

Gentle Rains Soak Friona Area Farmland

The Friona area, which had been almost void of rain for nine months prior to June 1 has been treated to gentle, soaking rains for the past week or two, and it finally seems to have "rained on everybody."

Farmers in the area report up to two and one-half inches of rain last weekend, when rain was received all over the area, and it was the type that gave farmers "100 cents on the dollar" -- every drop soaking in.

C.V. Potts, who farms 20 miles northwest of Friona in the Rhea Community, reported two and a half inches at his place last weekend. He said he had just started cutting wheat when the rains came, so most of it is still in the field. Clyde Weatherly reports that a lot of his wheat is still uncut also.

Larry Fairchild, who farms 18 miles southeast of town, reported that he received an inch of rain which took "all day Sunday" to fall. This was the story with most of the farmers, so the rain must have been general.

On the Raymond Cook farm southwest of town,

1.7 inches were recorded Saturday night and Sunday, and a total of 6.5 inches during the month.

At Fleming & Son Gin, nine miles south of Friona, reports were of 1.5 inches of rain Saturday and Sunday. Arthur Drake, three miles south of town, had 1.3 inches.

Hank Wheeler of Continental Grain Co. said that from talking with some of the area farmers, they have received up to 1.75 inches of rain last Thursday and Friday, and another inch over the weekend.

"Wheeler estimated that 65 per cent of the total wheat crop had been cut before the rain. "It came

down slow and easy; one of those million-dollar rains," said Wheeler. "It will probably save one watering for the farmers and maybe more."

Official measurements at the City of Friona show 1.33 inches of rain during the past week. This brings the total for June to 3.43 which is approaching the total for the same month in 1966, which totaled 4.22 inches.

The total for the year, as measured by the City of Friona, now stands at 4.54 inches, after only 1.28 inches had been measured the first five months of the year. A total of 5.97 inches had been measured during the first six months of 1966.

How long has it been since we had a day like we had this past Sunday? We can't remember, offhand. The nice, gentle rain for most of the day, slowly soaking into the ground, was really a treat for the Friona area.

To top it all off, we burned wood in the fireplace in our home, and someone else in our block did likewise, for we smelled the smoke when we returned home from church.

It's probably been a long time since fireplaces were stoked up in Friona as late (or early?) as June 25.

The rain we had Saturday night and Sunday closely resembles the type of rain which Northern California gets. We lived near San Francisco in 1960 and 1961, and that's the kind of rain we remember getting in the Bay Area.

In Northern California, instead of getting cold and having freezing weather during the winter - similar to our weekend rain. You seldom ever hear it thunder - it just clouds up and rains. And like most of our rain the past week, you don't hear it on the rooftops - it's so light.

In fact, Northern California's rain isn't limited to the winter. Such is also the fare in the summertime, along with its accompanying low temperatures, such as we experienced in Friona on Sunday.

The extreme coolness of the area prompted someone to say one time: "The coldest winter I ever spent was a summer in San Francisco."

Those of you who have been there know what we're talking about. You don't dare go out on a summer night in that area without a heavy coat -- unless you're pretty thick-skinned.

The rains of the past couple of weeks have been real money-makers for Friona area farmers. They have been the kind that have yielded 100 per cent on an inch measurement.

We had some newly-plowed ground at our place this weekend, and despite measuring an inch and one-half of moisture, the ground never did hold water. Naturally, when it takes over 12 hours to measure an inch of rain, you're going to get full value from the moisture.

When you're without a pastor, such as is our case at the First Baptist Church, it's a disadvantage, but one good thing about it is the fact that while without a permanent preacher, we've been fortunate enough to hear several good ones.

This past Sunday, for instance, we had Dennis Bennett, ministerial student at Wayland College. Bennett is the son-in-law of the Ralph Taylor, and is married to the former Judy Taylor.

The previous Sunday, we had heard another Friona product, Lee Euler, who is pastor of a church in Albuquerque, for our speaker. Euler is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Euler, and the brother of Raymond Euler.

