


Now, through the steering the executive committee's efforts, the board

Interested persons should submit a resume to Great Plains CASA for Kids, Inc., Box 1306, Hereford, by August 29.





We figured she would get it the next morning. Wrong. It took two days to arrive. Postmaster Jack Glover said everything is required to be sent to Amarillo for sorting







A mixture of buying and the absence of any sustained selling boosted New York cotton futures to a four-day high on Wednesday before falling lower once again as the market found little enthusiasm for the upside. Fundamentally, sources reported declining cotton conditions in Texas, and USDA reported another exceptional week of export shipments

In its final sales and export report for the marketing year, USDA placed shipments for the week ending July 31 at 331,400 bales which boosted the yearly total to record levels. Exports of 10.9 million bales of U.S. upland cotton for the entire 2002-03 season represent a marketing year record, according to USDA. In fact, the department noted exports for 2002-03 were 7 percent greater than the previous year's total of 10.2 million bales.

The past month saw a rapid rise in U.S. cotton shipments as mills clamored to take advantage of the 2002-03 Step 2 marketing certificate. The payment comes into effect if the price of the cheapest U.S. growth is above the average of world cotton prices for four consecutive weeks and is designed to make U.S. cotton competitive. It recently had been close to marketing year highs, but the Step 2 rate changed with the start of the new marketing year, and according to traders, the new rate is considerably lower.

Activity slowed on the spot cotton scene as online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers decreased in the five trading days ending Aug. 7. Just 930 bales were sold compared to the previous week when 8,297 bales changed hands. Prices received

by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 45.50 to 54.00 cents per pound versus the previous week's 48.37 to 54.06 cents per pound range.

Meanwhile, the crop condition report released this week by USDA showed a slight deterioration in the U.S. cotton crop. As of Aug. 3, 16 percent of the crop was in poor to very poor condition versus 14 percent the previous week while the crop in good to excellent condition fell to 53 percent compared with 55 percent a week earlier. According to the report, crop conditions had worsened in Alabama, Oklahoma, North Carolina, Texas, and Virginia.

The percentage of the U.S. crop that had begun squaring increased to 94 percent versus 89 percent the previous week. Boll setting increased by 15 percentage points for the week to 69 percent but development still is behind the 83 percent reported at the same time one year ago and the five-year average of 84 percent.

Concerns about the condition of the Texas crop, the largest cotton producing state in the United States, have been raised by a number of traders recently as most of the state is in need of rain.

According to the Department of Agriculture's Drought Monitor data for the week ended Aug. 5, most of the High and Rolling Plains of Texas were considered to be in a "moderate drought" with parts of the region described as being in "severe drought." Irrigation has continued in the northern counties of the area; however, a prolonged period of wet weather is needed before subsoil moisture levels there return to normal.

Extension Agent-IPM There are some situations brewing in the Northwest Plains where some tough decisions must be made. To salvage a crop, some irrigated producers may have to defer their water to a portion of their planted acres. The added moisture required to sustain a plant in 100+ degree temperatures can cause significant stress as well as excessive water use just for plant suvival. combination of high heat, virtually no rainfall, wind, and low humidity make it very difficult to keep up with rainfall amount for July and August is 4.26 inches compared to .05 inches accumulated July 1 to date. While it goes against most producers grain to abandon a crop, it is sometimes a "best management practice" to defer inputs to a limited number of acres to deal with the abnormal environmental conditions mother nature has dealt. Before a producer abandons a crop or defers inputs in an attempt to salvage a crop, the crop insurance carrier must be notified to keep from jeopardizing crop insurance coverage.

The CC payment rate is calculated using the weighted average price received by farmers for the applicable Upland cotton marketing year that begins August 1 and runs through July 31 of the following calendar year.

We have a long history of facing the weather extremes of drought and flood, and Texans have become highly aware of how important water is to the state. That's why water officials and government leaders across the state are trying to figure out how we can create, reserve or recycle enough water to meet our present and future needs.


The concept of desalinating water basically a process that removes dissolved minerals including salt from seawater and brackish groundwater - is relatively new and not widespread, but such new or unconventional methods hold promise for more water, and these are precisely the ideas we should be

Last year Gov. Rick Perry directed the Texas Water Development Board to develop recommendations for a largescale seawater demonstration project. Most recently, TWDB narrowed its recommendations down to three desalination projects that should be seriously considered for implementation. The projects, which would be located in Freeport, Corpus Christi or Brownsville, were chosen based on their potential for implementation. Further research is being done to determine the long-term benefits of these desalination technologies, and any progress is a step in the right direction for Texas water.

In Texas, every drop of water counts, and we must continue to think creatively to come up with a safe, drought-proof supply of water if we expect to meet our future needs.

Bovina I.S.D Lunch Program

Bovina ISD is announcing its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch/Breakfast Program. The Office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households, provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.

Households who do not list a food stamp number or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social

security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "none". The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy the school secretary will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Charles Carter, Supt., P.O. Box 70, Bovina, TX, (806) 251-1336.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.
