Packers Hiring Employees; May 6 Set As Target Date

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Last week we predicted in our editorial that Saturday and Sunday would be the biggest day in the history of Friona. However, at the time of the writing, we had no idea just how big the weekend would turn out to be. The dedication and open house at Missouri Beef Packers exceeded the fondest dreams of all who had worked toward the project -- from the Missouri Beef officials to the Friona Chamber of Commerce members.

The weather on Saturday was about as nice for an outdoor event as you could ask, at this time of the year. It got a little gusty at times during the program, but nothing like it had been the day or two previously, and even on Sunday.

And, while Sunday reverted back to the high winds which have plagued the area all month this did not hamper the crowd, which literally came in droves to see the magnificent new plant.

They came from all over -- from Amarillo and Lubbock, Hereford, Bovina and Muleshoe -- just to name a few places, besides Friona. We'd say the majority of the residents of Friona made the tour. It was a day to behold.

Friona's open house topped the turnout experienced at Missouri Beef's Rock Port plant, even using conservative estimates. According to officials, some 6,000 people toured the Missouri plant in 1966, as that plant held dedication and open house on the same day.

The tremendous turnout can be attributed to several factors -- chief of which is the publicity which the mammoth plant has received since the announcement of its location in Friona last April 27.

Area papers, plus radio and television stations gave continuous plugs for the dedication and open house programs. In addition, the Friona Chamber of Commerce, headed by president Charles Allen, and manager Ted Weaver, have been working tirelessly for the past several weeks -- mailing countless letters and making many arrangements for the events. Their efforts were rewarded this past weekend.

Most of our readers, loyal as they are, probably think the Friona Star rarely ever gets a real "scoop." (In fact, some of you told us as much in the past.)

However, Santa Fe president John S. Reed told us while here that the Star had scooped some of the largest newspapers in the nation, along with Life and Look magazine, in getting the full-page advertisement which Santa Fe carried in last week's record-setting issue of the Star. "This was a special ad, which has been created for release later this month and in May. To my knowledge, this was its first publication anywhere," Reed told us.

We also were among the first to run a picture-story showing Texas Governor John Connally

Greatest Need Said In Loading Dept.

Missouri Beef Packers was in the final "wrapup" stage of construction this week, and the tedious job of hiring permanent employees for the production phase of its work was underway. The new Friona industry plant to begin production on Monday, May 6.

Fourteen supervisors have been named for the new packing plant, and it will be their jobs during the next two weeks to train employees for their various duties.

Jim Borgenquist is the kill floor supervisor; Ray Rodman is assistant kill floor supervisor. Ray Hutton is assistant kill floor supervisor and hot offal supervisor, as is Tom Fulgham. Jerry Lindstrom is offal foreman, and Walter Carnes is rendering foreman. Jerry Hornecker is assistant rendering supervisor.

Harry Stevens is maintenance foreman, Keith Staples is cooler foreman, Rod Kempe is assistant cooler foreman, Joe Fitzgerald is personnel manager, Dennis Wesley is traffic manager, Rufus Davis is chief maintenance engineer and John Allen is chief electrician.

Fitzgerald, the personnel manager, says the company will try to have 200 people employed by Monday, May 6. While the construction employees will be given first choice at remaining with the company, he urges others interested in working to put in their applications because the turnover would be the greatest during the first 60 to 90 days of operation.

Fitzgerald said he expected 90 per cent of the 160 permanent construction workers would be hired initially. "As a rule, they make good employees. They have constructed the plant, and they have a little more pride in it than the next person," Fitzgerald says.

"Pride is the ingredient which is most noticeably missing from many of the nation's industrial plants today. By using those who helped put the plant together, we recapture the spark of pride," he says.

The personnel manager indicated that those wishing to work must not only display dexterity, but in many cases must learn to be ambidextrous, or the ability to work with both hands.

Fitzgerald stated that the main needs for applicants appeared to be in the plant's loading department. This is where the halves and quarters of beef are taken from the chain to the packaging department, and requires healthy, husky men.

"This is one place in our operation where the employee has to have the desire to 'break in' to the job, sort of like getting in shape for football. It requires the person to be in excellent physical shape," Fitzgerald says.

Two Qualify For State

Friona High School qualified two students for the state literary meet, and placed third in the regional meet by scoring 54 points in regional Inter-scholastic League competition last Saturday at Lubbock.

Crista Evans, who placed first in girls poetry reading, and Norman Mohr, first in informative speaking, are the two who qualified for the state meet May 2-3-4 in Austin.