A professor at East Texas State University is compiling a dictionary of place names in Texas, and has asked Farmer County residents to give him some help. He wants to know the origin of names within the county.

Dr. Fred Tarpley has the origin of most of the names within the county, but has submitted the following for the consideration of residents: Braley, Catfish Draw, Hinkston, Langer, Matthew, Running Water Draw and Sounjer.

We think the explanation as to the naming of Catfish and Running Water are simple enough; but perhaps there is something more definite behind the names than the simple explanation.

If any reader has explanations of any of the above seven names, they are urged to call or write us at the Star, and we will send the explanation on to Dr. Tarpley.

Your help will be appreciated, we are sure.

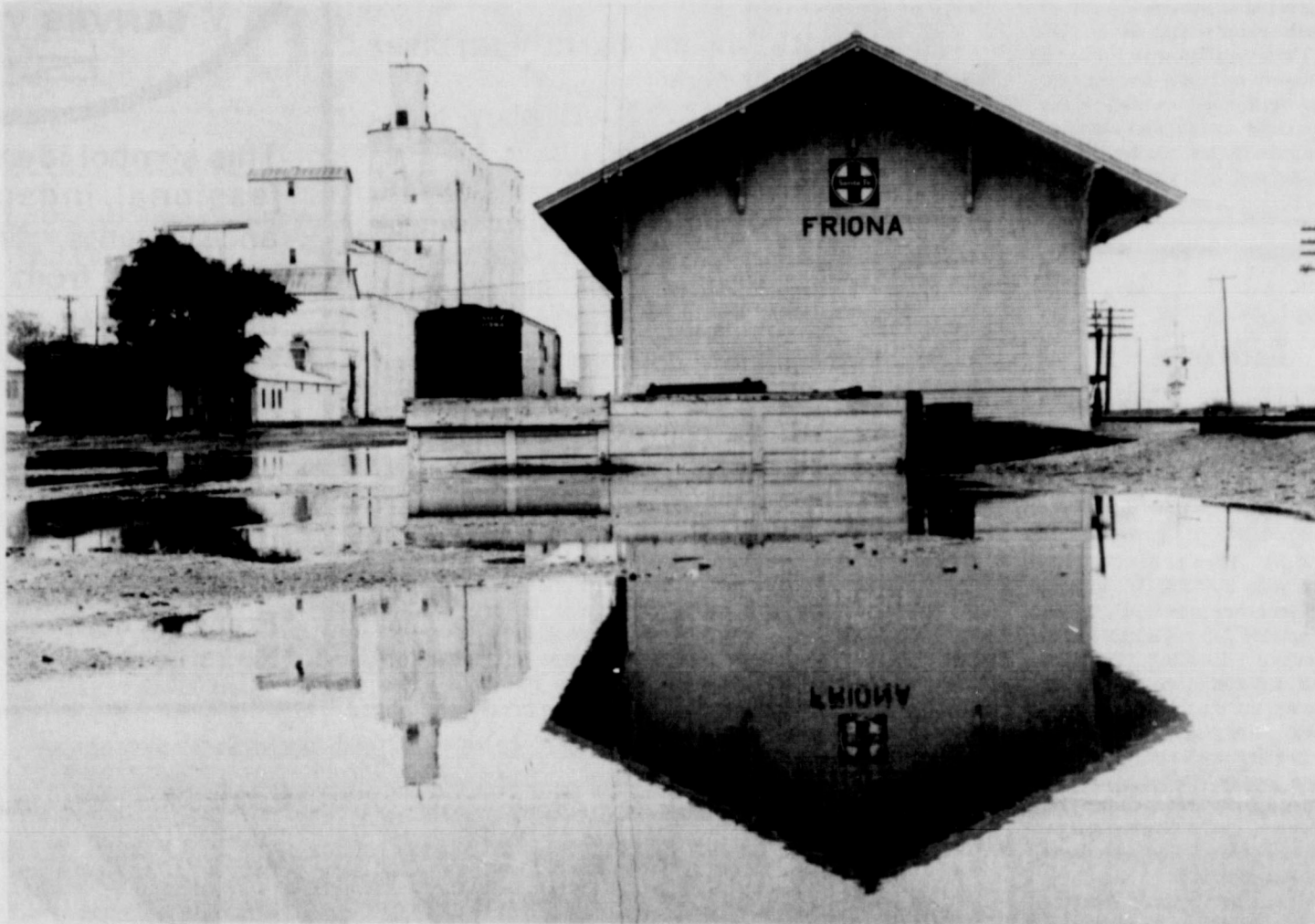

Services Held For W.H. Flippin, Jr.

Funeral services were held Monday for W.H. (Bill) Flippin, Jr., a popular Friona figure for the past 30 years.

Flippin, active in community affairs and widely known for his breeding of horses and cattle, died last Saturday morning after suffering a massive heart-attack.

He moved to Deaf Smith County with his family in 1926, and later in 1938 lived in the Black community, where he engaged in farming with his father.

In 1940, Flippin was married to the former Orma White, and the couple made their home a mile north of town.

Flippin was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite, Shriners, and had recently been initiated as Worthy Patron of the Order of Eastern Star.

He was active in community affairs, taking an interest in the Jaycee rodeos, horse shows, Antique Club, and also helped with Maize Days and Memorial Day activities. He served on the board of directors for the Credit Union and Friona American Legion Post.

A member of Union Congregational Church, Flippin had served in many capacities, such

as a member of the Board of Deacons, Board of Trustees, and most recently had been serving on the executive board of the building committee.

The Flippins had no children of their own, but Bill had acted as a "second father" to various Friona youngsters, who mourned his passing as they would their father's.

Survivors, besides his wife, Orma, are his mother, Mrs.

Lella Flippin of Friona; a brother, Mac, of Amarillo, and two sisters, Mrs. Ray Eads of Phoenix, Ariz., and Mrs. R.D. Mason of Alamogordo, N.M.

