It is to be pointed out that voting by mail is easy and convenient, and the vote therefore should be large and fully representative of the wishes of the cotton farmers in this county.

Ballots are being mailed on Friday, May 12, 1967 to all cotton producers on record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office.

Air Mail Postal Rates Are Increased

An increase of international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster Wright Williams announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail -- averaging 13% -- were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, Postmaster Williams said.

This was the first general increase in international rates since July, 1961.

- The increases are:
1. Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13¢ a half ounce to 15¢.
 2. Airmail to the rest of the Western Hemisphere remains 15¢ a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico.
 3. Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15¢ a half ounce to 20¢.
 4. Airmail letters rates to

the rest of the world remain unchanged at 25¢ a half ounce.

5. Aerogrammes and post cards increased 2¢ each from 11¢ to 13¢.

6. Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10¢ per piece to all countries except Canada.

7. Letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11¢ to 13¢. Post cards raised from 7¢ to 8¢.

8. Most printed matter, including publications, increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for six months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of packages of publications addressed to Canada post offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.

9. Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased 20¢ a parcel, an average of 7%.

"Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface 3rd class type printed matter to Canada and Mexico correspond to U.S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time," Postmaster Williams said.

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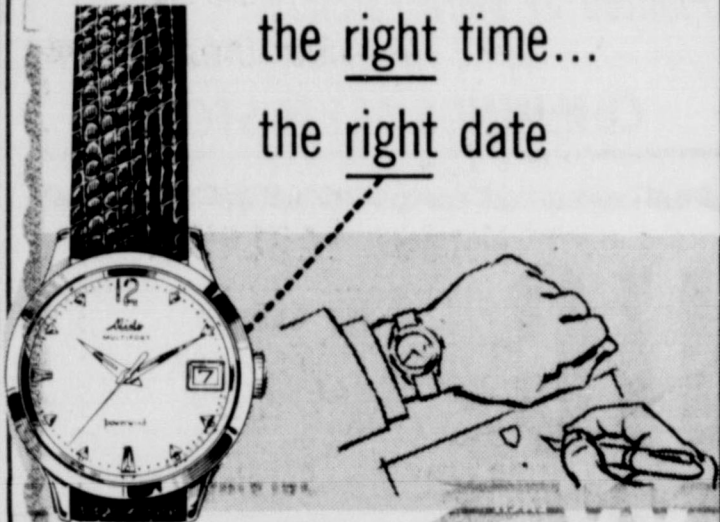
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