Three other entries placed second, and will be alternates to the state meet. These include the boys debate team composed of David Reeve and Bobby Thomas, Gary Crump in boys poetry reading and Ann Ayers in girls persuasive speaking.

Also winning points for FHS in the regional meet were the girls debate team of Terri Cummings and Becky Coffey, and Larry Truitt, third in ready writing. Truitt, who went to the state meet last year in the event, will also be an alternate this year.

Other entries in the regional meet were Kara Sides, informative speaking, and Belinda Mabry, shorthand.

Vet Sets Pet Shot Spot

For the benefit of those who may have missed the city's dog vaccination and registration clinic in March, a veterinarian will be on hand to administer rabies shots to pets, at Hi-Pro Feeds on East Highway 60 Friday from 3 to 5 p.m.

Dr. E.E. Kraus, DVM, Clovis, will be at Hi-Pro Feeds to provide a one-time service for pets, unless the demand proves greater than expected.

Monday Building Permits Hit Staggering \$125,600

Monday turned out to be the biggest day for building permits filed at the City of Friona since the permit was issued in 1965 for the new high school complex.

Six permits were issued, all for new homes, for a combined estimated value of \$125,600. Five of the homes will be built by Jim Cramer of Hereford in the Welch Addition, amounting to \$99,600 in construction.

The other permit was issued to Charles Bates in the Western Addition, for a \$26,000 home.

Building is off to a fast start thus far in 1968, and if it continues at the same pace for the rest of the year, an all-time building record could well be set.

AT PLANT

Opening Festivities Are Well-Attended

Nobody knows for sure exactly how many people came to the dedication and open house for Friona's Missouri Beef Packers last weekend -- but one thing for sure -- it was a mass of humanity.

Undoubtedly the largest crowd ever to come to Friona in one day went through the modern new plant on Sunday. Estimates ranged from 10,000 all the way to 20,000. There was no official head count, so officials could only guess.

However, the plant was literally full from about noon until almost 5 p.m. -- arriving at the plant ahead of the 1 p.m. "starting time" and staying past the published 5 p.m. "quitting time."

At one point for about an hour and one-half, traffic was backed up for over one-quarter of a mile on Highway 60 waiting to turn off at the Santa Fe crossing. There was a steady stream of cars in and out of the Missouri Beef location all afternoon long -- and parking was a premium most of the time.

At Saturday's dedication, some 500 people gathered at the outdoor affair, held on Santa Fe's loading dock west of the new plant. Several hundred other visitors toured the plant during the day, although not staying for the address, including Congressman Bob Price, who had an afternoon engagement elsewhere.

Congressman William Hull, U.S. Representative from Missouri, made the dedicatory address. Congressman Hull had also made the address at dedication ceremonies at MBP's Rock Port plant in 1966.

Hull praised MBP's decision to locate its new \$3.6 million plant in a rural area, which he said would help keep down the migration of people from rural area to overpopulated cities.

"Industries need to look to rural areas, where there are greater opportunities, better labor markets, safer investments and the water and air are cleaner," Cong. Hull stated.

Gene Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, praised the construction workers, who met the deadline in getting the plant ready for the April 20 affair. "The workmen outdid themselves. Not only did they meet their deadline, but they did a good job as well."

Frye praised the way the machinery operated during the test run on Thursday. "I wish we had had 2,000 head of cattle that day -- I think we could have slaughtered that many, things were working so well," he said.

The MBP head man said that the workmen had put together a plant second to none in capacity and workmanship. "Now it's up to us to perform -- and we'll do our part," he quipped.

A.L. Black, chairman of the industrial development committee, traced the development of the area from dryland farms to irrigated empires producing mountains of grain. He told how the area had become a great cattle-feeding center, and now was embarking into another