Funeral services were conducted at Union Congregational Church, Rev. Paul Mohr, pastor, officiated. Pallbearers were Shirley Smith, Joe Mann, Milburn Bennett, Robert Zetzsche, Virgil Phipps and Glenn E. Reeve, Jr.

It's a small world. Travelers from Texas meet other Texans in the nation's capitol. A lady from Spain overhears a word of Spanish and a contact is made with a foreign country. Transportation and communication are bringing all of us closer and closer every year. Like many other modern conveniences this can be a two-edged sword.

If this "togetherness" is used to bring about better understanding between nations and peoples, all well and good. If it becomes a means of destroying our individuality—not so good.

As one travels, this tendency toward sameness is very apparent. One of our basic American creeds is that all men are created "equal," but that is not to say created "alike."
To lose our individuality is to lose the mainspring which makes us tick. If we permit ourselves to be forced into a common mold, personality disappears, character suffers, and we become mere walking zombies. America was not settled, nor was the west won by a bunch of "me too" men and women.

The everyday conventions, politeness, good manners, consideration for the feelings and the property of others, - these are the traits of a civilized people. These are the weapons used against ignorance and crime. Without them it would indeed be a hard, cruel, unfeeling world. But they should not be confused with the forces that would rob the common man of his individuality.

The Scottish Poet, Robert Burns, begged for a power that would enable us to see ourselves as others see us. Fine and dandy; but let us carry the request a step further, let us try to develop the habit of seeing ourselves as the Good Lord sees us. He created us all equal in His sight but vastly different in physical appearance and abilities. It is a paradox that these differences are held in common. Would we consider a forest beautiful if every tree were the same size and shape?

Let us not be caught up in a whirlwind of sameness, rather let us strive to travel in our own little orbits within the framework of decent human behavior. Then we may enjoy not only self-respect but the respect of others at home and abroad.

We will make our own news and write our own history and we prefer to have both recorded in a clear and factual manner. If such a record offends our enemies that's just too bad. Americans have no desire to be wet-nursed and spoon-fed into oblivion.

2. I shall not drive after drinking.
3. I shall not pass on curves, hills or where the view is obstructed.
4. I shall not drive if drowsy or fatigued.
5. I shall dim my lights when other cars approach at night.
6. I shall observe and obey highway signs -- the signs of life.
7. I shall slow down at schools, playgrounds, hospitals and other danger zones.
8. I shall slow down at schools, sections.

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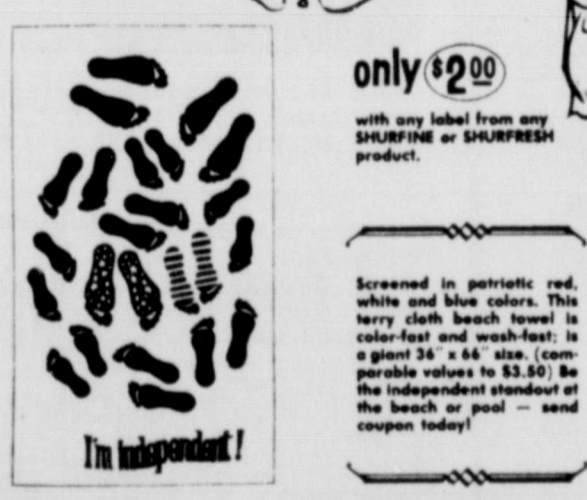

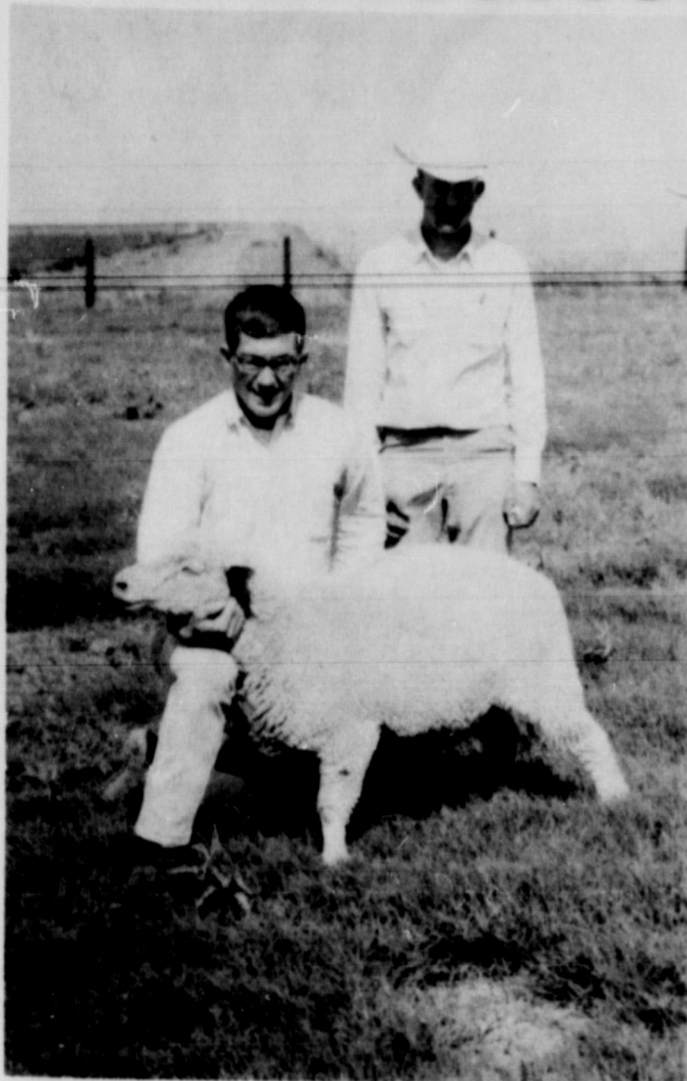

The word anulled to "simple shoes and handbags" and not "silver." These things happen sometimes regardless of how careful we are.

FOOD IDEAS

Budgets are always good conversation pieces. If you're interested in how to get the most for your food money, these practical tips may help.