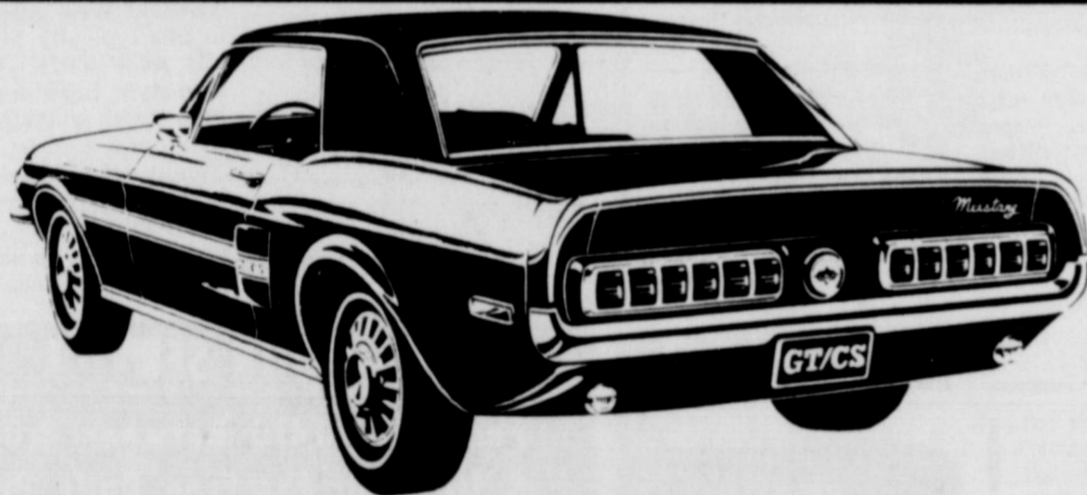
**New Mustang Now Showing**

The eagerly awaited Mustang GT/CS - the Mustang specially built for the West - has arrived at Southwest Ford Dealers.

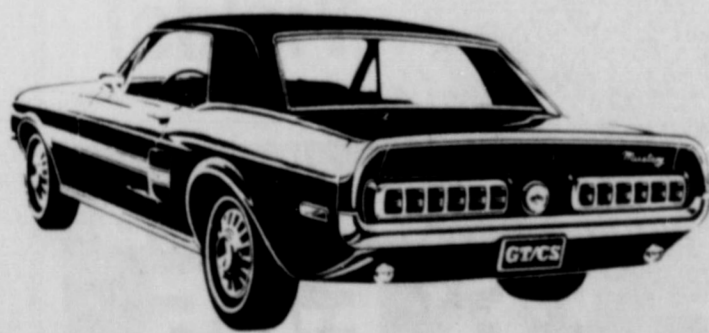

### Chambers Sells First To MBP

Warren (Mike) Chambers of Fairfax, Missouri, had the honor of selling the first steer to Missouri Beef Packers to be slaughtered in the new Friona plant.

Chambers, who purchased the animal at Friona Feed Yard, also had furnished the first steer slaughtered at the Rock Port, Mo. plant owned by the company, and also purchased the first share of stock sold by the company on February 2, 1965.

The steer, an Angus-Herford cross, weighed 1340 lbs. gross.

A total of 14 steers were slaughtered in the test run on Thursday, April 18. Company officials were unanimous in their praise of the operation of the plant's machinery.

"It was almost unbelievable. You don't usually crank up the machinery in a plant of this size and scope without having to shut down for adjustments. Everything was just perfect the first day," said Gene Frye, company president.