Make note of supermarket special sale ads and plan menus that take advantage of them. Plan your menus ahead as much as a week in advance. Pre-planning makes shopping easier and will help you to avoid monotony and repeated use of the same foods at mealtime.

Since a great deal of food money goes for impulse spending, jot down a grocery list and stick to it.

You can serve tempting and economical main dishes and a different one each day. Following are some suggestions:

After one hearty dinner on baked canned ham, use what's left over in a pleasing main-dish salad. Combine cubes of canned ham and sharp cheese with drained canned cut green beans and some chopped green onions. Then toss the ham mixture with vinegar-sparked mayonnaise and season to taste. Serve it chilled and mounded in lettuce cups with a colorful garnish of cucumber slices and tomato wedges.

EASY TO FIX HOT WEATHER DISHES

These are always welcome and can be economical and can meet the daily nutritional needs to.

For a favorite warm weather salad meal, mound shredded lettuce on a platter and put chunks of drained canned salmon on it. Complete the arrangement with deviled eggs, cucumber wedges, and slices of tomatoes. Serve French dressing with this.

Prepare a main dish on top of the range by tender-cooking chopped onion with sliced vienna sausages in butter. Gently stir in canned pork and beans, add a little catsup, and garnish with crushed corn chips at serving time.

Precooked dry beans that cook in 20 to 30 minutes are now on the market in most states. Old fashioned navy beans soup or popular baked beans can be ready for the table in less than an hour from start to finish.

Start asking for these at your grocery store - they are real time savers.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Wheat Harvest Reaping Completion.

What harvest in the county should reach completion by around June 30. The larger portion of the wheat was harvested during the week June 19-24th. The average yields reported for this week is between 30-35 bushels per acre. A few yields of around 50 bushels have been reported but very few.

SORGHUM AND COTTON
Corn and milo are making good growth. Some farmers have reported sorghum showing signs of water stress. This was prior to rains this past weekend.

I saw few squares forming in one cotton field this week, however, cotton is not

making too much growth yet.

When a field starts squaring farmers should be on the look-out for fleahoppers and their damage. Fleahoppers damage the small, young squares but do not cause larger squares or bolls to shed. After plants have set more fruit than the cotton can mature under a given set of growing conditions, discontinue fleahopper control. It is recommended that treatment begin when 15 to 35 hoppers are found per 100 terminals.

There is one sure way to determine the quality of hay. Have it tested. Al Novosad, Extension Pasture Specialist, says results from the A&M Forage Testing Service show a wide range of differences in quality and feed values of forages tested. A relatively new figure is being included in the analyses - not energy. Novosad says it is a more accurate indication of the worth of a forage than crude protein or total digestible nutrients.

The ever-increasing importance of pastures and forage crops to Texas Agriculture will be emphasized during the annual short course. The short-course will be held July 6-7.

Sturdy Variety Of Wheat Available

Fifteen years of breeding work have provided Texas growers with a "shorty" wheat for irrigation and other high production areas.

The new variety, named Sturdy for its ability to stand up in storms and with heavy loads of grain, will be available after the 1967 harvest from certified seed growers and seedsmen in Texas.

Sturdy was developed cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U.S. Department of Agriculture by a team of researchers at several stations. The researchers are Dr. I.M. Atkins and Dr. O.W. Merkle of Texas A&M University, Dr. K.E. Porter of the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, and K.A. Lahr of the Rolling Plains Soil and Crops Research Station at Chillicothe.

Dr. Atkins said the variety came from a complex cross made in 1951 involving several hard, red winter wheat experimental strains and a short stature type from Japan.

"While not related to the famous Gaines wheat, developed in the Pacific Northwest, it is similar in that it produces a short, sturdy plant that will resist lodging by storms," he said.

Although Sturdy is a hard red winter wheat, Dr. Atkins points out that its adaptation is more limited than most varieties. Regional and state tests have shown that it probably is not winter hardy enough in areas north of Texas.

"Furthermore, without irrigation it may not grow sufficiently tall for normal combine harvesting in very dry seasons," the agronomist added.

Plants of sturdy wheat are six to 10 inches shorter than present commercial varieties when irrigated or grown under high fertility levels. The trait boosts grain yields and avoids excessive straw production.

"Heavy straw growth is difficult to combine and decays slowly during the summer, sometimes being detrimental to a fall seed crop that follows," Atkins explained. "Sturdy frequently sets three and sometimes four seed per spikelet, and this contributes to high yields."

The new variety is early maturing, only two or three days later than Triumph Wheat. Plants are resistant to present races of leaf rust but not to stem rust.

Milling and characteristics of Sturdy, Atkins said, are superior in all respects for commercial bakery flour. The variety's quality has been approved by state and federal agencies and by the Crop Quality Council.

SS Claims May Be Reconsidered

"In a recent news story I pointed out that a claimant who did not agree with the decision reached in his social security case could request that his claim be reconsidered," John Troop, social security Representative for this area, stated today.

If the claim is again denied after such reconsideration, the claimant still doesn't have to give up and accept the decision if he feels it is wrong. He has six more months in which to request a hearing, in or near his community, by a Hearing Examiner. There he may bring witnesses and/or new evidence if he wishes.

The area of disagreement are talked out in a semi-judicial atmosphere, after which the Hearing Examiner studies the file, consults precedents, and in disability claims may secure the opinions of medical consultants and vocational experts. He then issues a decision upholding the previous denial, or reversing them and awarding the claim.

If he denies the claim, it's still not the end of the road. The claimant can request that his case be reviewed before the Appeals Council in Washington, or if this fails, can take the case to the Federal Courts.