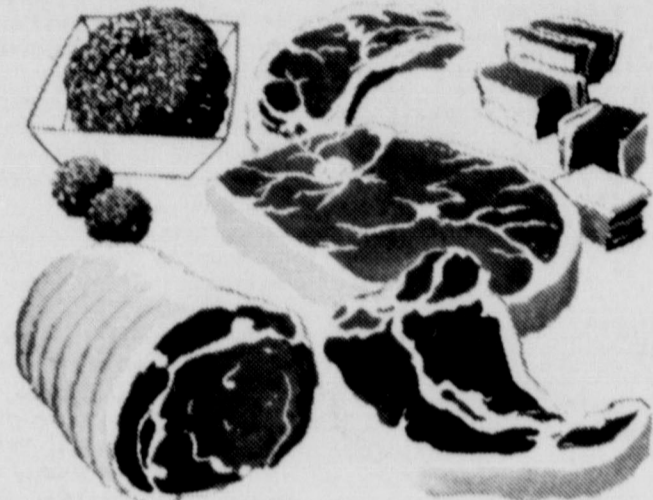

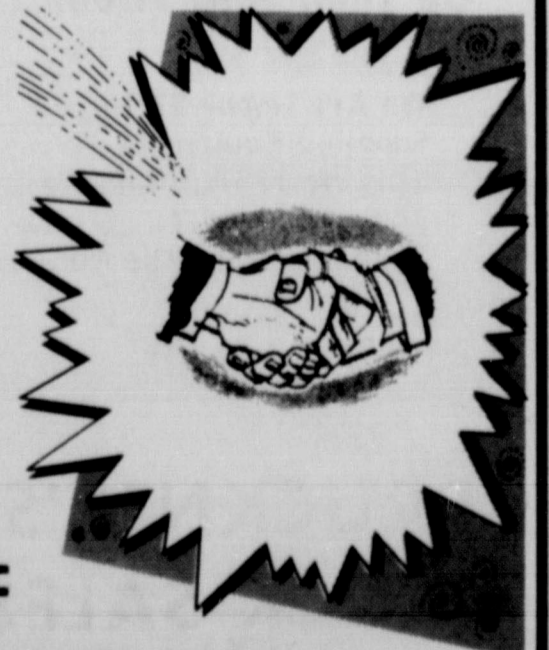

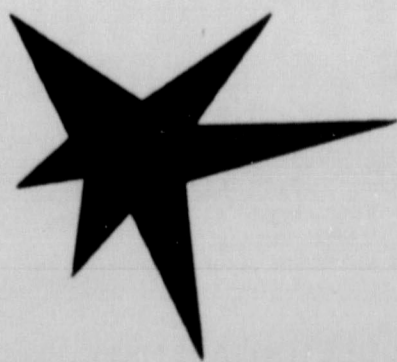

### At Home In Parmer County

#### ARE YOU A CALORIE COUNTER?

Winter weather seems to always cut down on physical activities and then spring comes along and finds us with a few extra pounds of weight that we do not need. Result, we are unable to get into last summer's garments, to our surprise.

Some women sort of panic at this point and start on "crash diets," trying to lose these extra pounds fast!

Some people do not want to bother with calorie counting. They are the ones that go on "crash" diets. They lose for awhile, then gain it all back again. It's really a "losing" proposition for them in more ways than the loss of visible weight (too often the body is deprived of essential nutrients).

The foods you allow yourself should contain more than "food energy." They should be packed with vitamins, minerals, and proteins needed to build the body and help keep you in good health throughout your "dieting" period -- and afterwards, too.

If you are eating less -- and concentrating on nutritional values -- then take a look at a few foods that supply valuable amounts of nutrients and yet relatively low in calories. Eggs are dependable source

of protein, iron (women need more than men) vitamin A, and riboflavin (vitamin B2) and vitamin D. Despite its high nutritive value, a large egg has only 80 calories. Eggs are versatile too. Can be fixed many ways.

Nearly everyone enjoys fresh fruits and most fresh, raw, unsweetened fruits have fewer than 100 calories per serving. All fruits have vitamin C in varying amounts. Citrus fruits, including grapefruit are rich in this vitamin. The "half-a-grapefruit for breakfast has only 55 to 60 calories. Added to other fruits its a refreshing appetizer, dessert or salad.

Another product that weight-watchers can use to advantage is instant nonfat dry milk. An eight-ounce glass of reconstituted nonfat dry milk contains only 90 calories -- about half that of whole milk and provides almost as much nutritive value. Even to mix equal amounts of reconstituted nonfat dry milk with fresh milk you still get fewer calories.

If you are counting calories, don't neglect the nutritional values of the foods you select. Choosing from the four basic food groups are important to health. The meat, milk, and fruit-vegetable are most important.

Clothing differs greatly from toddlers to adolescents to adults and for good reasons. Cricket B. Taylor, county home demonstration agent, explains that different age groups dress for different reasons. For instance, an infant's world is composed of his sense organs so textures and colors are important in his clothing.

A toddler's world is full of activity so his clothes should be non-restrictive, Mrs. Taylor says. The pre-schooler is at the "do - it - himself" stage and needs clothing which enables him to learn to dress himself. He is moving away from self-centeredness and glancing at the adult world.

New things, bright color, soft texture and tiny decorations intrigue him. His clothing must allow also for his activeness, says the home economist.

Adolescence is the age of individuality development in which the youngster is most concerned with poor reaction. He wants to be accepted by his group and dresses this way, she says. But they still show a certain amount of individuality.

A teenager's non-conforming dress may indicate he needs attention or he needs some rules set for him. The agent says it is better to allow the teenager to try many things.

He is developing his own philosophy of life.

But, Mrs. Taylor adds, he needs some basic direction.

The elderly, making up a growing segment of the population with more than 19 million Americans over 65 years old today, fits his wardrobe to fit his role, his self-concept and his physical changes.

We need to get away from the prototype of the grandmother image and the "little print dress" of the elderly, says Mrs. Taylor. Today the retired are still active and involved and they dress that way. They want fashion as much as the young women.

With more than \$40 billion buying power in elderly women, retailers are becoming increasingly interested in this group.