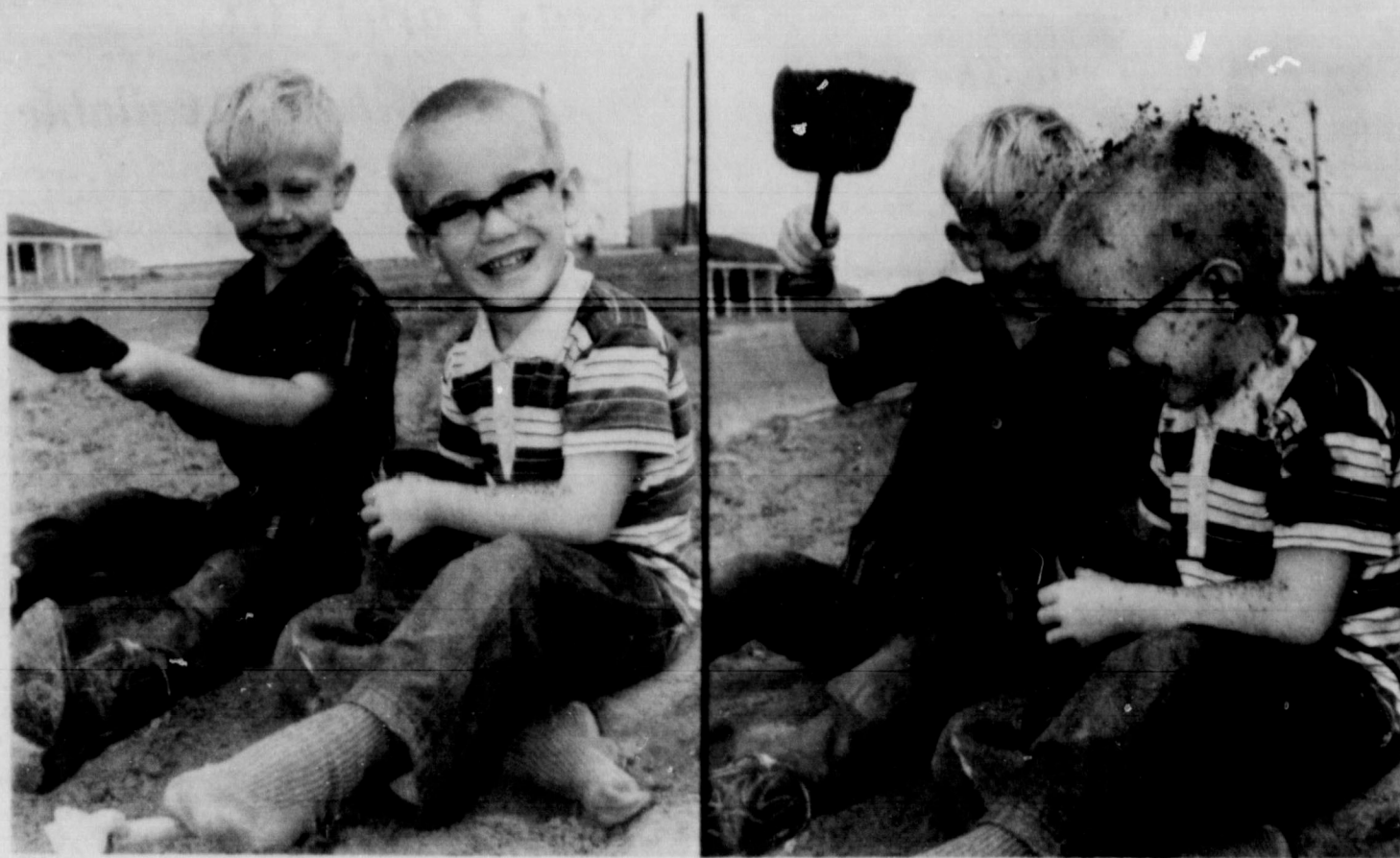

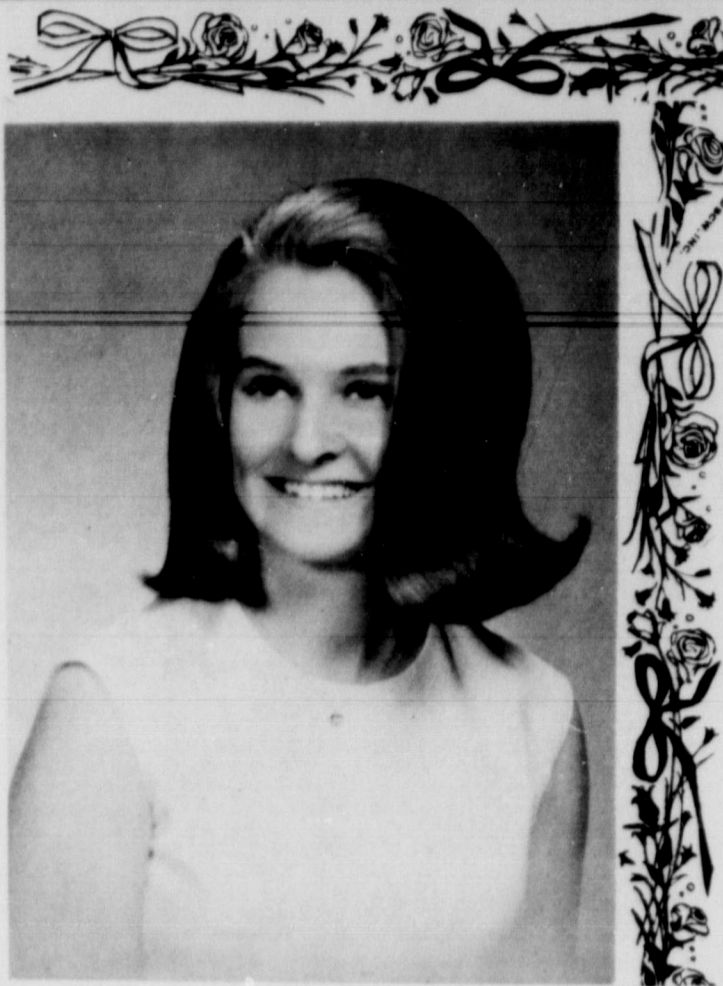
